WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal .- Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one vears at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,560 acres shall be leased to one individual or ompany. A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined. Quartz.-A person eighteen years of age, or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500 x 1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey requirements, purchase one land at The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2 12 per cent. on

the sale. Placer mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly. An applicant may obtain two leases

o dredge for gold of five miles each or a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate
