



"We the undersigned jurors find hat Jules Fortin died in the city of Montreal on 6th May inst., from a bulet wound at the hands of Timothy andy, and Daniel O'Connell died on th May also from a bullet wound incted upon him by the same Timothy andy, who is to be held criminally esponsible.

Timothy Candy, ex-night watchman or Messrs. Ames-Holden, Limited, oot and shoe manufacturers, Inspectr street, was held responsible by a oroner's jury for the shooting of onstables O'Connell and Fortin. He vill be charged with wilful murder. 'he verdict rendered by the coroner's ury was given as above.

Candy has been identified by the wo men he tried to sell the stolen roperty. Before Coroner McMahon t the morgue on Tuesday morning, lay 10th, each of them swore posiively that Candy was the man, and verything in the Ames-Holden buildng point to his guilt. The rubber oots were stolen from that firm. The eading of the time sheet of the clocks the building shows that he was abent at the time of the double murer. Even the revolver which was urnished Candy by the firm, points to is guilt. The night watchman was llowed no spare cartridges, and vhen the revolver was found aturday morning on the desk of the oreman of the estalishment it was paded with Kynoch cartridges, not he sort supplied by the firm.

Timothy Candy, the night watchnan, is 37 years of age, born in Liverool and married. He came to this ountry some two years ago, worked or the Canada Refining Company, and ettled in this city after his wife had ome over from England. However, he wife did not like this country, and he returned to England, where he cined her last winter. A month ago e came back to Montreal, and lafter aree weeks secured employment at he Ames-Holden Shoe Company, as ight watchman, on the strength of ormer certificates.

Candy came to work Saturday and Sunday night, but, on Monday mornng he showed a letter to another emloyee, saying his wife had written to im, asking him to come back. When irst asked by the police about this leter, the suspect said he had torn it pieces, but he later admitted that t was a fabrication.

Engineer Millard, of the Slater Shoe actory, for whom Candy was working ast year, said that the man was discharged on account of carelessness He said that Candy had threatened to shoot him, but he paid no attention to this at the time.

At the Ames-Holden factory it was stated that before he was arrested Candy expressed the intention of leaving at once for England without waiting for his six days' pay still due. He said at the time he had only \$7 in his pocket.

He dreads the ordeal of his trial and says that he'd like the authorities to send him to the gallows immediatev and be done with it.





of Tarliament: And whereas it is intended to substitute for the House of Lords as it at present exists a Second Chamber constituted on a popular instead of a hereditary basis, but such substitution cannot be immediately brought into

And whereas provision will require nereafter to be made by Parliament in a measure effecting such substitution for limiting and defining the powers of the New Second Chamber but it is expedient to make such pro vision as in this Act appears for restricting the existing powers of the House of Lords:

Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority o the same, as follows:

#### MONEY BILLS.

(1) If a Money Bill having been passed by the House of Commons, and sent up to the House of Lords at leas one month before the end of the Ses sion, is not passed by the House of Lords, without amendment within one month after it is so sent up to that House, the Bill shall, unless the passengers by the Siberian, and many House of Commons direct to the contrary, be presented to His Majesty and Park in the West End and expressed become an Act of Parliament on the pleasure at the excellent manner in royal assent being signified, notwith standing that the House of Lords have

not consented to the Bill. (3) When a Bill to which the House of Lords has not consented is presented to His Maesty for assent as a money Bill, the Bill shall be accompanied by a certificate of the Speaker of the House of Commons that it is a Mone:

#### ALL OTHER BILLS.

(1) If any Bill other than a Money Bill is passed by the House of Commons in three successive sesssions (whether of the same Parliament or not), and, having been sent up to the House of Lords at least one before the end of the session, is rejected by the House of Dords in each of these sessions, that Bill shall, on its rejection for the third time by the House of Lords, unless the House of Commons direct to the contrary, be presented to his Majesty and becom an Act of Parliament on the royal assent being signified thereto, notwithstanding that the House of Lords has not consented to the Bill: Provided that the provision shall not take effect unless two years have elapsed between the date of the first introduction of the Bill in the House of Commons and the date on which it passes the House of Commons for the third time

(2) A Bill shall be deemed to be rejected by the House of Lords if it is not passed by the House of Lords either without amendment or with such amendments only as may be agreed

#### CHANGES PERMISSIBLE.

(3) A Bill shall be deemed to be the same Bill as a former Bill sent up to the House of Lords in the proceeding House of Lords, it is identical with the former Bill or contains only such alterations as are certified by the Speaker of the House of Commons to be necessary owing to the time which has elapsed since the date of the ormer Bill, or to represent amendnents which have been made by the House of Lords in the former Bill in

the preceding session. Provided that the House of Comnons may, if they think fit, on the passage of such a Bill through the House in the second or third session, suggest any further amendments shall be considered by the House of Lords, ind if agreed to by that House shall be reated as amendments made by the louse of Lords and agreed to by the House of Commons; but the exercise of this power by the House of Comnons shall not affect the operation of his section in the event of the Bill eng rejected by the House of Lords.

#### SPEAKER'S POWERS.

4. Any certificate of the speaker of he House of Commons given under his Act shall be conclusive for all ourposes, and shall not be questioned n any court of law.

5. Nothing in this Act shall diminish or qualify the existing rights and priileges of the House of Commons. 6. Five years shall be substituted 'or seven years as the time fixed for he maximum duration of Parliament inder the Septennial Act, 1715. 7. This Act may be cited as the Parliament Act 1910.




