On or about Jan. I last one of the coupons of the forged bond was presented and paid by Baring Bros & Co., the financial agents of the dominion government in London. The coupons are worth £25 each and mature every six months. When the forgery became known the dominion government was notified and several items appeared in the English papers about it. The forged bond was numbered "01237." The dominion government at once set about tracing the forger and Chief Sherwood had the matter put into his hands. By the arrest of Lewis he thinks he has secured the right man. It was learned that in September, 1882, a 5 per cent bond of the issue of 1860 had been placed in the hands of a firm of brokers in this city as margin on stocks by Lewis. The stocks turned out a bad ers in this city as margin on stocks by Lewis. The stocks turned out a bad speculation and the brokers finally became the possessors of the bond. Then the bond seems to have passed through the hands of several other firms in Toronto, and finally found its way to Lon-don, and about Jan. 1 last, as stated above, don, and about Jan. I last, as stated above, the coupon maturing at that date was cashed by Baring Bros. This is the only coupon, as far as is known, that has ever been presented for payment. The bond would expire on Jan. I, 1885, and consequently there were but two coupons remaining. In 1879 Francis Lewis, who was attached to the receiver-general's office at Ottawa, was superannuated, and it was owing to his connection with that department and his subsequent placement of a bond in the hands of a firm of Toronto brokers, that led to suspicion resting on him. The forged bond arrived at the bank of Montreal in this city from London last of Montreal in this city from London last Monday. It was of course sent here to be made good by the parties who had sent it to England.

The theory of the dominion authorities is that Francis Lewis, who had access to all the unnegotiated bonds in the receiver-general's department, took one or more of them away with him when he was super-annuated and afterwards forged the names of the parties who are authorized to sign them. The names which it bears are: "George Sherwood, receiver-general;" "Sir A. T. Galt, minister of finance;" and certified by "Baring Bros.," and countersigned by "T. D. Harrington" and "Wm. Dickinson." The coupons attached are Dickinson." The coupons attached are stereotyped, and bear the name Riefenstein, whom it will be remembered served a term of imprisonment for fraud on the government. G. W. Chief Sherwood has moved very cautious ly in making his arrest. He has been in Toronto for a few days, and has kept as mum as a door-nail about his business, lest some of the friends of the man he wanted would get wind of his mission. On Tuesday he consulted County Crown Attorney Fenton, and on the same day a warrant was issued by Magstrate Denison. Lewis resided in Peterboro with his son, who is manager of the bank of Montreal agency in that town. A WASHINGTON RELIC.

Sish Carrier's Medal to Be Used as Evi-dence for the Cayugas. From the Hamilton Times. Isaac Davis, Indian agent in Brant ounty, and himself a member of the Mo nawk tribe, has in his possession the original silver medal presented by George Washington in 1792 to the Cayuga chief, Fish Carrier, as a token of his appreciation of the valor and services of the Cayugas in

the revolutionary war.

The medal is of solid silver, oval in shape, measures six inches in length and four and a half in width. On one side is four and a half in width. On one side is engraved a precise likeness of George Washington placing in the mouth of the brave warrior, Fish Carrier, the lighted pipe of peace. At the foot of the red man lies the tomahawk, where he has thrown it in token of peace and friendship. On the back there is depicted a yeoman of the last century ploughing the soil with his bovine team and rude wooden plough. On the other side of the medal is engraved the coat of arms of the United States.

The Cayugas left the States in 1809 and settled on the Grand river, having first sold their lands to New York state government for a sum which was to net

sold their lands to New York state government for a sum which was to net them \$2300 per year in interest. Mr. Davis says that the United States government has not paid interest since 1809, nor has the principal been received by the trine. A suit was begun on behalf of the Cayugas in 1882 against the authorities of the state to recover the amount by James C. Strong of Buffalo. The case has been before the courts twice, and each time was decided in favor of the claimants. The government of New York state has again appealed the case and it will come on for hearing in New York city in August next. The amount now claimed by the Incians is \$450,000. The medal above referred to is The amount now claimed by the Incians is \$450,000. The medal above referred to is looked upon as an important piece of tes-timony on behalf of the claimants, and Mr. Davis leaves for Buffalo Saturday to place it in the hands of his lawyer. The medal has been regarded as a sacred relic by the Cayuga tribe, and it was only after repeated importuning that Mr. Davis succeeded in getting the tribe's consent to have it taken into Uncle Sam's dominions.
