Tate Blackstock, K.C., in opening his case, said that the evidence in this case was so strong, unrefuted and unmitigated, that it was possible to conceive facts that set in bold relief the depravity that marked the character of the accused. He declared that the jury had no interest in the fact that the accused had been able to congratulate themselves upon the fact that the trial had been conducted with brevity, candor and decency, and with an earnest and solicitous desire simply to get the truth.

MANSLAUGHTER IS VERDICT

History of Crime. The crown prosecutor traced the history of Mrs. Turner's negotiation with Mrs. Authers, leading to the adoption of the infant. He asked why an infant with 1400 should have been desired. He placed together the links of evidence from Tuesday night, September 14, the noise in the house, the prisoner's agitation, her consultation of the trip to Niagara Falls in the morning, her story of passing a bad night, and the subsequent trip to Niagara Falls on Thursday morning, when she carried a parcel like that later found under the New York Central tracks by Mr. Fleming, containing the body of the Authers' infant. This is a year of corporation raiding, and strenuous efforts are being made to trap and sew up the people wherever possible.

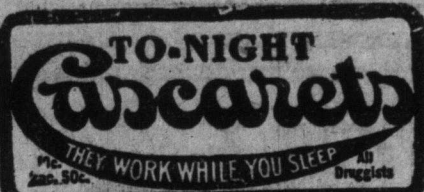

INTERCEDES FOR HUSBAND

Wife of Dr. Pollard Gains Access to Judge Winchester.

Judge Winchester made a flying exit from his private room off the sessions court room yesterday afternoon, when Mrs. Pollard, wife of Dr. Stephen Pollard, convicted in the sessions Tuesday night, of performing a criminal operation, slipped past the attendants and sought to make an intervention with the judge, who will sentence her husband at the close of the sittings within a few days.

With dark rings under her eyes and evidently Mrs. Pollard, who collapsed after a hysterical outburst when the jury brought in its verdict, entered the judge's room and began to plead for her husband.

The judge gently informed her that it was highly improper for him to hear her otherwise than in open court, but this was of no avail. The weeping woman sought to be allowed to speak for her husband, and the judge seeing no other course, took refuge in flight thru a private stairway to his chambers below, where he remained in hiding until his fearful petitioner had departed.

GOVTS. SHOULD HELP SOLVE THE G.T.P. LABOR PROBLEM.

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 21.—At the semi-annual meeting of the board of directors of the Grand Trunk to-day, the retiring president, Sir Chas. Rivers Wilson, suggested that the Dominion and British Columbia governments should endeavor to help solve the problem of securing labor for G.T.P. construction.

He objected to a Canadian advisory board, the financial management must be in London.

Objection was at first taken to allowing the retiring president a yearly pension of \$7,500, but it was approved.

BRINGLE MUST SERVE 7 YEARS.

PORT HURON, Mich., Oct. 21.—Capt. Ralph Bringle was sentenced this morning to serve from 1 to 15 years in Jackson Prison, for shooting George Ellreth, ex-Klannan of Moorestown, Ont., in a saloon at St. Clair, on April 12 last.

Shortage Will Be \$160,000. A meeting of the creditors of H. F. Wyatt & Co., the brokerage firm which assigned recently, has been called to meet at the office of E. R. C. Clarkson and Sons on Wednesday, Oct. 27th, at 3 p.m.

Mr. Clarkson said yesterday that the statement had not been completed yet, and that beyond there was a shortage, he could give any definite information. It is, however, believed that the loss will be about \$160,000, nearly \$100,000 more than the original estimate.

According to a report on the assets of the firm will be around \$25,000, and the liabilities about \$185,000.

BOUGHT SEAT IN SENATE

Claim Which Absalom Merner Makes Against Valentine Ratz.

BERLIN, Ont., Oct. 21.—Absalom Merner, son of the late Senator Samuel Merner, has begun an action against Senator Valentine Ratz, an ex-M.P., and a Liberal, for \$1400 for services alleged to have been rendered under an agreement made in July, 1908, between his father and Ratz, by which Merner was to resign and create a vacancy in the senate into which Mr. Ratz could step.

In consideration Ratz was to pay the plaintiff's father \$1400 on the first of May, 1909, and \$1000 a year thereafter as long as he or his wife, Mrs. Ellen Merner, lived. Hon. Samuel Merner died on August 11, 1908.

In his defence, Ratz denies that he was a party to any such agreement, and states that Merner's resignation was due to his insolvency. If there were any such agreement, it would be in effect for the sale of an office in the gift of the donor, and void as against public policy. It would also be void under the Ontario statutes, as being the sale of an office concerning the administration of justice. A senator receives \$2500 a year and it is a life job.

Vandalism at Public Library. Valuable scientific periodicals in the public library have been discovered to have had whole pages cut out of them. The vandalism was found out when the periodicals were sent to the binders.
