HAMILTON POLICE ROASTED

Fifteen Constables for a Wedding But Only One Available for Prospective Burglary.

Uttered a FORGED DOCUMENT

David McKenzie Found Guilty—Stove Mounters Meeting—Other Minor Paragraphs.

It is likely there will be an official investigation into the bungled matter by the heads of the Police Department in connection with the attempted robbery at the residence of Sidney Newburn, West Main-street, on Monday night. It appears that chief Smith was personally advised that the robbers would again visit the place, and was told of the hour of their going. Instead of taking active steps in the matter, he turned the matter over to Major Prentiss, who simply detailed one constable to stay in the house. P. C. Knox secreted himself in the place, and when the two burglars entered he was practically powerless, not being armed. The men, of course, escaped.

Members of the force are much disgusted at the disgrace brought on by it by the bungler. One said: "It seems strange that ten or fifteen policemen can be sent to a wedding, but in the case of a burglary only one can be spared."

David McKenzie, Emerald-street, was found guilty at the Police Court this morning of uttering a forged document. He was remanded for a week.

The case of Charles Carson and Alfred Donohue, charged with stealing from Mrs. "Spade" Guitan, Sandberg, was enlarged till to-morrow, as the complainant did not appear.

John Tilley, weed inspector, has had John Lyons, 450 East Barton-street, summoned on a charge of violating the noxious weed act. This is the first case brought in this city under the act.

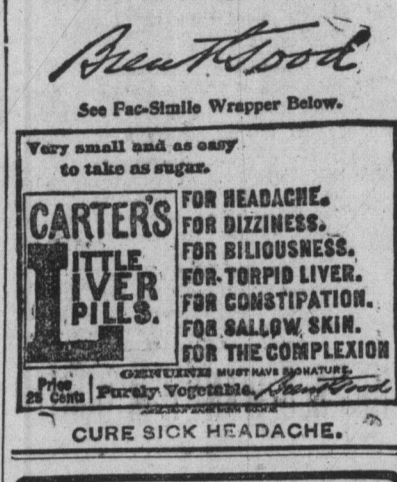

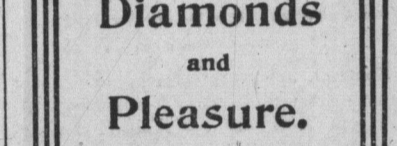

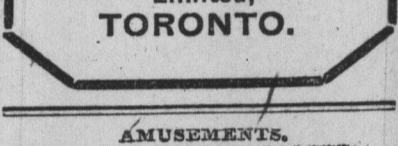

CORNWALL WEAVERS STRIKE.

Forty Men Want Minimum Wage Placed at \$1.25 a Day. Cornwall, Ont., July 12.—The weavers in the Cornwall Manufacturing Company's mill here are on strike, and the weaving department has been closed down. The strikers want their scale of wages arranged so that all weavers will be guaranteed a minimum of \$1.25 per day. The company contends that some of the weavers are not worth this sum, on any kind of work, and that many of them make an average of \$1.50. There are 170 hands employed in this mill, but all are working except the 40 weavers. If these do not go back to work the company say they will close down the mill. It is understood that the Canadian Colored Cotton Goods Company's two mills, which have been on half time for a couple of months, will resume full time in August. This will be welcome news to the 1000 employees of the two big cotton mills.

ATTACKED MANUAL TRAINING FAD.

Principal Grant Discusses Modern Teaching Methods. Detroit, July 12.—Rev. Principal Grant of Queen's University, in an address here last night on "Some of Our Mistakes," attacked the manual training fad in the Public Schools. He said technical schools of the best kind we do need, but their work should be based on sound general education given in the Common and High Schools, and for those who are to be leaders in modern industries and professions, in the college and university. Dr. Grant described a good teacher as one who will not allow his pupils to choose from the curriculum what they find most pleasing to their taste, but requires an accurate learning of what has been decided by educators as the best course for mental discipline and character-building.

MORE MISSIONARIES.

Methodist Will Send to China Eight New Men From Canada. The Executive Committee of the Methodist Mission Board concluded business yesterday morning. The session was mainly occupied in consideration of applications for mission grants and confirmation of expenditures already made. There is an urgent demand for more missionaries to aid in the work in China, where 10,000,000 Chinese have been allotted to the Methodist missionaries for conversion. This matter will be dealt with at the next meeting of the General Board, when eight new missionaries will be appointed. If the financial response is sufficiently large.

WILL PAY TRANSPORTATION.

Pan-American Authorities Will Allow Stop-Over at Toronto. Buffalo, July 12.—Canadian, who intend to exhibit live stock at the Pan-American Exposition during the week following the Toronto fair, may first display their stock at the Canadian fair if they desire to do so. If Toronto is on the direct line from the shipping point to Buffalo the Pan-American Exposition Company will pay the transportation fees just the same as if no stop were made.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT.

A large number of the passengers who traveled on the boats yesterday were Orangemen. The Macassa brought down from Hamilton 500 of the members of the orange and blue, who participated in the demonstration at Toronto Junction. Another party of Orangemen came over on the Garden City from St. Catharines. There were many outsiders who came into the city to see the demonstration. Four hundred employees of the Gowans, Kent Co. picked at Queen Victoria Park, Niagara Falls. They went as far as Port Dalhousie on the Garden City. The Bichellon carried a large number to Oakville, where a grand review was given by the boys of the Mimico Industrial School, who are in camp there.

The Toronto went out with every available space occupied. She had on board a large number of American tourists. Another big consignment of fruit arrived on the A. J. Tymon from Jordan Beach.

The Argyle is proving popular with the residents of towns on the north shore. She brought up yesterday 600 from Whitby, Oshawa and Bowmanville.

The Modjeska leaves Yonge-street wharf, east side, 2 p.m., returning at 10:15 p.m. A dainty supper can be had on board the steamer for 50c.

Independent Forestry. The annual outing of the head staff of the Independent Order of Foresters takes place to-day. Special cars will be attached to the G.T.R. going east at 8 a.m., arriving at Foresters' Island Park, Deseronto, about noon; returning will leave the Park on Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The Ven. Archdeacon Davis of London has been invited to preach the annual Forestry sermon at the Park to-morrow. A meeting of the Executive Council of the Independent Order of Foresters will be held at Weston on Monday evening.

Nova Perseid No. 2. The Toronto Astronomical Society is in receipt of a copy of a circular issued by Prof. Pickering of Harvard College Observatory, stating that an examination of the Draper photographs of the spectra of the new star, which appeared in the constellation Perseus, in February last, discloses the fact that the star is gradually changing into a gaseous nebula. In a photograph taken on June 19 the resemblance to the nebula, N.W.C. 2018, was very close. This change, in its general features, is in accordance with the theory of all new stars to which the spectroscopic method of examination has been applied.
