Wireless on Railway Trains.

Experiments with Marconi wireess apparatus installed on trains of the Delaware, Lackawanna, and Western Railroad Company have proved hat it is possible for trains so equipess of the speed at which they are ravelling, and have led railway men to predict that the wireless will prove of nearly as much value to land travel

The Lackawanna Railroad has esablished wireless stations at Binghampton, New York, and Scranton Pennsylvania provided with the ocdinary 'aerials' supported between ligh towers. Of course it would be an impossibility to equip an express train with such a system, but it has been found that communication can fifty miles from a train carrying on iron pipes eighteen inches above the roofs of the cars. Four cars have been so fitted out on an express train that passes through Scranton and Binghamton. The cars are connect ed by special attaching plugs, and the operator's station, in the third car of the group, takes up no more room than the ordinary lavatory. The regular Marconi system is used, except that power is furnished by special motor-generator set driven rom the regular train-lighting dynano, and the ground connection i nade to the rails by a wire to one f the car trucks. Scranton and Binghamton are

bout sixty-five miles apart, but when he train is between these two points is constantly in communication ith one or the other, and if out lirect touch with one can reach it by eaying a message through the other. As a precaution against collision he railway wireless may have great ossibilities, and it has already been proved to have them in regard afety and time-saving through th of trains with stations regardless o line breaks' caused by blizzards washouts, signal-obscuring fogs, and other abnormal conditions. Apart rom this value in emergencies, the mount of time saved in routine train peration when conductors are able to teep in direct communication with rain despatchers without stopping their trains makes it likely that the wireless will soon be as much used on ailway trains as it is on ocean liners The emergency value of the wireess, as already stated, has been thoroughly proved on the Lackawan-The other day the conductor of he train carrying a radio was sudienly taken ill as the train was aproaching Scranton. Ordinarily lelay would have been necessary ither a stop in order to send a tele As it was, however, a message was flashed ahead through the air and the relief conductor was picked up at scranton with no delay. On another ccason two tramps were found tealing a ride on the blind baggage, and the conductor telegraphed ahead to the next scheduled stopping-place for detectives, who arrested the vagrants when the train drew into the station. In fact, the only persons to lose by the general use of wireless or trains are 'hoboes' and train robbers, to whom the sending out of railway 'S. O. S.' might often be embarrassing.-The 'Outlook,' New York,
