Year 1883-84.

---

Notre-Dame Hospital was established for the cure and relief of the sick, without distinction of race or creed. The nursing of the patients is entrusted to the reverend Grey Nuns, fourteen of whom reside continually in the Hospital. In addition to these, two ladies of the same community come to the Hospital every evening, to watch the sick during the night.

The Hospital has a catholic chaplain or almoner who provides the help and consolation of religion to all who stand in need of it.

..

The corporation of the Hospital is composed of Ordinary Members, Life Governors and Elected Governors.

The business of the corporation is under the supervision of a board called the *Board of Governors*,

The medical service is entirely under the control of a board called the *Medical Board*.

Finally, the management and direction of the corporation are entrusted to a board called the *Board of Management*.

Any person having paid a yearly contribution of at least five dollars becomes an ordinary member of the corporation and continues to be so as long as he pays such annual contribution. He has the

right to attend, take part in the deliberations and vote for the election of Governors at the annual general meeting of all the members of the corporation, which takes place on the first Wednesday of July.

Any person having paid the sum of one hundred dollars becomes a *Life Governor* as long as he pays a yearly contribution of ten dollars.

The *Life Governors* are *ipso facto* members of the Board of Governors.

The *Elected Governors* are appointed at the general yearly meeting of the corporation. In no case can their number exceed twelve.

In order to be eligible as a Governor, one must have paid a sum of at least twenty-five dollars and must pay a yearly contribution of at least five dollars. The elected Governors have the same rights and privileges as the life Governors.

..

The *Board of Governors* is composed of all the *Life Governors*, and of not more than twelve *Elected Governors*.

This Board transacts the general business of the corporation and meets at least four times a year, on the last Wednesday of January, April, July and October.

The Officers of the Board of Governors are a President, two Vice-Presidents and a Secretary.

The Board of Governors must report at the annual general meeting of the corporation on the state of general business, in accordance with a statement made by the Board of management.

..

The *Medical Board* meets once a month, its officers being a President and a Secretary. This Board has the absolute control over the whole medical department of the Hospital. It watches over the sanitary arrangements, suggests the purchasing of surgical instruments, appoints the attending physicians, the house surgeons and assistants, and the physicians in charge of the out-door department. It determines the hour for the attendance of physicians, the admission of patients and consultation at the out-door department.

The medical Board makes regulations for the diet of patients and the behaviour of medical students and nurses; it has the right to visit and examine the pharmacy at any time and to suggest whatever it may deem advisable in the interest of the Hospital.

In the interest of science, the attending physicians and surgeons, or in their absence, the house-surgeons have the right of performing a *post-mortem* examination on all patients dying in the public wards of the Hospital.

∴

As it has been previously stated, the management, control and regulation of the corporation of the Notre-Dame Hospital are entrusted to the *Board of Management*.

This Board is composed of a priest of the Seminary of St. Sulpice, appointed annually by the Superior of the said Seminary; of not more than six members elected annually by the Medical Board (three at least of whom shall be members of the said medical board), and of not more than six members of the Board of Governors, annually elected by that body.

The Board of Management reports to the Board of Governors every third month, eight days at least before the quarterly meeting of the said board.

The officers of the Board of Management are a President, a Treasurer and a Secretary.

The Treasurer has charge of all the money, debentures and titles of property belonging to the corporation. He receives all the subscriptions, donations, legacies and all other sums paid to the institution.

Eight days before the July quarterly meeting of the Board of Governors, the Treasurer must give to the Secretary of the said Board a faithful and minute statement of all the sums received and paid by him during the year.

The Board of Management meets once a week, every Monday, (the first Monday of each month being excepted) at 8 P. M.

∴

The Hospital is opened to all the needy sick, *without any distinction of race or creed*.

The admission of patients is left entirely to the Medical Board. However no patient recognized as incurable or suffering from contagious disease or mental derangement, can be admitted. The same may be said of any woman in advanced pregnancy, unless she has met with some accident endangering her life and necessitating immediate attendance.

Children under five years are not admitted, unless in certain cases requiring special treatment, and when the attending physicians and surgeons deem it necessary. No patient is admitted whose ailments do not absolutely require his stay in the Hospital.

The Hospital has two out-door departments. A general out door department under the control of the Medical Board and a department for the diseases of the eye and ear, under the direction of Dr. A. A. Foucher, surgeon oculist to the Hospital. The number of patients treated each year at the out-door departments is quite large.

The daily visit of the wards is made regularly at 11 A. M. by the

attending physicians and surgeons. As will be seen further, the house surgeons make an additional visit morning and evening.

Besides the public wards where poor patients are admitted, there are in the Hospital private wards for each of the patients as have the means of paying. In these private wards, paying patients enjoy all the comfort desirable and may be treated by their own doctor or any physician of their choice. During the year 1883-84 the number of private wards has been increased to sixteen.

The house surgeon and his assistant reside in the hospital. They visit the wards at least twice a day, morning and evening. They examine all the patients suffering from serious or urgent diseases, and take charge of all cases brought in until the attending physicians arrive.

The house surgeon alone, or, in his absence, the assistant house surgeon has charge of the admission of patients.

If any urgent case is brought to the Hospital, the house surgeon must send for the attending physician or surgeon without delay. (Nearly all the physicians are connected by telephone with the Hospital.)

The house surgeon and his assistant must never be away from the Hospital when the attending physicians make their daily visit. If one of them is obliged to be absent at any other time, he must previously inform his colleague of the fact, so that one of them may be always present at the Hospital.

The house surgeon must enter or cause to be entered in books especially kept for that purpose, the names, age and sex of all the patients, the date of their admission and discharge, the treatment followed in each case, the state of the patient when discharged, the name of the disease he was laboring under and other peculiarities. He must also see that the prescriptions of the attending physicians and surgeons are carefully prepared, and if necessary, must attend personally the compounding of medicines.

The house surgeon and his assistant are not allowed to take charge of patients outside the Hospital nor even in the private wards of the Hospital. All their time and care must be devoted to the poor patients of the institution.

No medical student is allowed to attend the hospital unless he has previously taken his admission ticket.

Under no pretence whatever are medical students allowed to go into the wards in the absence of or without special permission from the attending physician.

During the daily visit, the medical students must follow the professor as it were *foot to foot*, that is to say, they must not examine



nor talk to any other patient but to the one who is, at that moment, the subject of the clinical lecture.

Unless they are especially authorised to do so by the *chef de clinique*, students are forbidden to enter into conversation with patients.

## THE KERMESE.

---

The most remarkable event of the year 1883-84 has been the Grand Kermesse of the month of June 1884.

During the month of December, last year, the Committee of the Lady Patronesses agitated the question of holding a Bazaar for the benefit of the Hospital. The suggestion was ardently adopted by all the Ladies, the plan matured, and the work began. A committee of organization was named, and after five months of persevering efforts and steady labor, the Grand Kermesse opened on the 7th of June, under tents, in the garden of the Place d'Armes. The ambulance costume was adopted by all the Ladies in charge of the different departments.

The Kermesse was kept opened eight days, and during that interval it was visited by a compact crowd, anxious to contemplate the admirable work and to contribute to its success. The indefatigable and noble zeal of the Ladies organizers of this charitable festival, was crowned with the best recompense and accompanied by the satisfaction which a good action always engenders, their receipts went on encreasing, till the sum of \$15,021.42 was realized, from which all expenses being deducted there remained a clear profit of \$12,022.89.

Thanks to this help, the Hospital has been enabled to ameliorate its means of existence. The sum of \$9,000.00 has been assigned in part payment of the purchase money for the proprietorship of the Hospital and also for the liquidation of other debts.

The public unanimously praised the zeal and devotedness of the Ladies who organized and so happily conducted the difficult enterprise. The result obtained suffices to prove how well Montreal understood and appreciated not only all that was admirable in such a work, but also the charity of its Directresses.

To all the Lady Patronesses, who so actively contributed to the success of the Kermesse, to all the friends stimulated by their word and example to cooperate in the good work, but especially to all the members of the committee of organization, the administration of

the Notre-Dame Hospital renews the expression of its liveliest gratitude. It desires that a more marked testimony be given to the worthy President of the Kermesse, Madame J. R. Thibaudeau, who was wholly devoted to the furtherance of the enterprise and towards whom the Hospital has on this occasion contracted an insolvable debt of gratitude.

The report of the Committee of Lady Patronesses for the year 1884 shall only be made towards the end of December and shall be published in the annual report of the Hospital for 1884-85. It will contain all details relating to the grand Kermesse.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL BOARD  
FOR THE YEAR 1883-84.

On 30th of June, 1883, there remained in the Hospital (from the preceding year) 41 patients: 20 males and 21 females.

During the year ending June 30th, 1884, 1089 patients were admitted, 646 males and 443 females, making a total number of 1130 patients for the whole year.

In the general out-door department there were consultations, prescriptions, medicines, &c., given to 3515 patients, both catholics and protestants. Out of these were 1964 males and 1551 females.

In the out-door eye and ear department, 1026 patients were treated, including 590 males, and 436 females, and 5728 prescriptions were given.

Thus the total number of patients treated at the hospital in both out-door and in-door departments was 5671, a surplus of 1550 over last year.

OF THE  
TREASURER OF THE LADY PATRONESSES

FOR THE YEAR 1882-83.

LADIES,

On the 2nd of december, last year, I had the honor to submit you my report of the labor of 1881-82 and even then we rejoiced over the results obtained. This year I am happy to announce the progress of our good work which, thanks to the zeal of the Lady Patronesses, enables us to show an important increase in our receipts. The year 1881-82 brought us the sum of \$276.62, accruing exclusively from the subscription of the Ladies, while 1882-83 gives us \$911.40 drawn from the following sources :

From the proceeds of this dramatical representation, the Lady Patronesses thought proper to reserve from their work only the sum of \$100, remitting the balance of \$551.40 to the Treasurer, for the general wants of the Hospital. Our receipts thus reduced to \$360, were used to purchase those articles most needed for the comfort of the patients and to furnish the rooms.

Moreover, the bread collection, due to the initiative of the Lady Patronesses, continues to prosper, and thus, a value nearly equal to \$500 is annually brought into the Hospital.

It is needless, Ladies, in order to manifest the utility of our work and the necessity of pursuing it with increased zeal and devotedness, to mention here, apart from these fine results, the annual Christmas dinner, and the consolation offered each day to the sick by the Ladies of our Association (statements which are the special attributes of our devoted Secretary.)



As our work progresses and develops, it must identify itself still more with the increasing wants of the institution. Therefore, Ladies, inspired by this idea, your Council has decided to organize a grand bazaar, to be held in April next, for the benefit of the Hospital. Your Council also trust to the zeal and charity of the Ladies of Montreal to give it a success worthy of the work.
