Presentations at Meeting of L. O. B. A. At a meeting of Dominion Lodge, No. 18, L. O. B. A., in Orange Hall, St. John's, last evening, Mrs. A. MacKinnon, Most Worshipful Mistress, presided. Mrs. Taylor, Supreme Grand Chaplain, who has just returned from Whinnipeg, where she attended the grand lodge meetings, reported a very good session. Mrs. B. Baird, of Colton Lodge, and Mrs. H. V. Currie of Reagon Lodge, were on the platform. Two new members were made welcome.

Two From St. John in the Number; One From Fredericton. School Closing After Successful Term—Exhibition of the Work.

Certificates of qualification as teachers for vocational night schools in dressmaking, millinery, home-planning and similar subjects will be given to three young women who were attending the training school closing today in the St. John High School building.

Those passing their course are Miss Mary Boyle, of St. John; Miss Mary Mullin, of St. John; and Miss Cecily Gallagher, of Fredericton. These certificates are good for three years and may be renewed by another term at a training school. The object of the renewal is to keep the night school teachers in touch with the latest in their work.

The school here has been in session since July 4 in charge of Miss Sarah Barnett, provincial superintendent of the home economics department, who has supervised the training of all the pupils in both theoretical and practical work.

Miss Mary Henleigh Brown has been in charge of the millinery department, teaching hatmaking and novelty work. Besides the millinery, Miss Brown gave a course in home-ecology and budget-making, showing the methods of furnishing a house of a given size and of living and saving money on a specified income. Some very interesting examples of this work were shown as well as some very pretty hats made by the tradespeople taking the millinery teaching course.

The dress-making and color harmony classes were in charge of Miss Millicent M. Coak. This department included the making of clothing from the pattern to the finished product, showing the various pieces of work to be shown. The color harmony work included the making and use of color charts and the theory behind them.

The school will have no formal closing but a public exhibition of the work done in the various branches is being held in three of the rooms on the ground floor of the High School this afternoon from 4 to 6 o'clock. Of special interest is the work in which the pupils of the training school were given practical lessons in teaching a number of city women. The work done by these women under the supervision of the pupils is remarkably good, especially when it is remembered that the time for the course was very short. The need for night schools, teaching subjects like those of the school was declared to be shown by the number of applications received from women in the city anxious to attend it. It was reported that in the daytime it was reported that there were thirty-three tradespeople making the teacher-training courses, fifteen first year students, seven second year students, three third year students and eight home-ecology students renewing their courses. The department for city women had thirty-one enrolments, twenty for a course in millinery and eleven for dressmaking. These women were present as pupils for the practical training of the night school teachers taking the teacher training course and were given some very helpful lessons.

Striking Sydney Steel Men Vote To Resume Work

TWO HAPPY EVENTS AT GOLDEN GROVE

Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Harrington of Golden Grove were pleasantly surprised last evening when about forty relatives and friends gathered at their home in honor of the fortieth anniversary of their wedding. They were received with the hospitality which has always marked this respected household and all had a jolly time with a bounteous repast, music and dancing. A feature that all appreciated was an old-time song sung by the groom of 1883. The presentation of a china tea set to Mr. and Mrs. Harrington proved a delightful part of the evening's proceedings. Miss Elsie Stephenson was tendered a surprise and novelty shower on Tuesday evening by a large number of friends and relatives at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Stephenson, Upper Golden Grove. More than 100 useful and valuable gifts were presented to Miss Stephenson. Among them were silver, cut glass, aluminum, pyrex and a dinner and tea set presented by the young people of the community. Refreshments were served and a very enjoyable evening was spent in dancing. Miss Stephenson's many friends join in wishing her much future happiness. In a fight among the colored members of the crew of the steamer Sheafmunt at Montreal yesterday Said Salem, a Hindu from Bombay, was killed. Hosain Cossum, another Hindu, is being held by the police and is said to have admitted the crime.

Strong Condemnation Voiced in Resolution Passed by Workers.

Sydney, N. S., Aug. 1.—By the terms of a resolution passed this evening at a meeting of the steel workers at Union headquarters about sixty-five per cent. of the striking steel men voted to return to work and the officers of the Union were authorized to notify the company to that effect. The resolution carried strong condemnation of the people, courts, police, newspapers, Provincial and Federal Governments for the stand taken by them and complained that every man's hand was against the strikers. The steel company announced today that out of about 3,450 men normally employed at the plant some 2,500 were now working. The strike of the steel men has lasted since June 27. They struck for a twenty per cent. increase in wages and the introduction of the "check-off" system which would involve recognition of their union. The resolution adopted at tonight's meeting reads: "Whereas, the steel workers of the British Empire Steel Corporation, having struck work on June 27, 1923, for the purpose of enforcing their demands for a living wage and a check-off of union dues, neither of which matters the corporation was prepared to negotiate before the strike but refused unconditionally; "And since the strike commenced the workers have been fought by all the power of Federal and Provincial Governments, the corporation and the Provincial Government have misrepresented us to the public, so that the impression is abroad that we are a lawless band of destructionists misled by a few so-called Reds, instead of loyal citizens of Canada trying to obtain decent living conditions for ourselves and our families. "Our funds having been exhausted, some of our low paid members have been driven to return to work by the threat of starvation to their families. "Every one's hand is against us in our effort to obtain enough food to sustain our wives and families and enough clothing to allow our children to go to school. "Be it resolved, therefore, that we return to work although none of our grievances are disposed of, but on the contrary, are carried on to the future, and many of our best workmen will, probably, as in the past, be unable to obtain work in the industries of Cape Breton and so must leave this country. "Be it further resolved, that the officials of our union forthwith notify the corporation that this strike is now ended."

**Greenwich Village  
Cafes to Be Locked**

Injunction Sought Against Seven Resorts for Alleged Violations of Prohibition Law.

New York, Aug. 2.—The "bohemian" life of Greenwich Village is threatened with extinction as the result of a movement launched by the United States Attorney with the co-operation of the Federal Prohibition Director. The preliminary groundwork for injunction proceedings, whereby the Federal authorities will try to padlock seven of the best known resorts in Greenwich Village as repeated violators of the Volstead act and the Eighteenth Amendment, was laid by Assistant United States Attorney Sanford H. Cohen, in charge of injunction proceedings in the office of the United States Attorney, Colonel William Hayward.

Assistant Attorney Cohen filed complaints in the Federal District Court against the seven establishments on the basis of evidence gathered by Prohibition Agents and special agents of the United States Attorney. The complaints charge the establishments as public nuisances because of repeated violations of the prohibition law and ask for a decree closing them for one year.

In each complaint the proprietor is charged with selling intoxicating liquor and violating the Volstead act. The search for evidence was carried on quietly for several weeks, and to avoid suspicion the prohibition agents made no arrests and took no other action until the Federal authorities were ready for the general round-up, which resulted in yesterday's complaints.

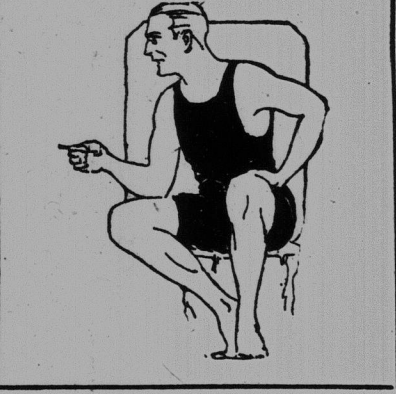

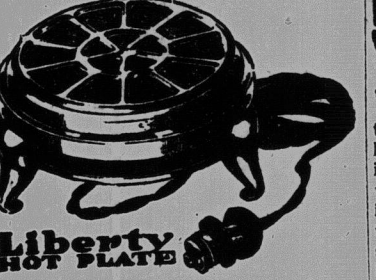

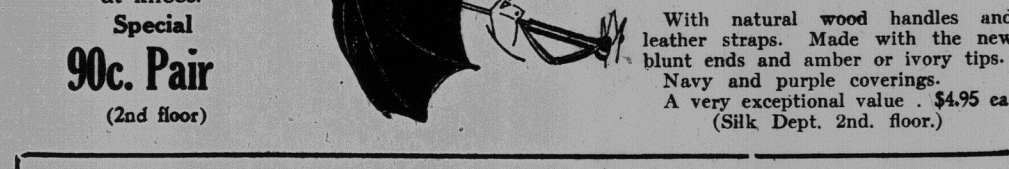

### Chief of Nurses Given Authority to Promote

#### Hospital Board Deals With the Matter of Resignations

#### Record Number of Cases Treated in G. P. H. Outdoor Dept.

A new policy of promotion to fill vacancies caused by the resignation of those higher up on the nursing staff, will obtain in the General Public Hospital, henceforth, as the result of a resolution passed at a meeting of Commissioners last evening, giving the superintendent of nurses authority to appoint hospital graduates and senior nurses, as head nurses. This arose out of the resignation of three of the head nurses because of holiday time reduction and the course was said to be decided on as a protest against employing expensive trained nurses and also to encourage good work among the members of the nursing staff.

The matter of affiliation with the County Hospital in order to give the nurses an opportunity to receive training for tubercular patients, was also under consideration. Miss Murdoch, superintendent of nurses said that if the affiliation went through, she would have to have four more nurses in train-

ing. She said that a class of twelve probationers would be entered in the Hospital on September 1.

As there was no time to deal with the matter of the new bye laws, the meeting was adjourned to meet again on Monday evening, to take up this matter.

The average number of patients, during the month, was slightly lower than in previous months.

M. E. Agar presided and others present at the meeting were Commissioners Mrs. J. V. McLellan, W. E. Emerson, Dr. R. J. Crawford, J. L. O'Brien and J. King Kelley. Miss Trentowsky acted as secretary in the absence of the superintendent, H. H. Gale.

Minutes of a special meeting that were approved, authorized appointment of Miss Elizabeth S. Bunnell as dietician, following Miss M. E. Hanson's resignation, and contained a draft of new by-laws.

The superintendent's report contained statistics telling of seventy-five operations in the operating room and ninety-seven in the out-door department. The large number of tonsil and adenoid cases among school children had brought up the number of out-door patient operations to so high a figure. The number of treatments given in the outdoor department was 644, a record figure.

## LIKELY TO AWAIT FINAL JUDGMENT

### Building Inspector Speaks of Court Decision re Mayor's Repair Work.

That he had not been notified that judgment was to be delivered and had no official notification as yet of the finding of the court was a statement made this morning by the building inspector, James Carleton, when asked if he had yet issued a permit for repairs to Mayor Fisher's building in Charlotte street. Yesterday afternoon Mr. Teed had called at his office and told him the court had decided the Mayor had a right to repair the building and requested that a permit be issued, but he had no notice from the court.

Questioned as to his intentions in the matter, Mr. Carleton said he did not think he would issue an permit until the final judgment had been given two weeks hence.

Mayor Fisher won the first round of the dispute with the building inspector as the right to repair the building damaged last winter by fire, when Mr. Justice White yesterday ruled that under the building regulations he had a right to repair the structure.

He ruled against the contention that a permit was not necessary for repairs, finding that no work could proceed without that document. He also found the building inspector was in error in refusing to grant a permit when it was asked for after attaching such conditions as he deemed necessary to ensure safety.

Final judgment was set for 15 days from yesterday to give the building inspector an opportunity to issue the permit and attach the conditions the law provides for without the court delivering judgment on this point.

## J. S. GREGORY IS WITNESS TODAY

### Arbitration Proceedings that Involve a Claim of \$74,000.

Arbitration proceedings were continued this morning in the Equity Court rooms in the matter of a claim of J. S. Gregory against the North End Nail Co., to determine the amount payable to him for improvements upon his wharf properties in the North End. He is claiming in various items a total of about \$74,000. Mr. Gregory, on being recalled to the stand this morning, said that he had been in business on the properties in question from 1902 until 1923. He described in detail the enterprises in which he had been interested, and what part of the properties were connected with the carrying on of his business.

Taking the statement of claim, the witness was asked to tell in detail, upon what it was based, and then to tell in a few words as possible, the actual work done. He then outlined all the permanent repairs and construction which had been effected during the time he was in possession of the property. There was some interesting data in respect to the relative value of labor, and materials of construction between 1902 and 1906, when the work was done, and at the present time.

At the time of adjournment for lunch the details of the permanent repairs and structural improvements to both the Portland wharf and the Portland yard wharf, had been gone into thoroughly.

W. H. Harrison, C. C., and H. A. Powers, K. C., appeared for Mr. Gregory, and Dr. J. B. M. Baxter and J. D. F. Lewin for the company.
