A Scottish Vendetta.

FARMERS READ THIS.—At a meeting of the farmers of S. S. No. 11 Puslinch held on the 2nd inst. at the suggestion of Mr. John Dickie, a resolution was proposed and afterwards unanimously adopted to the effect that the farmers of that vicinity will make an effort to suppress in some degree if possible the ravages or rather the propagation of grasshoppers during the ensuing year.—They propose so far as is possible having recourse to the following means viz. each farmer to plough up his fields that have lain under grass or in sod for a few years, to clean up and cultivate any land that may be but partially cleared in the vicinity of all brush etc. and to raise a flock of turkeys. Will those of other localities that have been troubled by these pests follow suit? Try it, as the cost of the experiment will be small and may be productive of a great benefit.
