Versailles, Oct. 6.-The trial of Marnoon to-day in the Palace Trianon. The Duc d'Aumale presided. Among the itnesses present were Marshals Can-obert and Lebœuf, and Generals Frossard, Bourbaki, and Changarnier. statement of the public services of Mar-shal Bazaine was read. Current Events. 
