The manifesto denounces "the intrigues" of the great powers and their "proposal to use alien satellite armies to prosecute a war which their own soldiers have refused to wage"—incicating among the "satellites" Japan and Poland.



Berlin, Jan. 28.—Indication of the government's growing concern over the extradition of Germans accused of war offences was given in the acts sent to the Allies today, asking revision of clauses of the Versailles treaty. The attempted assassination of Mathias Brzberger, minister of finance, last Monday, is viewed in official circles as a precursor of what is likely to happen on a larger scale if the government, yielding to the Allies, appeals to force in arresting men on the list submitted by the Entente Powers. The note to the Allies, which will not be published in Germany, warns the Entente Powers that Germany cannot assume she is able to compel either national or local agencies of the law to lay hands on the men wauted and transfer them to German frontiers. 

HOW TO INCREASE ASSESSMENTS AND YET PLEASE PEOPLE

Brantford Commissioner Tells Rev. William Sparling To Sucof His Plan.

CLAIMS IT IS SUCCESS

Less Than Fifty Appeals Being Entered in Six Years.

A. G. Ludlow, assessment commissioner of Brantford, in an interesting address before the members' council of the chamber of commerce at noon today in the Tecumseh House, explained the system used in Brantford, which in the last six years has increased the assessment of that city one million dolars. Less than 50 appeals were entered by citizens in that time.

Mr. Ludlow explained that all land was assessed at its actual value and interesting acceptance of the call extended to him are noon today. Dr. R. G. Peever, the present pastor of the church, will not leave until the expiration of his term. July, 1921, Mr. Chapman stated and Mr. Sparling, if he has accepted the call, will succeed him. In arriving at house values the speaker stated that the assessors measured right around the outside of the house and then multiplied the total by the height of the building, adding six feet for a building that was totally excavated underneath. A certain multiple was then used to arrive at the assessed value. In Brantford the multiple for

cheaper or rougher class buildings was 3, and ran up to 14. The multiple for factories ranged from 10 to 16, and wholesale houses at 20.

Improvements Costly.

A house of 3,000 cubic feet space was assessed \$300 extra if it had a hot water heating system. If the house contained a bath tub, another \$100 was added to its value, and still another \$100 was tacked on for each additional bath. In other words it cost extra to keep clean. In Brantford 85 per cent of the houses had "modern improvements."

A veranda seven feet wide had its width multiplied by two and to this a nought was added, the assessment being therefore \$140, an eight-foot affair would be assessed at \$160.

It was easy to classify the various types of houses. In London there were about ten classes, and the multiple system could be used in every class.

In speaking of depreciations in value Mr. Ludlow declared that the penalty should be never on the way who let his commercial high school, will be considered by the commercial advisory committee at a meeting tonight. Mr. Ludlow stated that from the assessment report he had received several years ago from London, this city had 6,073 vacant lots in its area of 6,000 acres. The remedy of the vacant lot problem was assessment at its full value if not a little beyond. "Put it that they would sell for less. There is one firm or man in your city that owns 75 lots. If you over-assess him he will get busy and build." He advised the

get busy and build. He advised the city not to be in a hurry to take in new subdivisions.

Mr. Ludlow told of a Brantford scheme in which the citizens had invested. They bought their land and scheme in which the citizens had invested. They bought their land and built houses of the same design, and by buying materials in carload lots reduced the cost 25 per cent. He was told that London people had turned this scheme down. "Well, then, they did not have it explained to them in the right way," he exclaimed, and went on to tell how Brantford had built a number of factory buildings and rented them to firms at 8 per cent of the building cost for five years, with an option of buyfor five years, with an option of buy ing. KOLCHAK SURRENDERS TO SAVE WHOLE ARMY

Gave Himself Up On Advice of General Janin.

London, Jan. 29 .- Admiral Kolchak's urrender to Siberian revolutionists was authorized by Gen. Janin of the Czech army, who was placed in command of all allied troops west of Irkutsk on January 19, by Kolchak's order, says a Harbin dispatch to the Daily Mail.

A profound sensation was caused hroughout the Far East by the report throughout the Far East by the report that Kolchak had given up, says the message, which was filed at Harbin on Monday and one Russian general has challenged Gen. Janin to a duel, while officers under the command of Gen. Semenoff have formed a league the slogan of which is "Have Janin's blood." slogan or which is "have Jahin's blood," Gen. Janin's explanation is awaited, but it is known that Czech reports on the ituation at Irkutsk which have been telegraphed to Gen. Janin at Verkhnieudinsk induced him to consent to Kolchak's surrender. The Czechs claim the choice lay between surrendering one man and a conflict in which they were likely to be completely annihilated.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

BETTER EDUCATION. To the Editry of The Advertiser:

I am pleased to notice that at the present time there is considerable attention being paid to our educational system. During the years 1907 and 1908 I pointed out through the columns of the press and otherwise some detects, and suggested remedies that seemed to me to be desirable. But for twelve or more years we have simply logged along at the same old dying rate, and now all over our province many are beginning to realize that our boasted system is very much in need of being system is very much in need of being amended. All these years we have been educating the few, whilst the masses have been continually pushing out into life's duties and responsibilities with to life's duties and responsibilities with only a very meagre education. It has been the same old story year after year, sending children to rural public schools from five to thirteen years of age simply to pass the entrance examinations to high school, and then only per cent of them going on, whilst the other remaining 93 per cent guit. the other remaining 93 per cent quit.

Now whilst I do not desire to belittle
the advantages to be derived from a
high school and sollege education, yet
I might be allowed to suggest that the I might be allowed to suggest that the 7 per cent who go on to high school at thirteen years of age are away from home at that time in life when they most need a father's guiding hand, and a mother's moulding influence, and many of them never return to rural life again, having been won away by the attractions of town or city life. Thus we in the rural section are surrounded by a class of young people, who have practically no education to cope with life's duties.

Now the question before us is, what can be done to better conditions for the 93 per cent, who remain in our rural sections? Occasionally we hear some one say we ought to have consome one say we ought to have consolidated schools. Many of us, however, do not see things in that light, and do not want them. All over our province we have good public school buildings, generally pretty well equipped with apparatus for conducting schools successfully. Are these to be forever turned down as mere kindergarten schools, and the children hauled in vans

to some central place in each town-hip in order to get a little more edu-dation, in consolid ted schools? What nonsense! We see no advantage to our rural sections in consolidated schools. Would it not be much better. in view of these facts to so amend our school laws as to make our rural public schools complete in themselves?

Let us have a fewer number of studies, on lines that will apply particularly to everyday life in the rural sections, and leave the extra studies entirely for high schools to handle. Then in order to have the masses remain a while longer in our rural pubschools, and thus secure a better lie schools, and thus secure a better education, hold out as an inducement, a diploma or even a certificate entitlling them to teach in the junior departments of our rural public schools.

Do you not think that such a system as I have suggested, and as far as possible the employment of competent male teachers, with liberal salaries, in the scalar departments of our schools. senior departments of our schools youth of our rural section a better education?

THE LEAGUE STARTS WELL. The League of Nations has been subjected to a lot of ridicule and abuse, but it must be admitted that it has made a most promising start. The partial lifting of the blockade against Russia, which permits of a renewal of trade relations between Russia and the Allied nations appears as the sanest, most reasonable way in which to solve the problem of Russia. The lifting of the blockade was ordered in the name of the supreme council, but under the conditions of the league's covenant no one

without the consent of all the others. Military assistance for the various Russian factions fighting the Bolshevists have failed utterly at a stupendous expense. It is regretable that many months ago the Russian situation was not recognized as largely an economic question. That the League of Nations has made this wise move shortly after its birth indicates that it is in for a long life of the usefulness the world so ardently desires.

ANOTHER COSTLY RESIDENCE.

Quebec is becoming more like Ontario every day. Until very recently it was considered quite out of order to give any scrutiny to the cost of keeping up the official residence of the lieutenant-governor. Spencerwood is a delightful old place on the banks of the St. Lawrence, famous for its hospitality and charming in its setting amid a fine park of trees. Its historical interest, however, has not shielded it this session from curious inquiries as to the cost of individual. The nation must save through its its maintenance, and Mr. Sauve gave the ministers a very uncomfortable afternoon explaining the various items appearing in the public

Some of the expenditures were sufficiently large or unusual to warrant inquiry and the answers received by the questioner did not indicate any very great acquaintance with the accounts on the part of the ministers. The coal bill of the year was \$4,340, while plumbing totalled \$4.183, which led to the inquiry whether Spencerwood had recently been wrecked. Painting fences and other things cost \$1,157, though the whole place was renovated two years ago. Carpets cost \$797, a silver table centrepiece \$250, eggs for the incubator \$200, harness repairs \$197, and so on and so on. The whole upkeep for the year cost the province over \$45,-000, which some of the legislators thought was rather out of proportion to other things.

The Quebec debate, which is reported very fully in the provincial press, is of interest in view of the criticism that has been directed at the cost of Ontario's palace at Toronto, which the new lieutenant-governor thinks is one of the things Ontario people hold dear. Perhaps so.

THE FOLLY AT ALBANY.

Prof. Franklin H. Giddings, head of the department of sociology at Columbia University. writes in the current number of the Independent on the case of the Socialist members of the New York State Legislature, whom that body is attempting to oust. Prof. Giddings points out that viewed in the light of past history the action of the Legislature is most unwise, since nothing came so near undoing the early republic and wrecking patriotic hopes of national unity as the alien and sedition bills. So, too, at a later date, Abraham Lincoln came perilously near defeat in his second election because of too free use of the executive power in suspending the Habeas Corpus act and such incidents, Prof. Giddings points out, are but repetitions of the earlier history of civil liberty in England where short was with dissenters" worked for a time, but in the end proved a dangerous expedient. "The instant we admit that any central governing body may say who shall and who shall not represent local electorates, we have gone completely over to the despotism of a Robespierre, a Lenin and a Trotzky; for it was precisely by that method that the Terror governed in revolutionary France, and it is by that method that the central council governs Russia today.

The incident at Albany is, of course, an evidence that abnormal war psychology did not subside with the armistice or even with the signing of the treaty of peace. The people of the United States have been standing up so straight since they entered the war that even today the mud off their heels is hitting them in the back of the head. A few evidences of folly like that now engaging attention at the New York state capitol will convince some of the "statesmen" that they are making themselves ridiculous and stirring up more of the trouble they aim to subdue.

MR. BARNES STEPS OUT.

The withdrawal of Mr. George Barnes from the Lloyd George cabinet is a considerable blow to the government of the Coalition. Hitherto it has been representative in some measure of all parties in Great Britain, could claim to be national in every sense, but now that peace has been made, Labor's most respected leader has lost no time in disclaiming any support of the Coalition's home politics. The Government will soon have to dissolve and go to the country or go on as a frankly Conservative regime battling against the various shades of Radical opposi-

Mr. Lloyd George himself is something of a puzzle to the public. Some call him a renegade from reform, some see in him a patriotic moderate who will be able to drag along the land-

lord and capitalist classes in measures of progressive character; others again may regard him as a compromise artist or tight-rope walker. Before the war he began to speak of land reform, the land for the people, etc. Lately he has been conspicuous mainly, so far as he has touched home affairs at all, for his indorsation of Unionist candidates and opposition to coal nationalization. But the truth is his work hus heen for four years the making of war and of peace, and what he is going to do in internal policy is a question that no one can answer at

Amidst the uncertainties, one thing stands out clear, that the old enemies, landlord and financier, are drawing together in self-defence or in defence of their old prestige, privileges and advantages, so far as they are not yet lost, while the forces of social reform, social revolution and levelling are not yet in accord, but growing in numbers, confidence and aggressive ness. As soon as the Liberals who have not gone over to Conservatism, the moderate Labor man, and the Communists can agree upon some common platform, if only provisional, under competent leadership, there will be some sensational developments in British political and social life. The nationalization of coal mines will be almost certainly one plank in any compromise platform adopted by the radical groups.

As for the other side, the pressure of high income and business taxes seems to have had the effect of urging the profiteers to even greater profits. It is stated that Yorkshire woolen mills have cleared from 400 to 3.000 per cent, enough to make our Canadian "glory of God" artist hang his head in shame at his power can make such an important decision modesty. WATER FOR THE GOLDFIELDS.

[London Sphere.] One of the largest engineering schemes ever undertaken in South Africa is now being carried out to supply the city of Johannesburg and the mining towns on the seventy-mile strip bearing reef with water. It was decided that the present system of supplying the Witwatersrand with water was inadequate, and a scheme for damming the waters of the Vaal River, about forty miles away, was sanctioned by the government, with the result that the work was put in hand about a year ago. The Vaal River barrage is twenty-four miles down stream from Vereeniging. a spot famous for the signing of peace at the cessation of the Anglo-Boer War. Great progress has been made, and a glance at the huge gives one the impression that some big Nile work is in the course of construction. The barrage will supply water to Johannesburg and the Rand to the extent of 20,000,000 gallons daily by pumping through a forty-mile pipe-line, thus supplying the seventy-mile strip of thickly-populated gold-mining area. The initial plant to be installed, at a total cost of £1,750,000 (of which the barrage itself will cost £285,000), will supply 10,000,000 gallons daily. The barrage is expected to be completed early in 1921, and will back up the Vaal to form a huge lake nearly forty miles long, which will contain 13,633,000,000 gallons of water, and besides supplying water to the towns, the dam will irrigate many

COUNTY PLOWING MATCHES.

[Agricultural Gazette.] In many of the counties in Ontario plowing matches were carried out with great success during the past fall. In most cases these matches were the first of their kind in their respective localities. They were carried on under various organizations. but for the most part under the direct supervision of the agricultural representatives. Outside judges were engaged, and in each case they were impresse with the excellent work and with the keen interest the farmers are taking in the plowing competitions. In some cases two competitions were held in the There were two classes, one in sod and one in stubble. In some cases plowing was done on the home farms, while in others the plowmen's association secured a centrally located farm for the purpose of the plowing match, and tractor demonstrations were staged. From the success of last year's show it is probable that county plowing matches will be much more general throughout Ontario in the coming fall.

This is, of course, a commonplace; but for that very reason it seems necessary to emphasize it. As the war fades in memory we are all disposed to think of the army in the old way, as something less important than a fifth wheel—even as a dubious item in the national budget.
