Fortier, Quebec, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, in his annual review of conditions in the Dominion delivered before the annual meeting of

Mr. Fortier stated that during the autumn months and December and January improvement in a number of departments of national activity, was evident, but in February and March a reaction set in, many factories went on short time, and the present outlook for industry and business, while retaining some encouraging factors is not nearly so satisfactory as expected. Mr. Roden reported a net surplus for the year of \$3,409.98. Total membership nees for the year had been \$200,271.50 and cost of operation \$208,242.48, leaving a deficit of \$7,970.88. Against this however, had been sent the profit from "Industrial Canada" of \$2,451.49 profit from the "Canadian Trade Index" of \$2,056.81, and interest from investments of \$6,872.66. We Have Precious Few Real Fathers and Mothers These Days-Too Many Parents are Quitters, Passing Their Work Over to Church and School and Club-But No Substitute Has Yet Been Found for Personal Love and Guidance in Rearing Children.

IT IS apparent to every one that parenthood isn't functioning as it should.

The younger generation has scarpped the biblical injunction to "Honor thy father and thy mother," along with hoop skirts and stocks and pegtop trousers and other obsolete fashions. If there was an infant left that obeyed its parents, it would be in a glass case in a museum with the relics of prehistoric man, and we would be paying out good money to behold the quaint freak.

It is the children now who rule the home, and of whom the parents stand in awe and fear. It is the children who are in authority, not the parents, and everywhere you go you hear fathers and mothers complaining that some youngster of 9 or 10 has gotten completely beyond their control, and that they can't do a thing with Sally or Bobby.

have precious few real fathers and mothers, and nobody yet has invented any satisfactory, synthetic substitute for real personal love and tenderness in dealing with children.

You can't properly rear children with your left hand and one lobe of your brain while you are devoting your right hand and all of your real intelligence to playing bridge or golf, or having a career, or making money, and that is what only too many parents are doing today. Why, half of the modern children have only the fraction of a mother, and, except for purposes of legitimacy, they might as well have no father at all!

MOTHER hustles them off to school in the morning, and when they come home she is out gadding the streets, or at a party, and so they also take to the streets, where, at the most formative time of their lives, they learn the manners and the morals of the street. Father means nothing but a cash register in their young lives. Home is only a place you go to when you can't go anywhere else, and the bedtime talks are done by radio, not by a mother who bends above a pillow, and to whom a little heart opens out in the dark, and tells its shy little hopes and dreams and aspirations.

How can the mother who has never made herself necessary to her children, who has never made her arms a refuge for them in times of trouble, or let them weep out their sorrows on her breast; who has let the children next door form their ideals instead of doing it herself, expect to have any hold over them when they are grown?

How can a man whose children are not even acquainted with him, who have never had a real, familiar talk with him in their lives, expect them to look to him for guidance when they get to the place where they need it most? Why, he is the strangest man in all the world to them—the one with whom they have least in common. And they could sooner tell their troubles to the policeman on the beat than to him.

IS IT the children's fault that they feel this way toward their fathers and mothers? Not a bit of it. It is the parents' fault. They had their chance to bind their children to them with hoops of steel when they were little. They had their opportunity to win their children's confidences when they were babies, and they were too busy with their own affairs, too much occupied with their own amusements, too selfish to take the trouble to do

There are too many mothers who park their babies out with anybody they can get to mind them while they jazz. Too many fathers playing golf on Saturday afternoons, instead of taking the boys on a hike or going fishing with them. Too many parents who are quitters, who are trying to pass the buck and make the church and the school, and the Boy Scouts and the Camplire Girls do their work of rearing their children, instead of doing it themselves.

THAT is one of the things that is the matter with parents. They are

Another thing that is the matter with parents is that they haven't any backbone.

THEY haven't the nerve to refuse their children anything, even when they know it is going to be their ruination. They see their children headed straight for disaster, and they wail and beat on their breast, but they don't try to stop them.

They make their children soft by overindulgence, and they excuse themselves for doing so by saying that when they were children they had to work and deny themselves. They never seem to realize that the very hardships that they went through strengthened the muscles of their souls, and made them the kind of men and women who have been able to achieve success through sheer grit and courage.

SO THESE people who have not the courage to say "No" to their children—who give high-powered cars to 16 and 17-year-old girls and boys, and fill their pockets with money, and who have brought them up to believe that their will is law—rear up the pampered, selfish, weak, wasters and spenders who fill the divorce courts, and furnish scandal headlines for newspapers, and who wreck their own lives and the lives of all of those who are connected with them.

Weakness. That is another of the things that is the matter with parents. We need fathers and mothers who will teach children obedience and self-denial, and a sense of duty; strong parents who will hold wandering little feet in the straight and narrow path until they get old enough to realize for themselves that the only true happiness in life is to be found in walking along it.





The acceptance of a bribe or gratuity of a customs officer for the neglect or non performance of his duty, should be prosecuted to the full extent of the law and convictions should be punished by imprisonment without the option of a fine, and in addition a fine, it is suggested. The person offering the bribe should be subject to the same penalty.

The statement recommends that thorough search of vehicles entering Canada should be made at bridges and main highways, and also at ferries. Where articles containing precious metals are seized and forfeited they should not be allowed to be sold but should be sent to the Royal Mint, melted down and the value remitted to the customs department.

A recommendation that the customs department station an officer in each factory at Rock Island and in other similarly situated border towns whose duty it shall be to see that foreign

similarly situated border towns whose duty it shall be to see that foreign goods enter the factory premises through a regular established customs port of entry, is made. Reconsideration by the Minister of Customs with a view to putting into effect the provisions of the customs act in cases where seizures were made against firms operating at Rock Island, is recommended. Buildings which are made use of in smuggling operations should be removed to within a hundred yards of the boundary. There should be a detail of mounted police on night duty at Rock Island

AMENDMENTS SUGGESTED Amendments to the customs act are suggested in the statement. It complains that in dealing with the matter of smuggling, and under valuation, the Department of Customs has preferred to deal with all scizure matters departmentally, and has not, until quite recently, availed itself of the penalty clauses act. The act should be amended so as to require the Department to take proceedings against offenders through the courts in all cases of wholesale smuggling, and under valuation. There should be differentization between what might be termed petty or casual smugshould be differentization between what might be termed petty or casual smuggling and wholesale or commercial smuggling. In all cases where the amount involved in a seizure is \$200 or over, the matter should be referred to the courts. In the case of petty smuggling, or other frauds, where the value of the goods is under two hundred dollars, the department should have the option of disposing of the case departmentally or referring it to the courts.
