## ADJUSTMENT OF INSURANCE LOSSES

Continental Lumber Company Carried Heavy Fire Risk.

Adjustment of the insurance losses, on the plant of the Continental Lumber Company at Charlo, destroyed by fire on September 24th, discloses the fact that the fire was the most costly from an insurance standpoint in the province in recent years. The total insurance carried was about \$425,000 and in the adjustment which has just been completed the insurance loss was placed at approximately \$365,000 or nearly eighty-six per cent of the amount carried.

The approximate individual losses are as follows: Continental Lumber Company on the plant and contents, other buildings and contents and lumber on the premises, \$230,000, or about 94 p.c. Goodday and Company Ltd., Quebec, on lumber, \$49,000, or about 75 p.c.

Montreal Lumber Company, Ltd., Montreal, on lumber \$17,850, or about 76 p.c.

Brownlee and Company, Ltd., Glasgow, Scotland, on lumber, \$68,000 or about 51 p.c.

The mill destroyed was one of the most up to date in the province, having been constructed in 1914 to replace one which was destroyed after having been struck by lightning. The owners have decided to rebuild immediately and already the foundations are being laid for a new mill.

London, Oct. 11.—The Prince of Wales, who reached Spithead yesterday on the battle cruiser *Benbow*, made a triumphant entry into London today, on his return after his six months tour of the empire. Hundreds of thousands of persons turned out to give the prince one of the greatest welcomes of the kind in the history of the country.

From Victoria station, where he was met by the royal family, Premier Lloyd George and other dignitaries, all along the route to Buckingham Palace, the streets were lined with vast, cheering multitudes eager to catch a glimpse of the prince.

The Duke of York and Prince Henry, brothers of the Prince of Wales, boarded the *Benbow* last night to welcome the prince home.

## RESTIGOUCHE IN OPPOSITION

Both Conservative Candidates Elected—Race for Second Place a Close One.

Saturday was a perfect day for the election, fine and cool and the workers were early on the move. Despite the efforts of all parties only a little over one half the total number of electors on the list exercised their franchise, and of these a goodly number were ladies. One feature of the voting was the large number of ballots spoiled. This was put down to the ignorance of the ladies in the first attempt in the use of this ballot. In the prohibition election they marked the ballot with an X and many insisted in so marking their ballots on Saturday.

## NASTARD BOY FATALITY INJURED

First Public Works Accident to Occur in West Bathurst Mill.

Bathurst, N. B., Oct. 11.—The most serious accident to occur in the West Bathurst mill of the Bathurst Lumber Co., since its erection eleven years ago, occurred last Tuesday when Nastard Roy, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. M. Roy of West Bathurst was so badly injured that he died a few hours afterwards in the hospital.

Just how the accident happened, nobody knows, as none of the men working in the mill noticed the young man until he was seen to be caught among the slasher saws.

His work was as a cleaner, and it is supposed that while gathering up refuse in the neighborhood of the slasher equipment, his scraper must have caught in one of the saws and drawn him against it. As soon as the unfortunate man's plight was discovered by one of the edgemen, the machinery was stopped and the lacerated body rushed to the hospital, where it was found that one leg and one foot had been severed and other severe injuries sustained.

The victim of the accident retained consciousness from the time of his terrible injuries until about two hours later when he died, and his courageous bearing throughout was remarkable. The funeral took place on Thursday.

RESULTS OF TAG DAY.

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**S. S. CONVENTION HELD HERE**

Interesting and Instructive Session Held in the Baptist Church.

The annual convention of the Restigouche and Bonaventure Sunday School Association was held in the Baptist Church, Campbellton, on Sept. 23rd and 24th. There were four sessions the first one on the evening of the 23rd, the president, Mr. Thos. Young, of Oak Bay Mills, P. Q., occupying the chair.

After devotional exercises and the appointment of the usual committees, Mayor Murray extended a very hearty welcome to the delegates present and wished them all success in their deliberations. This was replied to by Rev. W. A. Ross, the General Secretary.

Rev. J. S. Harrington then delivered a very thoughtful and earnest address on the methods of teaching. He strongly emphasized the need of the teacher to discover a common ground work of knowledge in the mind of the scholar on which to build, as the unknown is always interpreted in terms of the known.

After a hymn had been sung and the offering taken the General Secretary, Rev. W. A. Ross, then gave an address on Our New Association, Plans and Programme, in which he clearly outlined the work of the new organization. The territory was large and there were now 225 districts and 39 County Associations, besides the Summer Schools and Boy's and Girl's Conferences. He pointed out that under the new regulations the work was now definitely taken up by the different denominations, they having appointed Associate Secretaries who will devote their whole time to it.

The meeting closed with the benediction.

The second session opened at 9:30 Friday morning the devotional exercises being conducted by Rev. J. H. King.

The president's report showed that following last year's convention plans for organization of six District Associations had been formed and five of the Districts had been organized as follows: Campbellton, Dalhousie, New Mills, Matapedia and Ecuinimac. Organization had not been effected in New Richmond but it was hoped to have this done shortly.

The report of the District Secretaries showed that very fine conventions had been held at Matapedia and Ecuinimac.

The Secretary Treasurer, Mr. J. T. Reid, reported that out of four of the Districts had reported and these only partially. The total amount received was \$95.30. As our allocation was \$200.00 he impressed on the delegates the need of having the schools send in their contributions at once so that the amount would be in hand before the Maritime Convention.

Mr. Ross then led a conference on County Association Methods during which it was suggested that instead of the General Secretaries trying to cover all the District Conventions that a three day County Convention be held and all the business be disposed of on the first day and the rest of the time be devoted to educational work along the line of the summer school. Nothing definite was decided on the matter, however.

Plans for District Conventions at Campbellton, Dalhousie, New Mills were formulated and Mr. Ross agreed to arrange for a visit from Rev. J. H. A. Anderson of Chatham for this purpose.

Rev. W. Camp then gave a talk on Matt. 22, 42, "What think ye of Christ," in which he deeply impressed upon his hearers the need of getting into right relation with Christ, that we might be true witnesses for Him.

The meeting closed with prayer and benediction by Rev. W. A. Ross.

The third session opened at 2:15 with devotional exercises conducted by Rev. H. Miller. This followed reports from Mrs. J. C. Ferguson, Sup't of the Children's Division and Miss Mabel Keith from the Educational Committee showing that some satisfactory work in these departments had been done.

Mrs. M. P. Moore then gave a talk on the work amongst the Older Girls, outlining what her own class had accomplished in a very practical way in adopting a boy in India and in making Sunday School Conventions 2 up garments for missionary fields.

Rev. E. A. Kinley, Representative of the Baptist denomination, then gave a very earnest address on Christian Education, What We Expect from it and How We Seek to Produce it.

Jails Are Closed and No Call for Soup Kitchens Since Prohibition.

TORONTO, Oct. 4.—As a result of prohibition in the province of Ontario three of the seven provincial jails have been closed and the prison population reduced from 1,970 to about 1,000, according to Brigadier W. H. Fraser, of the Salvation Army here, in an interview.

"Before prohibition we had a soup kitchen, but we don't have to keep one going now," said Brig. Fraser. "Before prohibition I used to have sixty or seventy persons lined up at my office door seeking relief. There is none of that now."

Mr. Ross informed the convention that the Maritime Convention would be held in Charlottetown on Nov. 16th to 19th and he would like to have an exhibit of handwork and asked any person having same to forward it to him.

Rev. W. Camp then gave another of his interesting and impressive Bible Messages from John 14, 5, "He that hath seen Me hath seen the Father."

At the Fri. evening session Mr. Ross gave a splendid address on "How Religion Grows." Religion is the matter we are dealing with in the S. S. and is the soul's attitude to God. The grace of God is the love of God in action and the three steps were 1st, Christian Nurture, 2nd, Christian Decision, 3rd, Christian Experience.

Rev. F. E. Boothroyd then spoke on the subject of Temperance and showed how temperance effected the home, the community and in the field of economics. He suggested that the teacher take one idea in the quarterly lessons and press it home and advocate pledge signing in the school.

On motion the time and place of next convention was left in the hands of the Executive.

### FOSTER GOV'T. IS SUSTAINED

Good Working Majority in Next Legislature Assured—The New House.

One of the features of Saturday's polling was the elimination of men whose names had figured prominently in several investigations. To the surprise of many, the vote in the legislature is attributed to the defeat of Hon. B. Frank Smith in Carleton and Hon. James A. Murray in Kings county.

If a recount in St. John county should wipe out Hon. J. B. M. Baxter's lead of ten votes over A. F. Bentley then only one of the men who were named during these investigations would have a seat in the legislature, providing Mr. Jones is safe in Kings.

Six government supporters and six opposition men who were members of the last house and who were candidates for re-election were named, including two members of the cabinet and two former members of the old cabinet. These were Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, minister of agriculture; Hon. Robert Murray, provincial secretary; Hon. J. A. Murray, formerly premier of the province; Hon. B. Frank Smith, formerly minister of public works; Hon. P. D. Tilley, Dr. J. Roy Campbell, F. L. Potts, Thomas B. Carson, Arthur T. LeBlanc, Dr. McGrath, Hon. J. P. Burchill and D. V. Allain.

The result in Restigouche county was not considered as a surprise inasmuch as the third ticket of Hon. Charles H. LaBillicois, formerly a member of the old Blair cabinet, made it impossible for the government ticket to be elected.

The overturn in Northumberland was a great surprise. It was known, of course, that a strong independent element had been in process of formation there for some time. The several thousand workmen had been organized since the previous election and they had two winning candidates in the field. The union men, Farmers and Independent Liberals rolled up a heavy vote. Their success in Northumberland is not a victory for the Baxter party by any means.

Hon. Dr. D. V. Landry, formerly provincial secretary, had no better luck in Kent than he did in 1917, and Colonel John Sheridan, who figured in one of the many disclosures of the old days, also fell by the wayside.

Colonel O. W. Wetmore and Sterling I. Keith, the good government candidates, made a magnificent showing and Colonel Wetmore's election is one of the brightest spots in the political map, as indicating that Kings does not honor Hon. Mr. Murray's record.

# YOUR RAILWAYS

## AND THE COST OF LIVING

**B**EFORE the Privy Council at Ottawa protest against the new railway rates has been made on the grounds that the giving of the new rates would raise the cost of living by a percentage many times higher than the percentage actually charged by the Canadian Railways.

It was pointed out that the numerous middlemen who act as distributors of goods would each add his percentage of profit to the freight rate, so that although the railways might only receive say 40 cents additional freight charge on a shipment, the public would be forced, by the distributing middlemen to pay many times that amount.

The management of the various Canadian railways desire through this their Association, to draw the attention of newspaper readers to the highly significant fact that the recent increase in United States railway rates—an increase similar to the increase in Canada—has actually been followed by a decrease in the cost of living in that country!

### Furthermore

A great Canadian manufacturer recently made public—without any solicitation and without the previous knowledge of the railway managements—figures which proved that the retail selling-price of a yard of plain white cloth in Winnipeg after being hauled from Montreal to Toronto and Toronto to Winnipeg, would be increased only one-half a cent even after the wholesaler had added 20 p. c. profit to the new freight rate and the retailer another 50 p. c.!

He showed that these distributors, whether rightly or wrongly, added 15 cents to his mill-price of 16 cents per yard!

Yet the railways carried the raw cotton for this yard of goods from Texas to Montreal, and the finished goods from the mill to Toronto and Toronto to Winnipeg for one and one-half cents!

One and one-half cents as against fifteen cents!

We venture to believe that, whatever the explanation or the justification may be, the same serious additions to cost by the distributing trades will be found in relation to almost every article of common household use. This is not to attack distributors. They may themselves be victims of a bad system of an over-crowded trade. But it is to point out that if they add whatever percentages they, as a trade, find convenient on top of the freight rates the railways cannot help either themselves or the public. The oppressive results of these practices should not be charged against the railway managements, nor cited as reasons for holding freight rates down—merely because railway rates can be held down—while other prices soar as the various trades find necessary.

**R**AILWAY charges always must be a serious item in determining cost of production; but the managements of your railways urge upon your attention this fact: that antiquated, over-loaded and wasteful systems of distributing goods are much more properly a subject for public anxiety!

Canada cannot prosper without prosperous railways. Canadian railroads cannot prosper unless Canada prospers!

In all sincerity let us suggest that the people of Canada beware of those who would restrict and even strangle the railways of Canada **SIMPLY BECAUSE CONTROL EXISTS THERE—AND IS NOT SO CONVENIENT** in other departments of commercial activity!

Bonaventure County Man Appreciates Fine Exhibit.

The following address will no doubt be read with much interest by the readers of the Graphic in this vicinity and on the Gaspe Coast, as it was delivered by Mr. George Montgomery of New Richmond Centre, Que., on the closing evening of the Fair, October 1st.

Ladies & Gentlemen:  
I remember hearing someone say that the chief excellence of a political speaker consisted in his being able to make a long speech and say nothing. Now ladies and gentlemen, I would like to reverse that order of things and say a great deal in a few words and in a very short time.

To commence, ladies allow me to congratulate you on the success of this fair, success followed energy and perseverance and I wish on behalf of the County of Bonaventure to sincerely thank you for the zeal and perseverance you have manifested in the accomplishment of this success. And while I am on this theme, let me say that I cannot find words to express the gratitude I feel towards the ladies of Restigouche and Bonaventure for the kind consideration they showed to our boys at the front in providing and sending comforts to cheer them when their hearts needed cheering and mothers, wives, sisters and sweethearts let me say that your prayers for the loved ones at the front and in the trenches was a factor in winning the war, the magnitude of which we cannot estimate or form any conception.

Now for the object of this Fair, the creation of a Soldiers' Memorial Hospital. Northern New Brunswick and the peninsula of Gaspesia has long felt the want of such an institution. The distances, difficulties and expense of going to Montreal with a patient excluded all but the wealthy from taking advantage of the hospital there, and even people in comfortable circumstances mostly always postponed the trip until the case was hopeless and a great many valuable lives were lost for lack of a hospital nearer home. When this hospital is completed things will be altogether different, when a case is beyond the skill of the local doctor, rush them to the hospital without delay where they will be properly attended. Parties who can pay their expenses will be expected to do so, those not so well circumstanced will pay part and the unfortunate will get free treatment.

Now ladies and gentlemen when the laboring classes come to realize the importance of this hospital the contributions will be much more liberal. In the meantime we talk about it as if it was an skating rink or fire station or a depot or something exclusively for Campbellton, but when they come to know that it is "Our Hospital" things will be different. Of course there will always be difficulties in raising funds, such as life, but remember patience and perseverance overcome difficulties. So much for the hospital.

It is to be an memorial to our boys who went overseas to fight for humanity and freedom, for those who lie "where poppies grow" on Flanders field" as well as those who returned, do they deserve it? I think so. We can scarcely do too much for them. They have earned a name that will live in history. For instance, take Vimy Ridge, it was supposed to be invulnerable. Gen. Sir Arthur Currie thought different and said so. So he was given the chance to try with his Canadians and they did drive the Germans and took the ridge. Probably some of our local boys fell there than in any other single scrap in the war, but their fall was not a failure, for that fight broke the German's courage so that they never put up a good stiff fight after that. And at Ypres when the Germans first used poison gas the Moroccans fled and left the road to Calais open. The Canadians blocked the way and held the Germans in check for thirty-six hours until they were relieved, one of the most heroic achievements we have any account of in history.

Gen. Smith Dorrien said, "when I heard that the Moroccans had fled, I predicted one of the greatest casualties ever befall the British army when the word came that the Canadians were holding I did not believe it, but when message after message came in

South Africa to Celebrate Arrival of Chapman, Welch Carried the First Settlers

SOUTH AFRICA has its Maydower, the little ship Chapman, the first of a fleet of sailing ships which a dozen years ago brought to its shores a body of British settlers who left an enduring mark on the country. It is coincidence that in the very year in which America will be celebrating the tercentenary of the arrival of the Pilgrim Fathers on the Mayflower, South Africa is celebrating the centenary of the arrival of British settlers, or, as they are commonly called, the 1820 settlers. At that time the Cape had been under British rule less than a quarter of a century, and was occupied almost entirely by Dutch speaking settlers, who had mostly settled in the western districts owing to the distress and economic pressure resulting from the Napoleonic wars.

The British Government decided to promote the settlement of the eastern province. On this project they were prepared to expend the sum of £20,000. The scheme was eagerly taken up, and out of a large number of applications some 4,000 men, women and children were selected, not never has so small an expedition been so successful. The settlers proved to be of the true pioneer spirit, and their conditions and (faced with even less favorable hard-ship and difficulty, they soon began to prosper. Their descendants are scattered throughout South Africa, bearing some of the honored names of the colony.

"As a result of this breaking up and in an automatic manner, France will find herself on the rack."

"When Autenrieth shows the development of the next three wars he does not allow his desire to direct his thought. For, although he is a good patriot, he is above all a cold and clear-seeing calculator, and he is not trying to create an agitation."

"Without misplaced optimism (continues the notice) but as a natural consequence of facts, he shows the rising again of Germany by work and her mission in the next great conflict that between the white and the yellow races."

"He shows the road by which this recovery is attained, through united work and a wise utilization of the actual situation, which probably will establish itself sooner than the masses of people think."

France must foresee the gnashing of teeth; she will see the day which, they having no further need of her, she will be thrown to one side and then crushed."
