

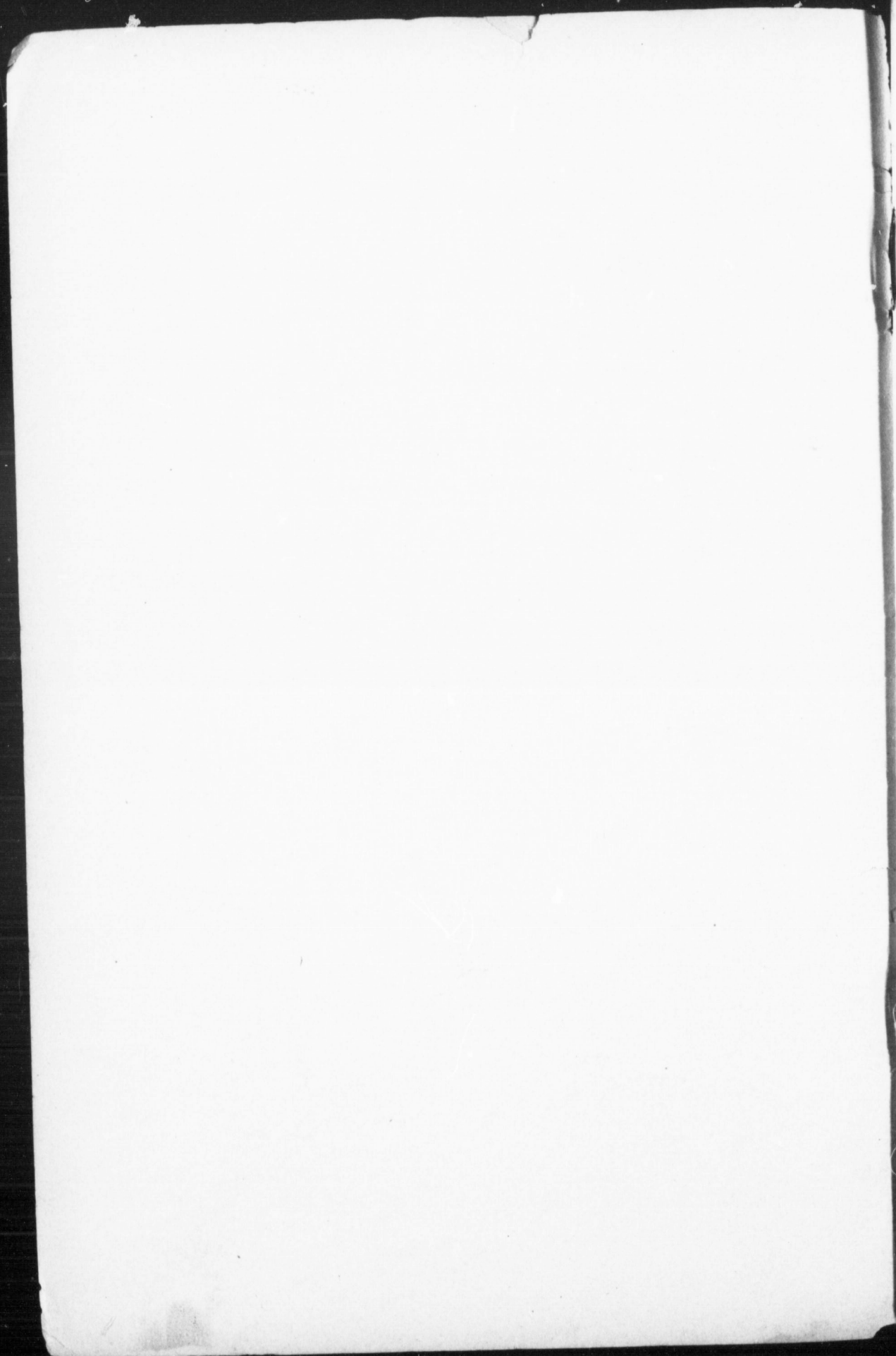

### 3. SACRAMENTS.

Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of each month. The Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbath of February, June, August and December, in the morning, and on the first Sabbath of April and October in the evening. Communicants are requested to bring their communion cards, as this is the only way of recording attendance.

### 4. SUPPORT.

Pews and sittings are free, although, as far as possible, allotted to the families and persons who attend the church. Any who have not secured sittings are requested to make application for them to the Treasurer, Mr. William Campbell, or to any member of the Seat-Letting Committee, on any Wednesday evening before or after prayer meeting service.

The congregational expenses are met by voluntary contributions, given for the most part weekly, by envelope. All who have not adopted this system are earnestly requested to do so, by applying to the Treasurer for envelopes. It is suggested that each contributor shall take his or her supply of envelopes home, keep them in a safe place, use them regularly with due regard to the dates printed



thereon, seal them securely, and write the amount enclosed in every case on the face. Each contributor who follows these suggestions can ascertain, by a simple examination of the envelopes remaining on hand, precisely how his or her account with the church stands at any time, and they are asked to make such an examination periodically, and supply any omissions which may have occurred by reason of absence or otherwise.

#### 5. MISSION SCHEMES.

All are expected to contribute to the Mission Schemes of the Church, such as Home and Foreign Missions, French Evangelization, etc. Envelopes for monthly contributions are provided, and may be obtained from Mr. Charles D. Gordon, 101 St. Vincent Street. Over and above the regular contributions, members of the congregation are supporting Rev. N. H. Russell, B.A., in Central India. These objects are commended to the generosity of the members.

#### 6. DISTRICTS.

The congregation being divided into districts, with an Elder in charge of each, members are particularly urged to make known to the Elder of their District any cases of sickness or other circumstance requiring attention. Members are particularly requested to give notice of change of address just as soon as it occurs.

Synopsis of Minutes of the Annual Meeting  
of the Congregation.

The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the evening of Monday, January 15th.

In the absence of the pastor, devotional exercises were conducted by Mr. Andrew Jeffrey and Mr. A. Sampson.

The following letter was read from Dr. McTavish:

Clifton Springs, N.Y., January 12th, 1900.

*My Dear People.—*

Please permit me to send a message of good cheer to you all on this the first annual meeting from which I have ever been absent. The thought of being laid aside from work at a time when one's presence seems specially necessary was a real trial to me at first. But Divine grace, which has been so abundant, has made it a privilege and a joy to say in this also, "Thy will be done." I cannot find words with which to express my gratitude to the session and the members of the congregation for giving me this rest and change. I am gaining strength rapidly and in God's good Providence expect soon to be back in the work that is so dear to me. My supreme desire while here is that I may get the strength not only physically but spiritually that will make me more useful to the congregation than I have ever yet been. I trust the annual meeting may be a very happy and satisfactory one and that we will all enter upon this new year with the earnest prayer that it may be the best we have ever had. Mr. C. B. Petry was appointed chairman, and Mr. A. D. Crooks secretary of the meeting.

The report of the Session was read by Mr. Andrew Jeffrey, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Crombie. Carried.

On motion of Mr. Creelman, seconded by Mr. Campbell the report of the managers was adopted.

Reports of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations of the church were presented, and it was decided that these, in addition to the reports of the Session and Managers, should be printed in pamphlet form and distributed among the members of the congregation.

On motion of Dr. Wishart, it was unanimously decided to send the following telegram to Dr. McTavish to be signed by the Clerk of Session and Chairman of the Board of Managers: "Annual meeting of congregation now in session, sends greetings and prays that by God's help your health may soon be restored."

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers for two years: Messrs. Donald Bain, A. H. Crawford, A. R. Creelman, A. D. Crooks, A. I. Forster, Wallace Maas, S. P. Miller and Thos. McMillan, Jr.

Votes of thanks were unanimously tendered to the members of the choir and to Mr. John Erskine, the acting auditor, for valuable services rendered during the past year; also to the ladies of the congregation for the pleasant social held under their auspices previous to the business meeting.

Mr. John Erskine was appointed auditor for the ensuing year.



## Report of Session.

---

It is with a feeling of deep gratitude the Session beg to present the report of 1899. It has on the whole, we think, been a very good year for the congregation in many ways. While we have lost some very valued members by death and removal, it has been our privilege to welcome an unusually large number into the fellowship of our church, and many of these are already proving very valuable helpers. Advance has been made in two or three directions. The Twentieth Century Fund, which was so enthusiastically adopted by the General Assembly in Hamilton last June, has been very cordially approved and active canvass will be made for it forthwith. A forward spiritual movement begun in our Presbytery has also been heartily approved by the Session. The interest taken by many in the prayer cards issued monthly, together with the interesting series of meetings held in November for prayer and conference, lead us to hope that the spirit of grace and supplication which is the sure precursor of rich blessing, is beginning to be poured out upon us. In Bible study a new and important advance has been made in the inauguration of the Home Department. It has in it the promise of much blessing and will, we hope, be warmly received by all the members. Arrangements have been made to unite our Elizabeth Street mission work with that carried on by the Mission Union, as both are covering much the same ground. The amalgamation will be completed as soon as the Mission Union buildings are altered and we sincerely hope the union will result in increasing interest on the part of this congregation and more effective work in our mission district.

Two more of our young people Rev. J. T. Taylor and Mrs. Taylor have joined the missionary force, having gone to enlarge the staff in Central India. Letters intimating their safe arrival and hearty welcome have been received. We receive hopeful and encouraging letters from our missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. N. H. Russell.

All departments of the church's work appear to have been carried on with faithfulness and efficiency and too much credit cannot be given to those who give so much valuable time and thought to the details of the work.

We hope that the new year upon which we enter may be characterized as the year of great blessing.

During the year 93 members have been received into the church—28 by profession of faith and 65 by certificate—while 44 were removed by certificate and 7 by death.

The Session removed from the roll a considerable number of names of those who have been absent from the communion for two years and longer, and the names now on the roll show a membership of 651.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has, as usual, been very well attended.

### Report of the Managers.

---

In presenting their report for the year past the managers are glad to say that in one very important particular it is the most satisfactory one submitted to the congregation for a number of years past. Year by year, without intermission, since 1890, the aggregate amount of the weekly offerings has declined, the lowest level having been reached in 1898, during which year the weekly average was less than \$100. In the past year the tide appears to have turned, the weekly average having been advanced to \$103.07; and in addition, the envelope contributions, as stated in another paragraph in this report, show at the beginning of 1900 a marked improvement over those of a year ago.

It will be seen, however, that the deficit has increased from \$275 at the beginning, to \$446 at the close of the year. This is easily explained. In the early part of the year, certain necessary improvements were made to the school-room, lecture-room, parlor, vestry, and the halls adjoining, so that these apartments now present a clean and attractive appearance. In addition, new carpets have been provided for the parlor and vestry, some repairs made to furniture, and one of the furnaces reconstructed. The cost of these improvements, with the usual small repairs, amounts as shown to \$361.

A few other items of expense were higher than usual during the year, such as the fire insurance premium, which is payable every three years, and the cost of maintaining the District Mission work on Elizabeth Street. On the other hand, the interest charge was less on Elizabeth St. On the other hand, the interest charge was less than in any former year, while the income from the ordinary weekly offerings and from special contributions was more than in the previous year. It should be borne in mind however, that there were fifty-three Sundays in 1899. If the weekly offerings continue to improve, there is every probability that the congregation will be in an excellent position financially at the end of 1900.

There are now on the contribution list the names of 236 members and adherents, giving weekly the sum of \$85.45, against 218 members, giving \$82.12 the previous year. The amounts contributed are as follows:

At a meeting of the congregation, held at the close of last year, an important decision relative to the District Mission work of the Church was arrived at. It was represented that, for various reasons, the best interests of all concerned would be served by the Central Church entering into an arrangement whereby the work might be continued jointly with the Toronto Mission Union. This view commended itself to the congregation, and accordingly a resolution was adopted, directing the Session to make the change, and instructing the Managers to sell the building on Elizabeth Street in due time to the best advantage. It is likely, therefore, that this property and the corresponding mortgage thereon will, in the near future, cease to be represented in the accounts of the Church.

The following Managers retire by rotation, and are eligible for re-election: Messrs. Bain, Burns, Crawford, Creelman, Forster, McIntosh, McMillan and Crooks.

Our Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. J. W. Walker, resigned and was succeeded by Mr. Alexander Bell.

### The Ladies' Aid Society.

The meetings of the Society have not been attended as well as in former years, an average attendance of twelve being the record for the year. Twelve meetings were held during the year, eleven being regular and one an emergency meeting. In the beginning of the year the meetings were held once a month, and later once a fortnight, with the exception of the summer months when no meetings were held. The ladies who have taken an interest in the work of the Society trust that in the coming year, the attendance will largely increase, and that more interest in its activities will be manifested in the future than in the past.

At the beginning of the year, it was found that quite a supply of clothing was on hand, for distribution among the poor, and later that the demand for it was not so great as in other years, consequently no further articles were made up until quite recently, when the wants of a few families made a demand on the ladies of the Society. As in former years the Society has been the medium for giving food, clothing and fuel to those in want, and in the case of one aged woman who has been dependent on the Society for a number of years, it has been necessary to give not only pecuniary help, but a great deal of thought and patience in providing for her. In the month of June last, she left the Aged Woman's Home, where she had been for a number of years, and a room was rented for her; this she occupied for only a short time as in the month of October she had to be removed to the General Hospital, for an operation of a serious nature; she is now ready to leave the Hospital, and the Society is making arrangements for her future accommodation. The Mothers' Meetings hitherto carried on, in connection with the District Mission work, were continued this winter, though they were a little late in beginning, owing to an uncertainty as to whether the proposed amalgamation with the Toronto Mission Union was to be affected before the opening of the season; it is understood that when this proposed union becomes an accomplished fact, provision will be made for the continuance of these meetings under the direction of the Society as in the past.

The thanks of the Society are due to those members of the congregation, who have so kindly contributed money, clothing and food to be distributed among those who, to some extent, are looking to it for help. Apart from the Society, material assistance has been given to the same persons, by members of the church, so that both directly and indirectly, the Society has been instrumental in alleviating no

little distress among a few worthy families connected either with the congregation or the Mission on Elizabeth Street.

In closing this report, a cordial invitation is given to all the ladies of the congregation to be present at the meetings of the Society, or such of them as they may find it convenient to attend. More good could be accomplished if a larger interest in the workings of the Society were manifested by the congregation, and it is surely an important work of the church, to extend the helping hand to those in need of assistance.

### "Jennings" Auxiliary, W.F.M.S.

In presenting the nineteenth annual report of our Auxiliary, we do so with hearts filled with gratitude to our Heavenly Father, for the continued interest, and increased prosperity which have attended our efforts.

During the year twelve meetings were held, instead of eleven as formerly, with an average attendance of twenty-six members. These meetings were ably presided over by several members of the Executive Committee.

Our present membership numbers sixty-nine. Thirty-seven belong to the general Society, six to the Auxiliary, and twenty-six are life members, two of these were added during the year, Mrs. John Ferguson, Isabella Street and Dr. Margaret O'Hara, Dhar, India, the latter by Miss McIntosh, in loving memory of her departed mother. Death has again invaded our ranks, and taken two of our loved ones. Mrs. Stewart, an aged member of this Auxiliary, and Mrs. D. McIntosh, one of our "Scattered Helpers." While we mourn their loss we rejoice to know they have passed on to the "rest that remaineth for the people of God."

We must also note the removal from our midst of two of our most valued and loved members, Mrs. Scott and Mrs. Ross of the "Ewart Training Home," the former to Port Perry, the later to Ottawa. We miss the helpful addresses and wise counsel of these ladies, and pray that God's richest blessings may follow them.

\$93.80 was received for our annual thank-offering held in October.

Instead of giving the usual contributions of money and clothing for the North-West, we complied with the request of the General Society, to clothe George Ayatashayo of the Mistawasis school, for the year.

There are eleven "Scattered Helpers" who have contributed \$13.42.

One hundred and twenty contributors enjoy the "Foreign Missionary Tidings" each month, and are thus kept in touch with the missions at home and abroad.

We are greatly indebted for bright and stimulating addresses from the following ladies: Mrs. Jas. Duff and Mrs. Knight of the "China Inland Mission"; Mrs. Smith of India, who has been with us for some time; Mrs. Ross, then of the "Ewart Training Home;" Mrs. Jeffrey, our North-West Secretary; Mrs. John Harvie; and Mrs. Hodgskin of Deer Park; also from the well-prepared papers, showing marked ability, from several of our members.

The total amount contributed was \$251.75, which we are pleased to note is an increase of \$66.38, over the previous year.

As we reach the closing year of the nineteenth century, the old warning "Time Flies" strikes upon our ears, urging us forward to achieve greater things for the Master in the future than we have done in the past, and thus help to prepare the way for His coming in glory, by sending the Gospel to every creature.

### Girls' Mission Band.

---

In giving the report of the Girls' Mission Band for the past year we are glad to say that it has been carried on with a degree of success.

During the year seventeen meetings have been held with an average attendance of twenty-nine.

From January to June Mrs. Ross and Mrs. Jeffrey instructed the girls about the early missionaries, among others, Zinzendorf, Swenty, Carey the first English missionary to India and Alex. Duff. These lessons were accompanied by a short lesson on India every meeting day, and the work being done there. Since September the work has been chiefly about China.

We were very sorry to lose our vice-president, Mrs. Ross, as she was a great help to the Band, and we hope that in her new field of labor, those connected with her may be as much benefited as we were.

Our contributions to the North-West this year were larger than ever before, consisting of two nice quilts, work-bags, scrap-books, marble-bags, a dozen dolls beautifully dressed, and many other little things dear to the hearts of the Indian girls and boys.

Our thank-offering meeting was held in October and the amount then contributed was \$3.94.

The offering from our box amounted to \$17.01.

The fees contributed amounted to \$11.75.

We have had twenty new members added to the roll during the past year, and our present membership is forty-three.

## Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor.

In reporting the work of the Society for the past year, while there has been no particularly marked advance, we feel that there has been in the individual life, that spirit of consecration which we trust will be still more manifest in active endeavor and loving service in the church of which we form a part.

We are pleased to note that those whose earnest lives and untiring efforts have been such a stimulus to the Society, in thus blessing others, have themselves been fitted for still fuller service. There are now on our roll, 94 active, 13 honorary, 8 corresponding, making a total of 115 members.

Nearly all our members are actively engaged in some branch of mission work as teachers in the church and mission Sabbath Schools, also Central Prison; tract distribution, personal visitation, open air meetings, and other departments of its work.

We feel confident that one of the features which we most desire developed in our young people, is being realized; through the monthly meeting reserved specially for missionary thought and study.

At each of these, varied topics are suggested, and it has been our privilege to hear directly from those engaged in the work, thus increasing a more definite and personal interest in that particular field.

One of the most important events of our work has been the forming of a missionary library, consisting of some forty books of the best missionary intelligence which could be obtained, a librarian being in charge fifteen minutes before the services on Wednesday and Sunday evenings. We hope to have still more of our members avail themselves of this privilege, that in the circulation of these, the missionary spirit may be more increased in our midst.

During the past year, two of our members, Rev. J. T. and Mrs. Taylor, whose preparation time was spent within the life and interest of the Endeavor Society, and whose consecration pledge "Whatever He would like to have me do," has been fulfilled, are now engaged in mighty conflict amidst the powers of darkness in India; linked in living union to the One who says: "All power is given unto Me."

The Society has, this past year, contributed to the Russell Mission Fund in India \$110.60.

The Temperance and Good Literature Committee have done excellent work in the distribution of tracts, etc., not only in the city, but to various Home mission fields, where they are much appreciated.



They have also been actively engaged in work for the Lord's Day Alliance, and report from the congregation, 104 members and amount collected \$135.25.

The congregation's liberal response to the pound offering planned for Christmas eve, enabled the Society to distribute forty-two baskets of provisions to the needy in the mission district, and many homes were made glad by these gifts.

### Elizabeth Street Mission Workers' Association

(Including all its branches.)

The opportunities for service in connection with the Mission have again closed and with the completion of another year comes the realization of many failures. During the first half of the year the work was carried on as usual but as it has been thought for some time that mission work in St. John's ward was overlapping, negotiations were opened with the Mission Union with a view to amalgamation. The workers considered the matter but on account of lack of accommodation in their building for our Sabbath School, it has not yet been accomplished.

In consequence of this unsettled state, definite organization was impossible and some parts of the work are at a stand still.



We had hoped that Mr. Taylor would be able to continue in connection with us for at least part of the summer but this could not be, on account of his appointment to India.

In September we said good-bye to Mr. and Mrs. Taylor with the earnest prayer that God would abundantly bless them in their new field of labor and give them souls for their hire.

In May Mr. Armstrong took charge; and workers and people appreciate deeply his earnest, faithful labors for the best interests of the work.

The Sabbath evening services have been small owing, somewhat, to the change in the district; Italians and Jews taking the place of the English speaking people.

The Thursday evening meeting has not been very encouraging; the attendance being small.

The Sabbath School is one of the most important branches of the work; the average attendance being larger than last year.

The Mothers' Meeting is still a source of help and profit to those who attend.

The Girls' Sewing Class has been carried on as usual, but not quite so large as last year.

The Girls' Own Circle united with the Mission Union who have a similar service on Thursday evening.

The open air services closed in September and no cottage meetings have as yet been opened.

The meeting for boys and girls was discontinued as there was one of the same nature in the Mission Union on Monday evening.

The Tract Society continues to do good work; and if we had more distributors the cross streets could be taken up also as the other missions are doing nothing in that line.

#### SABBATH EVENING SERVICE.

The Sabbath evening services have been carried on with varying success and failure: during the winter the attendance averaged from eighty to one hundred but in the summer months it decreased considerably. For this reason picture talks were introduced, illustrating the life of David, and for a time the attendance was larger.

Mr. Armstrong has had charge of the work since May and his earnest, faithful labors will, we are sure, bring forth fruit to the glory of God.

#### THURSDAY EVENING MEETINGS.

These meetings have been small, those who attend being mostly Christians, and the subjects taken up were such as would be helpful to them.

They have somewhat improved lately as a number of the young men come in rather than stand on the streets in the cold. During the summer Mr. Armstrong, and later Mr. Robb, have conducted these services.

#### COTTAGE AND OPEN AIR MEETINGS,

No more encouraging work has been undertaken than the open air meetings which were held on the corner of Elizabeth and Louisa Streets every Tuesday evening during the summer months. The attendance was excellent, the attention marked, the people quiet and respectful. This is a work which seldom shows definite results, but the seed sown in His name must bring forth fruit. Mr. Robb, Mr. Arnold of the City Mission and others assisted.

In connection with this the ladies of the Church of the Covenant had a circulating library for the children which gave great pleasure.

Owing to the unsettled state of the work in view of the amalgamation, no cottage meetings have been opened.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL.

With regard to our work we cannot speak about definite results with any degree of confidence. On the part of some of our scholars we do feel that the lessons we have studied together during the past year have proved a blessing to our boys and girls. The result has been the formation of a class for instruction in the Word of God and for prayer, meeting on Wednesday night from 7.30 to 9 o'clock, which is very well attended and great interest taken in the work. This work is in the charge of Dr. Skinner and Miss Pearson.

We had our usual summer outing to Lorne Park on June 24th, and Christmas tree on December 29th, at both of which a very pleasant and profitable time was spent, and our thanks are due to the kind friends who assisted us with money, provisions, books for prizes and printing anniversary hymns.

The average attendance per quarter was 131, 118, 85, and 90 respectively, the first two quarters showing an increase of 20 over the previous year and the last two quarters a decrease of 14 below the previous year.

The average attendance of teachers for the year was 21, total average of scholars and teachers was 127, an increase of 11 over the previous year. The falling off of attendance during the last two quarters was due to the very unsettled state of affairs re amalgamation.

We are deeply grateful to the Ladies' Aid Society for their sympathy and interest in the work, also the individual members who so generously contributed in various ways, to the carrying on of our work. Our earnest prayer is, that as we teach these children how to be useful with their hands, we may impress on hearts and lives lessons which will be far reaching in their results, and tend to uplift and fit them for spheres of future usefulness. Some of the girls seem very anxious to live a better and more helpful life and we trust there may be much fruit from the little seeds sown at these little meetings.

## YOUNG MEN'S WORK.

The work in this department had its real origin when the Bible Class was organized on the last Sunday in June, 1898—eighteen months ago.

A constitution was adopted and officers elected. The average attendance for the first six months was seven, and the total contributions \$15.00.



The young men wished to have a week night meeting, so, having made the necessary arrangements in regard to room, night of meeting, etc., we opened on the second Wednesday in January last, and continued every week until the end of April.

Mr. Geo. Best was elected Secretary and a chairman was elected each month. Messrs. Lee, Mason, Kennedy, Marsh and Thackery acting in turn.

The programme consisted of singing, an address and a Bible lesson.

The subjects chosen were sometimes ethical and sometimes scientific. In these as well as in the scriptural lessons we were assisted by Messrs. Gordon, Bruce and Forbes, Miss Clarkson and others.

The interest was not less at the close of the season than at its beginning and the average attendance was fourteen.

There were two receptions for young men held—one in October, 1898, at which thirty-five young men were present and one in November, 1899—both of which were presided over by a member of the class.

In March a sleighing party was decided upon and carried out on wheels in spite of rain and mud, to the residence of Mr. R. Mears, Merton Street, North Toronto, where a most cordial welcome was given to the fifteen young men and the workers who were their guests.

This fall a request was made that we should have an evening for study and although the use of the room was granted at the fall meeting of the Mission Workers' Association for three nights a week, we did not get started until the second week in November owing to the indefiniteness existing in regard to the place of meeting and for the same reason we did not like to add the two extra nights but tried to combine our lectures and study classes as well, but found after two meetings, at which Dr. Bradshaw gave the first of a course she promised us on "Hygiene;" and Dr. Macdonald began his series of "Prompt aid to the injured" by taking up the emergencies relating to the circulation, that we could not do justice to either one or the other and as some of the young men were working almost every night until Christmas, we decided to leave the lectures over until the new year. Now, however, the young men have requested us to give them the lectures and two nights of study each week until the Mission closes, and we would like to begin next week.

The average attendance has been ten.

This work is really one with our Bible Class work, and that of course, is a part of the Sunday School, and the report will appear with that, but we have some who attend Bible Class who do not come out on Wednesday evenings and vice versa. The number of names on



the Bible Class roll is twenty, average attendance for past year seven and total contributions for class and school purposes during the past eighteen months has been \$50.

We have the honor of being represented in the Transvaal at the present time by Mr. P. Dineen, and one of our members, Mr. Geo. Wallis has been chosen for Her Majesty's service in the Canadian Mounted Rifles and will soon be en route for the seat of war.

We gave \$2.00 from our class funds, and it was made up to \$5.00 among the young men and sent on to him at Kingston as a testimonial of our friendship and a token of our good wishes.
