STRATHROY paid the Grand Trunk Company last year \$80,000 for freightage-or \$19,000 quarterly.

THE first lake charter of the season made in Chicago consisted of 42,000 bushels of corn for Kingston.

IT is reported that the hemlock bark combination has been broken, and members are offering bark at \$10 in Boston. Dark has sold as low as \$9.50 there latterly.

D. McGregor, of Paisley, Ont., waggonmaker, is reported to be in trouble.-Andrew Armstrong, jun., manufacturer of paints, at Guelph, is also reported as in difficuities.

THE Merchants Manufacturing Co. (St. lienri Cotton Mills) is about to apply to the local legislature for authority to issue debentures to the extent of \$200,000.

THE arbitrators in the Woodstock waterworks dispute have filed a report valuing the works at \$25,156. The town refused to purchase the system from the company some time ago for \$20,000.

THE liabilities of D. F. Ferguson, grocers Sarnia, Ont., are about \$1,800. Mr. Ferguson came formerly from Strathroy and never advanced beyond a mere living business. He began with a few hundred dollars.

WM. HENLEY, a small furniture dealer, Toronto, was sold out by the bailiff on the 15th inst. His liabilities were about \$3,000.

The sheriff is in possession of the effects of R. C. Wylie, builder, same city.—Hill, Foster & Barker, cabinetunkers, Toronto, are reported to have assigned.

WM. E. Barny, of Great Village, N.S., carriagemaker, recently assigned, with liabilities of about \$900, after streamons endeavors to make both ends meet.—In order to participate in the distribution, creditors of David McClelland, livery stable keeper, Annapolis, N.S., should sign within 3 months from the 18th plt.

The Cuban planters sent large gangs of their men into the mahogany forests when the decline in sugar rendered their employment on the estates unprofitable, and the effect of the large cut of timber in Cuba has been to depress Leading Wholesale Trade of Montreal.

the mahogany market to such an extent that the business in the Tierra Caliente of Mexico has been seriously injured.

A LARGE quantity of alsike seed has been offered for sale in Toronto recently. The export demand has been confined to choice qualities. A car of some 444 bushels was bought the other day the price paid being over \$3,000. The seed in this car was grown by six farmers, and one lot of 150 bushels neited the grower about \$1,100.

Mr. I. RICHARDS, who has been in the hard-ware trade in Picton, Ont., since 1875, has assigned. The liabilities are placed at \$5,700 while assets are stated to reach \$5,500; in view of these figures, an offer of a compromise at 45 cents in the dollar, spread over fifteen months, last payment to bear interest at 7 per cent, was promptly refused by the creditors.

Thomas Munnoe, of Belleville, dry goods dealer, has assigned to Mr. Warring Kennedy, of Samson, Kennedy & Co., Toronto. Munroe moved from Peterboro in 1883, and started business with William Smeaton, under firm of Smeaton, Munroe & Co. They dissolved in 1884—Smeaton continuing the old business, and Munroe started for himself.

FRANK BANTER, generally called "handsome Frank," a statue-sque cigar dealer of this city, has failed, with liabilities of about \$200, and assets of probably \$150. He has been in business not quite three months. Frank was formerly a cigar maker, and will probably return to his trade a wiser if not a better man. Messas. S. F. Frains & Son, tailors, St. Thomas, Ont., appeared to the uninitiated to be doing quite a business locally, but the fact that they were a supply account of a Toronto house proved that appearances favored them too much. They had been slow pay locally for some time. They have assigned in trust, with liabilities of about \$4,000.

Chas. H. Denton, general storekeeper Rossway, N.S., wound up the old year by a precipitous plunge into insolvency. Judgment was rendered against him 31st December, and on the same day he gave a Bill of Sale and made an assignment. There was a little real property in the case, but it was not held in Mr. Denton's name.

News!—We are pleased to see that the enterprise of the Journal of Commerce is duly recognized by the correspondence of the daily press. In a leading paper Wednesday morning, under the heading "Latest from Toronto," will be found the account of the trial of Tobias Epstein, which appeared in these columns nearly a week before.

ROBE. ANDERSON mortgaged his 50 acre farm for \$600 or \$700—about half its value—nearly a year ago, and began business in Comber, Ont., where it was supposed there were plenty of storekeepers without him. As he had had but little experience his capital was soon exhausted to little purpose. Its stock, valued about \$800, was recently advertised for sale.

GEO. P. KEHOE, undertaker, is in difficulties. This morning his hearse was seized and sold

GEORGE MACDONALD, trading under the name of E. Macdonald, dry goods merchant, of Alliston, has assigned. Liabilities \$9,000, assets nominally the same. Mr. Macdonald was formerly in business in Oshawa on a large scale, but failed, as will be remembered, about two years ago, and has since done business in his wife's name. A meeting will be held in Toronto next week, where most of the creditors reside.

F. W. JEFFREY, general storekeeper of Midland, Ont., has effected a composition with his creditors for 50 cents on the dollar. His liabilities are about \$14,000, while his assets, including no less than \$6,000 in bad and doubtful debts, show nominally a surplus. Mr. Jeffrey is about to take in a partner, who, it is said, will put in \$7,000, and therefore, it is supposed, is desirous of starting with a clean balance sheet.

B. A. BENOIT, furniture dealer, St. Hyacinthe, Que., formerly of Benoit & Simard, in the same city, has made an assignment on the demand of a Montreal firm. He owes \$2,-000 and the assets are about \$1,200. A short time ago Benoit married the daughter of a widow who kept a saloon, and, instead of attending to his business, he entrusted it largely to an inexperienced youth, and his creditors no sooner heard of this than they determined to close him out.

Gabriel de Brandon, turned his footsteps towards Montreal, with \$400 in his pocket and the glow of youthful hope on his countenance, for he was about to begin a business life on his own account, and only wanted the necessary goods. His little capital and some credit soon enabled him to reach that goal of the ambition of so many young men, to keep a village store. Ten months have since clapsed and now Mr. Michaud finds that his little assets consist largely of book debts, which will not satisfy his creditors, and he consequently has assigned.

Mus. Eugene Demers, trading under the firm name of Barrette & Frère, general store-keepers, of Chambly Basin, has assigned. Liabilities about \$2,000, assets not yet ascertained, but it is believed will show about 50 cents on the dollar. The failure is considered a bad one, as the firm obtained consignments from some Montreal houses within a few weeks of its suspension. It will be remembered that Barrette & Frère failed in July, 1883, when the two brothers were arrested on a capias on a charge of concealing effects from their creditors; since that time Camille Barrette has been in Chicago, and the business has been carried on by his brother, under his wife's name.

An action has been instituted by the Ontario Bank against the grand Trunk Railway Co., and James Stewart of the *Times* Printing Co., for the sum of \$1,125. The action arises out of advances made to the now defunct *Times* Publishing Company, on the under-

year amounted to 1,003,562 tons, the stock now on hand being estimated at 384,995 tons.

The Penobscot river is now closed, and advices from Bangor state that, though last season has been a successful one for those who had logs to sell, but little was made by lumber sawyers, owing to the low prices ruling for manufactured lumber. This year's reserve of logs is the smallest known for the past fifteen years, there being only 17,000,000 feet of logs left over on the river, out of a total stock of 150,090,000 for the year; and so confident are the Maine lumbermen of better times next year that they intend to cut 150,-000,000 feet, or 25 per cent more than last winter, which amount, with present reserve. will make a total of 167,000,000 feet for 1886.

#### THE FISHERY QUESTION.

The recent discussion in the United States Senate on the subject of the Fishery relations with Canada and Great Britain must be sufficient of itself to bring the blush to the cheeks of those Canadian writers and members of Boards of Trade who persistently urge upon the government the necessity of taking some steps towards establishing reciprocal relations with the United States. It shows Canada, if that was not already most effectively done on the occasion of the late Senator Brown's mission to Washington in 1874, that, whatever basis of agreement might be fixed upon with the executive, is subject to defeat in the Senate, and that we are only blistering our knees to initiate such a movement. The people and government of the United States know but too well that Canada is ready and willing to enter into reciprocal trade relations with them consistent with our relations to the Mother country and other nations, and it is not through any fault of the editors and bodies referred to if they [the Americans] remain ignorant of our begging attitude. It is needless to say that the more the matter is discussed in such a spirit, the more difficult will it be for our own or the home government to effect anything like a reasonable solution of the difficulties surrounding the question of the fisheries. The preamble and resolution which were introduced by Senator Frye of Maine, are as follows:-

Whereas, the President has recommended Congress to provide for a commission to settle

and adjust the fisheries question:

And whereas, the fisheries question had been settled for ten years past under the treaty of Washington at a cost of five and a half million dollars in money and a revision of six million dollars of duties in that period;

And whereas, that treaty had resulted in an increase of 500 vessels and 10,000 seamen to the Canadian fishing fleets, with a correspond-ing decrease in the fishing fleets of the United States;

Therefore, resolved,-That it is the opinion of the Senate that a commission clothed with the powers referred to ought not to be pro-

vided for by Congress.

This is a plain unvarnished censure of the President for having in his recent address suggested the appointment of a commission -what the Journal of Commerce has all along recommended—to settle the difficulties arising from the unfortunate want of explicitness in the Treaty of 1818.

Senator Edmunds, of Vermont, on speaking to the subject, said he was glad that the resolution was introduced, but thought a word necessary in regard to the action of the President, had with Her Majesty's Government after the time had expired when, according to the provision of the law, the whole fishery matter and the customs matter connected with it had absolutely terminated. It seemed to be stated, he said, in a report just laid on the desk of senators that the President, without any advice or consent of the Senate, had entered into arrangements with Her Majesty's Government by which citizens of the United States were accorded certain rights in fisheries in British waters, which by existing treaties and the laws of nations, they would not otherwise have, and that British subjects were accorded reciprocal rights in the United States. If that was what was meant by the statements of the report (and he spoke of it with reserve because he had only just seen the report) it certainly presented a very grave question as to the exertions of the executive power in the matter of entering into a rangements with foreign powers, affecting the rights of citizens of the United States in the face of the constitutional provision that gives the President power to make treaties by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. It may be, he added, that the arrangement referred to was not a treaty, but in respect to the end to be obtained by it, it was what a treaty would be and what had never been supposed could be done without a treaty.

Senator Morgan of Alabama enquired

whether any right had been given to British fishermen by the arrangement referred to, that they would not have had without it.

Senator Edmunds replied that if the statemeants of the correspondence meant what they seemed to mean (and he read some of them), the powers granted could only be granted, as he understood the constitution, by a treaty made by the president in a constitutional way. He only called attention to the matter, and did that in the best possible spirit as he desired to speak of the President with every re-

Senator Morgan said that under the resolution that had passed Congress, instructing the

P resident to terminate the fishery treaty, we happened to fix the time in the middle of the fishery season and after the the people had gone to great expense in preparation for the work of fishing. It would have been a great injury to stop the work of the fleets in the middle of their course and, perhaps, the President, in conference with the British authorities, had strained a point in order to accommodate the interests and provide for the welfare of that large class of people interested.

Senator Hoar of Massachusetts thought he represented the State most largely interested in the fishery question, and so far as he under-stood, our fishermen had not discovered that the arrangement referred to had been made in their interests. The fishermen of the United States did not agree with the Senator from Alabama.

Senator Daws, also of Massachusetts, said that a year's notice in advance had been given to everybody that the privileges alluded to would terminate at a given time, therefore the "suddenness" of the emergency had not rendered the arrangement necessary.

Senator Frye called attention to the fact that while the arrangement was claimed to have been made in the interest of the American fishermen, yet no American fisherman had asked or proposed such an arrangement. That had been left for Mr. West, the British minister, to do. For one hundred years Great British had been protecting the interests of American fishermen. The people of New England, Senator Frye continued, desired no further commission to settle the fisheries question. The United States had gained nothing by the work of the former commission, though Ganada had gained immensely by it. The people of the United States asked nothing of Great Britain. Mr. Frye characterized the "arrangement" referred to as the "most marvelous piece of business in the way of diplomacy" that our history could show. "Our fishermen," he said, "do not ask the British minister to interfere to protect them, but they do ask that the United States of America shall be self-assertive, and this is all they ask. Our fishermen ask that this great republic of fifty-six millions of people shall protect her fishermen in their rights. They demand that, instead of yielding to Great Britain, as has been done every time, we shall stand by our rights.'

The fishermen, he said, knew as well as he knew that Great Britain dare not undertake to defend the course of the Canadians in taking eighty United States vessels into colonial ports and trying and condemning them on the evidence of colonial witnesses who stood on the shore and looked out to sea, and "guessed" that vessels were within the three mile limit. Let the United States be what they are able to be and not be frightened to death by the ghost of dead treaties. Our executive officers were trembling at the ghost of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty which Great Britain had regarded dead for a quarter of a century." "Let us assert our rights," said Mr. Frye, "and there will be no war, but our people on the Canadian coast will have their rights. No war! Never was a people in the wide world under mortgage to keep the peace with us as Great Britain is to-day.'

Senator Morgan expressed astonishment at the vigor and zeal with which the question was argued. The action of the Government, he said, had not been laid before the Senate, except in an informal way. No just criticism of the President or Secretary of State could be based on the information before the Senate. He was entirely surprised to hear that the arrangement spoken of was an intrusion of power on the part of the executive department, and that American fishermen were not

to be benefited by it. Mr. Morgan thought the debate had been brought as a matter of private greed into the Senate and placed the United States in an undignified position before the world, but it did not follow that because commissions appointed under former administrations had made a bad treaty, a commission appointed under the present administration would make a bad one. He did not think it necessary for us, when we wanted to speak to Great Britain about anything, to man our ships and load our guns. There was much in war, he said, that was not to be approved as this country was prepared to testify. He was for the sway of reason, for the influence of justice and truth in preference to war or anything that looked like war. sense of self-respect on the part of the United States Government did not require it to buckle on its armor whenever it went out to meet Great Britain or any other government. After further debate the resolution went over, Mr. Conger giving notice that he would ask to be heard on it to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Hoar, the bill providing for the Presidential count was then placed before the Senate. The Senate then went into executive session, and adjourned a few min-

utes later.

In the House of Representatives on the same day, the 18th inst., Mr. Dingley introduced a bill to encourage the American marine employed in the fisheries. The bill extends the benefits of certain sections of the Revised Statutes and Shipping Act of 1884 to fishing and whaling vessels, and provides that all imported fish, not artificially preserved by salt or smoking, canning or pickling, and no fish which has been thus artificially preserved shall be deemed to be "fresh fish for immediate consumption," entitled to be admitted free of

While some allowance should be made for what is known as "speaking to Bunkum," there is, we fear, but little hope that those who have the power will be likely to disregard the so emphatically pronounced wishes of the people of the north eastern States for the sake of settling by friendly arbitration even so important a matter as the fishery dispute, though the entire remainder of the Union be made to suffer for it. Let us hope yet, however, that the good sense of the majority may rise above the prejudices of certain neighboring States, in which Michigan seems to be included, and avoid any strain of the friendly relationship prevailing between the two greatest nations of the world. There would appear to be a tentency in some people across the border to forget that it is the British Empire and not Canada alone that they have to deal with on the question of the fisheries.

#### POLICIES, AVERAGE AND SPECIFIC.

A subscriber in Bridgewater, N.S., writes enquiring " whether it is the usual practice " for insurance companies when insuring "\$5,000 on a stock valued at \$12,000 to "only pay five-twelfths of a loss by fire of "7,000?" adding that while there are some companies which insist upon that mode of settlement, the policies of others do not appear to stipulate for such, " though they may imply it" (we presume decide to adopt it) through "the obscure way the conditions are worded."

The reply to this is two-fold, because the question entirely hinges upon the conditions of the insurance contract, and a little consideration will, we think, prove to our correspondent that those conditions are not so "obscure" as at first sight they may apppear.

In the first place should the policy be taken out subject to the conditions of average or the co-insurance clause then it is manifest that an insurance for \$5,000 covering a value of \$12,000 is only liable to pay a loss of 5-12ths, whether partial or total, those conditions reading plainly thus, according to the old wording in the English policies: "It is hereby declared and agreed "that when the sum insured is declared to " be subject to the conditions of average, if " the property so covered shall at the break-"ing out of the fire be collectively of greater " value than the sum insured thereon then "this company shall pay and make good "such proportion of the loss or damage as "the sum insured shall bear to the whole " value of the said property at the time " when such fire shall first-happen," which, being interpreted by the shorter and less verbose co-insurance clause now generally adopted, runs: "It understood and agreed "that claim under this policy shall only be " for such proportion of the whole loss as "the amount of the whole insurance bears "to the whole value of the property insured." Again, should there be two policies in different companies one for \$3,000 and the other for \$2,000, the former having the co-insurance or average clause attached, then the latter policy would be at palpable disadvantage unless there was a condition to the effect that, in the event of other insurance on the property covered being subject to average, said policy would be subject to average in a like manner, always supposing that there were not two separate rates agreed upon, one for an average policy and the other for a specific, in which case there would be two distinct contracts independent of each other, the average policy's liability being for 3-12ths of any loss while the specific policy would have a full liability up to the extent of \$2,000, the respective liabilities on the loss of \$7,000 being as follows: Average policy, 3-12ths of 7,000 = \$1,750Specific policy, \$2,000 = \$2,000paying a total of \$3,750, instead of \$2916.66, had both or the whole insurance been subject to average.

In the second place should the insurance of \$5,000, whether in one or more policies, not be subject to average, then there is no question that for a loss of \$5,000 or up-

wards the insured could claim the whole amount of insurance.

These insurance contracts are simple enough though, we frankly confess that we have searched in vain for the equity of the system embodied in the ordinary specific policy which is made liable to its fullest extent for a partial loss, while, if that loss be total, the liability may be only one-half! To make our meaning still plainer, which is to recapitulate what we have reasoned in these columns years ago: Suppose there are in a store 1,000 packages of merchandise each worth \$10, being a total value of \$10,000 upon which an insurance of \$5,000 is effected, does not such insurance practically cover each and every package to the extent of \$5 as that is all that could be collected in the event of the total destruction of all the packages, the insured or owner losing the other \$5 on every package? Further if there were a parsial damage on each package of, say half the value thereof, the policy would rightly pay said damage of \$2.50 a package or \$5,000 in all; and yet such is the admirable inconsistency of these specific policies that, should only 500 packages be destroyed, the rest being wholly saved, the insured could claim \$10 instead of \$5 a package, and, the policy being exhausted, the remaining 500 packages are absolutely uninsured! Instead of being a specific policy or insurance we maintain on the contrary that it is an absolute "floater," without the protection of the average clause; and so long as such an anomaly exists, fire insurance cannot be on a sound or equitable basis, for the insured runs a risk upon a total loss which he does not on a partial, while the company has considerably more propor. tionate liability on the latter than on the former; so that it is almost impossible to arrive at a rate which is fair and just to both, inasmuch as some insurers will carry more insurance compared to the value than others, and therefore pay more-the risks being equal-while so long as partial losses are possible and more frequent than total, the company runs a greater liability for the smaller premiums; for without the co-insurance clause policies covering different risks of the same nature and value, one for \$5,000 and the other for \$2,500—are by no means in that ratio as regards their intrinsic liability, since in any loss up to \$2,500 that liability, is precisely the same, and it is only when the loss reaches \$5,000 that the liability of the larger policy becomes double that of the smaller, and this will always continue until the average clause is generally applied.

One word in conclusion: we are asked whether it "would not be worth more to "pay to the extent of the amount insured "than only to rate losses with the owner as "co-insurer?" Here, if we mistake not, our

correspondent confuses the term "amount insured" with the "amount of the policy," as the former with the average clause attached, in the example given, simply means 5-12ths of the loss, and can only be \$5,000 in case of total destruction; but if he wishes to express that a specific policy should cost more than one with the co-insurance clause we quite agree with him, having already demonstrated the fact in our issue of the 11th September last.

#### THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The Bank returns for the 31st December are at hand this week. In most respects they show little change for the month, which is somewhat disappointing, since the marketing of grain and produce should have put some money in motion and liquidated some of the country merchants' accounts. No movement of the kind is, however, reflected in the returns before us. The main changes for the month are: a decrease in the circulation of \$1,400,000 and an increase in public deposits of about the same extent. This is almost identical with the movement of the same month in 1884, but the discounts a year ago showed a decrease of \$2,-500,000, while this December an increase of half-a-million has been established. The Government deposits have increased \$1,650,-000, mainly caused, no doubt, by the accumulation of funds for the provincial sub sidies payable on 1st January.

The month was, on the whole, somewhat uneventful. The bad roads in the early weeks and again just before Christmas kept back a good deal of the crop that might otherwise have been marketed, and to a certain extent injured the country trade. The effect of this is more than a mere delay in working off goods, for a good deal that might be done before the New Year will be omitted altogether if, through any cause, it is kept back till after the holiday season. Complaints of stocks of winter goods being carried over in consequence of this are very general, especially in Western Ontario. The disappointment is the more considerable, inasmuch as the promising condition of the crops led some to lay in heavy stocks.

The financial record for the month is equally quiet. The rates for money remain unchanged; the only movement being in sterling exchange, which throughout the month gradually moved upwards until on the last day or so the highest limit where gold can be exported was reached. The movement of sterling, so far this season has been altogether abnormal. It usually touches the lowest point early in November, and reaches the maximum about the end of April. In our article on the Bank Statements of August and elsewhere we have expressed

the opinion that the Exchange market this fall would be buoyed up beyond the natural level, and the usual "lowest point" might not be reached at all, which has been more than borne out by the facts.

The December returns seem a fitting point at which to make some comparisons, and we, therefore, add to our usual full statements some figures, in briefer compass to show the progress made for the year. The paid-up capital is practically unchanged, the "Rest" has increased \$530,000, only, representing less than 1 per cent on the aggregate capital. The other figures are as follows:

To the assets for December, 1885, should be added \$1,700,000, shown in the Government statement in "other assets" in excess of the same item last year. This, doubtless, represents bonds and other similar securities which do not come within the description of the seventh and eighth items of assets in the Government statement, and, therefore, have to be relegated to this general column. In a properly framed statement such a column would be quite unnecessary or at any rate would assume the very trifling dimensions.

This abstract gives at a glance the comparative position at the beginning and close of 1885. The deposits are increased \$9,-400,000, and on the other side the cash and net foreign balances are \$5,500,000 more, and the investments in bonds and similar securities (chiefly of the Dominion) have increased by no less a sum than \$5,400,000. Current loans are up \$2,600,000, and overdue debts are decreased \$2,800,000,-nearly 50 per cent,-a most satisfactory movement. Of these changes we attach most importance to the increase in securities owned by the banks. The heavy investments in this shape mark almost an entirely new departure in Canada, and one which cannot fail to meet the approval of all who understand the great importance, to the country as well as to the banks, of maintaining a strong financial position. The five and a half millions shown as invested during the year in bonds, etc., would probably be increased to seven or eight millions if a proper statement were made, and the value of this as a reserve for a possible stringency is very great indeed.

The changes shown are very marked, especially in view of the volume of the business done by the banks, and we think must be taken to indicate a very sound financial condition in the country as a whole.

With a view to arriving at some comparative figures for the earnings of the banks and of the market prices of their stocks we have computed the following average from the returns of the banks in Ontario and Quebec, omitting the smaller institutions. It will be seen that the dividends and rest show but a small increase in 1885 over the preceding 12 months, while the average market value at the close of each year is much higher.

With regard to the dividends it may be remarked that the full effect of the reduction in the discount rate has not yet been fully felt, since no general movement was inaugurated until at least a third of the year 1885 had passed away. On the other hand, the reduction in the rate paid for deposits set in (as is usually the case) sometime before the discounting rates were touched. The banks were therefore in the early part of the year generally reaping the advantage of higher rates on loans and lower rates on deposits.

We shall, however, be much surprised to see any falling-off next year from this cause. We have an abiding faith that lower rates mean more business and less losses.

#### DAIRYMEN IN COUNCIL.

The fourth annual convention of the Dairymen's Association of the Province of Quebec, recently held at St. Hyacinthe, was attended by about 200 members. The president of the association, Hon. Boucher de la Bruere, in the course of his address, said, he was happy to announce that during the past summer the number of factories inspected had been much larger than usual, and when the manufacturers became convinced of the necessity for such inspection a great step forward would be made towards perfection in the manufacture of butter and cheese. Experience showed that in general it was the least experienced manufacturers who most object to inspection. The number of factories inspected last summer was 120. He was pleased to state that fifty-two persons came to St. Hyacinthe during the past season to profit by the free lessons given at a factory school, and among them were cheese manufacturers of several years' experience. It was to be regretted that a greater number of persons do not enter for the open competition for pure-blooded Canadian cattle, although large prizes were offered. The past season had not been so remunerative as usual, and the price of cheese had been below that of

He did not wish to say that the low price was due to our system of manufacture, and he could not pass in silence the statement of an importer who said that the system followed in the majority of our factories left much to be desired. We have to corroborate this opinion, the report of Mr. Archambault, who states that of 120 factories which he inspected over 37, or about one-third, were first-class. During the year ending June, 1885, the export of cheese from Canada was 69,755,433 lbs., representing a value of \$7,251,989, or an increase of 63,927,641 lbs., or \$6,577,503, on the export of 1870.

With butter it is altogether different. Our export in 1870 was 12,259,881 lbs., while in 1885 it had fallen to 8,075,537 lbs. This is due to the defective method of making butter. A competent man, Prof. Arnold, of the United States says that Canada loses each year \$5,000,060 by her bad mode of making butter. It is worth our while to consider whether with the depreciation in the price of cheese it would not be worth our while to direct our attention to the exportation of butter. There is room, I believe, for butter factories, provided that their products are of the best quality, for it must not be forgotten that the competition we have with the United States is enormous. From statistics which I have reason to believe correct, our neighbors raked in \$500,000,000 from milk, butter and choose. During the year 1894 a capital of \$700,000,000 has been employed

in the construction and maintenance of dairies, etc., which is \$41,774,701 more than the combined capital of the United States banks. Even our progress is not to be disdained, for since 1882 the value of farm buildings in Canada has increased by \$40,000,000. This ought to encourage the friends of agriculture in this country to persevere in their efforts, and be persuaded, gentlemen, that the members of the Dairymen's society of the province of Quebec will not spare either time or trouble to help on the great prosperity of Canada.

Some of the chief facts contained in the hon, gentleman's speech will not be altogether new to the readers of the JOURNAL or COMMERCE—a coincidence which possesses peculiar interest to producers and dealers in dairy produce. At its conclusion the secretary read his report. The receipts for the year included a subsidy of \$1,300 from the government for instruction, and this, with members' subscriptious of \$1 per head, gave a good working fund. A balance of \$800 remains to the credit of the association.

Hon. Mr. Beaubien and others spoke at length on the advantages of the ensilage system, and samples were exhibited. Dr. Couture, V.S., reported on the competition for the prizes offered by the society for the best cows of Canadian breed. The following was given as a description of the best type of Canadian cattle:

Small and about the size of a Jersey, but that the head is longer; horns turning inwards almost invariably; grey or yellow circle around muzzle (one of the best indications) dark in color, or red and barred, or dull red or yellowish brown and dark legs. Another good indication is the ears, which should be yellow inside. The head should be short and the forehead large. Red cows with white legs are never of Ganadian breed. The report then gave the quantity of butter given by each cow for a week. Abbe Gerin's 12 lbs. 4\frac{3}{3} oz.; Mr. Damase Paradis', 10 lbs. 4\frac{4}{3} oz.; Mr. Damase Paradis', 10 lbs. 4\frac{4}{3} oz.; Mr. Damase Paradis', 10 lbs. 3. Jacques, 13 lbs. 8 oz.; Mr. Milot's, 11 lbs. 1 oz. Abbe Gerin's cow, which is 15 years old, gave 271 lbs. of milk for the week, and was the only one of the number which did not have indigestion, a fact which showed that the others had been "prepared."

Mr. Lesage, deputy minister of agriculture, read the report of the judges awarding the first prize of \$100 to Abbe Gerin; the second, \$50, to Mr. Paradis, and the third, \$25, to Mr. Masse. Mr. Lesage urged on the meeting the absolute necessity for improving and macadamizing the roads as greatly in the interest of dairymen, more so indeed than in that of any other class.

Of the numerous other speeches we have only space for a synopsis of some of the most important. Mr. Painchaud, as inspector of the factories, reported that he had visited 45 factories, 13 butter and 32 cheese. Of the butter factories, nine were first-class and four second-class. He explained the

faults in each factory in a very detailed statement, and gave a very scientific exposition of the best means of making butter. He strongly advocated the erection of butter factories in preference to cheese, as already in several places they were altering their cheese factories into butter factories. Mr. Marsan, of L'Assomption, delivered an interesting address on the rotation of crops and how they ought to follow each other, the best crops to sow in the various kinds of soil, and the choice of seed for meadow and pasture land. He recommended the introduction of new forage plants, such as orchard grass, meadow fesque and other grasses, to be sown in rotation, so that the cattle would have pasture all the year round.

Mr. Barnard announced that a committee had been appointed to do all in their power to help the members of the association to get up a good exhibit for the Colonial exhibition. He hoped they would get up a good exhibit of the very finest butter and cheese, which would give the English merchants an opportunity to see what could be raised in this section. They could not overestimate the importance of gaining a footing for their produce on the English market, and the Dominion Government would defray the cost of transporting the exhibits.

On motion of Hon. Boucher de la Bruere, seconded by Mr. Barnard, it was resolved to vote a sum of \$100 to hold an English convention of the association at Huntingdon nxot month.

#### THE GASPE FAILURE.

The failure of Messrs. Chas. Robin & Co., following closely that of the Jersey Bank, forms an instructive commentary on the present aspect of the fishery question; and, in view of the almost historic career of the firm and the magnitude of the interests involved, it deserves more than a passing notice.

Probably few of our Western readers have any idea of the limitless credit, and almost autocratic power, wielded by the firm in question and its great rivals the Le Boutillier Bros., and it may at first seem curious that inhabitants of the little island of Jersey should have obtained such a controlling interest in our great fishery industries. Chas. Robin, the original founder of the firm, landed in Paspebiae in the year 1766; twelve years later his establishment was destroyed by two American privateers who burnt his fishing stations and captured his boats. Although the destroyers and their booty were subsequently recaptured by British war ships, the heavy salvage demanded, no less than one-eighth of the value, was too much for Robin's resources, and he was compelled to fail. In 1783 he once

more started business and favored by the extraordinary demand for fish products produced by the neglect of agriculture during the wars which desolated Europe during the early period of the nineteenth century and which increased the price of codfish to \$6 per quintal in 1815, he was enabled to establish the company on a sound financial basis, and since then up to the present time the company has grown steadily both in magnitude and resources. Their great fishing stations at Paspebiac, Grand River and Perce on the St. Lawrence and at Arichat, Cheticamp and Caraquette in the Lower Province, employed an army of fishermen and their families, while their large fishing fleet, farms, curing establishments, etc., gave the means of subsistence to many others; and it is perhaps no exaggeration when we state that they virtually owned both the fishermen and their families. Their rule, though kindly, was in some instances despotic, none of their many clerk's and officials being permitted to have their wives or families with them, while their daily food was rigorously confined to those articles which were considered most nutritions by the original founder of the firm, but they bear the reputation of having dealt generously with the fishermen in seasons of scarcity, and their name has always been a mighty one along the Gaspe peninsula, their credit in some instances being placed higher than that of the Dominion Government amongst the simple folk who depended on them for their livelihood, and on whom their suspension will fall as little less than a cala-

Since 1877 the firm has consisted of Messrs. Ranlin Robin, P. Gossett, and Wm. Lempriere, trading under the firm name of Chas. Robin & Co., and their capital has been estimated at from twelve to fifteen millions. It is said that each partner drew the sum of \$85,000 annually from the firm. Their interests have always been closely bound up with those of the Bank of Jersey, and it is curious to note that a recent cablegram informs us that a Mr. Gossett, treasurer of the bank, has been arrested on a charge of embezzlement, in view of the similarity of the name with that of the second partner of the great fishing firm.

It is not believed that any of our Canadian banks are interested, with the exception, probably, of the Merchants Bank of Halifax, who lately opened a branch at Paspebiac and who have, it is said, done a large business there; and as most of the supplies were purchased on the other side of the Atlantic, outside of the poor fishermen, whose livelihood depends entirely on the firm, and on whose account we are glad to hear that the failure may perhaps only be a temporary

one, it is not believed that Canadians will suffer to the extent of a dollar.

#### THE OUTLOOK ABROAD.

We noted last week that the market rate for money in London was 11 per cent below the bank rate, a most unusual difference. The discrepancy still continues, and although the bank reserves are still below the usual level, the reduction in the bank rate by I p.c., announced this week is not surprising. It may seem a matter of no great importance that the difference between the bank and the open market rates should exist, but so many arrangements amongst bankers, merchants and others are based on the bank rate, that there is considerable hardship involved in maintaining what must now be more or less a nominal quotation. Such of our banks, for instance, as are charged this rate by their London Agents must find the profits in sterling exchange entirely destroyed by its infliction. The difference between 60 days and demand bills is at present only equal to 3 per cent per annum. The Treasury bills issued early in this month, amounting to £2,195,000, were all allotted in three month bills at an average rate of 2.94 per cent, the highest rate paid being 3.12.

From the foreign correspondence of the Economist we learn that the situation of the Saving banks in France with regard to the Treasury (which we refer to in another column) is likely to come before the new Chamber at its first session. Several members of the Extreme Left will, it is stated, move for a reform in the employment of the deposits, "so that they may be made available for "trade and agriculture, instead of being all "drained into the state coffers."

We quote these words, because they are almost a literal paraphrase of our own words on the subject, and we may add to them the following, from the same high authority, which have a familiar ring: "The "proper functions of these institutions are "to receive the small economies of the work-"ing classes until they have reached an "amount at which they may be invested, "and not to provide investments."

The Board of Trade Returns for December give the following figures:

Total Imports.....£31,143,588 Total Exports...... 22,377,210

The imports show a falling off of 5.8 per cent and the exports of 2.7 per cent as compared with December, 1834. Nevertheless the statement is considered on the whole satisfactory. The decrease is less than might have been looked for in the light of the previous returns. Taking into account the general decrease in prices, the figures actually represent a greater quantity of

goods handled. For the whole year the figures are:

Total Imports......£373,834,314 a decrease of 4.1 per cent (over 15 millions) from 1884,

Total Exports......£270,934,935
a decrease of 8.4 per cent (over 25 millions) from the previous year. The figures, however, do not tell the whole story. Trade throughout the year has been dull and sluggish, competition keen, prices low, and the profits of manufacturers reduced almost to the vanishing point. The reduction in the volume of trade (measured by values) is comparatively unimportant, the conditions under which trade has been done are much the worst feature. Of the various branches of business, the great shipping interest has suffered most; next to this the iron industries have felt the depression most severely.

In New York financial matters have apparently settled down for a period of dulness and low rates. There is only a light demand for money, and call loans are back again at 11 per cent, with commercial paper, 60 and 90 days, at 3½ to 4 per cent. The high rates for sterling have induced exports of gold to a moderate degree, and this, if continued, will affect the money market to some extent. But the falling rates in England are not conducive to continued shipments, which, in the event of no profit on the other side being apparent, can only be kept up by the continued inactivity of the export trades. The holders of produce on this side maintain their ground stubbornly, and will not ship at present rates. Prices on the Stock Exchange have been depressed by the opening of a war of rates on the part of the Baltimore. and Ohio, which has unsettled the hopeful view taken by the dealers generally in the position of railroad stocks.

#### OCEAN FREIGHTS IN 1885.

At no previous period on record have ocean freights from Atlantic sea-ports been so unremunerative as during the past year. Though at the commencement of the season, says the N. Y. Bulletin, grain rates to Liverpool by steamer were about 41d, the average during the month of July was but a fraction over 2d, and in November they stood at about the same figure. Such depression is credited mainly to two causes: first, the super-abundance of tonnage, and, second, the falling off in the export trade. As to the first, it is well known that competition was keener this last year than ever. The regnlar liners had to compete with an excessive surplus of tramp tonnage, and whenever the freight market evinced any little spurt the "tramps" made the most of it. In fact, these ocean wanderers, like their namesake on land, seem to be always on hand,

With the regular lines, says the same authority, the position of affairs is somewhat different. Their obligations to the mail and passenger service and to the general public compel them to sail at schedule hours, cargo or no cargo. Though the cabin business of last year was up to the average, immigration fell off, and there was some cutting during the season, which reduced the profits considerably.

As regards petroleum, which is largely exported from New York, the rate per brlast year ranged from 3d to 6d less than in 1884. A better aggregate showing is expected for 1886, leading houses in the carrying trade cherishing a belief that some of the idle tonnage will be employed ere long.

#### SIR GEORGE STEPHEN, BART.

There is perhaps no man in Canada on whom the order of knighthood or a baronetey could be more appropriately or gracefully conferred than on the worthy president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and his many friends and admirers will therefore be the more gratified at this latest expression of appreciation on the part of Her Majesty, of the successful accomplishment of that great interoceanic enterprise of which he was among the chief promoters. Mr. Stephen may be said to have risen from the ranks, from the position of clerk, through that of merchant, banker and railway contractor, and in all his relations he never forgot that he was one of the people. His unfailing courtesy, unpretentions demennor,-his moderation and wisdom on all subjects requiring the exercise of calm judgment-his financial ability, and last, though not least, his indomitable enterprise and perseverance, eminently fitted him for a leading part in the accomplishment of the great work which, more than all previous achievements, contributes to the nationalizing of British North America and to the integrity of our relationship with the great Empire of which Canada to-day forms so important a portion.

#### CANADIAN APATITE.

The recent rise in the price of phosphates both on the American and English markets has given a considerable impetus to the mining industries on the Lievre and Blanche rivers, and it is expected that this year will show a larger output than any previous year in the history of phosphate mining. During the past few months a large number of new mines have been developed, and it is claimed by their owners that in every case apatite has been discovered in paying quantities. It is now expected that the total export next year will reach tifty or even sixty thousand tons as compared with twenty-five thousand tons last year.

#### THE CLOTHING TRADE.

It is admitted on all hands that last year was one of the most unprofitable periods that the wholesale clothing trade of this city has ever experienced. Some leading merchants estimate the falling-off in the volume of business done at from 20 to 25 per cent, while in many cases sales were effected only at the net cost of labor and material, and in some instances (fortunately rare) even at a loss. That the late epidemic which-owing to the firm and vigorous action of our citizens-is now completely a matter of the past, was responsible to a large extent for this loss of trade is freely acknowledged; and the prominent part taken in its suppression by leading clothing merchants proves their appreciation of the fact; but it must be remembered that the trade was also passing through a period of great depression and depreciation in values, and that, as always is the case when trade is dull, country merchants bought almost exclusively low grade goods, and these as cheaply as possible.

When a period of depression such as that of last year is in progress, and numbers of men are out of work or on short time, the effect on the merchant-tailors is very marked, and as a consequence many cutters, efficient or otherwise, endeavor to obtain situations in the country. The country merchant on his part has always a lurking idea that it would be more profitable for him to make his own clothing than to purchase it from the wholesale houses ready-made, and tempted by the low price of tweeds and the silvery voice of the tweed traveller as he points out the cheapness and excellence of his goods, is in many cases induced to purchase a stock of cloths and, engaging the services of a city cutter, to add a tailoring branch to his establishment.

In nine cases out of ten this is a mistake, for although the majority of men undoubtedly prefer a suit made to order, no matter how badly made and high in price,

to any ready-made article, even if the latter is cheaper and better made; yet the losses inseparable from embarking in a new branch of trade without a thorough practical knowledge of it usually counterbalance any advantage that may be gained. That this "order" business is growing throughout the country is an undisputed fact, and it is to combat this new source of competition that the efforts of the wholesale clothing men are now principally directed.

Another branch of the clothing trade which has lost ground considerably is the flannel shirt line. The comparative cessation of railway building throughout the country has largely decreased the demand for shirts, railway men being the largest consumers of flannel shirts, both plain and embroidered, and particularly the latter; and this lack of demand is particularly to be regretted as the shirt embroidery trade is one of the manufactures only recently established in this Dominion. Knitted shirts, too, especially when showily embroidered, have largely supplanted the lower grades of flannels, and appear to be growing in popularity, especially in the North-west.

The season of 1886 opens under more favorable auspices, and though sales as yet run towards cheap goods, and very low prices only are offered, yet it is beyond doubt that the volume of trade will be largely in excess of last year's, and that as soon as business is fairly started for the season we may expect better times in the several branches of this important industry.

THE NOVA SCOTIA COAL TRADE.—The following estimate of the coal trade of Nova Scotia for 1885 as compared with that of 1884 is given by the Stellarton Trades Journal, and is, we think, as near a correct estimate of the shipments as it is possible to give at present. By counties the figures are,

From these statistics it will be seen that the

total shipments show a decrease of 51,887 tons from last year's figures. This decrease, though showing an unfavorable state of this most important of all our mining industries, is not by any means so large as was anticipated by mine owners; and the fact that it is not larger when the depression in many manufacturing branches is taken into consideration may be taken as a guarantee that Nova Scotia coal has succeeded in securing a class of trade that cannot readily be diverted. It is hoped that in view of the anticipated revival in all

branches of commerce and the more healthy

tone in manufacturing centres that an increased demand may be speedily looked for, but at the present time but little is doing at a large majority of the Lower Province colliering

CANADIAN BLANKETS .-- A good attendance of manufacturers and agents greeted the first annual meeting of the Canadian Blanket Manufacturers' Association in Toronto. The general consensus of opinion seemed to be that, while, owing to the open season, sales had not equalled those of the two previous years, the trade was in a much more satisfactory state, both for manufacturers and wholesale men. Prices have been well maintained and a fair profit has been secured by all handling blankets. An important step was taken by the association in deciding that the old method of selling blankets at one standard price, regardless of quality, should be abolished, and that in future three grades of blankets shall be established, to be sold at varying prices. An advisory committee has been appointed to grade the qualities and fix prices for this year.

INSURANCE OF GROWING GRAIN.-About five years ago the custom of insuring growing grain on the Pacific slope was first entered into, and since then this branch of insurance has assumed considerable proportions. The practice is to insure about 50 or 60 per cent of the actual value of the crop, as nearly as it can be ascertained by experts so soon as the grain has reached a stage at which the value of the probable crop can be estimated. The policies are usually for a period of sixty or ninety days at a short rate of 5 per cent., and are made to cover the grain while growing, standing uncut, cut and sacked, and until shipped. The companies who are taking these risks state that the business has always been considered a profitable one, but, as may be readily imagined, it requires to be handled with great delicacy, since the policy being based on the value of the harvested crop the hazard is very great, in view of the fact tha blight or other unforeseen causes may operate to reduce the expected yield.

COOPERAGE SHIPMENTS .- The decline in the price of bags, owing to the great depression existing in the jute manufacturing centres of Great Britain, has had the effect of reducing cooperage shipments almost to zero. These shipments consisted of shooks, heads and hoops in bundles, and were carried, mostly on our fishing schooners, to Cuban or West Indian ports, such as Cardenas, Matanzas, Havana, and Sagua. But the reduction of the export duty on sugar shipped in bags by the Cuban authorities, which amounts to nearly a quarter of a cent per pound in favor of the latter mode of shipment, coupled with the low cost of British-made bags is rapidly driving he hogshead from the market. Not leng ago 1,000,000 shooks went annually to Cuba, not including what was taken by other West-Indian ports; in 1884 shipments fell to 500,000, last year not more than 200,000 were shipped, while the importations of gunning and other bags have nearly quadrupled within the last three years.

THE Toronto Board of Trade held its annual meeting a few days ago, when President II. W. Darling delivered a long address, reviewing the condition of trade and commerce. He spoke of the great importance commercially of the completion and opening for traffic of the Canadian Pacific railway. Of the trade of 1885 generally, he said the close of the year found it in a sounder condition than at the beginning. There were not wanting indications that a healthier and tolerably active business would be done in 1886, the cash returns from which were likely to be more promptly made than heretofore. The following were elected the council of the board Messrs. H. N. Baird, W. B. Hamilton, G. A. Chapman, R. Jaffray, Hon. James Patton, J. D. Laidlaw, A. M. Smith, H. Blain, D. R. Wilkie, R. W. Elliot, A. B. Lee, Wm. Christie, J. L. Spink, Geo. Gooderham and A. A. Allen. A committee was appointed to consider a scheme for dealing with improvident classes in the city.

THE HOCHELAGA BANK .- The annual meeting of this institution took place on Friday last. The statements, which we give in detail in another column, were regarded by the shareholders as satisfactory under all the circumstances; the net earnings are not quite up to those of last year, but 8 per cent is not a bad return in these days of diminished rates. The Board were able to add \$20,000. to the rest after paying a dividend of 6 per cent. The financial position of the bank is improved compared with December, 1884. The assets immediately available are now nearly 30 per cent of the liabilities payable on demand'; the growth of the Bank's business is indicated by an increase of 25 per cent in circulation, and of about the same percentage in deposits.

Canadian Eggs show an enormous growth in the quantities taken by our American cousins. In 1884 the entries at Suspension Bridge amounted to 1,325,105 dozen, while in 1885 the exports bud increased to 3,383,205 dozen. The figures for Black Rock, Fort Huron and Detroit, and the exports from Eastern Canada are not yet to hand, but when they are added it will be seen that this branch of the produce business is rapidly becoming an important one, although it is somewhat checked by the restrictive measures of the Canadian Customs in exacting duty on returned egg crates.

As some misunderstanding seems to exist, among horse dealers as to the customs regulations respecting the importation of horses, we may state that the owner of a horse on entering him at a Canadian custom house is only required to deposit one duty and not the value of the animal. Should the horse be sold at a sum in excess of the amount on which duty has been paid, the entry must be amended by application to the collector, in order to avoid the possibility of seizure. Horses with a pedigree may enter Canada for breeding purposes free of duty.

The Manitoba Live Stock Company is the name of an organization formed by Winnipeg and Rapid City parties for stock-raising purposes. A specialty is to be made of sheep raising. Lately seven car loads, containing nearly 1,000 heads of Southdowns, Shropshire and merines were unloaded and driven over to the company's ranch, about four miles west of Rapid City. The country along the valley of the Little Saskatchewan river is well adapted for sheep and cattle raising, there being abundant pasturage, hay, good water and shelter.

REFERENCE has already been made to a raft at present being built by Mr. B. B. Burnhill at Two Rivers, N.S., and which will be towed to New York along the Atlantic coast. It is 400 feet long, 30 feet wide at the ends, 50 in the middle, 28 feet deep, and will draw 20 feet of water. The cost of towing it is estimated at about \$6,000. Its building, including getting out the timber, will give employment to a hundred men for the winter.

George E. Pomenov, the founder of the great express system of this continent, died last week at Toledo at the age of 79. In 1841 he established the first express line between Albany and Buffalo, and the afterwards celebrated names of Adams, Wells and Fargo appear among his assistants. Mr. Pomeroy issued the first prepaid stamps in 1844, and was the original suggester of the plan for distribution of the mails on the cars.

MR. E. B. Eddy, of Hull, Que., the well-known lumber merchant and manufacturer of woodenware, matches, etc., left this week on a trip to Europe, to combine business and pleasure. As Mr. Eddy makes business his pleasure, this has but one meaning for his numerous friends. Before taking his departure he took the precaution of ordering a large advertisement in the Journal of Commerce.

Messas. J. R. MacKedie and John F. Mc\_Martin have been admitted as partners in the well-known wholesale house of J. W. Mackedie & Co., this city. Both gentlemen have been long connected with the firm, and Mr. McMartin needs no introduction to the trade especially throughout the west.

The herring have struck into St. Andrews Bay, N.B., and are being taken in large numbers by the fishermen, of whom sixty sail are lying in the harbor. Unfortunately, owing to the unprecedented mildness of the weather, the fish cannot be frozen, and therefore large sales are impossible.

A YARMOUTH, N.S., company has been ormed, and is now seeking incorporation to engage in the manufacture and sale in Canada of a new oil stove. The capital stock is \$10,000, all of which has been taken up.

THE receipts from harbor dues at Toronto last year amounted to \$7,597.21 an increase over the previous year of about \$500.

BROOM CORN .- Among other articles which have recently attracted the attention of buyers is broom corn, and a "sweeping advance" is predicted by sellers. Broom corn, which is the chief staple from which common brooms are manufactured in Canada and the United States is a species of sorghum or guinea corn with a jointed stem like a reed or a stalk of maize. It grows to the height of eight or ten feet, and is extensively raised in Iowa, Illinois and some other States of the Union. Chicago papers of late date state that last season's eron was much below the average, not enough being raised to supply the trade until the next crop is mark-eted. In consequence of this and the fact of Chicago dealers and a few large manufacturers having bought up almost the entire crop, prices have rapidly advanced and bid fair, it is alleged, ere long to reach the figures of 1869, when broom corn sold as high as 22c per lb—about four times the usual price. In Scheneetady, N.Y., the largest broom producing district in the world, prices of brooms have already advanced over fifty per cent and manufacturers are refusing to accept large orders at present prices; hence the trade is literally on a hand-to-mouth basis. From enquiries we have made, says a Toronto contemporary, Canadian manufacturers, as a rule, did not anticipate the advance, and are therefore short of stock, otherwise large profits might have been made in the business this year. Housekeepers will not relish paying from 40c to 50c for an ordinary broom, but, judging from present appearances, they will soon be compelled to do so or else "swear off" sweeping for the best part of a year.

LUMBERING ON THE GATINEAU.—A correspondent states that the recent thaw interfered considerably with work in the shanties on the Gatineau river; communication was so difficult that provisions ran short in some instances and the issue of rations was reduced. Previous to the break-up work had been progressing favorably and fully two-thirds of the season's cut was ready for hauling. At a rough calculation the firms operating on this river will drive 425,000 saw logs, that is over 300,000 standards of 21 inches diameter. The Messrs. Gilmour will probably put in 200,000 of these logs. This firm's recent purchase of the Ben-

son & Russell limits gives them a certainty of many years work on the Gatineau, though bushmen say they were running short of lumber before they closed these bargains. Nine hundred square miles of pine holdings on the Gatineau virgin woods, gave Gatineau people an interest in the transfer of the Bronson. limits and mills to a company in which Mr. Stewart of London, England, seems to be the principal figure, though Mr. Benson still retains a substantial hold upon the business. Six hundred thousand dollars is understood to be the amount invested by the new company. White ptarmigans are unusually plentiful in the northern parts of the Province this winter. Old Hudson Bay men say that this is an evidence of continued heavy rains in the far north which has frozen over the willow buds on which the birds feed. Everything seems to promise unusually high water for next spring.

Manufacturers making use of the Siemens gas generator have usually experienced considerable trouble, when using rich bituminous coal, through the coal tar choking up the pipes. By making up the charge with one quarter anthracite culm, this difficulty is entirely obviated, while, as coal yard screenings can be obtained for less than one-tenth the cost of bituminous coal, a considerable saving is effected. The anthracite is converted into earbon monoxide, and it is found that this gas works well with that from bituminous coal; anthracite culm has also been used with good effect in the roasting of sulphurous and arsenical ores.

#### WESTERN DAIRYMEN'S CONVENTION.

The ninth annual convention of the dairymen's association of Western Ontario was held last week in Woodstock, Ont. The first paper was one on "The profits of dairying as compared with mixed husbandry," by Mr. Frank Malsolm.

He held that the question was one which did not admit of a definite answer. While in some places mixed husbandry would undoubtedly pay best, in another dairying was far in advance. Agriculture is governed by natural laws, which cannot be broken without loss, and so if nature be against the carrying on of dairying exclusively it would be folly to engage in it. Dairying, however, if it can be carried on so, is much more profitable if car ried on independent of other branches of the art of agriculture. Years ago Oxford, for example, was almost entirely cultivated on the mixed principle. Here and there a specialist cropped up, and these were, without doubt, the people who made the most money in the country. A little later the factory system was brought forth, and never did anything excite the farming community as did this idea. Stock owners got fabulous prices for their stock, and fortunes were made in a marvelously short time. This is, however, not a fair test of the profits to be made from dairying.

An argument in favor of dairy specialists is the fact that in countries where mixed husban.

dry is practised the farms are valued at from \$2,000 to \$4,000 lower in value than where dairying is exclusively indulged in. Fall wheat fails one year, spring wheat the next, or the horses won't sell; but the cows are almost invariably found to yield a fair profit. Another fact is that in dairy countries the luxuries, of life are more to be found than in the mixed husbandry counties, and the only reason that can be given for this is the fact that exclusive dairying is more profitable. However, the farm that raises all that is to be used on it is to be preferred to the one which goes into exclusive dairying so exclusively as to have to buy necessaries which could more profitably be raised. The paper closed with a few hints on how to make exclusive dairying more profit-

"Local dairy improvement" was the subject of a paper by the Rev. W. F. Clarke. He explained his object as two fold: "To teach factorymen to make good cheese, and to make patrons provide good milk. While we can now challenge the world in the matter of cheesemaking, we are not so well up in dairy farming. In this matter we must have a good dairy farm, good cows, scrupulous cleanliness, and careful attention to details. When it is no longer necessary to make good cheese of thirdclass milk, the millenium of cheese-making will have arrived. Patrons have not been missioned to enough. They must be visited and talked to in a plain, common-sense way on the needed improvements. Do not go to the farmer, however, in the sense of a fault-finder, but go as a kind teacher, and the good effects of your missionary work will soon be apparent.

Mr. Thos. Shaw, editor of a live stock journal, spoke on "The possibilties of the dairy-In successful cheese dairying every one concerned can ordinarily (1) attend the annual conventions and read and profit by the reports; (2) he can permeate every detail of his practice with the most scrupulous honesty; (3) he can adopt the highest standard of practice in his work that has hitherto been discovered; (4) he can ultimately possess a high milk standard of a dairy herd. In enlarging on the first head, he said that no single reform in cheese dairy had been introduced far-reaching in its influence that has not had for its birthplace these conventions, and regretted exceedingly that the dairymen were so blind to their own interests as not to attend these conventions and read the reports.

An egregious mistake has been made in the running of factories in the employment of incompetent labor because cheap. Under the fourth division, he said that the standard of the dairy cow instead of being 5,000 pounds per season was only 2,692 pounds in 1884, less than in 1882. Dairymen should adhere to a definite line of breeding. It is a mistake to try to get a Guernsey-Jersey-Ayrshire-Holstein-Short-horn cow. He looked hopefully upon the dairy industry, but said the expansion of the trade hangs on a single thread; that thread is quality of product. It is composed of an infinitesimal number of filaments, of which each patron furnishes one. All these things are assuredly possible to every dairyman, and splendid possibilities they are.

There is no doubt a great diversity of opinion as to the best shipping cheese. We do not want for shipment a stiff, dry or curdy cheese; a soft, pasty, loose or open cheese; a bitter, sour or strong-flavored cheese; differnt sizes, and as many differ ent qualities made none factory; nor cheese made from dirty, tainted or skimmed milk. Makers would oblige a depressed market by not making any cheese of the above kinds. What is wanted is a mellow, silky, meaty cheese; a good solid body and fine grained or textured cheese; a rich, pure, nutty or creamy-flavored cheese; a shapely, clean, smooth-skinned cheese, weighing from 60 to 70 pounds each.

Prof. Arnold spoke of the importance of suitable factory buildings, and gave a description of the model factory at Cornwall University.

"The proper temperature of cheese rooms" was dealt with by Mr. Jas. Williams, who remarked, among other things, that Canadian cheeserooms are, as a rule, too much like the temperature outside, being so poorly will that every outside fluctuation in the heat or cold is felt in them.

Hon. Harris Lewis read a paper on "Buttermaking." He advised having two rooms in the dairy house, one for keeping the milk and cream in, and the other for making and pack-A good breed of cows should be got, and these should be well salted, watered and bedded, and kindly treated. They should be milked regularly. Milk left 24 hours in the udder is filthy and unfit for use. Shallow-pan setting is the best. Skimming should be done 24 hours after setting or sooner if there should be signs of acidity. The first cream put in the keeping crock should be slightly salted, and when more is added stir, use a churn which gets the butter by concussion, not fric-tion. The churn should be scalded and rinsed Wash the butter thoroughly before using. after making, salt with fine salt, and thoroughly incorporate it into the butter. Work all water thoroughly out of the butter. These points, if observed, will produce a butter which, if packed well, cannot fail to command a good price.

The importance of this dairy industry was emphasized in the next paper by Hon. W. H. Lynch, of Danville, Que. The subject was illustrated by elaborate diagrams. In the one which the speaker called the dairymen's pyramid it was shown that agricultural products, as a whole, are larger than those of any other class of exports, and dairy products are considerably larger than any other item in agriculture. Butter and cheese thus form the corner-stone in the foundation of the pyramid. One of Mr. Lynch's diagrams showed at a glance, as a sort of object lesson, the whole commerce in dairy products of seventeen countries for fifteen years. Canada is shown to occupy a very creditable position in the matter of cheese exports, but she evidently has some stiff competitors, and must keep up her reputation for good quality if she would hold her own. The old story of losing ground in butter becomes painfully apparent from a glance at this diagrum. While our exports are falling off, the exports of competing countries have been increasing. The total imports show that the limits of demand are far from having been reached; that it is not a question of prices, but that it is simply a queston of competition in quality. While there has been gratifying progress in the establishment of the co-operative system, even in butter, it was shown that the bulk of butter has been made, and will for some time continue to be made, in private dairies. Consequently, while we may indulge in large hopes in regard to the results of factory production, the improvement will not be as rapid as it ought to be, unless there be a change in the practices in private dairies.

A resolution was passed empowering the Board of Directors to do all in their power to

have a good dairy exhibit made at the coming Colonial Exhibition at London, Eng.

are moving better here and values are steady. There has been a fair enquiry for dye stuffs, which are steady. Dye Stuffs .- Sumac, \$90 to \$100 per ton for prime brands; extract of logwood, 74c; chip logwood, 14c to 2c; archil, 27c to 30c per lb for concentrated; Gambier, 5%c to 6%c; indigo, \$1.50 to \$1.75. Cochineal, 38c to 40c; cutch, 7½c to 8c.

Day Goods .- The volume of orders sent in by travellers has not been so large this week, though a fair spring trade has been done. This is principally owing to the fact that many country storekeepers have not yet taken stock, or are just doing so, and, as a consequence, are unwilling to purchase until they see how they stand. It is stated that stocks in the West are by no means large, and the seasonable weather will probably largely reduce the stock of winter fabrics. Remittances are not so good, and money is hard to get, probably because many storekeepers have used their available means to meet the notes maturing earlier in the month. The retail dealers, both central and suburban, are well satisfied; the taking of the ice bridge and the formation of the winter roads across the river has enabled country customers to make their accustomed purchases, and a very fair volume of trade has resulted. In the States there has been a quiet, steady demand for dry goods of all kinds throughout the week, with no features of especial significance. The heavy fall of snow and the excessive cold prevalent during the earlier part of the week effected much in the way of clasing out retailers stocks of seasonable goods, and the demand for reassortment temporarily improved in consequence. The season as a whole has opened satisfactorily. The sales-The season as a men who have been busy in the South and West are sending back fair orders to the jobbing houses whose business is just about abreast with that of last year at this time. The imports of dry goods, including cofton and woollen goods, silks, and hats, caps and bonnets, at Montreal during the year 1885, were valued at \$6,879,501, against \$6,556,583 in 1884—an increase of \$322,918. Cotton goods show an increase of \$174,698, and woolen goods of \$125,551. In the latter, hosiery shows an increase of \$29,674, clothing of \$12,-738, Brussels carpets of \$14,671, and goods not specified \$130,153, while cloths have decrease. 1\$60,603, and shawls \$21,608. Silk has decreased \$7,816, and hats, etc., have increased \$30,485.

FISH AND OHS .- About six cars of Labrador herrings have gone from here to Chicago; demand here light but expected to improve from this out. Fresh fish sold fairly at the prices given under this head last week. Oils unchanged.

FLOUR AND GRAIN .- The business done in flour has been light; prices are irregular. Recent sales cover two cars of Manitoba strong bakers at \$5, a car of patent at \$4.70 and 50 brls spring extra at \$3.85. In grain a moderate trade has been done in car lots to millers, and some local exporters have been operating more freely in New York and Chicago at present low prices. . A decided rally was caused in Chicago by shorts rushing into cover on rumors of a combination by Armour and others to force wheat up several points. The export movement is, however, light and





many Western producers, looking at the large exports of grain to Great Britain from foreign countries take a blue look at things, and are marketing their crop freely, causing large receipts at the principal lake ports. The estimated receipts of wheat at eight primary points during the first few days of this week were 15,000 bushels more than up to the same time last week. The breadstuffs situation in Europe continues to show unfavorable symptoms, the markets all round being quoted dull, quiet, etc. California wheat was cabled 6d lower, at 34s 6d for nearly due, while just shipped or promptly to be shipped was at 35s. Cargoes of wheat in all positions were quiet, with corn on passage quieter. There was a slow feeling in Mark Lane, and the country markets in England and France were quieter.

-Despite the fact that there have been violent storms during the week, the English wheat crops have a satisfactory appearance. The trade is cheerless, and values are weaker. The sales of English wheat during the week were 57,648 quarters at 29s 10d, against 82,-891 quarters at 34s 2d during the corresponding week last year.



Tea and Coffee.—In tea sales are reported of over 1,000 pkgs Japans at from 15c for low common to 25c for good. The firm views of holders acted adversely to increased trade. Coffee has been steady with more business doing. Latest mail advices on tea from Yokohama are as follows:—For several days after the departure of lost mail there was less enquiry

for tea, and a falling-off in the amount of business done, but demand soon recovered and has continued active for this period of the season. Settlements for the interval amount to 2,100 piculs, consisting chiefly of good medium and grades below, probably destined for the Pacific coast and Canada. Prices which, were somewhat easier early in the interval though not quotably lower, close firm at last quotations. Stock is reduced to 4,100 piculs a good portion of which are poor drawing, good medium and fine teas. Total settlements at both ports to date are 283,050 piculs against 248,675 piculs at same date last year. We quote :- Choicest, \$34.00 and upwards; choice \$29.00 to \$31.00; finest, \$26,00 to \$27,-00; fine \$23.00 to \$24.00; good medium, \$20.-00 to \$21.00; medium, \$18.00 to \$19.00; good common, \$16.00 to \$17.00; common, \$14.00 to \$15.00. Sugar.—The market rules quiet but about steady; one of the refineries had again to close because of another rise in the river. There is a weak market at Havana , and the New York marketfor raw is dull; holders, however, still insist that present low prices cannot be maintained. The aggregate value of sugar, syrup, melado and mola-ses imported at Montreal during the year 1885 were \$2,96!,565, against \$3,348,882 in 1884—a de-crease of \$387,217. Sugar equal to No. 9 increased \$8,688, while sugar below No. 9 fell off \$374,511, melado \$81,732, and molasses \$34,736. Molasses about steady. At the Ba badoes the new crop will open at about 17c per wine gallon, equal to 38c per imperial gallon here. Syrups in fair demand at steady prices, namely 20c to 45c per gallon or 1]c to 3]c per lb. Fruit.—Currants have been bought Lere for shipment to England, the Lor don market being bare. Five hundred barrels were placed at a price which realized to the seller something like 10 p. c. more than could have been secured here. The imports of dried and green fruit for 1885 were \$499,089 decrease \$69,699. Dried fruit decreased \$53,616 and green \$18,083, the decrease in the former being due to light crops. Spices.—Supplies are somewhat limited and prices are firm.

Hay, Straw and Feed.—The market was steady, there being a good demand at \$12 per hundred bundles for choice timothy, and \$10 for inferior. The enquiry-for pressed hay was fair at steady prices; No. 1 brought \$16, and No. 2 \$15 per ton. The offering of straw was large, for which there was a fair demand at \$4 to \$6 per hundred bundles, as to quality. Pressed straw was quiet and steady at \$10 per ton. The demand for moulie was slow at \$23 per ton. Bran was fairly enquired after at \$14 to \$15 per ton. Shorts were steady at \$16.50 to \$17.50 per ton.

HIDES AND TALLOW.—Prices of green hides have been maintained on the basis of \$9 for No. 1, but tanners are endeavoring to break the market, and a decline is looked for shortly. Refined tallow is dull at 5c to 6c, some dealers refusing to give more than 5c for lots. Western hides have been slow of sale.

Hors.—Light offerings have been the rule, as prices are low and afford no inducement to sell, while any pressure would not improve matters. Business, therefore, has been light and confined to actual requirements, while prices are irregular, with seven cents the highest quated. A lot of twenty bales of choice was reported sold at 5c, which may be considered about the market when any seller has to let go.





11 ARDWARE. -- Advices travellers state that the outlook in the West is good, and a number of hand-to-mouth orders for pig-iron have been booked here. General hardware and shelf goods are in seasonable demand. Stocks of nails are reported light, and the situation seems favorable. Some of the makers have started up their works which were closed about the holiday season for cleaning up and repairing purposes. The English and American markets are in practically the same position as previously stated. Latest advices from the other side state that galvanized iron, tin plates and sheet iron are all firm. Steel boiler plates have declined 5s, but this, it is said, has no significance; it may be observed that steel sheets continue firm. The total imports of all kinds of iron and hardware, steel and other metals at this port during the year, 1885 were valued at \$3,186,-448, against \$3,352,087 in 1884, a decrease of \$165,639. Pig-iron increased \$109,546, bars \$163,633. 149-from increased \$400,640, inc. \$43,535, chain cables \$8,086, hardware \$43,688, machinery, \$62,967, and lead \$10,523. Brass decreased \$7,351, copper \$24,341, stoves \$31,970, muskets, etc., \$6,387, cuttery \$89, iron and steel manufactures not specified \$286,925, and metals \$22,634. Warrants, are cabled 9d lower in the week at 39s 9d. tin plates and Canada plates transactions have ruled in small lots at steady prices. Ingot tin, copper and lead remain unchanged. London cables are :- Tin, spot at £93 5s; three months' futures at £93 10s. Market firm; G. O. B. Chili bars £40 2s 6d; best selected copper at £45; soft Spanish lead at £12 10s; soft English lead at £12 17s 6d; Silesian spelter at £14 17s 6d; Hallett's antimony at £36; tin plates at 14s 6d.

LEATHER.—Trade in the leather market can only be reported as fair, partly owing to the large purchases made by manufacturers in December, and partly to the fact that buyers are unwilling to pay any advance, and are endeavoring to curtail purchases as much as possible in the hope of keeping down prices. The sales reported are principally sole at from 22½ to 23 cents and are only for immediate requirements. The market is firm, and prices are fully sustained.

LIVE STOCK .-- The Allan steamer sailing from Boston for Glasgow takes 399 head of cattle from Montreal. Cable advices report some improvement in the British markets, while beef has also advanced. Our market has been fairly active for export stock for the season. Offerings were larger, and shippers bough tmore freely. The market was firmer in tone, but not quotably better, sales being made at41 c to 41c per lb., live weight. There was a good demand for butchers' cattle, of which the supply offered was fair and of general good quality, but values were lower, and some good lots were sold at 3c to 41c per lb. Sheep were steady, the offerings being light, for which there was little enquiry at 3 to 31c. The demand for lambs was fair to prices were firm at 4c. Hogs were fairly enquired for, but the offerings were light and values higher at 44c to 44c, an advance of 4c per lb., live weight.

Pernoleum.—A fair business is being done at former prices, Canadian oil in car lots selling at 175c and Aperican at 23c.


Woon.—In sympathy with the advance in prices at head-quarters and the firm tone of the London market, our local wool dealers report stocks finnly held here, and a better feeling prevailing in the market. The London sales began ye sterday and cable reports state that prices are slightly firmer. A fairly seasonable trade has been done, and wool men feel that, in view of the promising outlook for the manufacturers a good season may be expected. In the States the wool market continues very strong, particularly for all coarse and medium grades, as well as for combing and delaine. Fine wools have also shown considerable improvement in the demand. In fact, since January 1st, the whole market has become stronger in consequence of the stock of all kinds and classes of wool being much smaller than it was at this time last year.

BUTTER .- The business is limited to choice tub, which is rather scarce and firm at 15c to 16c. Other descriptions continue plentiful and prices are heavy. Best large rolls 13c to 14c, and round lots 11c. Small lots inferior, 10c. Eggs in moderate demand, with limited offerings; really fresh are quoted at 20c to 21c; pickled 17c to 18c. Cheese quiet; prices firm; the best jobs at 94c to 94c; good and medium

COAL AND WOOD .- The demand for coal continues fair, and prices remain unchanged. Stove and nut sell at \$6.25 a ton delivered, egg and grate at \$6, and the best soft at \$6. Wood is quoted at \$4.50 to \$5 a cord for the best hard, \$3.50 for second quality, and \$4.00 for best pine.

COAL OIL .- A moderate trade is reported and prices rule steady. Canadian refined sells at 181c a gallon for single barrels, and at 18c for five to ten barrel lots. Carbon safety 20c. American oils unchanged at 24c for prime and 27c for water white. Crude is firmer at 88c to 89c in Petrolea, and refined is quoted at 141c a gallon in car lots.

Barley in fair demand and firm, especially the higher grades; No. 1 is quoted at 93c, No. 2 at 82c, No. 3 extra at 72c and 73c, No. 3 choice at 67c, and No. 3 at







Rye dull and nominal at 60c; no stock in store. Oatmeal is steady at \$3.75 to \$3.85 for ordinary cars on track. Bran in moderate demand and steady; car lots are quoted a \$12.50 on track.

GROCERIES.—Business limited. Orders, coming are for small lots. Fair demand for teas, with quite a movement in low grades of Young Hysons and Japans. Sugars very firm. Fruits scarce and prices firm.

HARDWARE.—Trade fair for the season of the year. Prices are steady, but they are comparatively low, and profits are small. Bariron, \$1.70; pig iron, Summerlee \$19 to \$19.50; Carnbroc, \$18 to \$18.50. Glass, \$1.85. Nails steady. Ingot tin, 23cto 24c; bar 26c to 27c; Tin plates, I. C. Coke, \$4.10 to \$4.25; I. C. Charcoal, \$4.50 to \$4.75; D. C. do \$3.75 to \$4.

HIDES AND SKINS.—Hides continue fi m, although offerings are fair. Sheepskins.—There is a good demand, and prices are firmer. Country receipts are fair, and prices from 70c to 85c; the best bring \$1.00 to \$1.10.

Tallow dull and easy at 5½ to 6c for rendered and 3c for rough.

LIVE STOCK.—receipts larger than the demand calls for, and prices rule easy. Some left unsold. Fair demand for export lots; offerings of good quality are limited. A few sold at 4½ c to 5c a pound. First-class butchers' cattle are steady at 3¾ c to 4c; fair to medium sold at 3¼ c to 3½ c, and inferior at 3c. Milch cows brought from \$30 to \$45 a head. Lambs brought \$3.50 to \$4.25 for choice and \$3 for ordinary. Hogs are steady at 3½ c to 4¼ c, the latter for choice light weights. Calves range from \$5 to \$12 a head, according to size and quality.

Provisions.—Trade is very dull, and prices unchanged. Potatoes are firm, with sales of car lots at 55c on track, and small lots at 65c to 80c per bag.

Wool.—There is very littledoing, and prices remain unchanged. Fleece is quoted at 19c to 21c, the latter for selected lots. Supers are steady at 22c to 23c, but the demand for factories is limited. Extras, 261c to 27c.

### THE AMERICAN MARKETS.

Boston, Jan. 21.—Flour, no improvement, sales in small lots only. Spring patents quoted \$5.25 to \$5.65, and winter patents \$5.15 to \$5.40. Extras sold \$3.75 to \$4, choice extras \$4.10 to \$4.25; Superfine \$3.15 to \$3.50. Cornmeal unchanged at \$2.25 to \$2.30. Oatmeal \$4.50 to \$4.75 fine, \$5 to \$5.25 cut. Hay, market firm, sales of choice \$19 to \$20. Butter, better grades in good demand, other kinds steady; sales of extra creamery 27c to 28c, choice 23c to 25c, good to choice 17c to 22c. Cheese firm, fair demand; extra quoted 10c to 10½c, choice 9c to 9½c, common to good 5c to 8c. Eggs easier; Eastern quoted 26c to 27c, fancy 28c to 29. Canada Peas in moderate demand at 85c to \$1, as to quality.
