Commissioner Mitchell Will Move That Buchanan Take Glaubitz Job.

A MEETING TOMORROW

Glaubitz Will Be Retired For Good, as People Want

BUCHANAN IS GOOD MAN

Salary To Be Paid Manager Will Be Decided Upon Later.

At a meeting of the Public Utilities Commission on Thursday afternoon, Commissioner F. G. Mitchell, who headed the polls at the last municipal election, will move that Acting Manager E. V. Buchanan be made permanent general manager of the public utilities in place and stead of H. J. Glaubitz, temporarlly resigned manager. Mr. Mitchell stated to The Advertiser this morning that the commission would have this motion to deal with when the meeting was called to order temorrow.

"This will mean that Mr. Glaubitz will be retired for good?" was asked.

People Want Wishes Obeyed. "Yes; as far as I am concerned Mr. Glaubitz is through with that position. The people decided that at the municipal election. I feel that they want this expression (A inion carried into effect as quie, ly as possible, and it is for this reason that I will move that Mr. Buchanan be appointed. As far as I can ascertain, he has all qualifications required for the position, and has done a great deal of the work in connection with it since he the staff. His work since Mr. Glaubitz retired has been satisfactory, and I see my duty clearly in the matter.'

Glaubitz Ignored Requests.
Asked as to the proposed investigation before the couty judge, Mr. Mitchell stated that the special committee of the city council had made an investigation, and that their findings were on the minutes of the council. The matter had been looked into, and the finding made. While he was desirous of giving Mr. Glaubitz every chance to clear himself of specific charges we could not forget that Mr. Glaubitz had ignored the requests of the council to appear before the special committee, when he had been offered the chance to make a statement in connection with the escape of Becker, the German re-

What action the utilities commissioners will take on Commissioner Mitchell's motion is unknown. Acvote against his motion will be voting to retain Mr. Glaubitz. The salary to be paid to the new manager had not been decided by Mr. Mitchell. That was a matter for the commission to decide, Buchanan Doesn't Know.

### Private Houses In Six Towns Suffer Most Damage, Public Buildings Escaping---Darkness of Night and Mist Enabled Enemy To Escape Without Damage

(Canadian Press.)

London, Jan. 20.—German airmen delivered their long predicted attack on England last night. From a base presumably in Germany they flew over the North Sea to the eastern coast of England, where for nearly four hours, from 8:20 p.m. until about midnight, they circled over a group of some six English towns, only a little more than 100 miles from London, apparently dropping bombs at will.

FOUR OR FIVE KILLED. So far as has been learned today four or five persons were

killed by these missiles and about as many wounded. Whether these airships were Zeppelin dirigibles or aeroplanes has not yet definitely been established. There is increasing belief in London this morning that possibly only aeroplanes

took part in the attack. There has been no news so far today to confirm the report current last night that a Zeppelin has been brought down on the English coast; on the contrary it now appears as though all the German raiders have returned whence they came. KING HAD LEFT.

The most important towns over which the German airmen appeared were Sandringham, Yarmouth, Sheringham, Hunstanton, Cromer, Heacham, Dersingham and King's Lynn. King George had left Sandringham only a few hours before the Ger-

Most of the damage inflicted appears to have been on private houses and shops; few public buildings or docks seem to have been injured.

SKILLFUL PILOTS.

The raiding airmen showed excellent ability to pilot their vessels, as well as good marksmanship. In spite of the darkness of the night they seemed to find their way over the country with remarkable directness, and the accuracy of their aim with bombs was greater than generally had been believed ONE SOLDIER KILLED,

Among those killed is one soldier. The property damage does not exceed a few thousand dollars. A shoemaker and a woman were killed at Yarmouth, and a civilian and the soldier lost their lives at King's Lynn.

The police reports from the towns upon which bombs were thrown say that the public responded very well to the raid instructions recently made public. For the most part the people took refuge in their cellars. Several theatres were emptied

An unexploded bomb found in Yarmouth weighed six pounds and is cone-shaped.

RETALIATION URGED.

Comment of the British press on the airship attack is bitter in tone, many of the London papers assailing the Germans in the same unmeasured language as at the time of the Hartlepool naval raid. The event is being used as a text

for editorials urging more rapid recruiting. The Pall Mall Gazette says that the only fitting answer is the sending of fresh armies to the continent. The Westminster Gazette characterizes the raid as a violation of the rules of warfare. The Globe urges retaliation in kind, observing that there are several flourishing German towns within easy reach of British airmen.

A press dispatch received here from Yarmouth says it is generally believed there that the raiders of last night came in aeroplanes of large size.

PROBABLY ATROPLANES.

There still is a difference of opinion among Englishmen as to whether the aerial raiders were Zeppelin dirigible balloons or aeroplanes and the weight of opinion is steering to the latter, though a considerable number of observers believe they,

At Yarmouth, which is the largest of the towns visited by the aircraft, the Post today issued the positive statement that the raiders were aeroplanes. The small size of the bombs and the few missiles dropped supports the theory that they were not Zeppelins, as those air vessels could carry a much more formidable cargo of explosives.
