ON THE EVE OF BLOCKADE

Three of Their Submarines Reported Damaged by Bombs From Airships

Britain Now Expected to Prevent Food Supplies Reaching Germany by Water--Rewards to British Trawlers For Aid in Sinking of Enemy's War Vessels

London, Feb. 17—With her naval plans completed to meet the submarine campaign which Germany will launch against her tomorrow, England awaited the issue today with all calmness confident in her ability not only to ward off the German attacks, but also to effect a blockade of the German coast that will shorten the war.

Rejoicing over the latest successful raid of the British aviation corps upon a German naval base at Zeebrugge was increased today by reports that the combs dropped by the aeroplanes had seriously damaged three .German .sub-arines. Advices to this effect were received from Amsterdam, the despatches so stating that it will be impossible for the Germans to repair these submar-

ines at Zeebrugge.

The attack upon Zeebrugge are taken here today as the answer of the government to the German proposal of compromise.

The next active step is expected to be the establishment of a blockade of the German coast that will prevent any food supplies reaching Germany by







THE LITERACY TEST.

While the literacy test in the Burnett immigration bill was vetoed by President Wilson, and his veto sustained by the house of representatives, the question is by no means settled. Representative Burnett announced that he would introduce another immigration restriction bill immediately after the next congress convenes. The vote in the house to over-ride the president's veto was 261 to 186, but a two-thirds vote was necessary. If four of shose voting nay had voted in the affirmative the bill would have been carried over the president's veto. One of the speakers, supporting the bill and replying to a contention that the American people liad never passed upon the subject, pointed out that the literacy test was not new, but had been fully considered by the people. In President Cleveland's time a commission reported unanimously in favor of restricted immigration, and eight out of the nine commissioners advocated the adoption of a literacy test. Congress enacted such a law, but it was vetoed by President Cleveland. A similar law was vetoed by President Taft, and now another has been vetoed by President Wilson. The literacy test in the Burnett bill provided that "all aliens over sixteen years of age, physically capable of reading, who cannot read the English



Britain To Tighten The Grip

London, Feb. 16, 10.20 p. m.—Great Britain received today, through and a never-rester withdraw her threat of a submarine blockade against Great Britain if the British navy would permit the free movement of foodstuffs to the civil population of Gerisa the body back

There is no expectation here that the offer will be accepted. In fact, Great Britain already is preparing to retaliate against Germany by placing under more stringent control ships destined to German ports, and a proclamation momentarily is expected, declaring a blockade of the German coast, or, at any rate, the prohibition of foodstuffs destined for Germany. The cabinet, with its naval and military advisers, considered this question today, and it is understood the decision is awaiting the formal confirmation of the Privy Council, from which all proclamations emanate.


