C.H.E. Results and Reports.

In another part of this issue will be found some of the results of the C. H. E. Examinations held in June last. These results include the winners of scholarships and of subject prizes, and a list of those who obtained the Associatehip of the Council and of those who obtained diplomas in the Honors divisions of the Intermediate and Preliminary grades. The Examiners not only furnish a list of passes, marks, and distinctions in the diploma examinations, they also make a short report of the answers of the candidates in general in the several subjects of the four groups of examinations. These are known as the Examiners' reports. We purpose to call out some of the features of interest in these reports.

ASSOCIATE GRADE.

English.—The essays were, in most cases, highly satisfactory, only a few were specially weak, while the work of the best candidates was characterized by fullness of matter and good expression.

English Literature.—Most of the candidates showed a fair acquaintance with the texts of the plays and the poems.

History.—A creditable percentage of candidates obtained the mark of Distinction, and there were a good many who only just missed it. . . . The

spelling, even of good candidates, was frequently very bad.
Geography.—There is again a slight improvement in knowledge of geographical principles, but the knowledge otherwise is still very scanty and superficial.

Arithmetic and Algebra.—The average work of the candidates was not so good as on former occasions.
Geometry.—As on the last occasion, a number, greatly increased, of unsatisfactory papers were followed by a number of satisfactory papers, but these latter papers did not contain so many successful attempts at the solutions.

Mechanics.—The papers reached a high average of merit.
Navigation.—One very moderate paper.

French.—In the translation from the French, the first piece was not satisfactory, the vocabulary being rather poor. . . . In the second passage, the style of most of the candidates was poor; very few seemed to grasp the general idea and feeling of the passage. . . . The Translation into French was the most satisfactory.

Latin.—The work, on the whole, was very satisfactory.
Light and Heat.—The knowledge of heat was very fair.

Chemistry.—An excellent set of papers, giving evidence of careful training.
Hygiene.—The papers showed a good standard of work.

Shorthand.—The shorthand notes showed a good knowledge of the theory.
Theory and Practice of Education.—Of the few who attempted No. 3, most failed to define Reason with any approach to accuracy, and none showed ability to discuss the question on the reasoning power of young children. Many full and accurate defini-

tions of Memory were given, but the discussion on the use of Memory in school work consisted mainly of giving lists of things that children should or should not learn by rote. Often no reasons were given for such distributions, and where reasons were given they were usually unconvincing. A considerable number defined Sensation and Perception with fair accuracy, but the majority either used technical language incorrectly or defined the popular and not the scientific meaning of these two terms. In the answers on the "Training of the Senses," some made scanty reference to school work, others gave a list of vague generalities, the rest were irrelevant.

INTERMEDIATE GRADE.
Scripture History.—The papers, with two or three exceptions, showed signs of careful study.
English.—The general character of the work in Grammar was creditable. . . . The answers to the Literature questions were, as a rule, fuller and more satisfactory than in Grammar. The Essays were very fair.

History.—About 72 per cent. passed, and of these about 6 per cent. obtained the mark of Distinction.
Geography.—In the report of last year attention was called to the neglect of the manufactures of different countries, and in this year's papers similar neglect is evident.

Arithmetic.—The average number of Totals done correctly was five, almost exactly the same as last year, but the whole work on the paper showed a clear improvement both in the percentage of passes and in the percentage of Distinctions.

Algebra.—As a whole the work of good quality, and was written out legibly and in good style.
Geometry.—A good portion of the work sent up was excellent in quality, the papers being neatly written and the propositions understood.

Mechanics.—There was some good work, but about half the candidates had evidently been through the subject too hastily.
Book-keeping.—The papers, on the whole, showed a decided improvement on last year's papers in the general average of merit obtained, as very many candidates completed the accounts.

Mensuration.—A considerable number of the candidates had no useful knowledge of the subject; they showed that they did not really understand the difference between length, area, and volume.
French.—The results were as a whole satisfactory, and in part very satisfactory indeed.

Latin.—The work as a whole was satisfactory and gave clear signs of careful teaching.
General Elementary Science.—Some of the work was very fair, but the candidates, with few exceptions, were unable to grasp the importance of proof by experiment.

Chemistry.—On the whole, the work was very satisfactory.
Hygiene.—The work presented by candidates was admirable in quality. Physiography.—It is evident that the Syllabus is beyond the capacity of the candidates who enter for this group.

Botany.—The examinees showed a knowledge of the subject, varying in quantity, but generally very accurate.
Agriculture.—The work was very unsatisfactory for candidates attempting to pass the intermediate stage, and it is difficult to resist the conclusion that the time given to the study of this subject has been wasted.

Plain Needlework.—Some of the patterns sent in were very well cut and tucked together, and reflected much credit on the workers, but there were many which did not fulfill the

requirements of the examination in point of size.
Shorthand.—A marked improvement was shown.
Typewriting and Office Routine.—The standard of work attained showed a decided improvement.
Penmanship.—The penmanship of these papers was for the most part fully up to a good average standard.
Drawing.—The average attainment is about equal to that of last year.

Harbor Grace Notes.

Master Grant Tetford returned by train on Saturday after a very pleasant holiday spent with relatives at St. John's and Clarke's Beach.

Mr. John S. Taylor, Mrs. Taylor and baby, who spent the past ten weeks here leave by to-morrow's train for St. John's, enroute to Pittsburgh, Pa., where Mr. Taylor holds a prominent position at the Carnegie Institute.

The children attending the Methodist Sunday School held their annual picnic at the Park yesterday. The day was a fine one for the outing, and the scholars and teachers thoroughly enjoyed the treat.

The Presbyterian Garden Party takes place this afternoon at the grounds of Donnelly Hall. The weather is delightful, with bright sun and enough east wind to make the atmosphere cool, and at the same time not interfere with the sale of ice-cream.

The funeral of the late Henry Webber took place this afternoon, and was attended by the members of the British and Orange Societies, as well as by a large number of citizens.

By letter from Murray's Harbor, Labrador, we were glad to hear that Mr. Frank Moriarty, who was compelled to go up to Battle Harbor hospital, owing to a numbness in his limbs, is on the coast again, and is on the road to recovery. We also note that trapping is about over at Murray's Harbor, but fish is still being caught with hook and line. Scud were just striking in. All the people in the place were well, and fish-making was being rushed ahead.

Several bankers were in port this week and after obtaining ice and bait left for the fishing grounds.

A large number of people visit the near-by hills each day to gather wild berries which are very plentiful this season.

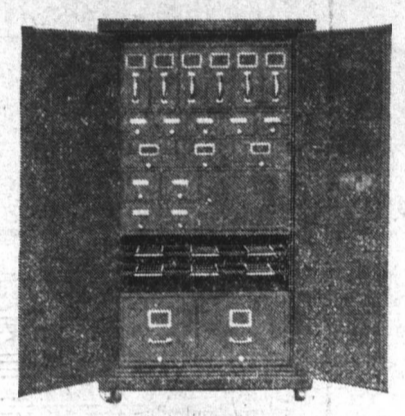

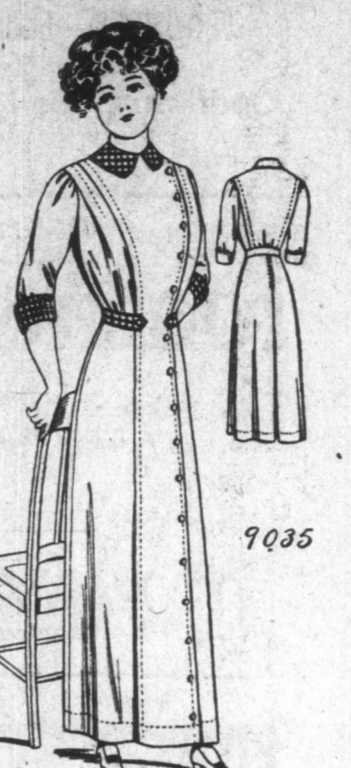

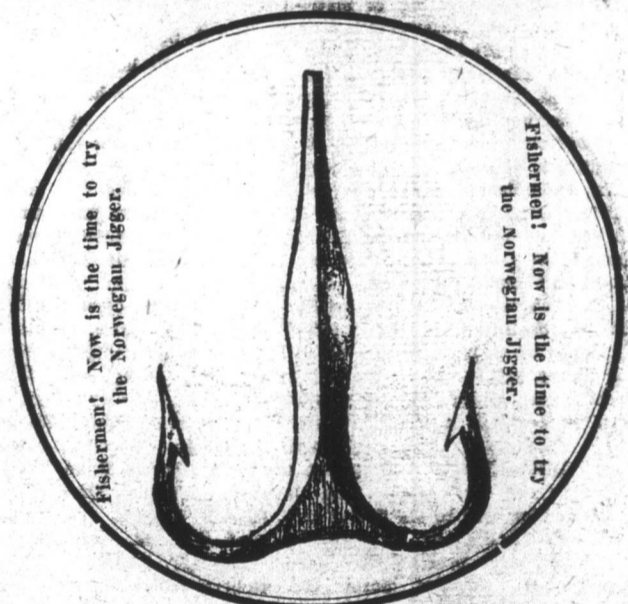
