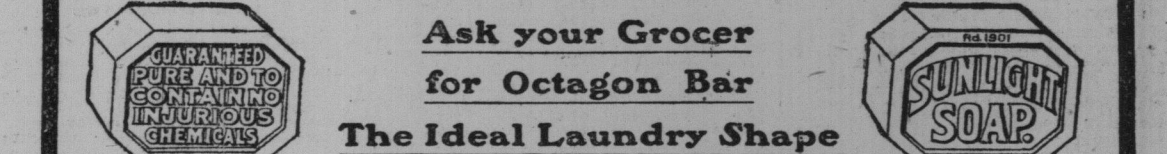

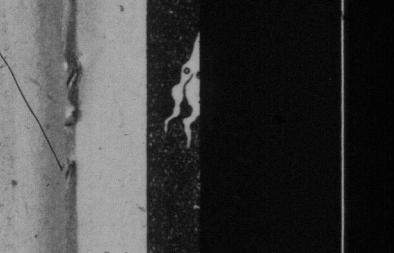

SIR WILFRID'S INEVITABLE HASTE.
The Globe is trying awfully hard to search for a justification of the Premier's Chamberlain letter to the Ontario. Its recent articles on the subject are extremely apologetic. Resulting between the lines, it is evident that The Globe doesn't itself like the tenor of the Premier's reply, but, as the organ of the party, it must justify the Premier as far as this is possible. The Globe has exactly a similar case on its hands to-day that if had when it was proposed to send the first Canadian contingent to South Africa. It started out to defend Sir Wilfrid after he had declared his policy of "no contingent," but it was soon forced, in deference to public opinion, to completely modify its views. And it will be forced to do the same thing on the present occasion. The Globe's apology of yesterday is an inconsistent as it is servile. It admits that Canada must provide its own defence by hand, but the question of a navy is a more difficult one. It ends up by saying that the whole thing is a question open to discussion, but that it is not a question to be settled during a jubilee or coronation "ought to be settled," says The Globe, "not in a spirit of martial or any other kind of enthusiasm, but in a spirit of duty and fair play. In the meantime, this country is doing very well, and it would be quite misleading and unjust to describe it as a burden upon the empire."

That is just our opinion of the matter. It is a question that should not be settled "in a hurry" or during "a coronation" excitement. Mr. Chamberlain's proposal does not involve a settlement in a hurry or under excitement. He distinctly states in his invitation that he wishes the Premier would remain in London for three weeks after the coronation. This affords ample time to discuss the question, and as to excitement attending the coronation we think the Premier of Canada and the other gentlemen who will form the conference are amply quite capable of restraining themselves and of discussing the question free from the excitement of the coronation ceremony. The Globe's apology for Sir Wilfrid fails completely. It admits the subject of Imperial defence is open to discussion. Sir Wilfrid Laurier officially informs the British government that it is not open to discussion at all because he has already settled it. Sir Wilfrid's proposal, as it is before it reaches the court at all. He does not plead that the occasion of the coronation is an inopportune time, but comes out with the bald statement that, "in the varying conditions of the coronation, there is no scheme of defence applicable to all."

In order to make his meaning still more clear, he states that "there is only one question which gives promise of useful discussion, and that is of commercial relations between the various countries of the empire." It is this pre-judging of the case that is especially objectionable in Sir Wilfrid Laurier's letter. His remarks were quite uncalled for. It is just such a reply as this that we would expect the United States to make towards Canada. We were given to understand by the United States that there was "nothing to discuss." When dealing with the Mother Country, the Premier of Canada should at least have had the common decency to have stated the reasons for his arguments, and against any scheme that may have been brought forward, before he announced his ultimatum. He is clearly guilty of a breach of diplomacy, not to mention the greater crime of playing false with the public sentiment of the country.

When The Globe pleads the no-hurry argument, it clearly convicts Sir Wilfrid because he has presumed to settle the question offhand, and in the biggest kind of a hurry. The Globe had better not try to walk through life on his hands, but he creates for himself a kingdom of topsy-turvy. He turns right into day. He eats regardless of time and physical necessities. ISOLATION OF QUEBEC.
Montreal Star, March 12: There never has been in the whole history of Quebec so much legislation of a mischievous character squeezed into a single session.

The whole tendency of the bills introduced in the Legislature is to isolate the Province of Quebec from the rest of the Dominion.

One honorable member wants to have the British North America Act amended so as to isolate Quebec from the rest of the Dominion by giving the Provincial government the exclusive control over railways within the Province; and the right to impose export duties on articles manufactured in the province and sent to other provinces. This gentleman also proposes to raise an inter-provincial issue by demanding an increased rate for the province from the federal treasury.

Perhaps the most dangerous bill of all is the one that is designed to deprive the people of this Province of the right to appeal to the Privy Council in all cases except those arising out of the interpretation of federal laws.

As if for the express purpose of accentuating the separatist tendencies of such bills as these, or else for the express purpose of raising a unnecessary and mischievous issue, notice has been given of a resolution protesting against "the dangerous tendencies of the new imperialism."

FACTS RE STEEL.
Montreal, Que., March 14.—The push for steel rails, in fact for steel of every kind, both for railway and construction work, is unprecedented all over the continent, and intending purchasers are hurrying to place their orders wherever they can best be suited.

Mr. A. Peterson, C.E., consulting engineer of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has gone to the States after an order of 20,000 tons of steel rails, which the company has placed there. Ten thousand tons of this steel to the great Krupp concern at Essen-on-the-Rhine, and ten thousand to the Ontario Steel Mills at Hamilton, while it is not considered a very large order for the Canadian Pacific, means an outlay of probably half a million dollars. The German market is in a very bad way, and the English mills, in fact, are in a very bad way.

It is understood that as soon as the Ontario steel rail mills are completed a good portion of the rails required by the C.P.R. will be manufactured in that place.

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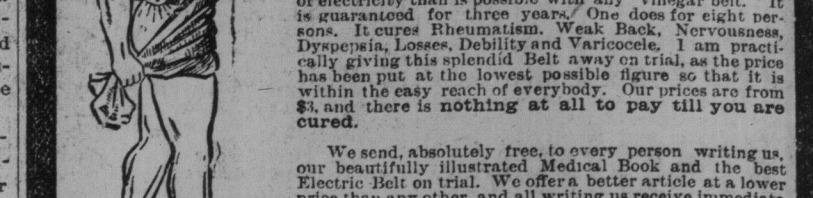

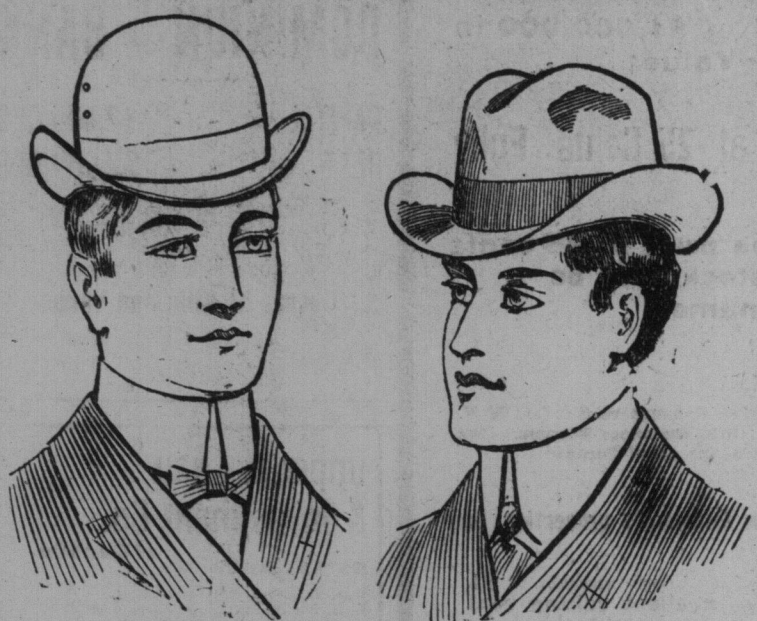
