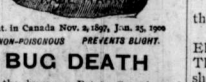

The body of the girl who had  
slept her life away was put on the  
dissecting table at 3:15 p. m. She  
had been pronounced dead at 1:30  
a. m. Saturday. Her father and  
her mother were at the bedside  
when the vital spark, fluttering and  
flickering for three weeks became  
dim and was snuffed out. When  
the post mortem examination was  
made the doctors were baffled.

They found a brain, healthy, well-  
nourished and, compared with other  
brains of similar age, natural and  
fully developed. Further than this,  
the examination showed a state of  
bodily health, absolutely incom-  
patible with even the suggestion of  
disease. From the crown of her  
head to the sole of her feet Nellie  
Corcoran was a healthy, natural  
young woman, without the slightest  
taint of even the most trivial ail-  
ment. She was like a woman who  
had lived out the full span of life  
who had died of old age and ex-  
haustion, and this was the very  
queerest and most remarkable part  
of the case.

Through some strange process,  
which pathologists do not attempt  
to explain, Nellie Corcoran lived  
60 years in 21 days, the period of  
her sleep. She was shrunken down  
from 150 to 115 pounds when she  
died, and the autopsy showed that  
while every bodily organ was per-

### Newfoundland and United States Treaty.

#### Copy of Alleged Arrangements.

##### ARTICLE 1.

U. S. fishing vessels entering the waters of Newfoundland shall have the privilege of purchasing herring, caplin, squid and other bait fishes at all times on the same terms and conditions and subject to the same penalties in all respects as Newfoundland vessels.

They shall also have the privilege of touching and trading, selling fish and oil and procuring supplies in Newfoundland, conforming to the harbor regulations, but without other charge than the payment of such light, harbor and customs dues as are or may be levied on Newfoundland fishing vessels.

##### CONTEMPORARY OPINION.

It is announced from Ottawa that the government do not intend to proceed at present with the erection of a building for a Canadian mint; and it is suggested that nothing further will be done in the matter until the next general election.

Another temporary loan of \$6,000,000, and the amount of its obligations of this kind is now \$15,186,216. Much is made in liberal papers about the huge taxation revenue and the 'surplus.' The revenue, large as it is, is not equal to the expenditure, while the surplus is of the Mulock kind, and means borrowing money to pay the running bills.

Aside altogether from the other considerations, it is certainly unwise for the government to borrow so largely in this way. Temporary loans not only require a higher rate of interest to carry them than debentures do, but there is always the danger that payment may be demanded at an inopportune time.

Hon. Mr. Tarte, is congratulating Sir Richard Cartwright upon the recent honor bestowed upon him by King Edward, says: Members of the press will always remember the oratorical contests in the commons chamber between Sir Richard, Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Charles Tupper, Edward Blake and others.

It is understood that "green" codfish are not included in the provisions of this article.

The officer of customs at the Newfoundland port where a vessel laden with the articles named in article 2 clears shall give to the master of said vessel a sworn certificate that the fish shipped were taken in the waters of Newfoundland, which certificate shall be countersigned by the consul or consular agent of the United States and delivered to the proper officer of customs at the port of destination in the United States.

When this convention shall come into operation, and during the continuance thereof, the duties to be levied and collected upon the following enumerated merchandise imported into the colony of Newfoundland from the United States shall not exceed the following amounts:

Flour, 25 cents per barrel; pork 1 1/2 cents per pound; bacon and hams, tongues, smoked beef and sausage, 2 1/2 cents per pound or \$2.50 per 112 pounds; pig, beef, hogs, hocks and feet, salted or cured, 1/2 cent per pound; Indian meal 25 cents per barrel; peas, 30 cents per barrel; oatmeal, 30 cents per barrel of 200 pounds; bran, Indian corn and rice, 12 1/2 cents per ton of 2,240 pounds; kerosene oil, 6 cents per gallon.

And the following articles imported into the colony of Newfoundland from the United States shall be admitted free of duty: Agricultural implements and machinery imported by agricultural societies for the promotion of agriculture, crushing mills for mining purposes, raw cotton, corn for the manufacture of brooms, gas engines when protected by patent, reaping, raking, ploughing, potato digging, harrows and seed sowing machines to be used in the colony and for the use of the importer, printing presses and printing types.

It is understood that if any reduction is made by the colony of Newfoundland at any time during the terms of this convention in the rates of duty upon the articles named in article 4 of this convention; the said reduction shall apply to the United States.

The present convention shall take effect as soon as the laws required to carry it into operation shall have been passed by the imperial parliament of Great Britain and the provincial legislature of Newfoundland. Such an act having been given, the convention shall remain in force for five years from the date at which it may come into operation, and, further, until the expiration of twelve months after either of the high contracting parties shall have given notice to the other of its wish to terminate the same, each of the high contracting parties being at liberty to give such notice to the other at the end of the said term of five years, or at any time afterwards.

The seventh article is merely the usual formal stipulation providing for the ratification of the treaty by the two governments, the date of signing and the signatures of the plenipotentiaries.

Many Killed.

PANAMA, Columbia, Nov. 12.—The first American casualties as a result of the revolution occurred yesterday. The Columbia fleet captured a boat having on board correspondence showing the whereabouts of two revolutionary schoons loaded with provisions. The Government warships headed for the place and on arriving there the Bogota, manned by an American crew, and commanded by Captain Marmaduke, lowered two boats with armed men, but as the schoons were aground, they waited until high tide to attack them.

In the meantime the Revolutionists were discovered in ambush close to the beach and when the Bogota's boat pulled ahead the second time the rebels opened fire on them, killing the ship's armour, Richard Kane, of Washington, and wounding George Walker, who was shot through the legs. A seaman named Clark and Lieut. Vasquez were also wounded, but not seriously. The Bogota and Chiuuito then opened fire on the enemy and killed every man in sight.

One shot fired at a group of ten rebels, who were most actively engaged shooting at the boats crews killed every one of them. Gunner Cross, of the Bogota, thinks that from forty to fifty rebels were killed. One of the schoons loaded with rice was captured, but the first shot at the second schooner set her on fire and she was completely destroyed with her cargo. The body of Kane will be buried with military honors here.

### Molinuex Not Guilty.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Roland B. Molinuex was set at liberty today after spending nearly four years in prison and being once condemned to death and twice placed on trial for his life for the murder of Katherine J. Adams.

But thirteen minutes sufficed for the jury to reach the decision of acquittal at the close of a trial that had lasted for weeks, the first trial which resulted in Molinuex's conviction and sentence, having been prolonged for about three months. The verdict which was confidently anticipated was greeted with an instantly suppressed outbreak of applause, Justice Lambert having delivered a stern admonition that no demonstration would be permitted. Molinuex who was brought into court as soon as it was known that the jury had agreed, was apparently unconcerned as he had been throughout the trial, and gave no evidence of emotion when the words that established his innocence were pronounced.

His aged father, General Molinuex, was deeply affected and could with difficulty respond to the greetings of friends who pressed forward to offer their congratulations. Immediately after the rendering of the verdict the prisoner was formally discharged from custody and left the court room with his father and counsel. On passing out of the building the three were cheered by a great crowd that gathered in anticipation of the acquittal. After removing his affects from his father's home in Brooklyn where he was again cheered by a large crowd.

### W. C. T. Union.

At the bottom of all the evils and temptations that infest our cities lies the legalized liquor traffic. For the sake of the boys and girls who are leaving the farms and seeking employment in the cities, it should not be difficult to convince farmers and farmers' wives that prohibition is the only kind of regulation that will regulate the drink business, or to persuade them to join the prohibition forces.

They cannot get employment if their condition is known, and they are discharged from service when their habits are discovered. The day is going to come when no man who allows himself to get under the influence of intoxicating liquors will be able to find employment in any business.—New Orleans Picayune.

### The Boxers Again.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 12.—Mail advices from South China report a recurrence of the rebellion in Kwang Si, said some time ago to have been suppressed. Large numbers of the Kotsihui, a new secret society, which is both anti-foreign and anti-dynastic, have joined the rebel movement. In Sze Chan the Boxers movement still progresses. The villages have plundered all the villages between Sze Chan and Cheng Tu, and in one place massacred 1700 Catholic converts. On October 1, two parties of Boxers entered Cheng Tu, but the prompt arrival of the garrison resulted in the Boxers being driven from the city with heavy losses, eleven, including a woman, looked upon as a prophetess were captured and beheaded in front of one of the yamens.

Minister's Lament Cures Distemper.

### History of the Molinuex Case.

Harry S. Cornish, on December 24, 1898, while physical director of the Knickerbocker Athletic Club received by mail an innocent-looking package. It contained what appeared to be a bottle of bromo seltzer in a silver bottle holder.

Cornish, at the request of Mrs. Katherine J. Adams, a relative, with whom he was boarding at No. 61 West Eighty-Sixth street, brought home the supposed Christmas present.

On December 28, Cornish gave Mrs. Adams a dose of bromo seltzer from the bottle he had received to cure a headache. She became ill at once, and in spite of physicians who were summoned, died in great agony in twenty minutes.

Molinuex boldly went to police headquarters to answer the charge, and was not detained, but the police began to weave a web of evidence around him.

Molinuex had been a member of the Knickerbocker Athletic Club and the friend of Henry C. Barnett, who lived at the club, and introduced Blanch Chesbrough, now Molinuex's wife to him.

Barnet died after taking a dose of a sample of medicine received by mail just as Cornish got the bromo seltzer.

The certificate of death gave the cause of Barnett's death as diphtheria; but when his body was examined it was disclosed by chemical analysis that death had been due to cyanide of mercury.

Molinuex volunteered as a witness at the coroner's inquest to determine the cause of the death of Mrs. Adams.

Assistant District Attorney Osborne boldly examined Molinuex for three days, and by directing suspicion to Cornish got Molinuex to make admissions which corroborated damaging evidence the police had collected against him.

At the conclusion of the inquest on February 28, 1899, Molinuex was arrested, charged with the murder of Mrs. Adams.

Then came the long, bitterly-contested legal battle to convict or acquit Molinuex. He was indicted, Justice Pardon C. Williams set aside the indictment because testimony concerning the death of Barnett was heard by the grand jury to the prejudice of Molinuex, who was not accused of killing him.

Molinuex was still held in the toms. The police found many letters which had been sent to quack medicine firms under the name of H. Cornish and H. Barnett, directing answers to be sent to private letter boxes at No. 1620 Broadway and Forty-Second Street, near Sixth Avenue. Koch & Heckman, the owners of these letter boxes, identified Molinuex as the man who had hired them. This was taken to show he was familiar with the method of sending medicines through the mails.

The case was submitted to another grand jury, of which Col. W. S. Church was foreman, and was dismissed. Molinuex was arrested on a charge of assault and held in \$5,000 bail.

Handwriting experts in the meantime had been working on the case and were unanimous in the opinion that Molinuex had written the quack medicine letters and the address on the poison package sent to Cornish.

On their testimony Molinuex was indicted July 29, 1899, and was brought to trial in November. He was convicted, after 55 days trial, of murder in the first degree, and sentenced to death. After spending 18 months in the death cells in Sing Sing Prison, he was granted a new trial, which began 14 days ago.

One hundred witnesses were examined at the first trial, and according to Mr. Osborne, 25 per cent of these refused to attend the second trial, and a half dozen of the former witnesses are dead.

Evidence as to the Barnett letters which were admitted at the former trial, and on which the appeal was granted were ruled out this time. New evidence proved an alibi for Molinuex, and a new witness, Mrs. Stephenson, swore that while standing in line at the post office, she saw a man in front of her mailing the package addressed to Cornish, which was not Molinuex, but resembled Cornish himself.

### Slip in Church.

GLEN COVE, L. I., Nov. 9.—Cards and dancing have divided the Glen Cove Methodist Episcopal Church and arrayed some of its flock against the pastor the Rev. Mr. Eggleston. Strangely it is the minister who favors the pastime, while some of his parishioners hold that these forms of amusements do not conduce to the spiritual welfare. An effort to have the pastor's successor named has been defeated and the Weekly Euchre Club meets regularly.

The presiding elder of the district, the Rev. Mr. Wing, visited the church Wednesday evening at the regular quarterly conference.

A discussion arose as to the spiritual condition of the church.

Mr. King, who is President of the Epworth League, complained that the pastor had set an un-Christian example by being a member of the Glen Cove Club, which countenances dancing, card playing and other forms of amusement. Mr. King said that even if they were unharmed, and he did not believe they were, it would be much better if members devoted some of the time to the church which they had to the Glen Cove Club.

To the disappointment of that faction opposed to the card playing and dancing the presiding elder mildly defended these amusements. He said the right to deal a deck of cards, providing there was no money at stake, and to gaily skip over a waxed floor was not denied even to Methodists. He said in such matters members should be guided by their conscience.

"I have refrained from card playing for forty years," said a member.

"And I have done the same thing," said one of the sisters.
