

At 1.50 twenty minutes later, the I. C. R. oper ator at Father Point was awakened by the "S. O. S." ring on his door bell. Rushing to the apparatus he was informed by the Marconi operator that the Empress of Ireland was sinking, having been struck by some vessel. He could get no other signal from the doomed vessel. The manager of the Marconi Station at Father Point immediately notified the Government Steamers, Eureka at Father and Evelyn at Rimouski. These steamers started at once for the scene of the disaster; but when they arrived there was no sign o the Empress. She sank to the bottom fourteen minutes after she was rammed and only some wreckage, a number of life boats and the coal steamer were to be seen.


