


### The Dirigo Stamp Company

### Chapter I.

Ever since the "stamp mania" had struck North Lynn, Will Hallsey and Ed. and Charlie Burdee had been devoted worshipers at the shrine of Philately. True they were the only collectors in North Lynn and most, if not all the people, looked on it as but a boyish fad that would soon die out, but that did not lessen their zeal.

Now they had reached that stage of Philatelic life when a desire to deal in stamps takes possession of and overpowers its victim.

Each of them had accumulated quite a quantity of duplicates and they believed themselves well equipped to embark as dealers.

The present meeting was for the formation of a firm to deal in stamps It had been decided to call the firm "The Dirigo Stamp Co.," and Ed. Burdee had been formally elected as president, and his brother treasurer and advertising manager, while Will Hallsey was to act in the capacity of Secretary. It was further agreed that

all should have a hand in filling orders and making up approval sheets. The capital stock of the company had been fixed at \$25.00, divided into as many shares. Each boy was to pay \$5.00 and own five shares, while the remaining shares were to be sold, if possible among their friends who might care to help them along.

It was arranged to invest \$10.00 of the capital with a wholesale dealer in order to increase their stock of stamps After much consultation it was decided to invest this money in a packet of 1,500 varieties offered by a leading dealer.

The advertising manager was instructed to send small advertisements to three different philatelic papers and also to insert the following notice in the local papers:—

OLD STAMPS WANTED.

We will buy the stamps off your old letters. Hunt up some and call on us. We pay cash, Dirigo Stamp Co., North Lynn M.....

With this the first meeting came to an end as the town clock indicated supper time. We will present an instalment of this story each month until completed. ### Canadian Postoffices.

The following statements are taken from the annual report of the postoffice department, for the year ending June 30, 1896, as laid on the table of the house of Parliament May 28, 1897 by Mr. Mulock, Postmister-General.

June 30 there were 9,103 postoffices in the Dominion, of which 1,640 were in the province of Quebec. The total number of letters carried was 156,028,000; post cards 24,794,800; free letters 4,808,800; registered letters 3,565,500; transient newspapers etc. 24,024,000.

During the year 318' additional miles of railway mail service were established. The value of the issue of postage stamps was \$3,779,993 an increase of \$154,178.

### "NOTES.

By S. A. Nichols.

The collecting of stamps is one of the most profitable amusements that young people can engage in. When thrown aside for a time, as it may be, the collection, if carefully made, will increase in value with the lapse of time. Parents cannot do better than to encourage in their children a love of stamp collecting. It is no longer considered a fad, but is now recognized as a harmless yet intellectual and sensible recreation, attractive to all classes. Collectors are advised never to buy badly cancelled, torn or otherwise damaged stamps; but always lightly cancelled ones. Most unused stamps increase in value more rapidly than used ones.

Herbert Irey Watts, whose illustration appears above, was born at Winchester, Indiana, Randolph Co., July 19, 1875.

Mr. Watts began collecting in 1890 and, until a short time ago, had general collection of about 3,500 varieties but has disposed of it and intends to start a special collection of British Colonials with Mexican issues as a side line.

In 1894 he began writing for the Philatelic Press and to him belongs the honor of writing the first Philatelic novel ever written. Mr. Watts is Associate Editor of this paper. He is also the discoverer of the Cincinnati Hand stamp, and in spite of opposition still advocates its claims.

In 1896 he entered the Law Office of Canada & Caldwell as a student.

### Random Jottings.

Veda.

Among the earliest of telegraph franks were those issued early in the fifties by the Electric Telegraph Co., of London England and instead of franking to any stated money valuation they franked a message to a certain distance, being issued for messages for fifty miles or under, one hundred miles or under, or over one hundred miles.

On some values of Austrian stamps may be found what is known as complimentary stamps, which consist of a block of color the size of the stamp crossed by a St. Andrew's Cross. These are used to fill the sheet out to an even monetary value without causing irregular shaped blocks or sheets.

I recently saw a Bermuda stamp (two pence value) fraudulently surcharged "Gibraltar." The surcharge is the least trifle larger than the genuine. We would advise purchasers to ascertain by using an accurate measure, if the surcharge is 15mm. long and no longer.

For the specialist in perforations, careful search among the stamps of the Roman States will develope specimens perforated only on two and three sides, the outside stamps on the sheets not being perforated on the outer margins.

Searchers after the curious may find "tete beche" specimens in the 9c China both surcharged and unsurcharged, but only in the first printing as the "placing" was corrected as soon as convenient after discovery.

Among recent discoveries is a 3 baj Romagna printed in light yellow, the color of the 2 baj. The specimen is held by a New York firm at fifty dollars,

It is said that the French Minister of Commerce, Telegraph and Posts will soon suppress the 75c postage stamp, the 5c envelope (large), the 1c envelope (small), the 3c newspaper wrapper and the 60c and 1 fr due stamps as being unnecessary.

One of the most interesting places to visit at the National Capital is the the museum of the Postoffice Dep't. The things of most interest to the collector are the postage stamps shown in large quantities. Many countries being represented. Full sheets of all the issues of U.S. stamps are not the least of the curiosities. Collectors who visit Washington and see this collection will go away with increased admiration for our beautiful national stamps, as well as for these beautiful samples of works of art, for that is what many of them are.

### BRITISH COLONIALS.

By HERBERT IREY WATTS.

III. Falkland Islands.

These islands lie northeast of Tierra Del Fuego. The principal islands are East and West Falkland and King George Island.

The stamp issues have been six in number and of two designs only.

The first issue, 1873, consisted of four values, 1d, 4d, 6d and 1 shilling. These were on plain paper without watermark. None of these are very rare. They are good stamps and command a fair price but still remain within the reach of the average collector.

In 1884 the 1d and 4d were issued with crown and C A watermark.

Later, 1886, they were discovered with watermark sideways.. Very fortunately for philatelists this error in watermarks is plentiful so that the stamps are cheap.

In 1391 to supply a demand for ½d stamps a split provisional was made. It consisted of the 1d claret cut in halves and surcharged ½d in black ink. It is scarce on the original cover but can be had at a low price in an unused condition. Care should be taken in buying this stamp that a genuine surcharge is secured.

In 1891 a reissue of the first design was made but in a new set of colors and two of the original values omitted and two new ones added. The ones omitted are the 4d and one shilling stamps; the ones added are ½d green and 2½d blue. This set is watermarked Crown and C A.

Containing so few varieties a complete collection of these stamps can be made quite cheaply.

### Philatelic Pencilings.

The following varieties in Canada stamps have come under my notice since last month.

A copy of the 3c green third issue Bill stamp pennarked 1868. Both Adams and Ketcheson catalogue this issue as 1869.

A distinct paper variety in the current ½c, a thick wove paper on retouched die.

A copy of the 3c 1872 a distinct brown shade on original cover. As it was among a lot of correspondence from an old Toronto bank I have reason to believe it a genuine shade uncatalogued.

The 3c current issue entirely black on hard paper.

The following was sprung on me when I applied at the P. O. for Jubilee stamps, "We have received official notice from Ottawa to the effect that only one complete set of Jubilee stamps will be sold to each person in order to keep them out of the hands of stamp collectors.

Your correspondent was an interested spectator of the proceedings at the Toronto general P. O. on the morning of June 19th. The Jubilee stamps were advertised to be placed on sale at 9 A. M. but long before that hour a large crowd had gathered, all anxious to obtain the first consignment The P. O. officials found it necessary to call four policeman to preserve When the long looked for 9 o'clock arrived there were at a low estimation 500 people waiting. the prominent collectors and dealers were present. One enterprising dealer was seen handing out circulars and cards.
