



BAD ACCIDENT ON C.P.R.

NORTH BAY, Ont., Jan. 26. Fifteen are dead and a number injured as a result of the worst train wreck in the history of this division of the Canadian Pacific Railway which occurred at Cobeil, ten miles east of here, to-day. Number one Canadian Pacific express for Vancouver, due here at ten o'clock, was running in two sections. No. 1 section became stalled owing to failure of engine to make steam under conditions of severe frost obtaining, and number two section came around a curve on it, the locomotive of number two section telescoping the sleeper of No. 1 section. It is stated that torpedoes had been placed and other precautions taken by the crew of the stalled train but there is too much confusion exist ing to be certain on this point. The two sections, it is stated, were running close together. Eight passenger on the stalled train were killed out right and seven others died after their removal on their way to the hospital here. 

Have you ever noticed the rerious hieroglyphics with which your linen is marked by the laundries? Strange and wonderful are the methods fying the contents of the wash-tub. In some parts of France linen is defaced with the name and address of the laundry, and an additional geometrical design to indicate the owner. In Bavaria every patron of the washtub has a number stamped in large characters on his linen. In other parts of Germany a small cotton label is attached by a hot-water-proof adhesive. In Bulgaria each laundry has a large number of stamps engraved with designs, and in Russia before the war, the laundries marked linen with threads worked in arrow shapes. In some Russian towns the police periodically issued regulations for laundries. In Odessa books of marks were furnished annually to the laundry proprietors, and these and no other marks, could be used. By Write DR. F. TO TAKE EXERCISE FREELY.

During the spring season fowls hav ng free range get abundant exercis Close confinement without exercise not conductive to the best results, although the feed provided may be the best, for idle hens spon grow too fat to lay. It is almost impossible to give aying hens which are confined too exercise. The fowls may be enred to exercise in various ways, ich as feeding corn on the cob, sus-anding cabbage heads, beets, etc., so that the birds have to jump for them, and scattering grain in the litter. The litter should be from 4 to 8 inches deep, and may consist of straw (either out or whole), hay, leaves, buck-wheat hulls, shredded corn fodder, or any convenient material of this naure. 


