He spent the greater part of his life in Charlottetown where he was well known and much esteemed. He was many years in business and afterwards for about twenty years was Inspector of Weights and Measures for this Province until superseded in 1893. In his official capacity he gave great satisfaction to all who had business with him. He was a kind-hearted and affable gentleman and was highly esteemed by his large circle of acquaintances. His funeral yesterday morning was largely attended. A High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by Rev. Dr. Monaghan. His funeral to mourn, his brother Judge Bishop presided at the Probate Court, two sisters and eight children, (three sons and five daughters, besides several grand children and numerous friends. May his soul rest in peace.

General News.

Plans are being made to try and recover a quantity of coal at the bottom of Long Island sound, N. Y. wrecked from different barges.

A company is being organized at Newark N. J., to develop extensive gold mines in the Lake of the Woods District.

A miners' train on Pennsylvania road bound for Richards Colliery was stopped near Mount Carmel on the 29th ult., all the windows broken. The passengers were carpenters, repair men and pump men.

The home of Michael Weidon, a non-union worker at Schuykill Colliery was dynamited on Monday. The family escaped injury, however.

London advices of Monday Sept 29th, say: The death roll from the Sicily hurricane is swelling and already six hundred persons are awaiting burial and grave fear is felt of an epidemic resulting.

The new armored cruiser Drake entered Portsmouth harbor last Thursday evening and reported having steamed 24 knots an hour, the fastest record ever made by a British cruiser. The Drake was designed to make only 22 knots an hour, but she has been fitted with a new form of propeller for purposes of experiment.

Collingwood Schreiber, chief engineer of railways and canal, returned from a lengthened visit to the North west and British Columbia to Ottawa on Friday last, during the course of which he inspected many railways. Mr. Schreiber says the Canadian immigration office in Trafalgar Square, London, will be open about Christmas. The intention is to get Canadian families for the office.

A special of the 26th to the Denver Post from Colorado Springs says that C. C. Hamlin, Henry M. Blackney and C. P. Grimes have been appointed by Judge Orr as administrators of the estate of the late W. E. Stratton, and that their bonds in the sum of \$5,000,000 had been filed by the U. S. Fidelity and Guarantee Co., the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland and the American Bonding and Trust Co. of Boston. Attorneys for the executor's name in the will have petitioned against naming any of administrators at this time, and it is said against the man named especially.

A letter dated Sept. 19th, received at Ottawa from W. D. Griffiths, Canadian Government Agent at Cardiff, Wales, says that the "fine new steamer Manchester Engineer was due at Swansea in the course of the week to take 7,000 tons of locally worked anthracite coal for Montreal and Quebec. This is not only the largest cargo of coal ever shipped from Swansea, but one of the biggest on record from the British Channel. It also exceeds in tonnage any coal cargo ever has been sent to the Western Hemisphere from the United Kingdom. An other vessel was loading 3,000 tons, and a third 4,000 tons, also for Montreal and Quebec.

"He would go to the sheriff, he said, and get a warrant for his arrest, for he deserved the stake as much as Servo, an accused wretch, whom Calvin caused to be burnt at Geneva, St. Barbe only laughed at such threats, and advised Mr. Bittontons to go first to Sir Amias and find out who he was. The minister went on for some time with a vehement tirade against Pope 7, quoting many texts and urging the necessity of faith alone in matters of belief; his companion answered not a word.
