INTemperance ILLUSTRATED AND EXEMPLIFIED.



Child. Mother, what is this picture?

Mother. It is the picture of a nurse with a little infant on her lap. And there is a bed on one side; a cradle for the babe on the other; and a table standing near the nurse.

Child. But what is nurse doing to the baby? Is she going to kill it?

Mother. No, my child. She is feeding it with gin and water, made sweet with sugar. The decanter stands, you see, on the little table.

Child. But, mother, why does nurse give gin to the baby? I thought only men and women ever used spirit.

Mother. Many mothers and nurses think that spirit is very good and necessary for infants; and they often give it to them to keep them quiet. But it is a very bad and hurtful practice. I think that many persons have become drunkards in consequence of being fed with sweetened liquor when they were children. Then they learned to love it, and when they grew older, they loved it more and more, till they became like the man whom you saw staggering past the house last evening. I always feel very unpleasant when I see it done. I should not be surprised if, when this little babe grows up to be a man, he should be a drunkard.



Child. See that little boy, mother, how he holds up his hands, and seems to be asking for something. I wonder what he wants

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Mother. You see his mother is preparing to give him something. It is rum and water sweetened. You remember the little baby in the other picture?

Child. Yes, mother; and I remember too, that nurse was feeding him with some rum and sugar.

Mother. Well, now you see, he loves sweetened rum, and he has seen his father drink it, and he thinks it good.

Child. Will he be a drunkard, mother?

Mother. I cannot tell; but I should think he is in a fair way to that end. He has the appetite of a drunkard, in the same proportion as he has the size of a man.

Child. Will his mother give him some rum and sugar, does mother think?

Mother. Very likely; for a great many parents thoughtlessly indulge their children in their foolish and injurious demands, in addition to setting them a bad example.

Child. Why, mother, is it wrong to drink rum? I have seen a great many people drink it, and they are not drunkards.

Mother. Yes, my child, it is wrong for any body to drink rum or any kind of ardent spirit; for it does them no good, and in one case out of every forty it makes them drunkards.



Child. There, mother; there is a woman sewing; and see, there are her children in the bed asleep. Will mother please to tell me about this picture? I like very much to hear about these pictures.

Mother. Well, my child, I am pleased to tell you about them: for I wish you to understand them.

This represents a woman who sat up all night to finish a garment for a gentleman who was to set out on a journey the next morning. Look at the clock. You see it is midnight, and her children are asleep in the bed, and one in the cradle. Her husband is not at home; and she knows if she does not work hard she and her little children must be without food, for her husband does not provide any for them. He is a drinking man, and has become very idle. She has been working hard all day, and now she must work hard all night.

Child. Does she not look sorry, mother? I should think she would feel very bad.

Mother. Yes, I suppose she does. Her countenance does look as if her heart ached. But do you not feel sorry for these little children?

Child. Yes, mother; how very bad they must feel. Does their father ever come home intoxicated, does mother think?

Mother. Very probably he does. We shall see him in the next picture.



Mother. Here is the picture. What do you think this represents?

Child. I cannot tell. Here are several men; one is asleep on a chair; another is going towards a man who is pouring something out of a bottle into a glass, and the third looks as if he was just ready to fall. Well, mother, please tell me about them. Is this a tavern too?

Mother. No. This is what is called a grocery, or a place where they sell a little tea, a little pepper, and a little of some other things, and a great deal of spirituous liquor. Most people call this a *grog-shop*. The three men you see, are each drinkers of different degrees. The one who is asleep in his chair, with his pipe at his feet on the floor, is what is called a moderate drinker. He says, he will drink when he pleases; and he looks with scorn upon the man by the bar, and wonders why a man cannot drink with judgment, as he does. He says, too, that he does not fear ever being a drunkard—he can drink or let it alone, and means to do as he likes in this free country. Yet you see, he has descended on the drunkard's down-hill road from the *tavern* to the *grog-shop*; and I have always remarked, that when a man is so far along as that, there is little or no hope of him. He is then to be ranked among those in the second stages of intemperance. This man is yet very decently dressed, as you see; and is, no doubt, a very respectable man. Yet many times he is under the necessity of talking and walking very circumspectly, lest his family and friends should discover that he has not drunk with his usual judgment. And I should think, he had failed in his judgment this time; for, you see, he is fast asleep, and does not know that his pipe is fallen, neither does all the noise around waken him.

Child. Does mother think he is drunk?

Mother. Yes, he is drunk, but not what people call dead drunk; that is, helplessly drunk; for you see, he can yet sit on his chair.

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Child. O, mother! look at the man standing by the one on the chair, and see how he leans over! I should think he would fall. Is he a moderate drinker, too?

Mother. He says he is; for he drinks no more than his necessities require: and he drinks with a great deal of discretion. I once heard just such an one as him, when he was so drunk that he could just walk, say, that any man was a fool who could not govern his appetite.

Child. But, mother, this man looks ragged, and is not so decently dressed as the other man who is asleep in the chair.

Mother. The reason is, because he has drank so much and so long, that poverty begins to pinch him very close, and money is so scarce with him, that he can hardly get enough to buy his liquor with. I dare say, his family are often very destitute.

Child. What will we call him, mother; for I don't think he is a moderate drinker?

Mother. He is a tippler. He used to drink at the tavern and be satisfied; now he *stops* at the tavern, and *stays* at the grog-shop. He is a drunkard of the third degree, and will soon become like the one you see going up to the man who is pouring out liquor.

Child. Is he a drunkard, mother?

Mother. Yes, he is one of the lowest class; and I could tell you his history if I had time. But he was once a rich man, and went well dressed, and had fine horses, and kept servants to wait on him. He then used to drink wine at his dinner; and then brandy and water; then he would call at the tavern and drink his grog; *now he fills the lowest place in the grog-shop.* He has seen the others drink, and heard their reasons, and he thinks just as they do; so he drinks. Now we must look at the next picture.



Child. See, mother, here is another picture in the almanac! Please tell me what this is about.

Mother. Well, my son, it is intended to represent the bar-room of a tavern, at an election. You see, there in one corner, a man standing within a little enclosure with rods or bars running up before it?

Child. Yes, mother; and there are boards part of the way. Is that a bar? What is he doing there, behind the boards? Is he ashamed to stand out, mother, with the rest of the men?

Mother. Perhaps he is; for he is not engaged in a very laudable employment. He is measuring out rum, by the half gill, to the man you see standing the other side of the boards.

Child. Do men go to election to drink ruin? I thought they went to choose — what, mother?

Mother. Officers of government.

Child. Yes, but must they drink ruin when they choose officers?

Mother. There is no necessity for it. But let me tell you about the rest of the picture. See that man with his arms on the table; and resting his head on them. He is asleep. He has drank too much liquor, and is drunk. His pipe, bottle and glass are by his side, on the table. A pipe or segar, and a rum bottle and glass, are always fit companions for each other. And this man has been reading the newspaper; you see it open before him. One man you see, has a glass in his hand, and appears to be very earnest in conversation. We may suppose he is discussing the merits of the different candidates for office; and, perhaps, 'by fair words and — a good treat, is designing to win to his opinions the two men who are listening to him. On a paper lying under the table, you may read the words, 'No priestcraft;' and we may conclude, these men are of that class who are opposed to all attempts to suppress the use of ardent spirit, because they pretend to fear that a union of church and state will be the consequence of people's becoming temperate! You see, all these men, but the one who is too drunk to smoke, and the one who holds the glass, have segars in their mouths. I hardly ever knew a hard drinker, who did not use tobacco in some form or other; and physicians tell us, that the use of tobacco is a species of intemperance, and very often may be considered as the first step towards drinking.

Child. Well, mother, must all who keep taverns sell rum?

Mother. By no means. A public house where no rum is sold, is much more pleasant than one where they sell it. There is, generally, so much noise, and drinking, and often swearing and fighting, at such places, that travellers are disgusted, as well as rendered very uncomfortable. There are a good many tavern keepers now in the United States, who do not sell rum, and I have heard them say, that they enjoyed a very quiet life and did very good business.

Child. I should like to stay at such a tavern, if I were travelling. Did mother ever stay at such an one?

Mother. Yes, at several. There is one in Rochester, kept by Mr. Henry Hoyt, and one in Utica, kept by Mr. Jones, Genesee street, and one in Albany, kept by Mr. N. Safford, besides several in Boston and in other places; and at most of those which I have named, I have stopped and found them all I could wish.

Child. Were there any drunkards there, mother?

Mother. Not any. There was no liquor for them to drink, and they do not like to go where there is no liquor. Well, now we will look at the next picture.



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Mother. There, my child, in this picture you may see a very striking explanation of drunkenness. These two men have left their work to go to the tavern, you see near, and this is the effect of their visit. One, you see, has fallen upon the ground; and is unable to rise. His jug has fallen with him, and the cork coming out, his liquor is running upon the ground. He hears it, and would fain save some of it, but he is so far gone that he cannot reach it, although he tries very hard to do it. And see those hogs: they heard the liquor running, and supposing it food for them, they came. The other man, you see, stands holding to a tree—his bottle sticking out of his pocket, and his hat off. Now, my son, you see what liquor does to men—makes them conduct in such a way, that even the very beasts shun them, or manifest by their looks their shame at such conduct. How disgraceful and wicked it is, for rational beings to destroy their reason and sink themselves lower than brutes. I have heard some compare a drunken man to a beast; but the one is far less respectable than the other. God made the beasts as they are; but man, and only man, makes himself a drunkard.

Child. Were these men always drunkards, mother?

Mother. No; they had in early life, fair prospects and high hopes. They were well dressed, and went in good society, had property, and were useful and happy. Now you see, that even the beasts fly from them. They were first temperate drinkers—drank more and more freely, till they became what you see them. My son, let me advise you, and remember a mother's advice, *never drink spirit at all*; for if you do, you may come to be like these men.

You remember the poor woman sewing in the other picture?

Child. Yes, mother: and she looked very sad.

Mother. The man on the ground is her husband; and he will probably lie on the ground till morning. He has spent all his money, and to-morrow he will not be in a condition to earn any more, and so his family must suffer. His children cannot go to school, as you can, or to church; but they must grow up in ignorance and rags, because their father is a drunkard. One intemperate man has it in his power to make many persons wretched. Can you tell me what the Bible says about drunkards?

Child. Yes, mother; it says, 'DRUNKARDS SHALL NOT INHERIT THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN.'



Child. Well, mother, we have done with the drunkards now; have we not? We have been looking at them and talking about them till I am weary.

Mother. What then must be the feeling of those who are obliged to live with them from day to day? But we have not yet done with them; for, if I mistake not, I see several drunkards in this picture. This cut represents a hay-field, as you may see by the grass; and if we may form an opinion, the owner is one of those who think they cannot do their haying and harvesting without ardent spirit. I think he is not a *temperance* man, though it is possible he may be a *temperate* man. But see, there are two men under the bush asleep, and they are intoxicated. This is what in some parts of the country, is called taking to the bush. I have often been surprised that farmers did not see their true interests more clearly than to furnish their laborers with spirit, or employ any but those who would work without it. This farmer has hired those men who are asleep; they are too drunk to give even the hope of their doing any thing more for the remainder of the day. Thus he will lose three dollars, at least, in labor. And there you see that broken rake and fork; these were broken by the two men under the bush; and to repair them will cost at least, one dollar more; and to all this we must add the consideration, that at this time the want of their help is more than the worth of it, for the grass is now too ripe; beside, the other branches of farming are suffering for want of attention. In short, ten dollars would not make good the loss to this farmer, occasioned by one quart of whiskey, and no money can be a compensation for the wretchedness those men will bring upon their families and friends. Some men deem it an act of kindness to employ men who are poor, and at the same time intemperate; and so it would be if they did not furnish them with ardent spirit. But it is not kindness to employ a man all day and send him home at night intoxicated, to abuse and afflict his family. Let us see the next cut.

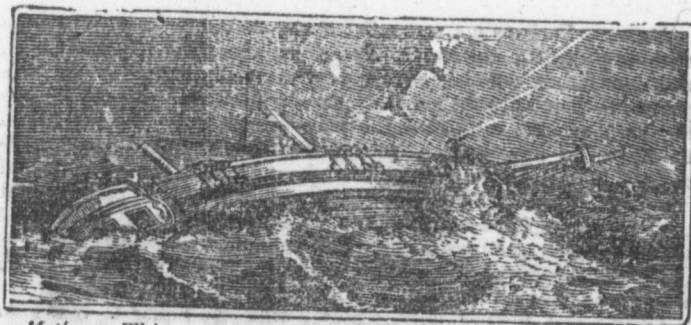


Mother. the bottom called the in Ireland crew. both into and all Among the *Child.*

On the eleventh of May last, the captain and mate being both intoxicated, the ship struck an ice-berg, and soon went down; and all on board perished, except 36, who escaped in the boats. Among those who were drowned were many children.

Child. Were they a great way from land, mother?

Mother. Yes, they were near the Banks of Newfoundland, and the weather was so cold, that of those who escaped, some were frozen so that they lost their limbs. A great many accidents at sea happen in consequence of the officers and crew being intoxicated. Merchants who send ships to sea, are, many of them, now sensible of it, and they are becoming more and more unwilling to have spirit put on board for the use of the crew. More than 700 ships now sail from the United States without ardent spirit. These are called TEMPERANCE SHIPS.



Mother. James, look at this picture. Here is a bed, and a woman lying upon it, very ill; three physicians consulting upon her case, and her little children are crying, because they are afraid they shall lose their poor, kind mother. This is the same woman you saw sewing at midnight, and her hard work and grief has caused this illness.

Child. Will she die, mother?

Mother. Perhaps not now; but if she should, what will become of those poor little children? You see, it is now 12 o'clock at night, and their father, who has been gone three days to the tavern, has just come home drunk, with his jug in his hand. I dare say, he rages and swears, and orders the poor woman to get up and leave the house. I have known such an instance, and the doctors were obliged to have the unfeeling, hard hearted man taken away and confined. See now, how liquor not only degrades a man so that the very swine run away from him; but it makes him more cruel than a savage; destroys all the finer feelings of his nature; debases his mind; destroys natural affections; causes him to disregard all obligations, and set Heaven itself at defiance.

Child. But, mother, did the person who sold liquor to this man in the picture know that he was a drunkard?

Mother. Yes, undoubtedly. And, for the sake of a few cents, he has turned this man out more degraded than any beast, to go home and abuse his family, as we see.

Child. Is this right? Is it not as bad for any one to make a man drunk, as to be drunk himself?

Mother. I think it is, and perhaps worse too. But most of those who sell liquor say, they will not sell to drunkards. I saw Mr. B. refuse to let a drinking man have liquor the other day. And he did right.

Child. But you told me, mother, a little while ago, that all drunkards were once temperate drinkers. I should think they ought to refuse to sell to them, and then they would not be drunkards.

Mother. That is true, James; but the love of money shuts their eyes, so they cannot see how their conduct appears to reflecting and disinterested persons. It has long been my sentiment, that one rum-seller does more hurt in the world than fifty drunkards.



Child. Why, mother! is that man going to kill his wife? See, he has raised the tongs and is going to strike her!

Mother. Perhaps he does not *intend* to kill her; yet as he is intoxicated, he may be guilty of murder. He means, however, only to drive her out of doors into the darkness and storm of a tempestuous night.

Child. But, mother, tell me if it can be right to sell a man liquor, who thus abuses his family?

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Child. night?

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Mother. No, my son; it is not right. If this man ever commits murder, in a fit of intoxication, the man who shall have sold him the liquor will be, in the eye of the law of God, guilty as an accessory, and in strict justice ought to suffer the same punishment. Yet the law of the land authorizes the sale of spirit; and the vender, by that, would be pronounced innocent.



Child. Mother, is that the same woman we saw sewing at midnight?

Mother. Yes; their property is all gone. The husband and father has committed an infamous crime, and now the family are compelled to go to the alms-house, or suffer with want. The little remains of their property are to be sold by the sheriff, to pay for the liquor drank by their unfeeling and ruined head and parent, during the last three months. And now, my son, hearken to a mother's counsel: never drink ardent spirit, even temperately; for all drunkards were once temperate drinkers.



Mother. Here, my son, you see the end of the drunkard. There is an officer of justice; that house is a prison; and there stands a gallows. The unhappy man, in a fit of intoxication, has committed murder, and he will now end his days in ignominy. In the first cut, you saw him an infant; the nurse feeding him with sweetened liquor. On the next, you saw him asking his mother for spirit and water; and now, you see him on the way to a miserable end.

COMETS.

" It was a world as fresh and fair
 As e'er revolved round Sun in air ;
 Its course was free and regular,
 Space bosomed not a lovelier star.
 The hour arrived, and it became
 A wandering mass of shapeless flame,
 A pathless comet, and a curse,
 The menace of the Universe ;
 Still rolling on with innate force,
 Without a sphere, without a course ;
 A bright deformity on high,
 The monster of the upper sky."—*Byron.*

This year will be remarkable for the long expected return of the Comet of 1769; commonly designated "Halley's Comet," (from its having been successfully predicted by that celebrated astronomer,) which in one of its former returns appeared in great splendour, with a tail 30° in length. If the calculations of the most eminent mathematicians may be relied on, it will come into the vicinity of the earth's orbit early in July, and cross the plane of the ecliptic, about the beginning of Aug. in near the middle of the sign Gemini; moving among the fixed stars from the west to the east, and north, through the constellations Taurus, Auriga and the Lynx, into Ursa Major, or the Great Bear; it will not however probably be visible till it arrives in the constellation Auriga, about the first of September, when it will rise in the N. E. at about 11 o'clock in the evening, and pass the meridian, near the zenith, at a little past 7 the next morning. On the last of September it will be about 20° due north of the stars Castor and Pollux, and will rise in the N. N. E. at about 10 in the evening, and pass the meridian a little north of the zenith at about 8 the next morning; its apparent velocity of motion through the constellations about this time being incredibly swift, equal to 15° of longitude in 24 hours. At about the beginning of October, when it arrives at Ursa Major, it will have attained so great a northern declination, that it will revolve without setting for several days, but will probably be lost for a few hours, near the horizon in the humidity of the earth's atmosphere. Its distance at this time will be about twenty-five millions of miles from the earth, and will probably exhibit a brilliant appearance. From Ursa Major it will pass rapidly into the constellations of Bootis, thence through the head of the Serpent, into the Serpent-Bearer, but it will now, (near the last of October,) have arrived so near the Sun, as probably to be lost in his rays, except it may possibly be visible for a little time early in the morning near the horizon, in the east or a little south of east. It will reach

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its perihelion about the 4th November, and be invisible during the remainder of the year ; but on its return from its perihelion in 1836, it will probably be visible early in the morning in the south-east, for a few weeks about the last of January and first of February ; but it will soon after reach such a distance from the earth, that the attenuated light of the sun, which it reflects, will cease to make an impression on the organ of sight ; and it will be no more visible until the year 1912, as its period is computed to be about 76 years ; so that probably not one that has now arrived at the age of manhood, will live to witness another return of this illustrious visitor. Since its last appearance successive generations have arisen and passed away, and more than two hundred millions of the human family have joined the innumerable company of the mighty DEAD.

The year 1832 was distinguished by the predicted appearance of two Comets, the most remarkable that have yet fallen under the notice of astronomers. These are the comets of Encke and Biela, the former was not expected to be visible in this hemisphere during its visit : that part of the heavens in which it pursued its track was, notwithstanding, carefully examined, night after night, but not the faintest glimmering of it could be perceived. It was, however, seen in the southern hemisphere, at Buenos Ayres, but it exhibited so very faint an appearance, as to induce the suspicion that it had undergone considerable physical changes since its perihelion in 1829. Its return in August, the present year, will also be unfavourable for observation in the northern hemisphere of the earth, and we must wait till the autumn of 1838 before it will again be advantageously situated for tracing it. The latter had been an object of fear to many on account of the nearness with which it approached, not the earth, but a point of the earth's path. Towards the end of October it actually intersected the orbit of our planet ; happily, however, the comet was in advance of the earth, so that unless our globe had augmented its pace, or the visitant had retarded its journey, there was no risk of any dangerous proximity, much less of a hostile collision. There are many who, without going the length of fearing danger from the shock of a comet, nevertheless imagine that any unusually hot weather, which happens while such a body is visible, or going to be visible, is caused by it in some measure at least. A comet *may* certainly strike the earth in the next century ; not one of these which are known, unless the laws of nature be singularly altered, but some one or other yet to come ; and as the Science of Astronomy approaches towards perfection, we shall doubtless add some important and interesting facts to our knowledge of comets. As to the multitude of idle theories with which for want of better information, this part of astronomy has been loaded, such as that the planetary system was formed by matter struck off from the sun by one comet ; that another caused the deluge ; that the four small planets were formerly one, which was broken in pieces by a third ; that the moon was originally a comet, and the like ;—we

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would willingly amuse our readers by an account of them, if our limits permitted.

The revolutions of some comets are completed in much less time than a few years since was supposed; the comet of 1682, whose period is 75 years, was termed by Dr. Halley, "the Mercury of comets." The following are some of the most remarkable; the comets of Encke, Biela, and Halley, are the only three whose returns have been satisfactorily verified:—Comet of Encke, 3½ years; comet of Biela, 6½ years; comet of 1770, 50 years, 5½ years and 20 years (having had its original period disturbed by the action of Jupiter;) comet of 1815, 74 or 75 years; comet of Halley, 75 or 76 years, (this is the comet which is expected to return the latter end of this year;) comet of 1680, 575 years; second comet of 1811, 875 years; comet of 1769, 929 years; comet of 1807, 1713 years; first comet of 1811, 3383 years; and the comet of 1763, 7334 years.

ECLIPSES AND OTHER ASTRONOMICAL PHENOMENA, IN THE YEAR 1835.

"Thou, even thou, art Jehovah alone;
Thou hast made the Heavens,
The heaven of heavens, with all the host of them.
The earth and all that is upon it,
The seas and all that is in them.
Worthy art thou, O Jehovah,
To receive the glory and honour and power,
For thou hast created all things,
And for thy pleasure they are and were created,
And thou preservest them all
By the word of thy power,
And the host of heaven worshippeth Thee.
The heavens declare the glory of God,
And the firmament sheweth his handy work:"

There will be THREE eclipses this year—two of the SUN—and one of the MOON as follows:—

I. The first will be of the Sun, on Wednesday, 27th May, at 9h. 15m. morning; yet by reason of the Moon's south latitude, it will not be visible in the British Provinces; but in South America, the Atlantic Ocean and Africa, it will be visible, central and annular; a dazzling, luminous, golden ring of the Sun appearing all around the dark body of the Moon at the middle of the eclipse, in all places where it is central, and the untutored savage of Amazonia and the Ethiopian of Africa, will admire the beautiful and

sublime phenomenon without knowing its cause. The Moon's penumbra in this eclipse will first strike the earth at sunrise, in the United Provinces of S. America, in lat. $24^{\circ} 30' S.$ and long. $59^{\circ} 3' W.$ of Greenwich; hence taking a northeasterly course and travelling at the rate of about 1800 miles an hour, it will cross the river Paraguay and enter Amazonia; traversing the desert regions up the river Parana, and to near the source of the St. Francisco, in the Brazillian Mountains, its centre will take nearly the course of that river to lat. $10^{\circ} S.$ and long. about $40^{\circ} W.$ thence continuing its northeasterly course, it will pass over Cape St. Roque, into the Atlantic Ocean; crossing the Atlantic it will enter Senegambia, and the colony of Liberia, in Africa at the mouth of the Mesurado, and the city of Monrovia; taking nearly the course of that river to its source; it will then change its direction to nearly due East, passing over the Kong Mountains, along the borders of the Foulahs, Dahomy, Benin, and the Ivory, Gold, and Slave Coasts of Guinea, to Biafra, and bending its course more to the south, it will enter the unexplored regions of Northern Ethiopia, where it will go off at the setting of the Sun—in lat. about $5^{\circ} N.$ and long. $22^{\circ} E.$ of Greenwich.

II. The second will be of the Moon, on Wednesday 10th June, at 6h. 13m. afternoon; and as the Moon will then be below the horizon it will of course be invisible; but it will be so very small that it would hardly be perceptible were it to have happened when the Moon was above the horizon.

III. The third will be of the Sun, on Friday, 20th November, at 6h. 26m. morning, invisible, and it would also be invisible on account of the Moon's south latitude, were it to happen after sunrise; but in the Gulf of Guinea, and Africa, in long. about $10^{\circ} E.$ and under or near the Equator, it will be visible, central and total on the meridian. The Moon's shadow will first strike the earth, at the rising of the Sun, in the Atlantic Ocean, near the tropic of Cancer, and a few leagues to the north west of Cape Blanco;—taking a southeasterly course, it will enter Senegambia, and Sahara, or the Great Desert in Africa, passing over the southwestern border of Sahara, and the northeastern border of Senegambia, and up the Senegal River to near the mouth of the Niger, it will cross the Kong Mountains into Guinea, passing over Dahomy into the Gulfs of Benin and Biafra, it will again enter Africa traversing Loango, Congo, Angola and the southern unexplored regions of Ethiopia, and the coast and channel of Mozambique, it will enter the Island Madagascar, when it will take nearly a due east direction, and pass off into the Indian Ocean, to lat. about $11^{\circ} S.$ and long. $74^{\circ} W.$ of Greenwich, where it will leave the earth, at the going down of the Sun. In the province of Ashantee in Guinea, on the Ivory Coast, near the colony of Liberia, in Africa, in lat. $9^{\circ} 30' N.$ and long. $4^{\circ} 30' W.$ of Greenwich: both the great eclipses of the Sun this year will be central; the first annular, and the last total.—This occurrence in the early ages of antiquity, ere the light of science and religion had dawned upon the world, would have been

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deemed an alarming deviation from the established laws of nature, and witnessed with terror and amazement as a prodigy hung out by the immediate hand of God, in the heavens, and portending calamity and misery to mankind. That two such uncommon eclipses, should happen at the same place within the short space of less than six months, is a most extraordinary and remarkable phenomenon, and cannot be expected again for many centuries to come.

Besides the eclipses there will be another interesting phenomenon this year, viz:—

THE TRANSIT OF MERCURY;

or the passage of the planet across the Sun's disc. This event will take place on Saturday, 7th November, in the afternoon, and be mostly visible. Its phases will be as follows;

At the middle Mercury will be within 5' 35" of the Sun's centre, and will appear like a small black round spot, of about the size of a rifle bullet, on the face of the Sun. The ingress will be visible from the western extremity of Africa, and the whole continent of America. The egress from the western half of North America, the western coast of South America, New Holland, and the northeastern part of Asia.

There will likewise this year, be several remarkable conjunctions of some of the larger fixed stars, and the planets, with the Moon; several of which will be occultations. They are all noticed in the Calendar pages. The most interesting will be of Jupiter on the 6th of February at about 10 o'clock in the evening; and of Saturn on the 12th April at about 9 in the evening.

LEFT HAND PAGE.—First column contains the days of the month—Second, days of the week—Third, Rising of the Sun—Fourth, Setting of the Sun—Fifth, length of days in hours and minutes—Sixth, Sun's declination in hours and minutes—Seventh, Moon's Rising or Setting—Eighth, Moon's Southing: this column also gives the time of High Water at Windsor, Parrsboro', Horton, Cornwallis, &c.—Ninth, Moon's place in the signs—Tenth, High Water at Halifax.

RIGHT HAND PAGE.—First column, contains the days of the month—Second, Holidays, Weather, &c.—Third, Farmer's Calendar.

The top of the columns on each page shows the Moon's phases, or the times of new and full Moon, and of the first and last quarter, or two quadratures with the Sun.

All the calculations are in apparent or solar time. The Sun's declination is taken from the Nautical Almanack.

stammering, his lips quivering, his legs tottering, and his stomach heaving! The only rational being on earth, reduced to absolute incapacity of reason or speech! A being, formed to be immortal, sunk into sensuality!

There is no other vice that so effectually and suddenly unhinges and overturns all virtue, and destroys every thing valuable in the mind. It takes off every restraint, and opens the mind to every temptation. So that there is no way so expeditious for a man to corrupt and debauch himself to turn himself from a man into a demon, as by intoxicating himself with strong liquor. Nor is there perhaps any other habit so bewitching, and which so soon becomes unconquerable, as drunkenness. The reason is plain. No other vice so effectually destroys reason;

tures gave them the fullest liberty to refrain. Avoiding, however, all appearance of rigorous abstinence, they leave to every man's judgment and conscience, how far he shall feel himself warranted in the use of fermented liquors, and only insist, as their fundamental principle, on an abstinence from distilled spirits, and a discountenancing of the causes and practices of intemperance. Their regulations respect persons in health alone; with the prescriptions of physicians they do not interfere. Even the moderate use of distilled spirits they consider to be injurious, and they call upon their brethren, for their own sake, to renounce it. The great mass of excellences attributed to intoxicating liquors, they believe to be fictitious; and though all the virtues attributed to them were real, they are cheerfully willing to sacrifice them, while they have the remotest hope of thus cutting off even one of the sources of drunkenness, or

and when the faculties of the mind are overturned, what means can the unhappy person use, or what course can another take with him to set him right? To attempt to reform a confirmed drunkard, is much the same as preaching to a madman, or an idiot.

If, by the force of strong liquor, a man's cares may be mechanically banished, and his conscience awhile lulled to sleep; they will soon break loose upon him with greater fury. He, who artificially raises his spirits by drinking will find them sink in proportion. Then they must be raised again; and so on, till he has no spirits to raise. For understanding, and fortune, and virtue, and health, all fall before this fell destroyer.

He is besides publicly exposed in the parish church on the following Sunday. If the same individual is found committing the same offence a fifth time, he is shut up in a house of correction and condemned to six months' hard labour; and if he is again guilty, of a twelve months' punishment of a similar description. Drunkenness is never admitted as an excuse for any crime; and whoever dies when drunk is buried ignominiously, and deprived of the prayers of the church. Whoever is observed drunk in the streets, or making a noise in a tavern, is sure to be taken to prison and detain-
