The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and who has since continued to be a British subject or a sutject of an allied or neasection of available Deminion Land Manitoba, Szakatchawan or Albert Applicant must appear in person a Dominion Lands Agency or Sab-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditious. Duties-Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteade

may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-smption. Price \$3.00 per acre Duties-Reside six months in each o three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extre. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain con

A settler after obtaining he mester patent, if he cannot secure a pre-empion, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside eix months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
