This fund, which is known ats the "Bank (irenlation Redemption Fund, was formed br a contribntion from every bank, \&radef according to circulation, and should it fall below a periticd amomat. owing to the payment from it of the notes of a failed lank, the other Banks of the Dominion, must again contribute to make up the detteiences. These Tide Tables，for Halifax and Que＇vec，with tidul differences for other places，are supplied by the Tidal Survey Brasch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries of the Domini on of Canada．They are based upon direct observations of the Tides obtained by means of self－registering gauges which are kept in con－ tinuous opelation day and night throughout the sear．The records are rednced by the latest methods of analysis，and the computation of the Tables is made by Mir．E．Roberts，F．R．A．S．，of the Nantiea！Almanac Office L：ndon．The Tidal Diffi rences when applied to the Tide Tables，give the time of high and low water at other places in Standard Time．The differences applical＇e to the Halifax Tables are derived from the Establishments given in the Acmiralty list．They will，therefore，be correct at full and change of the moon，approximate only at other times in the month．

Tidal difprrances for the Atlantic Coast of Nova Scotia．These differences when applied to the Halifax Tide Tables，give the time of Hirh and Low Water at the places named．it－andard Time，for the 60th Meridian；which is four hours slower than Greenwich Mean Time．

## THE SEASONS.

The Sun enters $\upharpoonright$ (Spring begins) March 20th, 10h. M.


## ECLIPSES, ETC.

In the year 1898 there will be six Eclipses-three of the Sun and three of the Moon.
I. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, January 7th, visıble generally in the eastern portions of North America, in South America, Enrope, Asia and Africa; occurring here as lollows :

II. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, Januarg 22nd. Not visible to America Visible to Easteru Europe, ihe greater part of Asia and Africa, and to the Northern part of the Indian Ocean-the line of totality running through the Chinese Empire, India and Eastera Africa.
III. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, July 3rd, not visible to North America, but visible grnerally in Furope, Asia and Africa.
IV. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 18th. Invisible to North America Visible to the South Pacific Ocean, and the extreme soathern purt of South America; the line of annulus passing through the South Pacific Ocean.
V. A Partial Eclip;e of the Sun, Decomber 13th. Invisible here.
VI. A Total Erlijse of the Moon, December 27th. Visible generally throughout North and South America, Europe, Asia and Africa. Oceurring here as follows:


## MORNING AND EVENLNG STARS, 1898.

The Planet Venus ( $O$ ) will be morning star till February 15th; then evening star until December 1st ; and the morning star the rest of the year.

The Planet Mars ( § ) is morting star all through this year.
The Planet Jupiter (2l) will be morning star till Mareh 25th: then evening star till October 13th ; after which he will he morning star to the end of the year.

The Planet Saturn (h) is morning star till May 30th, then evening star till December 6th ; and then morning star until end of the year.

## EXPLANATORY.

Annular Eclipse-An Eclipse of the Sun in which its whole disk is covered by the Moon, except a bright outer ring.

The Astronomical day is reckoned from Noon to Noon through the 24 hours. Thus July 21, 9h. is 9h. A. of July 21st, and July 21st, 15 h . is 3 h . M. of July 22.
The Sun's Declination and Equation of Time are given for Noon at Halifax, Apparent Time, i.e. when the True Sun is on the meridian.

The Moon's Southing is given in Astronomical Time for the Meridian Passage at Halifax ; and her declination when on that meridian.

Both the rising and sctting of the Moon are given for every day in the year.

To find the length of the day-subtract the time of sunrise from 12 hours, and to the difference add the time of sunset.

To find the length of the night-subtract the time of sunset from 12 hours, and to the difference add the time of sunrise next morning.

In this Almanac all the times except for Moon's Southing are Mean Time at Halifax, i. e., Civil Time. The Moon's Southing is given for Astronomical Time at Halifax.

Standard time is $\mathbf{1 5}$ minutes earlier than Halifax Mean Time, and the Railway Time one hour later than Halifax Standard Time.

upon the hay crop for the winter feed of cattle. Let it be remembered that a moderatcly cool wet season will give a good hay crop, while a hot dry one will ensure searcity of this most important article of fodder. To meet this a reasonable plot should be sown or plantel with mangolds, turnips, or Indian corn. The latter is alwars advisable for ensilage in our varied climate and soils. No farmer shonld depend on hay alone for winter feed. All modern farmers in Great Bricain, as well as many in Canada and the United States, use a mixed feed, or mazhley as it is called, in the erreen state in summer time, and dried into hay, or for ensilage, in the winter. The folowing is a good mixture of seeds for mashley :- 1 bushel broad horse beans, 1 bushel small peas, $\frac{1}{2}$ bushel vetches, 1 oats. Or, 1 bushel peas, 1 bushel tares or vetches, 1 bushel oats. Or, peas, oats and wheat make an excellent mixed fecd, to be cut quite green while the milk is in the kernel, for ensilage corn should be planted thin ; twelve quarts (12) of seed is allple for one acre.

Frbruary is the most trying month for cattle; we cannot too strongly impress the necessity of care in their feeding, watering and general treatment, at thls season of the year. In order to overcome the many difficulties that appear in February, it is a good rule to give extra time and attention to the stock. In feeding grain and meal alrays mix them into ent hay, moistened,-and geason with common salt. Cut hay does not digest any more rapidly than uncut, but it enables the meal or crushed grain fed with it to be more perfectly digested. Our farmers still suffer immense loss every year in striving to fatten cattie on meal, bran and middlings fell alone, without belng mixe: with cut hay as here deseribed. When ted alone the meal simply passes through the animald in an undigested form, and is thus lost. In districts where an Agricultural Society does not already exist this is a good time to organize ; farmers have leisure to attend a meeting and take steps for organization. our climate necessitates the use of het-beds for raising seeding plants for those crops that require a loug season to nature. A hot-bed is made by piling on successive layers of fine, fresh horse dung, obtained from a stable where oats are freely fed. The manure may be raised to a height of two or three feet above the surface of the soil. On top, spread four or five :nches of ery fine and rich soil mixed with sand ; this should have been prepared in the fall, and kept dry under cover all winter, - otherwise it is likely to become a hard frozen lump or mass. Glass sashes are then put on and kept ciuse till the hot-bed heats. The steam and heat will soon start the seeds and growth will bo rapid. In this way lettuce, radishes, etc., may be ready for the table quite early in the spring.

April.-This is the month. to begin seeding as soon as the soil is fit, and this can be done much earlier and more rapidly where the land has been ploughed in the fall. The farmer should be ready to avail himself of the early opportunities presented $b y$ the varying years. It is not wise to seed till the soil is comparatively dry, and little is gained by early sowing until the ground is warm. In fields seeded down with timothy las: fall, it will now be time to sow clover, - a mixture of red and alsyke is the best for hay. Where early potatoes are required, the seed should be kept in a warm place so as to start the eyts, and, wherever the ground is dry enough, they may be planted. This advice if not

Last sear (1897) the spring opened carly, but heavy and continuous rains through April, May and the greater part of June kept seeding back until very late from one end of the Provituce to the other, and as many farmers neglected the iniportant matter of fall ploughing seeding was late, and in some p.rts farmers were unable to get the usual amount of seed in the ground.

May.-In most parts of the Province ploughing will still have to be done; let it be done as soon as the land is fit; if manure has to be taken out for crops, don't wait for a more convenient season; if the weather is not all that is desired proceed nevertheless w.th your work, vary it to suit the state of the soil and atmosphere. Men cannot fight successfuly against the operations of nature, but they can very often turn them to advantage by consideration and forethought. What has to be sown and planted this month? It has been found advantageous of late years to p'ant as carly as possible; as soon therefore as the ground is in a fit condition, commit the potato to it; see, however, that the eycs of the seed have started into growth, other wise it will be apt to rot in the cold seed bed. Neglect of this point, which has been urged again and again in the Farmer's Calendar of this Almanac, has cansej the loss of countless thousands of dollars to our farmers. It should not be forgotten that we have not only to sow and cultivate, but to protect our erops, if we would gather a profitable harvest. Summer bedding plants are let out in the flower garden as early this month as the weather will allow; erbenas may be put out very eariy, and they thrive better in the moist, cool weather of cariy June than later, when the soil is apt to be baked by the sun.

Some even prefer to sow their Swedes carly this month instead of June, su as to avoid the well-known "fly" which attacks the young seeding plants, and the sof turnips for immediate feeding seed not necessarily be sown till the end of July, although if they get warm, cenial weather to start with they do much better earlier. Skprember.--Grain has to be harvested. Late in the month Indian corn will have to be cut and put into the siloes. The ensilage forms an excellent supplement to the hay and roots, but ensilage is still used to only a very limited extent. Later in the month, potatoes of the earlier kinds, and earlier planted, will be ready to be taken up, but while the weather remains warm they should be well aired bcfore being put into the cellar, and only in small quantities at a tine. The most experienced farmers usually wait for cold weather before taking up their fall crop. The farmer's year is a complete cycle, and before one year's annual harvest is taken in it is needful to be preparing for the next. In fact it is already time, in September, to sow Winter Rye, which is a favorite crop with farmers who have suitable, light, sandy soils. It is also a valuable crop for yielding green feed in the month of May, when it is much required. This is the month

The specill purpose of a Society is to improve the live stcek of the district, which is accomplished by obtaining and keeping for the use of its members superior male animals, such as bulls, rams and boars. Societies muy also, by permission, introduce seeds of new varieties of grain, roots, and also improved in.plements, and sell them to members at cost and charges. The whole of the Sucieties of the Province meet annually on the first Tucsday in November, each in its own district, when the members of each Society receive their Director's report, and eleet officers for the ensuing year. Full information as to the method of organizing societies, the grants given in aid, and other particulars, may be ubtained on application at the Office of Agriculture, Old Province Building, Halifax. In addition to these organizations there is the Nova Scotia Farmer's Association, which meets once a year with delegates from all the Societies of the Province. A register of thoroughbred cattle is kept at the Office of Agriculture, where blank forms of application for registry can be obtained. The printed Herd Register of Nova Scotia Cattle can be obtained from any bookseller for a dollar.

## Corrected to November, 1897.

Her Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:-

In this Act, or in any other Act relating to the Customs, unless the context otherwise requires, -
"(a) The initials ' N. E. S.' represent and have the meaning of the words " not elsewhere specified."
" (b) The initials, 'N. O. P.' represent and have the meaning of the words not otherwise provided for.'
" (c) The expression 'gallon' means an Imperial sallon.
"(d) The expression 'ton' means two thousand pounds avoirdurois.
" (e) The expression 'proof' or 'proof spirits,' when applied to wines or spirits of any kind, means spirits of a strength equal to that of pure ethyl alcohol compounded with distilled water in such proportions that the resultant mixture shall, at a temperature of sixty degrees Fahrenheit, have a specific gravity of 0.9195 as compared with that of distilled water of the same temperature.
" $(f)$ The expression 'gauge' when applied to metal sheets or plates or to wire, means the thickness as deternined by Stubbs' Standard Guage.
" (1) The expression ' in diameter' when applied to tubing, means the actual inside diameter measurements.
" ( $h$ ) The expression 'sheet' when applied to metals, means a plate or sheet not more than three-sixteenths of an inch in thickness.'
"(i) The expression "plate" when applied to metals, means a plate or sheet more than three sixteenths of an inch in thickness.

## Nova Scotia Game Laws:

The Nova Scotia Game Society has issued an abstract of the game laws of the Province. Sportsmen would do well to peruse them carefully. They are as follows:

## - moose, caribou.

Close season from January 15th to September 15th.
No person shall kill more than two moose and two caribou.
Meat must be taken out within ten days from killing.-Penalty for breach of foregoing provisions, $\$ 50$ to $\$ 200$.

No person shall have in possession any green hide or fresh meat from January 20th to September 15th.-Penalty $\$ 25$ to $\$ 50$.

No person shall set any snare or trap for moose or cari'ou. Penalty $\$ 50$ to $\$ 100$.

No person shall hunt moose or caribou with dogs.-Penalty \$50 to $\$ 100$.

All dogs so hunting may be destroyed by any person.
Close season for American elk or red deer till October 1st, 1904.Penalty $\$ 50$ to $\$ 100$.

Provision protecting cow moose, repcaled.
Any person bringing moose or caribou meat to Halifax, or any incorporated town, for sale, shall bring neck and forelegs and keep them exposed till all meat is sold. Penalty $\$ 50$. Any member or agent of Game Society, game commissioner, police officer or constable is authorized to examine or mark game, and resistance to him is a violation of the law.

BIRDS.
Partridge - Close season Dec 1st to Sept. 15th. Woodcock, snipe. teal, blue-winged duck, wood duck: close season March 1st to Sept. Ist, Save in Cape Breton, where close season for all birds except partridge is March 1st to Angust 20th. Partridge same as in N. S.

No person shall kill woodcock between sunset and sunrise. No person shall have any bird in possession in close season.

No snare, trap or net shall be used for partridge or any other game bird, at any time.

Any snare for hares or rabbits shall be of "rabbit wire," not slighter than number 21 .

Penalty for breach of provision as to birds $\$ 5$ to $\$ 10$ for each bird.
Pheasants, spruce partridge, \&c.-Unlawful to hunt, kill, or have in possession, phessants, spruce partridge, blackcock, capercailzie or sharp-tailed grouse.-Penalty, $\$ 5$ for each spruce partridge, $\$ 25$ for each of the other birds. Unlawful to have in possession, buy or sell eggs, or injure or destroy the nests of any native birds.-Penalty $\$ 5$ to $\$ 10$.

## rabbits, hares.

Close season from February Ist to October 1st.
No person shall have them in possession from February 5th to October lst.

No snares shall be set for rabbits or hares in close season.
Clear space of 100 feet must be left between each hedge and the nearest hedge. All snares or hedges unlawfully set may be destroyed. No hedge shall exceed 50 feet in length.-Penalty for each offence, $\$ 5$

No person shall hunt or kill at any time any Newfoundland hare or rabbit.-Penalty $\$ 10$.

## BEAVER.

No person shall hunt or kill any beaver until after the lat day of November, A. D. 1900.-Penalty for each offence, $\$ 100$.

## OTHER FUR-BEARING ANIMALS.

Mink.-Close season March 1st to November 1st. For all other fur-bearing animals, except bear, wolf, loupcervier, wildcat, skank,
muncianah, raccoon, fox, wondchuck, otter and weasol, from April lst to November Ist.-Penaity, \$5. Unlawful to hant any of the foregoink animals with dogs between 1st February and lat October. Penalty, 330 to $\$ 80$.

## LICESAEs.

No person not domiciled in Nova Scotia sfiall hunt without a license. Licenye fees for birds, hares and rabbits, $\$ 10$; all other game, $\mathbf{\$ 3 0}$. Licenses may be had at Provincial Secretary's office, Halifax, from all Clerks of Counties and from the Agents of the Game Society in various parts of the Province.

Licenne fee for officers, Army and Navy, on this station, \$5. Such officers if members of Game Society, are not required to take any license.

Penalty for hunting without license, $\$ 50$ to $\$ 100$, in addition to the license fee.

The hunter, guide or companion of any such person hunting without license, is liables to same fine as the person himself.

Note.-No person shall sell or expose tor sale, or buy any animal or bird included in the definition of game until after the lapse of three dhys from the end of anv close season.- Peualty, $\$ 25$.

Whenever a fine is imposed by the game laws, the person fined is linble to imprisonment if the fino is not paid; and judgment may be recovered in the county courts for amount of tine and costs, and may be recorleal so as to bind the lands of the defendant.

When he is imprisoned he shall remain in jail one day for each dollar of the fine.

All the penalties for having game unlawfully in possession, apply whether the gamo was killed in Nova Scotia or elsewhere.

CAPE BRETON.
Close scason for monse and ceribou in Cape Breton, till September 15th, 1899.-Penulty, \$200.

HXBORT, HRDS, ETC.
Unlawful to export from Canadn, deer, wild turkey, quail, partridge, pruirie fowl, woolcock.

FISH.
Salmon-Close season from Angust 15th to March 1st, except that salum mav be fished for with the fly alone from February 1st to August 15th. From low water nearest 6 o'clock $p$. $m$. of every Saturday, to low water neurest $6 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. of every Monday, no one shall fish for salmon in non-tidal waters. In non-tidal waters frequented by salmon, no one shall fish for any kind of fish botween 9 o'nlock p. m. of everv Saturday and 6 o'elock $\mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. of the following Monday. Drifting and dipping for sulmon is prohibited. The use of nets and other apparatus is confined to tidal waters. Close season in Cape Breton from August 31 st to February 1st.
'Tromt, \&e-Untawful to fish for or to have in possession any speekled trout (sulvelinns fomtinalis), lake trou: or land locked salmon, between Ist October inil ist April. Unlswfal to fish for trout by any other menns than a.ngling with hook and line, or to fish through the ice.-P'omuly for breach of foregoing provisions, $\$ 20$ for each offence.

Explosives -The use of explosives to kill any kind of fish is prohibited under a penalty of $\$ 20$.

Bass.-Close season, from 1st March to 1st Oetober, except that Bass may be fished for at all times by angling with hook and line. Bass should not be tished for with nny net having meshes of a less size than 6 inches, extension measure, nor by means of seines. Pemalty \$20.

Shad and Gaspereanx-Close scason for Shad and Gaspereanx shall he from sunset on Friday evening to sunrise Monday morning in eneh week. Penalty $\$ 20$.

Also, goods similar in character to those produced in such institutiens, when sold or offered for sale, by any person, firm or corporation having a contract for the manufacture of such articles in such institution, or by agent of such person, firm or corporation, or when such goods were originally purchased from or transferred by any such contractor.

Oleomargarine, Butterine, or similar substitute for butter.
Books, printed papers, drawings, paintings, prints, photographs on representations of any kind of a treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or imlecent character.

Coin, base or counterfeit.
Ropints of Canadian Copyright Works, and reprints of British Copyright Works, which have heea also Copyrighted in Canada.
'Tea adulteratel with spurion: leaf or with exhansted leaf or con. taining so great an admixture of chemical or other deleterions substances as to make it unfit for ase.

## EXPORTS PROHIPITED.

The expot of Deer, Widd Turleys and Quail, partridges, prairie fowl, and :deock, in the carcas or parts theteof, is hereby declared walawiland prohibited and any person exporting or attempting to export any such article shall, for each anch offence, incur a penal - of one huruired llollars, and the article so attempted to be expors shoil be forfeited, and ma, on reasonuhle cause of suspiciun of intertion to export the same, be seized by any officer of the Customs, and if ach intention be proved shall be dent with as for b.eacl. oi the Customs Laws, provided, that this seetion, shall not apply to the export, under such regulations as are made by the rioveruor in Council of uny carcasses or part thereof of any deer raised or bred by any person, company or association of persons upon their own lands.

## RECIPROCAL TARIFF.

On all the products of countries entitled to the benefits of this Reciprocal Tariff, under the provisions of Section 1f, the duties men tioned in Schedule " $A$ " shall be reduced as follows :-

On and after the twenty-third day of April, 1897, until thr thintieth day of June, 1898, inclusive, the reduction shatl he in ever case one pight of the duty mentioned in Schedule " $d$," and the duty to be levied, collected and spaid shall be seven-eights of the duty mentioned in Schedule "A."

On and after the first day of July, 1898, the reduction shall in pvery case be one-fourth of the inty mentioned in Scedule " A ," and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be three-fourths of the duty mentioned in Schedule "A."

Provided, however, that these reductions shall not apply to any of the following articles, but such articles shall in all eases be subject to the duties mentioned in schedule "A," viz.:--wines,malt liquors,spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing aleohol, singar, molasses and syrups of all kinds, the product of the sugar cane or beet root ; tobaceo. cigars and cigarettes.

All articks, excepting those enumerated in the last paragraph, being the produce or manufacture of Great Britain and Ireland, and of New south Wales. when imported direct therefrom, are entitled to the benefit of the Keciprocal Treaty. One eighth until 1st Ang., 1898, to Relgium, Germany. Frınce, Algeria, the French Colonies, Argentine, tustria, Hungary, Bolivia, Columbia. Denmark, Persia, Rissia, Sweden, Tunis, Venezuela, and Switzerland as well as Great Britain and Ireland.

## FRANCO CANADIAN TREATY.

The Franeo-Canadian Treaty went into force on the 1 th October, 1645.

It provides, that the advantages granted to France, Algeria, and the French Colonies, shall be extended to Great Britain, to the several British colonies and possessions, as also to the following foreign countries with respect to their commerce with Canada, provided that satisfactory proof of the origin of the article imported is given to Collectors at the time of entry, viz.:-

Argentine, Austria Hungary, Melgium, Lolivia, Chili, Columbia, Costa Rica, Germany (Zoilverein, Muscat, Norway, and sweden, Russia, Salvador, and Spain.

The following articles, of Canadian origin, and exported direct from Canala, accompanied by certificates of origin, shall receive the advan tage of the minimum tariff on entering France, Algeria, or the French colonies :-

Cannel meats; condenset milk, pure; fresh water fish, eels; fish preserved in their mitural form; lobsters and cray-fish preserved in their uatural form; apples and pears, fresh, dried or pressed; fruits preserved, others; building timber in rough or sawn, wood pavement, staves, wood pulp (cellulose) ; extract of chestnut, and other tanning extracts; common paper, machine made ; prepared skins, ot hers whole; boots and shoes; furniture, in common wood; furniture other than chairs of solid wood, common ; Hooring in pine of soft wood, and woorlen sea-going ships.
lt is understood that the advantage of any reduction of duty granted to any other power on any of the articles enmmerated above. shall be extended fully to Camada.

Vessels entering Cascumpec harbour keep the Savage Island range lights in one until the Northport range lights are nearly elosed when they should change their course for the Northport range, being careful not to overrun the line of rauge, as the channel at the point of intersection is narrow and the tide strong. The Northport range leads in to the wharf clear of all obstractions.

Bua Thonisn.-Two range lights. Back range light on beach at inuer end of N. breakwater pier. Lat N. $46^{\circ} 5 \overline{7}^{\prime} 35^{\prime \prime}$, lon W. $63^{\circ} 59^{\prime}$ $20^{\prime \prime}$. Building white square wood, with a black horizontal band 33 feet high. Postage Stamps, Postage Cards, etc., issued by the Canadian P. O. Department.

The stamps issued by the Canadian Post Office Department, are of the following denominations, viz.: postage stamps, $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c} ., 1 \mathrm{c} ., 2$ c., 3 c ., 5 c., 6 c., 8 c., 10 c., 15 c., 20 c. and 50 c.; lc., $2 \mathrm{c} ., 3 \mathrm{c}$. letter eards and 1 c . and 3 c . envelopes are also supplied.
Post Cards are issued at one cent each, and may be sent to any address in Canada or United States. Reply Post Carls ( 2 cts .) may be sent to any address in Canada or the United States. Post cards are also issued at two cents each for transmission to the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, St. Pierre et Miquelon, and certain forcign countries. Post Bands are for sale at the rate of $\$ 1.25$ per hundred.

## 1st Class Matter.

Includes Letters, Post Cards, Legal and Commercial Papers wholly or partly written, (with the exception of those specially exempted,) and all matter of the nature of a letter or written correspondence.

The letter rate for Canada, Newfoundland and the United States is 3 cẹnts per oz., and for other countries 5 cents per $\frac{t}{d}$ oz.
Letters addressed to any place in Canada upon which any postage has been prepaid by stainp, are to be forwarded to their destination charged with double the amount of the postage thercon not so pre-paid, which amount is to be collected on delivery.

Letters addressed to places in Canada or in the United States, wholly unpaid, and letters addressed to the United States on which at least one full rate ( 3 cents) has not been prepaid, are sent to the Dead Letter office.

## RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

Letters re-dirented to places in Canala, the United States and Postal Union Countries, without being taken out of the post office. or if handed back to post office as soon as possible after delivery therefrom, are not liable to any additional postage.

## REQUEST AND ADDRESS LETTERS.

Letters for places in Canada, Newfoundland and the United States sent in envelopes having printed thereon a request that the letters be returned to the sender, or bearing on the corner the printed address of the sender, will be returned direct to the senders instead of being sent to Dead Letter Office.

## post cards.

For Canaaja and the United States, one cent each. For Great Britain, Newfoundland and all Postal Union Countries, two cents each. Reply cards, for Canada and the United States, two cents each. A post card may be addressed by means of an adhesive tag, but nothing else must be attached to it, except, of course, an additional stamp when necessary, nor must the card be cut or defaced in any way.
Private Post Cards may be sent under the following conditions.The words "Private Post Card" must be distinctly printed or written on the address side near the top. The name and address of the sender may be printed on the face of the card, but the face of the card is not to be used for advertising purposes. Private Post Cards must not exceed a size of 6 inches in length by 35 inches in width and must not be less than $3 \frac{1}{4}$ inches by $2 \frac{1}{4}$ inches. Cards not complying with these regulations will be treated as insufficiently paid letters.

## 2nd Class Matter.

Newspapers and periodicals posted from the office of publication, and anthorized to pass free of postage to re, ular subscribers in Canada Newfoundland and the United States.

## 3rd Class Matter.

newsparers and periodicals.
Transient newspapers within the Dominion and the United States, 1 cent per four ounces or fraction thereof-but a single paper weighing not more than one ounce will be torwarded for $\frac{1}{2}$ cent. For the United Kingdom and all l'ostal Union countries, the rate is 1 cent per two ounces, or fraction of two ounces.

A newspaper or periodical must have no cover which can not easily be withdrawn. It must contain noenclosure. It must have no writing thereon but the name and address of the person to whom it is sent. books, clrculars, etc.
The postage on printed books, pamphlets, circulars, occasional publi. cations, etc., addrcssed to Canada, is 1 cent per 4 oz . To the United

States, Newfoundand, Great Pritain and all European countrics, 1 eent per $20 \%$. The postage on blank books, printers' proof shects, maps, prints, druw'ngs, engrnvings, lithographs, phctographs, sheet musle, printed forms, entirely blank, and printed stationary, etc., addressed to Canada and the United States, is 1 cent per 2 oz . No package must exceed in lengit 2 feet by 1 foot in wilth or depth. The limit of weight for Canada, United States and Great Britain is 5 lbs .
Seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots and scions or grafts can only be sent to the Uuited States as 5th class matter; when posted for delivery in Canada, the postage is 1 cent per $\ddagger \mathrm{oz}$., and the limit of weight 5 lbs .
Commercial papers and legal documents may be sent to Great Britain, all European countri's and United States, at 5 cents for the first 10 oz , and 1 cent for every additional 2 oz These papers, when posted for delivery in Canada, must be prepaid at Letter or Parcel Post rates-but deeds and insurance policies may be sent if prepaid 1 cent per 2 oz .

## PATTERNS AND SAMPLES.

Bona fide patterns and samples of merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, may be sent to any place in Canada at 1 cent per 4 ounces. Must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quanti:y may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissable as such. The limit of weight to United Kingdom is 5 lbs ., and the limit of size 2 ft in lengıh by 1 in breadth or depth. Postage, 2 centa for the first 4 ounzes, and 1 cent for every additional two ounces.

4th Class Matter.-closmd parcels.
Closed parcels may be sent to places in Canada. They must be plainly addressed and should have the sender's name on the lower left hand corner. No correspondence must be enclosed.
Parcels for Canada must be prepaid 6 cents for 4 ounces, and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight nor 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth. They may be registered for a fee of 5 cents.

5th Class Matter
comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage Postage 1 cent per oz., or fraction of an ounce. Limit of weight 5 lbs ., of size, two feet in length by one foot in width or depth. Matter claiming to be 5th class must be open to inspection, and there must be no correspondence enclosed. Packages of 5th class matter may be sent to the United States for the same prepayment as is required within the Dominion, hut the contents will be liable to customs inspection and collection of duty in the United States. Scaled tins coutaining fish, lobster, vegetables, meat, etc., if put up in a solid manner and labelled in such a way as to fully indicate the nature of their contents may be sent as 5 th class matter within the Dominion, hut no sealed matter can be forwarded to the United States under this head. Liquids, oils and fatty suhstances may be sent to places in Canada and the United Stares as 5 th chass, if put up in accordance with the ruling referring to such articles in the Canada Postal Guide.
foreign parcel mail.
A parcel post mail for the United Kingdom and certain other countries, is made up weekly at the Halifix $\mathbf{P}$. O. for transmission by Canadian Packet. A Pparcel for the United Kingdom must

not exceed 11 lbs . in weight, nor two feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth The postage is 16 cents for the first lb . and 12 cents for each additional lb. or fraction thereof. Parcels can be sent to all the countrien and colonies with which the United Kingdom maintains a parcel post. Information as to the principal places, and the rates applicable, c.ın be obtained at the delivery wicket.

A Customs declaration form giving an accurate statement of the contents and value of the parcel, etc, must be filled up hy the sender. This form must be nffixed to the parcel. The forms can be obtained at the delivery wicket of the Post Office.

REGISTRATION.
Every article intended for registration must be handed in at the Post Office, and a receipt obtained therefor. On ǹ account must it be dropped into a letter box. The registration fees on letters to places in Canada, Newfourdland, the United States, Great Britain and all European countries, is 5 cents.

All classes of matter may be registered to all deatinations in Canada and throughout the Postal Union; and letters may be registered to most of the countries nat included in the Union.
matter which cannot be forwarded througil the post.
Any explosive substance, liquid; etc., not properly put up, and other matter likely to entail risk or injury to the ordinary contents of the mail, will be sent to the D -ad Letter Office, Ottawa.

Glass in any form is also inadmissible, except eye-glasses, spectacles and microscopic slides, which properly put up and prepaid at parcel post rate or 5 th class matter rate.

No immorai publication, and no letter or post card bearing injurious words, devices, etc., can be forwarded through the mails.

Letters containing gold or silver money, jewels or precious articles, or anything liable to custotns duties, cannot be forwarded by post to any of the Postal Union Countries, except to the United States.

Besides, there are throughout the diocese several academies, and superior and common sehools, partly supported by government, and partly ly contributions of the people. There are also superior sehools at Stellarton, Little Glace Bay. North Sydney, and Harbour Boucher, conducted by the Sisters of Charity.

\section*{EXPLANATION OF SIGNALS.}

\section*{Made on Main Signal Staff ot Citadel Hill, when Vessels are seen from the Citadel or reported from Camperdown Signal Station.}

The approach of all vessels is reported from the Lookout Station at Camperdown to the Signal Station at the Citadel, a man heing on watch at either place day and night. These stations are connected by a Military Telephone line, and as the Citadel Station is connected to the Civil Exchange, information regarding any vessel can at any hour be obtained by subscribers on the Civil Exchange.

As soon as a vessel is perceived by the man on watch at Camperdown, he at once reports the fact to the Citadel, stating whether she is a steamer or a sailing vessel ; if the former, she is signalled at the Citadel by a cross, (siguifying unknown steamer) hoisted at the extremity of the upper yard, oil the east side, if she is reported to be approaching from that cuarter, on the west, if she is approaching from the other direction. This first report is usually made on first sighting the smoke of the steamior on the horizon ; as she gets nearer, the man on watch observes whether she is a first class (or cean going) steamer, or a second class (or coas*ing) steamer; if he reports her as first class, the cross is hauled down and replaced by a large ball, if second class by a small ball.

As soon as the indentity of the steamer is ascertained her name is reported, and if she is a mail vessel the proper mail flag is hoisted half way out on the lower yard, while the house Hag of her owaers is hoisted on the private staff near by.

Should the vessel, however, be report, 1 to be a man of war, or one of the Dominion Government Vessels, the cross will be lowered from the end of the upper yard, ant a ball or cross will be hoisted half wav out on the upper yard, a large ball denoting a Flag Ship: a small ball denoting a Cruiser ; and a cross denoting a Gumboat, or Torpedo Catcher, or Torpedo Boat, or else a Dominion Vessel, in which latter case the : Ominion Ensign will be ho: sted half way out on the lower yard. In all other cases the National Ensign of the Country to which the Warship belongs will be hoisted half way out on the !ower yard. A further report is made from Camperdown when any vessel crosses the line hetween Devil's Island and Crebucto Head, and on this report the ball or cross denoting the vessel, is lowered and a pennant is bent on under it, and the signal is rehoisted, signifying that the vessel has entered the Harbor.

It is thus obvious that when the pennant (in the case of a steamer it is white with a blue ball) is seen flying beneath a ball or cross, it means that :-The vessel signalled has entered the Harbor, but as long as the ball, or cross has no pennant below it, the vessel is still outside the line ahove mentioned.

There is one exception to this rule, namely, in the case of a fleet entering the Inarbor, when one penmant beneath the group of balls, or crosses reprisenting the fleet is sufficient to denote that the fleet has entered. For Merehant Steamers and Sailing Vessels each ball or cross will receive its distinctive pemnant as each vessel enters. The distinctive pennant of a Tıoopship is a white fary with two blue crosses.

Sailing Vessels are signalled in the following manners -
On being first sighted by the man on watch at Cminperdown he reports whether the vessel is square rigged, (and if so how inany masts she has) or sehooner rigged. If she is square rigged, and has three masts or more, she is signalled at the Citadel by a large ball on the end of the lower yard, If she is s!uare-riggel and has only two masts, a small ball is horsted; and if schooner or cutter rigged, a cross is hoisted.

Is she approaches the mouth of the Harbor, the man at Camperdown will ascertain her rig definitely and report whether she is a Ship, or Barque, or Brig, or Brígantine, and when she crosses the line between Devil's I land and Chebucto Head, he will report the fact to the men at the Citadel, who will hand down the ball, or cross, and bend beneath it the tescriptive pennant and rehoist.

The descriptive pennants for the various rigs, are as follows :-
Ship, blue; Barque, blue and white: Brig, red; Brigantine, red and white; Schooner, white ; Cutter or Sloop, whire with red ball.

As in the case of Merchant Stemmers, the honse flag, if kept at the Station, will be hoisted on the private staff, when the vessels identity is known. If the vessel is a private yacht, a blue swallow-tail burgee . will he hoisted on the private staff.

The following are the distinctive Mail flags emp'oyed :-
Weekly Mail from England.. Bluo flag with white centre.
"ortnightly from "، .. Blue to white flay quartered
for ". .Blue and red flag quartered with white ball in first quarter.
New foundland Mail ........ White flag with Blue contre.

Should the direct Mail from England, arrive during the night, a red triangular flag is hoisted half-way out on the lower !ard (east side) from \(7 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\). to \(9 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\).

When the mail from England is requoted to have arrived at Rimonski, a blue flag with white " \(\mathbf{R}\) " in centre is hoisted half-way out on lower yard (west side), for one hour. When the news is received during the night, this flag will be flown from 8 a m .109 a a. m .

It will be notieed that the upper yard is reserved for steamers, the outer halliards being tor merchant steamers, and the inner for menof war.

The outer halliards of the lower yard ara reserved for sailing vessels, and the iuner halliards for mail flage and national ensigns of men-of-war.

Steamers only are signalled at night in the following manner:-
A steamer approaching from the west will he sigualled by hoisting a green light on the end of the west lower yard arm, and a steaner approaching from the east will be signalled by a red light on the end of the eastern yard arm.

If two steamers are approaching from the east, a second red light will be hoisted close bencalh the first and so on, we cell light for each steamer from the east, and one green light for earh steamer from the west.

When a Steamer enters the Harbor (i. \({ }^{2}\), , passes the line hetween Chebucto Head to Devil's Island) a white light will he hoisted close beneath the colored light which denotes her approach, thas corresponding with the steamer pennant hoisted by aay beneath the bail when a steamer enters the Harbor.

When two Steamers from the east have entered, the white light will be hois!ed close beneath the two red lights, hut if one steamer has entered and the other is still outside, the white light will be hoisted
beneath the upper red light and above the lower one which denotes the approach of the second steamer. The same with two steamers from the west.

Night signals for Mail Steamers, mid Men-of-War will be made as hitherto, the vertical intervals between those lights being 12 feet.

Direstions to Mariners with Reference to Canadian Storm Warnings issued for Quebec and the Maritime Provinoes.
I.-Cene, hoisted with the apex downwards, incicates "moderate gale is expected," probably at first fiom an easterly direction.

II -Cone, with apex pointing upwards, indicates "moderate gale is expected," probably at first from a westerly direction.
III.-Drum, with Cone underneath, the apex pointing downwat ds, indicates fresh to heavy gile is expected, probably at first from a easterly direction.
IV.-Drum, with Cone above, the apex pointing upwards, indicates fresh to heavy gale is expected, probably at first from a westerly direction.

The Cone, when hoisied by itself, indicates that it is expected that the wind will obtain a veiocity of 30 miles an hour, but will not exceed 40 miles; and it is not intended that an ordinary well found vessel should stay in port, but simply as a warning to mariners that strong winds are expected from the quarter indicated.

The Drum will always be hoisted when the velocity of the wind if expected to exceer 40 miles an honi.

The night signal, corresponling to Nos. I and 3 , is two white lanterns hanging perpendicular.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos. 2 and 4 , is two white hanterns hanging horizontally.

Notes.-Mariners will be able to whain further information from thrm Agents or ly eonsulting the daily probabilities. Nariners shonld always bear in mind that the stom sigmals are merely cautionary, and do not necessarily mean that a storm will oecur at the place whre the signal is displayed, but that one is expected eith r there or within such a distance that vessels learing port would be liable to \(b\) caught in it.

[^0]:    An observation said to have been made in London and Florence, extending over a period of fift years, and observed in Halifax for the past thiry years, shows the weather will be the same as the last three days of the moon through the firsi three quarters taking a day for each quarter of the moon. It is necessary to make a calculation of the exact time of the beginning of each of the three days, making due allowance for differeree of time between the lunar and solar day.

    The weather will renain the same during the whole month as it is on the 5th, if it continues unchangeable on the 6th, and like the 4th day if the 6th resembles the 4th. Due observations inust he made as to when the day begins, allowing for the difference of time as in the above.-Com.

[^1]:    January -The modern farmer of the present day rarely dails in receiving a good return for his labour. This is the season to lay out his plans for spring crop. Petatocs and Iidian corn yield best ir, a hot season, and not too wet, while oate, barley, peas, turnips, mangles and grass make most growth in comparatively cool weather and moist atmosphere. The occasional loss of the hay crop from drought sh.ws that it io of the greatest inportinnce for a farmer not only to make a judicious choice of crops suitable to the climate, and to the solls and exposures of his fieide, but also to have sufficient variety in his crops, so that whether the s ason should prove a hot and dry one, or cold and moist, or of a medium or average charaeter, he may fairly expect a profitable return. Other kinds of torage should also be sown, so that reliance may not be placed entirely

[^2]:    ferred. Devons make tice best working oxen, are quick, active and easily fed, and soon fatten in the wiid pastures for beef. For domestic cows, and butter making, Guernseys or Jersess are the most suitable. The Jerseys have been great favorites, and the increase will promote the manufacture or butter, but it threatens to lessen our capacity for beef production. Fall plunghing will be the principal field work this nonth. After ploughing do net forget to go carefully over the water furrows to make way for the exit of the rain and melting snows that are sure to flood your fields before seed time. A well plough d, well drained field may be sown in spring as s.on as the frost is gone, while one that is irregularly ploughed or has no water furrows, may Iong remain a puddle, defying every attempt to improve its condition, until the season is so far advanced as to reduce very much the prospect of a crup. The best part of what is too often left to be "Spring work," can be done in the month of November. At the same time care should be taken not to open up gravelly banks or $h 1 l y$ land, subject to he seoured by the Fall or Spring rains, or melling sinows Every season lrings loud ee mplaints of the winter-killing of grass in the hay fields. It may possibly be of use to some farmers to say that the winter-killing is merely
