San Francisco, Aug. 20—A new transpacific wireless as well as a proposed cable system is under consideration by American and Japanese business interests, according to Kakachi Uchida, a former Japanese vice-minister of communications, who arrived here yesterday in the interest of the projected cable and will meet business men in San Francisco and New York to promote formation of a company to assume approximately half of the \$25,000,000 expenditure proposed for the new system. ## THE PUBLIC HEALTH.

The Canadian Official Record warns the people of Canada that an insidious effort is being made "in the name of religion" to frustrate health regulations and retard the work of health authorities and others to improve conditions generally. This propaganda is not only being carried on in Canada but in other countries as well, and those behind it are declared to be pursuing their "ne-farious and deadly" work with energy

The most recent manifestation of this "cult," says the Record, was the introduction into the State Legislature of Minnesota of a Bill the purpose of which was to prohibit compulsory medi-cal examination and treatment, except in certain cases, without the consent of the persons involved, or, in the case of minors, without the consent of parents or guardians. This bill was defeated, but it was startling in the provisions it proposed. Therefore the public is cautioned, says the Record, against "a movement of this kind by which the physical examination of cases of cominicable disease, even in epidemic form, or the powerful agent of quarantine itself, would be prohibited and penalized. # URGES BRITAIN TO

British Banking Institution Sends Significant Circular to Share-

New York, Aug. 20—In view of a further decline in Russian external bonds in the local security market the following statement by the management of the British Bank for Foreign Trade to its stockholders on the Russian situation is of interest as expressing the views of English financiers:

"The shareholders will recognize the inadvisability of realizing our Russian holdings at prevailing quotations and they will also see that dividends cannot be distributed until the capital value of such securities is re-established. Newspaper accounts of Russian affairs lay stress upon the terrible civil conflict which afflicts the people. Nevertheless, the fighting appears to be confined to forces numbering hundreds of thousands at most, and returning travelers speak of millions of peasants and industrial workers who are pursuing their normal activities.

"Opinion in this country is divided as to whether intervention or non-in-

their normal activities.

"Opinion in this country is divided as to whether intervention or non-intervention is desirable. Many merchants and traders lately arrived here tell us that Lenine and 'Trotsky are ready to acknowledge Russia's external indebtedness and to discuss plans for the resumption of payment of interest. Admiral Kolchak has given formal undertakings which are entirely satisfactory to British bondholders. If British statesmen are to influence the course of events to British bondholders. If British states-men are to influence the course of events in a foreign state so distraught as Rus-sia is today, we imagine that British interests would be best served by en-deavoring to stand by Russia, when the

deavoring to stand by Russia, when the fighting ceases."

The statement bears out other advices from London indicating that British opinion regarding Russia is more optimistic than that apparently held in Washington, where Admiral Kolchak's position was recently described as 'critical' in contrast with this pessimistic comment a London cablegram last week said that in that centre the Kolchak government had not been materially weakened by the Bolshevist advance.

An important development bearing on the Russian situation was the announcement by the Federal Reserve Board that a general license had been issued permitting the exportation of Russian roubles to those parts of Russia which are not under the control of the Bolshevists. This ruling was interpreted as another step on the part of the United States designed to aid the Kolchak government.

Montreal, Aug. 20—The council of the Montreal Board of Trade yesterday decided to make representations to Hon. Mr. Sifton, minister of customs, urging the removal of the discrimination against British imports by making such changes as may be necessary in the customs regulations to permit of the establishing of value for duty on the basis of the rate of exchange current at the time of shipment from British ports.

In the matter of the payment of ocean freights, the board of trade had in 1915 been successful in inducing the steamship companies to accept as a basis a premium of 9½ per cent, or \$4.362-3 to the pound sterling, which basis has remained in effect up to the present, and was until recently acceptable to all.

At present sterling exchange is quoted at about \$4.40, while ocean freights continue to be settled on the basis of \$4.862-8. The council decided to ask the shipping interests temporarily to adopt the system in effect in New York and allow the settlement of freights to be made on the basis of the rate of exchange current on the day of the ship's entry at the customs house, a fixed rate to be reverted to on the return of normal conditions.


