The High Courts.

HIGH COURT OF CENTRAL ONTARIO.

(From our own Correspondent.)

The meetings of this body at Owen Sound on Tuesday and Wednesday, August 21st and 22nd, were of unusual interest owing to the presence of the Chief himself both at the public meeting in McLauchlin Park and as an active but impartial participant in the sessions of the High Court. When it was known that Oronhyatekha would be present to be seen and heard, numbers of the neighboring farmers hitched up and drove into Owen Sound, so that with these and the 300 delegates added to the citizens, Poulett street took on a decidedly metropolitan aspect. Ower Sound, while not a convenient central spot for this juriswhile not a convenient central spot for this juist-diction, well repaid our visit both by its attractions and its genial hospitality. We felt that we got more than we gave. The delegates investigated and admired in the Liverpool of Canada its harbour, its scenery and its parks. During the intervals of the business of the High Court they went hither and thither, according to temperament, some visiting Eaton Bros., up-to-date improvements where the genial and affable foreman explained the mysteries of malting; while others took a greater interest in what the address of the acting mayor termed the "excellent moral and educational institutions, administered by good and pious clergymen and a well-trained staff of High and Public school teachers."

The meeting house at McLauchlin Park unfortunately proved inadequate to contain the enormous crowds that two steamers kept pouring into that charming resort. The anxiety of the people to hear and see the Chief and the extraordinary hold he kept upon his audience though following orators very well known in Canada and the United States corroborated the popular estimate voiced by the mayor of Owen Sound when he said:

"I also recognize your Order has one great force that similar institutions have not had, and that great force is the man who for many years has been at its head. Canada has produced many great Canadians, but Oronhyatekha occupies a position in the field of fraternal insurance, the peer of them all, and is recognized as one of the great men that the Dominion of Canada has produced."

Nothing captivated the audience and especially the fair sex more than the way Oronhyatekha mingled serious information about our progress in all parts of the globe with the most inimitable drollery and the most delicate badinage.

- 6. It will also be noticed by the Secretary's Report that the same number of Courts are in arrears as last year, viz., 30, but I am pleased to add that the indebtedness is only \$177.57 as compared with \$362.82 last year, being a reduction of more than one half.
- 7. While the above excellent results have been obtained, you will note by the Treasurer's Report that the expenditures have been kept well within State of the Order-Rev. W. J. Hewitt, Severn | the appropriations made for the different depart-

ments of the work, and that the handsome surplus, with the addition of the appropriations to be made for organizing work for the coming year, will go far, I trust, in bringing still greater additions to our membership.

AFTERNOON.

AT M'LAUCHLIN PARK.

In the afternoon the Order formed in procession at the Market square, and, marching down to the dock, boarded a little fleet of four steamers engaged for the purpose, and were conveyed to McLauchlin Park, four miles from the town, where the afternoon was spent. Over 3,000 people were present on the grounds, and addresses were delivered by Dr. Oronhyatekha, Hon. Dr. Montague, Rev. A. MacGillivray, of Toronto, High Chief Ranger Wilson, and Hon. E. J. Stevenson, of Detroit. H.C.R. Wilson was the first speaker and was welcomed with loud applause. He voiced again his gratitude to the people of Owen Sound for the welcome given the High Court. He dwelt briefly upon the great progress recently made, and modestly withdrew to make way for other speakers.

DR. MONTAGUE'S ADDRESS.

Hon. Dr. Montague was the next speaker. He was introduced by the chairman as a "baby Forester," though renowned throughout Canada as one of its most eloquent speakers. As he rose to address the audience he was loudly applauded. He congratulated the Central Ontario district upon the successful High Court meeting which was now being held in the splendid town of Owen Sound. The greeting of the town, kindly and enthusiastic as it had been, showed how popular Independent Forestry was in the community. He was somewhat at a disadvantage in following upon the platform the Supreme Chief of the Order, whom they had come, he was sure, principally to hear—the builder and successful guide of the organization. After some humorous allusions, which were

Sound at the present time would be struck, first, with the good-fellowship existing in the Independent Order of Foresters. The social element in such societies was a most important one. As a result of it they ought to be better neighbours, friends, and citizens. (Cheers.) Secondly, he would be impressed with the class of men who were the representatives of the Subordinate Courts. A large number of the representatives were members of the learned profession, prominent business men, or leading agriculturists—in fact, among the most successful and trusted citizens who could be gathered together. (Cheers.) He was glad to say that a large number of the members of Parliament were also members of the Independent Order of Foresters, among them the honoured leader of the Govers, among them the honoured leader of the devernment, and Sir Charles Tupper, the distinguished head of the Conservative party. (Loud cheers.) "I have, sir," said the speaker, "twice visited Owen Sound; the first time I accompanied that great Canadian, Sir John Thompson, who by his patriotism and ability climbed to the highest place in the gift of Canadians. (Cheers.) I am glad to be here to-day with a gentleman—Dr. Oronhyatekha—who has by his genius, worth and energy reached the highest position occupied by any Canadian in the field of fraternal insurance. (Applause.) You all remember doubtless the statement of Wolfe, when upon the St. Lawrence upon his way to Quebec he was handed a copy of Gray's great poem, 'An Elegy in a Country Churchyard.'
He said: 'I would rather be the author of that
poem than take Quebec to-morrow.'"

A RECORD TO BE PROUD OF.

"Sir, look at the work your Order has done. Your Order has paid thus far to the widows and fatherless, the enormous sum of nearly ten million dollars. (Loud cheers.) Looking at such a record, the Chief of the Order might well say that he was proud of it, and that he would rather have borne a principal part in such a work than to have received public honours." (Cheers.) Only the other day the speakersaid he had met a lady, who, when the subject of fraternal insurance was talked of said that her family had been saved to her by the Foresters; her sons had, by means of their help, been placed in professions, and she would ever be grateful for the existence of such an insti-tution. That was a sample only of the work which fraternal societies every day were doing for the home and for mankind. (Cheers.) The history of the Foresters was one which told of hard work and great achievements.

"See the work as told by the figures. I notice, sir, from the statistics that in 1881 you had 880 members, in 1900 you have 170,000. In 1881 you carried 31,140,000 of insurance; to-day you carry \$194,792,500. In 1881 you had as a reserve fund \$4,568; in 1900 you have the sum of \$4,125,000. (Loud cheers.) That was a record of which any institution should be proud. It was a record of which Canadians should be proud. There was no doubt that much of that success had been due to the great head of the Order. (Cheers.) In its poor days he had been generous, refusing to accept emoluments. His great genius had always been at their disposal, and his upright course-and if the speaker read aright the history of the organization, it was founded in a determination to do rightly and generously by those depending upon it received with great laughter, Dr. Montague said —had always maintained its high character. that anyone who saw the body gathered in Owen (Cheers.) Altogether, the Supreme Chief Ranger was a Canadian of whom Canada should be proud. I had received was to them a great blessing," was A great poet had said, 'To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die.' Dr. Oronhyatekha would long live in the hearts of those who owed so much to the Order he had carried through dangers to such a successfui place. (Cheers.) But he was sure that they wished him long to live and to carry on the work. (Cheers.) The work of fra-ternal insurance was only in its infancy, and, as far as Independent Forestry was concerned, there was no reason why it should not, since it was planted almost all over the world, yet reach a point of success in distant Australia and in European lands, equal to the point which it has reached in Canada and the United States of America."

Hon. Mr. Stevenson, of Detroit. Mr. Stevenson was born a Canadian, and they were glad of his success. He was true to the country of which he was a citizen, and he was sure he was proud of the soil from which he sprang. A man who forgot the country where he was born was not apt to be a good citizen of his adopted country. Mr. Stevenson was proud of both, and the presence of such able Canadians among the citizens of the neighbouring country was a perpetual bond of good-will. (Cheers.)

"The Parliament of Canada had put its approval upon the Independent Foresters, upon their methods and system, by giving them a special Act of Incorporation, and they must remember that in every land where courts were being established-in the United States, in England, in France, in Sweden, and our sister colonies -the insurance departments all satisfied themselves as to the system and financial standing of the society before giving them licenses for operation. That they had always been licensed was the strongest testimony in that behalf. (Applause.) The national view of this society should not be forgotten-existing in the Colonies and the Mother Land, it was a strong influence in gathering the parts of the Empire closer together. Existing in foreign lands as well, it was bound to make for universal peace and concord among the nations." (Loud cheers.)

MR. MACGILLIVRAY SPEAKS.

Rev. Alex. MacGillivray, of Toronto, P.H.C R. of Ontario, was introduced by the Chairman as a typical Forester-one that represented the physical, intellectual, and moral strength of the Order.

Mr. MacGillivray, in a short speech, dwelt on the fraternal aspects of the Order. In an Order that gave monetary benefits of high value, there was danger of overlooking the less material but valuable social and fraternal benefits. In a recent visit to the far West of our Dominion it was particularly gratifying to him to find members of the Order extending to brothers from the east, or from whatever direction they came, that fraternal greeting always welcome, but specially precious when one was far from home. In the past few weeks cases had come under his notice that showed conclusively how faithfully the principles of the Order were carried out. In Fort William he was privileged to call upon a brother that was on the disability list. During a long illness the brother received many tokens of the regard and sympathy of his brethren. The testimony of the wife of the afflicted brother, that ' the Foresters was the best friend she had in the world, the \$500 they mit me now to briefly review the progress of Inde-

the best evidence of the good work done by the I.O.F. in Sault Ste Marie; at a meeting of the Court in that growing town, he heard read a letter from the widow of a deceased brother who was taken ill and died in Sault Ste. Marie, away from his family and home. The letter of the widow spoke in feeling and grateful terms of the kindness of the members to her loved one in his sickness, and their respect for him in death. sickness their visits were frequent and helpful, and in death everything was done that regard could suggest. Benefits and deeds such as these touched their hearts, and appealed to the sympathies of all. Wives and mothers could not deny merica." their support to an Order that did so much for He was glad to meet upon the platform the husbands and sons. In several places that the speaker had visited he spoke of visits to afflicted brothers in hospitals, made at the suggestion of, and in company with members of the Order. The Order in its principles, aims, work, and management merited the high confidence it enjoyed.

AN OVATION FOR DR. ORONHYATEKHA.

Dr. Oronhyatekha, as he stepped to the front of the platform, was tendered an ovation which con-tinued for some minutes, and which reached a climax when the entire audience arose to its feet and joined voices in singing "He's a Jolly Good Fellow." The Supreme Ranger several times essayed to speak, but each attempt was the signal for renewed applause. He had, therefore, to content himself with bowing his acknowledgments, until, after several minutes, order was restored. His address was characterized by his usual happy delivery, and was continually punctuated with ap-

plause. He said :.

"Mr. Chairman, High Chief Ranger, ladies and gentleman, I am unfortunately on this occasion in a very different position from the worthy High Chief Ranger. He has told you that he is at a loss to know for what purpose he has been placed on the programme. I am in an altogether different position. I know why I am here—it is because of my good looks. The gentlemen who have preceded and are to follow are eloquent speakers in every sense of the term, as well as practical, earnest Foresters, who in the past have done noble work for Forestry. In Hon. Dr. Montague we have one of the most eloquent Canadian statesmen, and in the Hon. E. G. Stevenson, of Detroit, we have one of the most eminent and fluent public men in the United States. As I have said, I have been put on the programme for my good looks and my common sense. (Laughter and cheers.) The others are the orators. And now, as I have shown myself to you, I will detain you only for a few min-utes, which I must do in order to carry out my reputation as a man of common sense. I cannot sit down, however, without telling you a little of the history of our noble Order. Some of the brethren here will recall my first visit to Owen Sound, sixteen years ago, when I came here to organize Court forthern Light. I well remember the visit. recired to bed about 4 o'clock in the morning, leaving instructions to be called immediately before train-time. The porter called me an hour in advance, and, after driving me to the station, left me to my own resources to wait till the departure of the train. I was tired, cold and cross, and the incident had ever served to keep me in fond remembrance of Owen Sound. Will you per-

pendent Forestry since that visit? Sixteen years ago the membership of the whole Order was only 2,300, and the surplus was only a little over \$10,000. To-day I am confident I am speaking well within the figures when I announce the membership of the Independent Order of Foresters to be 170,000, distributed all over the world, and, in place of a diminutive \$25,000, the Order to-day place of a diminutive \$25,000, the Oracle has to its credit a magnificent surplus of \$4,200,-with each year. To-day, 000, which is growing with each year. To-day, Independent Forestry is paying \$5,000 a day to widows and orphans of its deceased members, and to its sick and disabled. The Order then was limited to Canada, with the exception of a few Courts in the United States. To-day we have a membership in the United States alone of over 90,000, and our Order is established in all parts of the United Kingdom, in Norway, France, Egypt, India, Australia, and New Zealand. It is not many years ago when our surplus was only \$50,000. We thought that a wonderful thing then, and some of you well remember we fixed in celebration of the event the pass-word, 'Fifty thousand,' in ofder that every Forester would be daily reminded of the prosperity of his Order. To-day, ladies and gentlemen, we are adding \$50,000 every month to our surplus, and the amount is growing. As many of you are aware, I have recently returned from a trip to Australia and New Zealand, where we have planted the banner of Independent Forestry under auspices which promise a growth and extension equally as rapid as in this banner jurisdiction of Ontario. I look forward to a time at no distant date when Courts in Australia will be as thickly scattered throughout the country as in Canada. Australia is not the only place where Independent Forestry is making progress and forging to the front ranks. Magnificent work is being done in France by Bro. Breton. Let me read you a cablegram just received from him, which announces that the Independent Order of Foresters which is taking part in the Paris Exposition, has been awarded the gold medal.

"I will now leave this matter, and will trespass on your time but a few moments longer. The presence of so many of the fair sex here this afternoon reminds me of the fact that in the early history of the Order we did not have the ladies with us as now. I understand that in this magnificent city we have no Companion Court. I promise you I shall at once take measures to have such a Court instituted in Owen Sound. I recall the early struggle we had to get the ladies into the Order. Many were the objections, but we have accomplished it at last, and we have thousands of ladies who are members of our Order, and they are doing a greater work than the Subordinate Courts which are controlled by the men. I desire to thank the ladies who are present in such numbers for their sympathy, for their appreciation of the work and efforts of Independent Forestry to lighten the burdens of mankind. It expends, as I have said, \$5,000 a day in the relief of widows and orphans. A work of such vast extent and farreaching effect is deserving of the sympathy of every right-minded person. I shall now, ladies and gentlemen, give way to what I know will be a treat for you, and I am sure when you have heard them you will say that Independent Forestry is fortunate in having such able men in its ranks. thank you again for your magnificent reception and the patient hearing you have given me." (Loud and continued cheering.)

Hon. E. G. Stevenson delivered an excellent speech, brim full of interesting information regarding the growth of the Order. He also pointed out the work it was doing in promoting a better feeling between the people of Canada and the United States.

EVENING.

The evening session was specially marked by the ceremony of making Foresters at sight of Mayor Reid and Alderman Wilson, the operation being neatly and successfully performed by Dr. Oron-hyatekha. The S.C.R. was also deputed by the neeting to reply to the fraternal address presented by Dr. Howie and Bro. Burgess, of the C.O.F., in doing which the Chief took occasion to express his pleasure at the disappearance of the very different feelings that once existed between the two great Orders.

Proceedings of the Second Day.

MORNING.

One of the most entertaining and useful of the addresses made in the morning session was that of Bro. C. H. E. Rea, the eminent actuary of London, England, who writes after his name the learned characters F.R.A.S., F.S.S. and A.I.A., signifying Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society, Fellow of the Royal Statistical Society, and Associate of the Institute of Actuaries of Great Britain. Mr. Rea is Actuary for the I.O.F. in Great Britain, and made the quinquennial inspection for the Board of Trade in London previous to the renewal of the charter of the I.O.F. last year. Mr. Reabegan his task in doubt, but as the inspection went on he came to see the correctness of the position taken by the 1.O.F. His report passed the Board of Trade without objection, and Mr. Rea himself subsequently became a member of the Order. His address was as follows:

'Since I left the Old Country I have met with many surprises. I was surprised at the high buildings, great institutions, inventions and rapid means of conveyance in this country. I was also surprised on being knocked down by a bicycle, which I thought was or the wrongside of the road, as in England we always keep to the left. But I find that over on this side at least the policy is always to keep to the right. I have met with great orators in your ranks, and the trepidation I feel in addressing you is only allayed by the knowledge that I can appeal to those fraternal interests with

which you are all so thoroughly imbued.
"When I first undertook the valuation of your "When I first undertook the valuation of your Order to meet the requirements of the Board of Trade of England I had many misgivings as to the future of the Order, but I thought that at the most the existence of the I.O.F. in England was only just within the bounds of possibility. As I proceeded with my work that possibility gradually developed into a probability. Now, I do not see why a great success should not develop in your course.

"Your business is entirely distinct, from the

"Your business is entirely distinct from the business of an ordinary life insurance company, and I am very firmly of the opinion that there should be no competition or even sign of hostility between you. Your work lies in totally different directions, and I urge you to develop your own business without attempting to prejudice the societies which are established on commercial as

distinct from fraternal lines.

"I have come to the conclusion that for insurance pure and simple there is nothing to compare favorably with the lodge system, where the expenses are all reduced to an absolute minimum and the initial expenses are paid by the members for the privilege of initiation, whereas, on the other hand, commercial companies must necessarily make allowances and reserves for surrender values, bonuses, dividends to shareholders, and pay a large army of professional representatives to engage in the work of competition for maintaining their business. With all these obligataining their business. With all these obliga-tions to meet it stands to reason that the premium rate must be higher than is necessary to make the simple matter of insurance, and as these rates are considerably higher than the amounts required by the Order with their mortality risks, it does not follow as it has been attempted to be proved, that the latter are too

low.
"I am not in favor of an assessment system, as understood in England, but I think that fraternal societies can and should work on a minimum level premium basis, which can best be determined by a thorough analysis of the experience of these insti-

tutions throughout the country.

"I have been somewhat surprised to find the kindred institutions sending delegates here to welcome you to the town, and to greet you in such a fraternal spirit. This proves to me how far-reaching is the spirit of fraternity in your coun-

IMPORTANT COMPARISONS.

"A great deal has been said during the conference of the policies that are not taken up by members. I do not think that the number of these cases is very great, and I wonder what we would think if you had to experience, or rather if you had the experience, of most of the companies in England, where all the initial expenses, including the expense of medical examination, had to be borne by the company; it would be a very happy thing for those companies if they could only feel that they could get rid of those expenses without any loss in their case. I hope you will never be subjected to a system of competition that has held a considerable sway in England over a long period. The numerous small friendly societies and clubs, thinking of nothing but increasing their membership, are incessantly extending their benefits, to the prejudice of sound and legitimate institutions, and ultimate ruin to themselves. It would be a great thing if some State regulation would keep these bodies within proper limits, so that no irresponsible body again would be allowed to promise the impossible and bring disappointment to many happy homes. think that with all your great successes, with all your promise, and with all your ability to assure those joining you, that the extension of the Order might through its own members and with the influence of those present be more rapidly develop-

ed.
"I have been paying a business visit to the chief office at Toronto, and all the investigation I have made and the work that has gone from my hands lead me to more thoroughly appreciate the great organization and the thoroughly systematic

principles of your Order.
"I thank you, gentlemen, for the kind and generous hospitality with which I have been treated since I arrived in Owen Sound, and my only hope is that I may return some day to speak to

you once more when your numbers have increased beyond your grandest hopes. (Loud applause.) It has been an added pleasure for me to make my first speech since leaving England to Canadians, for I need not tell you how high your reputation stands in the Home Land for bravery and noble participation in England's warfare in South Africa." (Loud

No wonder Dr. Oronhyatekha waxed eloquent, waxed grandiloquent even, if such a term is appropriate grandiloquent even, if such a term is appropriate in a case of the kind, as he surveyed the grand result of all his labour and of all his sacrifices, considered how many homes had been relieved from the dread shadow of poverty through his efforts, and contemplated the faces of the distinguished men by whom he was surrounded. The little bantling institution o? 19 years ago has now become a giant, and spreads its arms about the world. The major portion of the United States, all of Canada, and Great Britain and Ireland are covered with thriving Courts, and the I.O.F. is making surprising progress in Norway, France, India and Australia. It was only last spring that Dr. Oronhyatekha invaded France and Australia, and introduced the Order into these countries. Mr. P. M. REPORT OF THE HIGH CHIEF RANGER.

DEAR BRETHREN,

In accordance with the established usage of our order, and the rules of this High Court, it becomes again my duty to report as your H.C.R., on the condition of the Order generally throughout this province. The duty is a pleasant one, from the fact that the onward march of the I.O.F. in the seaside province of Nova Scotia has not been stay. ed, but we can again report progress all along the line, and for this progress we should return thanks to Him who ruleth all things, and in whose hands the affairs of men are helped or hindered, as best suits His all-wise purpose.

In opening this Fourteenth Session of our High Court, I am much encouraged by the knowledge that I will be surrounded by many old and tried comrades, men who have done much toward making this High Court representative, in the fullest sense, of our provincial Courts; these I again desire to welcome to their work and labor of love, and I also extend a cordial greeting to those who for the first time take part in our proceedings; assuring them that though they be young in the Order they are none the less welcome among us, and that we will gladly receive the aid and assistance which I know they will all cheerfully give.

The coming together of so many men, who, while their views on many other matters may be widely divergent, are all enlisted under the banner of Liberty, Benevolence and Concord and all imbued with a whole hearted interest in our Institution, cannot be otherwise than productive of good, and I trust this session may be made a great factor in bringing added prosperity to our Order.

During the two years elapsed since our last session many changes have taken place, some of which would have a tendency to retard our growth, yet such is the confidence of the people in our Institution that our members increased from 132,664 to a total on 1st May last of 163, 103, and between that date and July 1st the Medical Board accepted 8,017 applications, thus giving us on July let a grand total of 171,000 members, a gain of more than 38,000 in two years. Our surplus funds also took a gigantic step. At our last session I was pleased to report \$2,786,564.-11, a magnificent sum; what shall I then say of our funds to day, when the treasury of the I.O.F. is swelling with \$4,124,094.29, a gain of nearly one and a half millions. Truly, we are a prosperous

Nova Scotia was no exception to the general advance, and we can again report an increase in membership which, though much smaller than for the previous term, is still in view of the changed conditions a very encouraging fact; our net gain of 300 is equal to that of other jurisdictions where the same conditions have obtained. The record of work performed by the membership is best shown by the applications received which numbered 1,037, of which the Medical Board accepted \$76 and rejected 161, but the large addition which these figures would have given us was reduced by that enemy of all fraternal societies, "Suspension for non-payment," to the extent of more than 500.

In the matter of finances we have made greater gains and I am especially pleased that the necessity of borrowing money for the purposes of the High Court no longer exists, and we are to-day able to pay dollar for dollar of our liabilities and have a balance on the right side of the ledger. When you first honored me with the appointment of H.C.R., not only was the treasury depleted, but we were deeply in debt, and in order to pay the expenses of delegates and other necessary expenditures we were forced to borrow largely. I may congratulate you on the fact that these loans have all been repaid, and as we assemble here, at this time, to deliberate on our future movements, we do so with the welcome knowledge that we have over \$1,000, to our credit in the Merchants Bank of Halifax. The reports of the various financial officers will give you all items of receipts and disbursements in detail.

The above gratifying result has been largely brought about by the untiring labors of the membership in the various Courts, coupled with the zealous unremitting efforts of my colleagues on the High Standing Committee of the present and post term, to whom I desire to tender my sincere thanks for the cordial support so freely given by each and all of them. "Some one has said that rum and life insurance are the curses of this country. When we consider the extortionate rate charged by old line life companies we realize that he might have said many things not half so true."

(After making many excellent and elaborate comparisons between Legal Reserve companies and Read, Amherst.

the I.O.F., giving figures and data to support his contentions, Bro. Logan concluded his very excellent report as follows:)

"In closing I would sum up the situation as fol-We can offer life insurance at a much lower cost than offered by the old line companies, and permit payments to be made in the most favorable We offer social and fraternal benefits which old line companies cannot give. We can give medical attendance at a reduced cost; a permanent disability, and a sick and funeral benefit. Surely these objects are worthy of our best efforts.

"And now, when our brothers and fellow-countrymen are out on torrid plains of South Africa fighting for the cause of Right, Liberty and Humanity, let us who have remained at home endeavor to alleviate the needs, and lighten the burdens of those who in some sad hour, whether by death upon the battlefield or in the quiet of the home, may be deprived of a tender husband, a loving brother or a kind father. Brother Foresters, there is an opportunity for us all, and may our united efforts be in the interests of Liberty, Benevolence and Concord."

Bro. John Suckling in a very felicitous manner referred to the fact that the High Court of N.S. was organized in Trure 17 years ago and that he observed several charter members present. He also made happy reference to the fact that the new era in Independent Forestry in N.S., marked by the admission of ladies to membership in the High Court, was inaugurated at Truro, and as a member of the first Truro Court, Hiawatha, No. 108, he desired to mark his appreciation of the ladies' presence by requesting them each to accept a beautiful bouquet. Bro. Suckling concluded his remarks amid applause.

Companion Baxter, C.D., on behalf of the ladies,

made a suitable reply.





Wm. Gibson, M.D., J.P. The High Treasurer, Bro. James Wilson, and the Supreme Court Organizer, Bro. D. L. Cottrell, had also rendered very valuable assistance to the Order. The ladies' Court of Companions during the year had been a very great help in promoting the social side of the organization. In the course of the year, 190 were initiated into the Order in Ulster. With regard to the position of Forestry throughout the world, it stood higher than ever. Their honored and beloved Supreme Chief Ranger, Dr. Oronhyatekha, had planted the Order this year in India, France and Australia. On the 1st July, 1900, the membership numbered 168,795, with

surplus funds amounting to £859,412 0s. 3d.

The High Secretary, Bro. Dr. Wm. Gibson, in submitting his report, stated that the membership amounted to 1,100, and that they had attracted to their ranks many of the best youths of their city

The High Treasurer, Bro. Jas. Wilson, submitted the Treasurer's report, which showed a substan-

tial balance on the right side.

The High Court adjourned for lunch at half-past two o'clock, and business was resumed at half-past

We are glad to welcome back to her old birthplace and home Miss Hope Morgan, daughter of Bro. Judge Morgan, and niece of Bro. J. C. Morgan, P.H. V.C.R. of Central Ontario. After several years under Marchesi of Paris she comes fresh from a series of triumphs on the continent and in England in Opera and concert, to visit her old home previous to beginning her automn and winter engagements on the other side of the water.

We hope next month to be able to present our readers with a lucid and satisfactory account of the proceedings of the National Fraternal Congress. Apart from the particular interest we as Independent Foresters take in this celebrated convention owing to the fact of our Chief presiding at its sessions, there were matters discussed and action taken that will be of interest to every fraternalist in America or elsewhere.

We learn from the Fraternal Monitor that a new order has been established—a juvenile auxiliary to the modern Woodmen. The order is known by the singular appellation of "Patriotic Order of the Owl." This is not the same as the bird mentioned in the text: "I am like a pelican of the wilderness, I am like an owl of the desert." On the contrary, it is a more domesticated fowl that has been dwelling in the foresta long time with the Woodmen.

The Insurance Record, commenting on the alliterative forms of a certain order, wants a new order started under the name "Independent and Infernal Idiots of Insurance Imbecility." We always did think the policyholders of old line companies ought to combine to try and close up the dividends, commissions and other rat-hole expenses of their concerns. But this is the first time we ever heard a really appropriate title for a policyholders' association.

At Owen Sound, besides addressing a mass meeting at McLauchlin Park, the Chief presided for a considerable time at the indoor sessions, replied to an address from Court Northern Light of the I.O.F., an address by the local Court of the C.O.F., and a unanimous resolution of congratulation from the High Court, and, also, made the Mayor and an Alderman Foresters-at-sight. He did not wish to overtax himself, however, so he left to preside over the National Fraternal Congress.

Canvassing and Caucusing.

It is sometimes borne in upon the mind at High Court meetings and similar conventions that a good deal of canvassing is being done and that the canvassing spirit, if carried too far, may be a dangerous usurper of the fraternal spirit. This is a difficult subject to pronounce upon; for one man will dray the line very sharply, while another will allow considerable latitude. As a rule, the old attendant at High Court who is known to nearly everybody, and who has, therefore, no need of canvassing, is very pronounced against the iniquities of electioneering. On the other hand, the ambitious new member who is perhaps thinking overmuch of his own claims to greatness, is apt to despise the lack of system displayed and to try and paste over the record of proceedings a leaf from the tactics of practical politicians.

It is evident that the man who succeeds in dividing any Court or Lodge (Subordinate or High) into two definite parties, succeeds in destroyi, g the fraternal spirit and introducing in its place a spirit of partisan animosity and mistrust. It is, therefore, wise for every member or delegate of an Order when he is called upon to cast his ballot between brother and brother, to have some rules to guide him when he is approached or solicited on behalf of a candidate. We shall endeavor to suggest a few simple considerations in this respect.

In the first place, it does not appear very objectionable or even at all unfraternal for Bro. Smith, who knows that Bro. Jones would like a certain office, to ask his acquaintances at the convention to give Bro. Jones a vote. This is a natural thing to do; at any rate, it is so far natural that a brother doing it might be considerably surprised if you told him it was wicked and unfraternal.

But it is so easy for Bro. Smith, canvassing just a little for Bro. Jones, to join hands with Bro. Brown, who is canvassing just a little for Bro. Robinson who is not running for the same office. Thus almost unconsciously you have formed a "caucus."

Now, it is in the nature of a caucus, as in the nature of a cancer, to grow; and though cut out and separated, to grow again and keep growing and eating out the body it lives upon. Every time the caucus meets, it becomes a larger caucus, more systematic, more highly organized. A chairman is appointed; men are allotted to see certain other men; the objects and motives of certain candidates are discussed, and in their absence probably misjudged. Then follows what is a natural consequence, a complete ticket is drafted covering all the elective offices-a ticket to be swallowed regardless. To facilitate the purpose of electing this ticket, the individual names of which might escape the memory, the ticket is printed and handed to the faithful. It is elected remorselessly, there being no organized opposition. A voter, more clear-sighted than polite, spoils his ballot by writing over it "Machine wins." The result is never in doubt. It will then be in order for the victorious machine voters (after having rejoiced) to separate and go aside, every man by himself, and each hold his head in his hands while he tries to think how much he has added to the fraternal spirit and how well he has vindicated his independence as a man.

It may be that some others will say to themselves, "We too shall caucus and get out tickets, and when next election is held we shall be there also." But this action, though provoked, is more unfraternal than the first. For in such opposition the first caucus will find its excuse and its justification. It takes two to make a fight. It is better to take a licking good naturedly—and a "squealer" is not esteemed a good lodge brother.

It would be better for the aggrieved brethren to examine their own conduct and recollect if there were not sundry zealous recommendings by themselves of candidates, sundry conversations that might have been mistaken for canvassing and sundry more or less accidental meetings in hotel corridors and parlors which a hasty observer might have mistaken for caucuses.

Let the defeated brother show himself largehearted, and when the brethren see that his interest in the fraternity is in no wise diminished and his lodge spirit is still up to the mark, it will not be easy to get a caucus against him. The boys will vote him a "jolly good fellow." Let not the sun go down upon your wrath.

At any rate, allow the last year's bitterness to die down and the plow of fraternity will turn upto be withered by the sun—the roots of small cunning and misapplied election science.

But the chiefest remedy .ies to the hand of the individual voter. It is for every delegate, when he is canvassed, to consider whether the canvasser is within his rights as a brother or is pursuing an injurious and unfraternal design. If he detects the handiwork of the wirepuller and feels the throb of the machine he should assert in no equivocal fashion his disapproval and disgust. A fraternalist should, above all, cherish his right to act on his own judgment and in the best interests of his Order. A true believer in fraternity, and especially a member of the I.O.F. who is not only a Forester but an Independent Forester, will resent all encroachments upon his independence as he would an insult to his personal dignity. The spirit of brotherhood is strong and will not let itself be killed by caucusing any more than a stout apple tree will let itself be killed by a few worms that are found in its windfalls. The rank and file may be trusted to draw the line beyond which canvassing shall not go.

The Genial Deputy.

The man who came around and got the boys interested and while they were hesitating drew them together and put their names down as charter members, and before they knew it had the officers installed and the Court going ding dong; the man who, when the old Court had settled down to stagnation, and you all thought it was folding its hands for the last sleep, came into your midst and brought in twenty new members, applicants whom you in your timidity thought unapproachable and hopeless—ba kind to this man; he is the genial deputy.

Others may be late, absent, forgetful, lacking in steadfast fauch. But the organizer must allow neither season nor weather nor broken bridges nor swollen streams to stand between him and his work. The Deputy must partake of the spirit of the Chief, and go where fraternity calls. It may be that some one started to build a Court and stopped half way, leaving his work as desolate as a boom-departed mining camp. The deputy must go in and make success out of failure, re-enthuse the disgusted, pacify the disgruntled, silence the obstructionist and pump the warm blood of conviction through the veins of the sceptic.

It may be that in a live Court some one was entrusted with office who made ducks and drakes of the finances, and when the brethren found their assessments going astray, and their certificates suspended, they thought the whole Order rotten. Taking a wrong view of things they said, "Life is short," and threw the whole thing up. Then the deputy had to go and reheat them in the flame of his genial nature, and put them in good standing and bring in others to make the good Court flourish. But do not forget that the man who devours the doubts and difficulties of other men has sometimes a precious indigestion. Many a deputy has felt the yoke a little too galling and the burden too crushing. He has gone out into the business world to some more tranquil occupation where he can succeed with less strenuous argument and make money for himself rather than for the widow and fatherless.

They that wear soft clothing are in kings' houses, not on the organizing staffs of fraternities. The organizer is less familiar with the parlour car than with the value of his ear as a pillow. He cannot choose the hour of his rising or be particular about the hour of his going to bed. He goes out to strange places where his comfort is a late consideration with every man he meets. Like the carver he is the last served.

Be kind to this man. When death and weariness make him drop out, you will be looking for his face at High Court meetings and passing resolutions praising the value of his work. For then you will miss the genial deputy, and find it easier to miss than to replace, and unavailingly wish that you had made more of him when you had him.

The great man has greatness in him before the occasion brings it out.

Life Insurance in Denmark.

Enormous Profits Made by Old-line Shareholders.

CAPITAL RETURNED SEVEN TIMES.

Andelshladet, the journal of the Danish cooperative associations, states in its last issue that the life insurance companies are very lucrative for shareholders. The most lucrative is, perhaps, the "Hafnia," which has been in existence for twenty-seven years, and during that period has paid to shareholders a dividend which amounts to seven times the paid-up capital. The paid-up capital is only 100,000 kr., and the shareholders have been been paid ca. 675,000 kr., besides an annual interest on the 100,000 kr. In 1898 they received a dividend of forty-five and a-half per cent.

To this must be added that the management of

To this must be added that the management of the life insurance companies is awfully expensive, especially on account of the high per cents, which

Agent-General, Inspectors and Agents receive on each policy signed, and which frequently swallow the premiums of the whole first year.

All these moneys, of course, come out of the pockets of those insured. The shareholders who alone are governing and managing the society have been used to consider them as profit-yielding objects.

Andelsbladet therefore suggests that there should be formed a life insurance society on the common principles of the co-operative associations with local unions, in which the president occasionally is doing the business of an agent, and with a guarantee capital which, after some years, will be superfluous, and be compensated by a lay-by. Those insured in such a life insurance society will thereby be free from the large tribute to the capital, and from the large management expenses, and they will further be in a position to influence the management of the society, every local union sending delegates to the general meetings.

The Supreme Secretary Visits the Men's Influence Over Men. Potteries.

The Supreme Secretary of the Independent Order of Foresters, Bro. J. A. McGillivray, Q.C., of Toronto, paid his initial visit to the Potteries July 9th, and in the evening addressed a meeting of Foresters and their friends at the Town Hall, Hanley, on the principles of the Order. Accompanying Bro. J. A. McGillivray, Q.C., on the platform were Bros. E. J. Powell, H.C.R., Mid-England; B. Cronyn, Manager-in-Chief, London; F. Walker, P.H.C.R., Mid-England; J. H. P. Montford, H. See., Mid-England; and P. P. Nichol, D.S.C.R., the prospective organizer for the Potteries and district. Bro. Powell was the chairman, and introduced the visiter to the meeting in a few remarks, in which he spoke of the great work done by that gentleman for the Order.

Bro. McGillivray commenced by saving that although he had visited Great Britain many times he had never before had an opportunity of visiting the world-renowned Potteries district. He did not come amongst them as an entire stranger, for his grandfather was born within a few miles of Hanley. Continuing, he explained that the Independent Order of Foresters was a Canadian organization with its head office at Toronto. As an indication of the amount of business they were doing he mentioned that they were at present paying out an average of £1,000 per day to the widows and children of deceased members. It was nineteen years age since the Order was revived with a membership of about 600, and now they could boast of a membership of over 160,000. They had a capital of eight million dollars and upwards of four million dollars as a kind of reserve, fund, a four million dollars as a kind of reserve, tund, a record of which they were justly proud, because no such history was to be found in the whole of the fraternal circuit. They had a larger surplus than all the fraternal organizations in the world combined. He knew that other societies boasted they had a larger capital, but the Independent Order of Foresters did not call building and such like capital. Continuing, the speaker and such like capital. Continuing, the speaker dwelt upon the various benefits and workings of the society and said that their system was one of a purely business character so far as insurance was concerned. He denied a statement that had been made in the London Press that this Order was practically an assessment Order, but at the same time stated that the constitution would indeed be faulty if they had not some provision to provide for in the case of some great calamity overtaking either of the two countries. The cost of carrying the risk plus 5 per cent. was what they charged and not plus 45 per cent. It was alleged that the Order could not live because they did not charge enough, but he mentioned that during the last 100 years there had been something like 800 insurance companies doing business on the stock plan with large capital subscribed, and that only 49 of that number now existed. It was not entirely capital that they wanted, but a sturdy member-ship, and the Independent Order claimed to have both. The speaker emphasized the fact that this was not a secret society, and that they had over 10,000 Roman Catholic members. Concluding, he spoke of the society as not interfering with the consciences of any of its members with respect to religion, and said they had the high hope of expectation that they were the beginning of an organization that would live on and on through the ages.


