From there the Prince will go to Japan, and thence to San Francisco, New York, London and Paris.

Edgar, member for West Ontario, was moved by Mr. Laurier, seconded by Sir Richard Cartwright. There was no objection to him on the part of the Opposition. Sir Charles Tupper, who spoke for them, contented himself with expressing regret that the Government should have departed from the custom which would have given the Speakership of this Parliament to a French member. The remark was received by the French Liberals with laughter, which did not encourage the baronet's complaint. After brief speeches by Hon. Mr. Laurier, and Sir Charles Tupper, Dr. Bourinot, as clerk of the House, put the motion, and, in accordance with the response, declared Mr. Edgar elected Speaker. Mr. Edgar acknowledged his election in an appropriate speech. He made a hit by repeating it in French after having spoken it in English. The Conservative Frenchmen joined laughing applause which rewarded the Speaker's graceful compliment to the French-Canadian section of the House. This concluded the formalities of

### WINTER BARLEY.

An Avon Farmer Grows It Successfully -Samples Came From Germany.

Winter barley is a novelty in Canada, but Mr. J. De Groat, of Avon, has a goodly crop of it. A couple of years ago his brother-in-law was sent a small quantity of the seed from Germany in a letter. He sowed it, and the results were very satisfactory. Mr. De Groat secured some of it and last fall sowed about two acres of it. He cut a luxuriant crop on June 27, this year, an unusually early date. It was of fine quality, having headed out splendidly. Mr. De Groat is enthusiastic over the new barley, and claims many advantages for it. It was not attacked by any of the pests that preyed on the spring grain. He estimates that the average yield would be 40 or 50 bushels to the acre, and thinks it may be pastured in the fall. His brother-in-law at Walsingham has a great crop. Mr. De Groat has a considerable quantity on hand, and would be pleased to send specimens to those desiring them.

Death of Hon. W. D. Balfour, the Provincial Secretary,

In the Parliament Buildings, Wednesday Evening.

The Patient Conscious to the Last - In terment to Take Place at St. Catharines.

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 20.-Hon. W. D. Balfour, Provincial Secretary, died in the Parliament Buildings, Queen's Park, at five minutes past six last A Workman Cooked Alive During the evening. In the afternoon his illness took a turn for the worse, and he sank gradually. By four o'clock hope had been given up, and his family were summoned to the bedside. He was conscious up to half an hour of end, and bade farewell to his father, mother, wife, three sisters and eldest son, who were present.

THE FATAL ILLNESS. The illness, which proved fatal, was consumption, which developed into hemorrhage of the lungs, and finally this was complicated by pneumonia. All his medical attendants - Drs. Amyot, McPherson, Graham, and Chamberlain, of Toronto, and Fisher, of Amherstburg-were present during the day, but their combined skill was unavailing. During the afternoon Rev. Ross G. Morrison, of Toronto University, a Presbyterian clergyman, was in attendance, and spent much time with the dying man.

Mr. Balfour was perfectly conscious of the critical condition in which he was, and on Tuesday made his will. The family was in attendance as long as consciousness remained, and bade him an affectionate farewell. were induced to go into another room, and Dr. Fisher and another attendant were the only persons present at the actual moment of dissolution.

## Important Experiments.

Leading Varieties of Winter Wheat Throughout Ontario,

Results of Co-operative Experimental Work During Last Year.

Within the past seven years 133 varieties of winter wheat have been very carefully tested in the experimental department at the Agricultural College, Guelph. Besides ascertaining the comparative yields of grain and straw of the different varieties, the wheats have been closely examined each year for their quality of grain, time of maturity, strength of straw, freedom from rust, etc., in order to determine which kinds will give the most satisfactory results, when grown under uniform conditions. After the various varieties | Early Genesee, have been carefully tested at the college for a few years, those which have given the best satisfaction are selected for distribution throughout Ontario This system of co-operative experimental work enables the farmers to determine for themselves which of the leading varieties will give the best results upon their own particular farms. As a practical result from obtaining information in this way, hundreds of farmers are now growing varieties in their regular farm practice, which were entirely unknown to them a short time ago. For instance, the Dawson's Golden Chaff variety of winter wheat, which has recently given such high average yields of grain per acre, both at the college and throughout Ontario, was scarcely known except in one neighborhood near Guelph, until it was sown in our experimental grounds in 1891, and afterwards distributed for co-operative experimental work. This is now one of the most popular varieties of winter wheat in

In the fall of 1895 nine leading varieties of winter wheat were distributed in this way. They were divided into two sets, with five varieties in each. The Dawson's Golden Chaff was used in both sets to form a basis by which the results of all the varieties could be compared with one another. Each person who wanted to conduct an experiment, stated in his application which set he desired, and the five varieties in the set selected were sent to his address, with full instructions for conducting the experiment. The grain was sown at the rate of one and one-third bushels per acre, upon plots exactly uniform in size and shape. The yields per acre have been calculated from the actual results obtained from

Ninety reports of carefully conducted experiments have been received this season up to the time of writing. As these came from 27 of the counties in Ontario, the results should be of real practical value to the farmers of the



Mileage and Per Diem Allowance Lost Mr. Atwell Fleming Honored-Officers' Salaries Fixed.

Ottawa, Aug. 20.-The High Court of the I. O. F. resumed business yesterday morning. Rev. Alex. Macgillivray, P. H. C. R., who has just returned from the High Court at Washington, conveyed to the court the fraternal greetings of the High Court of that district.

Mr. Barlow Cumberland presented a

lengthy report on behalf of the finance committee, showing that the last year's estimated receipts of \$16,000 had been exceeded by \$693, and drawing attention to the fact that the arrears of subordinate courts to the High Court had increased from \$860 to \$2,015. The expenses of the High Court at London last year had been estimated at \$1,500, but had cost only \$1,222. The general expenses for the year were \$8.687 of the amount only had been used for this account. The report commended the management for its efficiency, inasmuch as its economy had resulted in a surplus of \$6,393, part of It showed the liabilities to be \$6,273,

Dr. Oronhyatekha was asked why was the clause providing for old age benefits and annuities after the 70th birthday withdrawn. This report caused one of the most interesting and heated debates of the High Court, lasting over two hours, the brethren objecting to it on the ground that a notice of motion had been given at London last year to repeal the bylaw made at Peterboro two years ago, and the brethren who spoke in opposition to the report felt that they ought to be able not only to repeal the bylaw but to pass a reso-lution providing for the payment of the delegates' mileage and per diem allowance. The High Court, however, read that the High Counselor be instructed to prepare a bylaw to be adopted at this High Court, rescinding estimated at \$10,000, but the sum of the bylaw passed at Peterboro, which was carried, and the obnoxious bylaw repealed, but the brethren failed to carry a resolution authorizing the payment of delegates' mileage and per

liem allowance.

CHEMICAL TREATMENT OF SEW-

AGE.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: A correspondent suggests that chemical treatment of our sewage might be preferable to the plan which has been indorsed by the Provincial Board of Health. This has been carefully considered-both Mr. Horetzky (one of our consulting engineers) and myself having been disposed to favor that method. Investigation showed us, however, that while it was good in the ory, and would probably be most efficient some day when cheaper chemicals could be obtained, at present it would be a failure. In the first place, the ordinary chemical treatment of sewage only disposes of about half the impurity-the water that would flow into the river after treatment would still be impure. In the next place, we would have an enormous amount of "sludge" to get rid of. A million gallons of sewage will make about four tons of sludge, even after the latter has gone through a sludge press. At the very outset we would have about five tons of sludge on our hands every day. We could not allow it to accumulate at the works, for it speedily becomes offensive; it would cost a large sum to cart it away every day; and then the township authorities would prosecute us for creating a nuisance in the locality where it might be dumped. Experience proves that farmers will not take it away to any extent for manure, even though they get it for nothing. We would have an elephant on our hands. East Orange, N. J., undertook to dispose of the sewage of fifteen thousand people by chemical treatment. The cost of the works, tanks, sludge presses, buildings, etc., exclusive of land, was \$80,000; and the cost of running the concern for seven years averaged \$9,174 a year. Then the Board o Health of the adjacent township filed a bill in chancery against the East Orange people for creating a nuisance; and they have had to spend \$250,000 more to carry their sewage to tide water. The citizens may rest assured that we have carefully con-

Significance of the Fight for Free Silver in the States.

(Bystander, in the Toronto Sun ) In the United States the Republican leaders, there is reason for believing, decided on their plan of campaign. and resolved to make the currency he main issue, throwing the tariff in to the background. The McKinley tariff, however, it is believed, will be withdrawn, and a revision of duties, such as may restore the revenue, will be put forward in its place. It remains to be seen how this will satisfy the ultra-protectionist Republican on one hand, or Democrats who are thoroughgoing free tracers on the other. There are symptoms already of dissent on the part of free trade Democrats. If these continue it will apparently be necessary to have recourse to the device, otherwise weak, of bringing out a third candidate to take off the votes of free trade Democrats, or Democrats who cling inseparably to the name, and whom nothing will induce to vote for a Republi-

can. > How Canada's Bong Birds Are Being Ki led Out. Ottawa Free Press.

Can nothing be done to protect the birds of Canada? In the economy of nature they are evidently designed to play an important part, and their extinction may bring evils in its train which we do not at the moment appreciate. In spite of appeals to the better nature of the gentler sex vanity still dominates, and even egret plumes which have to be obtained by acts of the most deliberate cruelty, still beautify (?) the headgear of the feminine part of the community. And there are other evidences of the destruction of birds to be witnessed all around.

A bad feature of the matter is that this destruction of birds is often merely a deliberate and wanton act merely for the sake of killing, and it is not to be denied that wherever birds gather there will also gather the slaughterers with all sorts and conditions of shotguns, and even the catapult is brought into play. bird will soon become a thing of the past. 


