MUCH INTEREST IN SUN'S ECLIPSE

Great interest was taken here Saturday morning in the eclipse on the sun. Although a trifle cold and a strong wind blowing, the weather was highly satisfactory from the standpoint of the amaetur astronomer

While the eclipse was not a total one in this section of the continent, it was nearly so. Many persons, armed with smoked glasses, were on hand before nine o'clock gazing heavenward and were soon rewarded by the first sign of the darkening process of the great orb of the day. The eclipse began here at 9:15 o'clock a.m. and continued until shortly after eleven o'clock. The limit was reached at 10:30, when the sun, as seen through smoked glass, resembled a new with its point towards the earth. It was quite dark at this time, especially indoors and in places not exposed to the sun's rays As it was the only opportunity, people now living will ever have to observe an eclipse of the sun, near ly everybody availed themselves of it. For a time overcast skies hampered the observations but it is, announced by scientists, who were ht the path of totality. that the conditions were ideal fo their observations.







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Claiming Name "Presbyterian"

To the Editor of the Gleaner. Sir,-May I have space to mak claim that Presbyterian congregations going into the United Churcu of Canada retain the right to call themselves Presbyterian?

1. In the preamble of the Church Union Act, it is stated that the negotiating churches "have agreed to unite and form one body or denomination of Christians under the name of the United Church of Canada.' In section 4 (a) of the same Act we have these words "the said churches as so united are future development purposes, conhereby constituted a body corporate and politic under the name of the United Church of Canada." I have on careful search of the Act, failed to find either hint or suggestion that a negetiating church, ... any congregation of such church, shall do otherwise than bear the nam "The United Church of Canada.

2. A letter addressed to the Hon N.W. Rowell, K.C by G.W Maso and McGregor Young, the legal counsel who prepared the Church Union Bill, says " in our view the Basis of Union and the Bill as ap proved by the Union Committee for a union of the negotiating churches, and upon the passing of the Act these churches would cease to exist." Which simply means that hcse who go into the Union cease at the moment of their entry to be Presbyterian and become United Churchmen



Sir:-It has been pointed out to me that the statement I made to my people last Sunday evening was understood by some to mean that I was advising the congregation to follow a course I declined to take mys-lf.

Will you kindly allow me space to say that any ambiguity in my words arose from the fact that in making my statement I was considering the best interest of the Church and not my own. Moreover, it did not occur to me that I could be supposed to advise my people to follow a course I was not willing to follow myself. I declared my intention to enter the United Church at Synod last October, still hoping for the "reasonable unanimity" we have all for twenty years back declared to be essential But the depth of cleavage revealed by the last few week's voting especially the now obvious split in St. Andrew's and my own belief that we should not leave so many of our Presbyterian people churchless have created quite a new sensation for me.

Rightly or wrongly, but at least sincerely and looking alone to the conditions under which in my judge ment St. Andrew can render the most effective Christian service.
