ROW ON BOARD MOUNT TEMPLE

Pistol and Knife Wounds For Three Immigrants

Trouble over woman. Fight took place at sea on voyage to Quebec and Arcata. Made at Wharfe The Wabana Damaged—Canal Navigation Tied Up.

(Canadian Press)

Quebec, June 16.—When the steamer Mount Temple, of the C. P. R. line arrived here on Saturday evening from Antwerp with 2,084 passengers on board, three men were suffering from wounds, one from a knife and two from revolver wounds, as a result of a row on board on last Thursday night at sea.

The immigrants are principally from continental Europe, and it was impossible to get any information from them with regard to the trouble. A message in regard to the row was wired to the immigration authorities here, and the latter had a detachment of police to meet the steamer. Some thirteen passengers from the compartment in which the row occurred, were placed under arrest and examined as to what they knew about the occurrence. They all appeared to know nothing as to what caused the trouble, or were afraid to speak.

The Wabana Damaged

Quebec, June 16.—The British steamer Wabana, Captain Beside, which ran ashore below Matane, while on the passage from Sydney to Montreal and now in the dock here, was damaged yesterday. She has a bad dent, extending nearly the entire length of her starboard side, and a shorter one on the port side.

After Friday's game, which ended in a draw, Umpire McCann submitted to Secretary Donald a written report and his recommendation for fines on the players named and the suspension of Ganley, the term of suspension being for the proper time to be determined. Mr. Donald posted the report to Mr. Hooper on Friday night and on Saturday morning, as it was reported not to have arrived, the matter was telegraphed to President Hooper by the umpire.

Street Railway Men are Said to Have Been Given Higher Pay

It was said today that the request presented by the conductors and motormen in the employ of the St. John Street Railway Co. for an increase in wages during the night shift had been granted. The report was that the men had secured a 10 per cent increase, but had been asked to give their agreement to make any further demands of a similar nature for at least two years, and that this was consented to.

Lady Scott and Little Peter on Steamer that Took the Explorer to his Death

Cardiff, June 16.—When the Terra Nova, the steamship which took Captain Scott and his companions to the Antarctic, arrived here on Saturday, she was greeted with deafening sirens whistling by the craft in the harbor. Thousands of people watched Lady Scott, the explorer's widow, and her little son, Peter, as they came aboard the steamer. The Terra Nova will be dismantled and overhauled.

Britain Urges Bulgaria to Demobilize Army

Sofia, June 16.—The Bulgarian government has replied to the Serbian invitation for demobilization, urging, in effect, that the allies sincerely adopt the Bulgarian arbitration proposal. Bulgaria, the note adds, is ready for simultaneous demobilization but suggests that, to prevent further attempts at pressure, it is necessary that the contesting districts should be occupied by mixed garrisons.

TWENTY MILLION IN HOSTILE CAMPS

Did Bismarck Rightly Work Out Future of Europe?

THE SITUATION REVIEWED

Speculation, With Reasons For it, as to the Grouping of the Powers, Great and Small—Switzerland Alone Declared in Neutral Position

(Times' Special Correspondence)

Berlin, May 27.—In the next few weeks may be revealed the fact that France has secured one of the greatest wishes of her heart—either an open alliance or an entente, with all kinds of secret agreements, with her southern neighbor, Spain.

For many months, France has been conducting an active and almost open press campaign in favor of Spain's formal junction with the Triple Entente.

The greatest enemy of such a course has been King Alfonso himself, who believed that no policy except an official visit to him and dine with him and put him in the hands of their best diplomats, now Paris is talking rapidly of "the new alliance."

The whole of Europe is waiting anxiously for the result.

Two Rival Groups?

Europe is organizing itself into two rival groups, each of which is resolved to thwart, menace, and war on the other.

That is the net result of the diplomatic developments and under one heading or another, is taking its place.

This process is not yet complete, but it is developing. The Balkan League is another stage nearer to its completion and the day is not far off when Bismarck's prophecy will be fulfilled: "Before Europe is federated in a single group, there will come a stage of organization in two rival groups, and probably an interval of war."

General Ratko Dimitrijeff, hero of Kik's Killage, at this moment in St. Petersburg is negotiating with Saranoff, the Russian foreign minister, for the inclusion of the Balkan Slav states in the Dual Alliance.

This is not an accidental circumstance. All Europe's diplomacy is immersed in such problems.

What will become of Holland in time of war? Will Belgium join Germany or France? Can Switzerland stand neutral? What of Roumania and Bulgaria? These are the questions which the next few years will decide.

The minor states are collectively known as the "little powers."

Presently Bismarck foresaw the real trend of things is shown by the fact that in 1875, when he spoke, none of the present alliances was dreamed of.

Since then there have been formed in 1879, the Dual Alliance between Austria and Germany; the Triple Alliance due to the accession of Italy in 1882; the Franco-Russian Alliance a decade later; the Austro-Roumanian political convention, the result of the policy of Bismarck; the Roumanian's great liberal minister; next in 1904-5 the British treaties with Russia with the object of enforcing the Dual Alliance becoming the present Triple Entente.

This is the form of tacking on and of hunting for allies in time of full force.

The late King Edward VII. advertised by his tours through Europe. Germans believe that King Edward, not content with seeking allies among the minor disengaged states, also aimed at breaking up opposing alliances and tried to argue Kaiser Franz Josef, during a Karloviar cure, into abandoning the Dual Alliance with Germany.

The dependence of Portugal on England is a permanent historical fact. Confidently the can government of Theophile Braga was to proclaim that the alliance with England stood intact.

The Balkan States

England's "entente" friend, Russia, has also been successful at work. She has got in her pocket four of the six Balkan states. Why Bulgaria, Serbia, Montenegro and Greece have no formal alliance with Russia is a mystery; the likely explanation is that Russia should not undertake to defend the provocative Serbs in case their monthly quarrels with Austria should flare up.

In Bulgaria a formal alliance with Russia has grown popular only since Bulgaria's domestic affairs emancipated from St. Petersburg. That was finally accomplished about 1906 when Russia's own internal economy was tested and found wanting.

At that time Colonel Nikiphoroff, the Bulgarian attaché at St. Petersburg, published a pamphlet on "Slav" and advised the expulsion of Turkey, and advised to join Russia during war; Nikiphoroff is now Bulgaria's minister of war; he is urgently demanding the realization of his plan and it is Ratko Dimitrijeff, his intimate friend, who is trying to carry it out.

In Russia the leader of the campaign for a "Vaslavianskoe Gosudarstvo"—an All-Slav state—is the notorious chief of the Duma reactionaries known as "Markoff of the Second." Markoff, backed by Count Bobrinsky, and some other Pan-Slavists, demands that Russia should immediately seize Constantinople and then arrange an alliance with the Balkan Slav states, with the purpose of "encircling Austria."

passion for neutrality, have taken several military measures which indicate agreement with Germany.

Scandinavian States

Competition is going on for the alliance of the three Scandinavian states. None of the three counts much on land, but among them they control the entrance to the Baltic, which is of first rate importance in a naval war.

Since the war of 1854, in which Denmark and Sweden were allied with Prussia and Austria, the Danish Schleswig-Holstein from the Danish monarch, before the Franco-German war Denmark proposed to Napoleon III an offensive alliance with the object of enforcing the fifth article of the Peace of Prague under which North Schleswig was to be returned to Denmark by plebiscite.

In 1908 Kaiser Wilhelm proposed an alliance to Denmark, offering to guarantee her territory if she undertook to close the Sound to British warships in time of war, and to prevent the landing of British troops in West Jutland; but King Christian IX, whose court was a centre of anti-German intrigues, rejected the offer.

Switzerland Alone Neutral

Turkey and Roumania count with the Triple Alliance. The Austro-Roumanian Convention guarantees Roumania's independence, and Roumania promises to assist Austria with 300,000 men.

There is no European state, except Switzerland, of which it could not be said that it is likely to join one side or the other, judged by present sympathies and alliances, the twin camps of Europe will organize in this way:

France... 4,372,000

Denmark... 100,000

Spain... 600,000

Portugal... 150,000

Total... 10,454,000

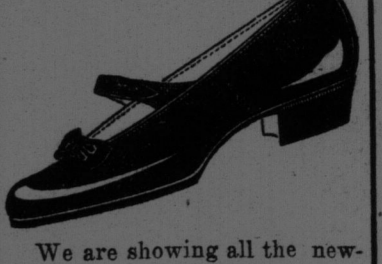

EXHIBITIONS OF IMPORTANCE

Two This Season in London Have Much of Interest

ONE IS ANGLO-GERMAN Marks New Era of Commercial Prosperity - Strike of Farm Laborers in Cheshire Ends, But Trouble Threatens in Lancashire

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, June 2.—The coming London exhibitions are beginning to attract a large amount of public attention.

Another exhibition which is being organized for the autumn of next year is to be held at Olympia. It is the shipping, engineering and machinery exhibition, one feature of which is that it is to be run on co-operative lines.

Of the immediate forthcoming events one is the Imperial Services Exhibition at Earl's Court, and the other the Anglo-German Exhibition at the Crystal Palace.

Mimic Battleships An advance squadron of the fleet, which is to take part in the naval spectacle at work at Earl's Court.

Another feature of the Earl's Court exhibition will be a display of ordnance, small arms, uniforms, breast-plates, historic military weapons, and relics which are being sent from the Tower and Woolwich Arsenal and are being arranged for exhibition in the long corridor extending from the Queen's Palace to the Queen's Hall.

New Commercial Era The outstanding attraction of the long list of festivals, shows, concerts, and sports to take place at the Crystal Palace is the Anglo-German Exhibition to be opened on June 11, and is intended to mark the growth of a new era of commercial prosperity, and of new inventions and labor-saving devices in this country and in Germany.

CHURCH PARADE OF ST. JOHN FUSILIERS

The 62nd regiment, St. John Fusiliers, attended divine service in St. Paul's church yesterday morning. The regiment, in command of Lieutenant-Colonel J. L. McAvity, with 375 men in line and headed by their two bands, paraded from the barracks square to the church, where an eloquent sermon was delivered by the chaplain, Rev. E. B. Hooper.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

A tank filled with coal tar broke loose from an engine at Montreal last night and crashed into the Place Vigor station. Alfred Gaudry, 22 years old, was badly injured and two others were hurt.

Lord Strathcona has donated \$100,000 for the purpose of providing a site for a drill hall to be used exclusively by the students of McGill University. The hall will be erected by next year.

The five master schooner "Paul Palmer" was burned to the water's edge yesterday off Race Point, Cape Cod. The crew were taken off by the crew of the fishing schooner "Rose Doherty."

Premier Borden arrived in Halifax on Saturday night, accompanied by Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways and F. P. Gutelius, of the I. C. R. He was met at the depot by Mayor Bilgh, members of the board of control, and of the Conservative Association.

From Ottawa there has come a denial of the report to the effect that a naval shipyard was to be established at Charlottetown, P. E. Island. No provision for such has been made in the estimates for this year.

The officials of the men declare that the farmers have acted in an arbitrary manner, and at a largely-attended open-air meeting of the men, arranged by the National Agricultural Laborers' Union, the following resolution was passed:—"That this meeting bears with regret and indignation of the action of several farmers in the Devonshire district in locking out their men in consequence of application for better conditions, and pledges itself to give them financial support over and above the lock-out pay that the union was giving; and that the labor members in the House of Commons be asked to raise the question of the threatened eviction of the laborers from their cottages, on the house re-assembly."

THE JUDGESHIPS SYDNEY COLLIERY IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Ottawa, June 15.—As a result of the operation of the amendment to the Judges Act, passed in the closing days of the session of parliament, there will be a considerable shake-up in the judiciary of Canada.

The new amendment applies only to county court judges, but there are several others who, under the old law, are about to retire on full superannuation. The act now provides that county judges must retire on reaching their 70th year, while they may be retired after thirty years of service.

The vacancies impending under the provisions of the new law or otherwise were two supreme court and ten county court judgeships in Ontario and one supreme and one county court judgeship in New Brunswick, and one county judgeship in Manitoba.

In addition to these about a dozen new judgeships were provided for in the last session, thus giving effect to provincial enactments. They include an extra county judgeship in Ontario and a new circuit court judgeship in Quebec.

There are now three vacancies by resignation in the county bench of Ontario.

Progress in Gloucester "Our company will ship 150,000 tons of iron ore during the summer," said J. Drummond, proprietor of the Drummond Iron area near Bathurst, yesterday. "Up to the present time our shipments have been practically experimental but now we have regular contracts and hope to increase the output each year. The ore is sent to Philadelphia where the business is on a sound basis."

Mr. Drummond said that the company had about 80,000,000 tons of ore in their holdings. "We have three vessels under continuous charter for carrying the ore," he continued, "and these are loaded at Bathurst. The whole northern part of the province has advanced greatly within the last few years. Dredges are at work deepening the Bathurst harbor, and there will be twenty-five feet at low water at the different docks. We expect soon to have a large pulp and paper mill established here."

CLEWS DISPLAYS MORE CONFIDENCE IN THE OUTLOOK

New York, June 14—The home business situation is generally sound. Merchants and manufacturers are running upon a hand-to-mouth basis and there is consequently no general overstocking of merchandise. The moderate contraction of credit thus far enforced has also tended to improve general conditions and place the country upon a stronger and more conservative basis. Commercial paper is in better supply and offerings are more freely taken, indicating sound business conditions. There is every reason to believe that as soon as the tariff is settled a decided business recovery will follow. In the steel trade there is already a disposition to place a promise about as good as a year ago. The home banking situation is slowly but surely improving as a result of persistent credit stringency. Forthcoming bank statements in reply to the last call from Washington should show more or less strengthening of reserves in all parts of the country.

Turn for the Better: There is good reason to hope that the market has taken a more encouraging turn for the better. At the same time it would be imprudent to be overconfident. The financial situation at home has not yet improved to the point where the demands for new capital still very in.

Political conditions are unsatisfactory. The situation abroad is still one of great strain. There have been several failures in London resulting in a general increase in the price of money. The Canadian situation is also one of concern. The steel and iron trade shows signs of slowing down, and copper prices must be shaded to meet buyers. Crop prospects continue good. Financially, we have resources enough to lift the whole world out of its gloom if only their strength could be marshalled under operation of a good banking system. To be bringing in the hidden gold of Europe, intelligent co-operation must be enlisted and exerted.

KAISER DECLARES HIMSELF STRONGLY IN FAVOR OF PEACE

Berlin, June 16—The twenty-fifth anniversary of the accession of Emperor William to the imperial throne was celebrated today in Berlin and throughout the German empire as a general holiday. The brilliance of the festivities and the enthusiasm displayed by the people testified to the monarch's great personal popularity among all classes.

The commemoration coincides with the forty-second anniversary of the triumphal return of his grandfather at the head of his victorious army after the Franco-Prussian war and naturally was marked by considerable military display. Emphasis, however, also was laid on the peaceful aspects of the emperor's quarter century reign, industrial and civic developments and the material prosperity of the country.

To a delegation from the British chamberlain in Berlin received by His Majesty this afternoon the Emperor said: "I can assure you I shall continue to do my best to preserve peace and promote the friendly relationships existing between our two countries."

The emperor responding to an address from the American peace societies, headed by Andrew Carnegie, congratulated His Majesty on the completion of his twenty-five years peaceful reign, saying: "I hope we shall have twenty-five years more of peace."

Austria Adds Air Ships: Vienna, June 16—The visit of Count Zeppelin to Vienna on board the dirigible airship Sachsen, a few days ago, according to a report here, has impelled the Austrian government to order six Zeppelins for delivery after 1914. They are to be armed with machine guns.

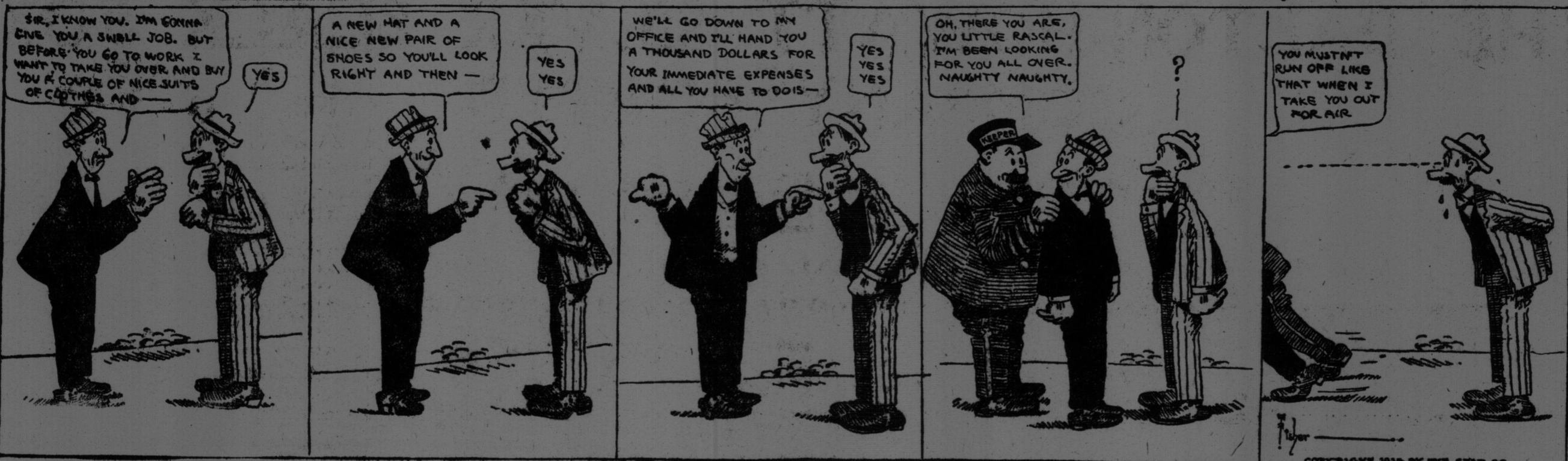

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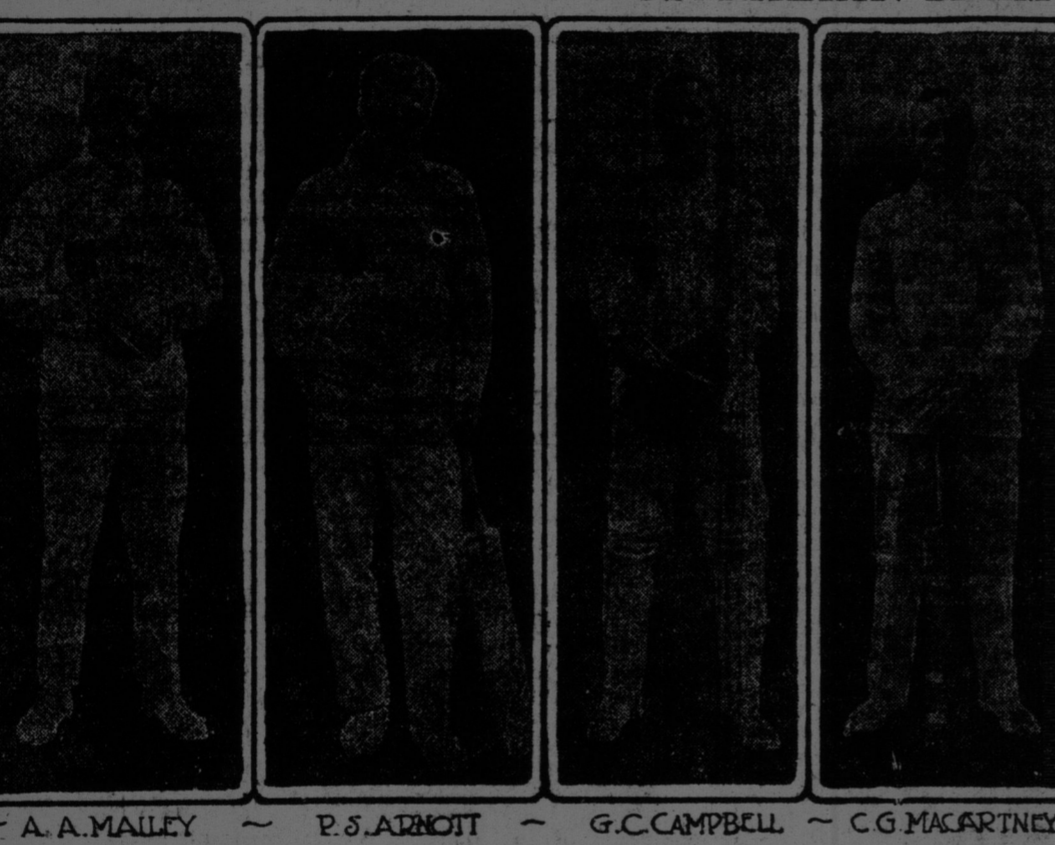

GET INCREASES

The Allan line have granted an advance of five shillings a month to seamen and firemen employed on the Gramplan and Hesperian, since those vessels have been engaged in carrying mail between Glasgow and the St. Lawrence. The advance is in accordance with the custom of the mail service vessels which pay higher rates than others.

Lynott, editor of the Carlton Sentinel, Woodstock, N. B., became the bride of Edward J. Mahony, son of Peter Mahony, of St. John, N. B. Rev. Father Patton officiating. The bride was assisted by Miss McMullen, while Dr. J. Gallagher acted as groomsmen.

The bride, who is distinctly one of June's most charming, was attired in a becoming blue serge traveling suit and wore a stylish mill rose turban which blended perfectly with the array of beautiful roses she carried. After the wedding the party were the guests of Mrs. McMullen.

TEN KILLED IN NEW YORK SUBWAY CONSTRUCTION

New York, June 16—The body of John Green, a driller, was recovered early today from a pile of broken rock under which he and nine other fellow workers were buried in a cave-in on Saturday on the Lexington avenue subway now under construction. All ten bodies have now been recovered.

Succeeded Ismay

London, June 16—In consequence of the retirement of J. Bruce Ismay, Harold A. Sanderson, the first vice-president, becomes president of the International Mercantile Marine Company. P. E. Curry, Southampton, manager of the American line, has been appointed manager of the White Star Line at Southampton, not a director of the International Mercantile Marine, as previously reported.

THE PROBLEM OF RAILWAY SIDINGS

Local Merchants Anxious to See Something Done at Once—Water Street Tracks

The problem of providing siding accommodation to replace the facilities which are being removed to make way for the sugar refinery plant is daily becoming more pressing. Not only is it said that the berths which have been used for loading lumber scows will be done away with, but the railway is losing the platforms which have been used for handling large quantities of local freight.

While the site for a new lumber wharf may present some difficulties, it is said that there is plenty space on the government property for the loading platforms and all that is required is their erection on the site which is awarded there. This would give accommodation for most of the local business, but this traffic is steadily growing and, in addition, there will be new business developing along Water street, where the new wholesale warehouses are being erected.

To provide for this new business as well as to make the handling of goods in this district more convenient the extension of the C. B. tracks along Water street is being urged upon the government.

At Ballast wharf there were formerly sidings and loading platforms at which eight cars could be handled at the same time. The removal of Shed No. 10 has reduced the number of these and it is understood that Shed No. 11 is to be removed within the next six weeks and this will mean the loss of two more car berths, leaving only two instead of the original eight. In the past, it is said, there has been enough business to keep all eight occupied pretty steadily, and the present condition of affairs is declared to be causing considerable hardship to the merchants who depend on these sidings for delivery and shipment of their goods.

It is said that the remaining portion of the government land at that place provides sufficient room for the erection of new loading platforms to replace those which have been done away with, and the local merchants are anxious to see something done promptly by the C. B. officials in whose hands the minister of railways said on Saturday, the matter has been placed.

Something, they say, will have to be done also to provide new loading berths for the lumber scows. Kennedy slip has been used for this purpose for a long time and at present there is no other berth in the city which meets the requirements. What is needed is a wharf with rail connection on the face of it and a mud slip on which the scows can rest at low water. A deep water slip is not suitable, as the distance from the top of the wharf to the scow would be too great to permit handling the deals at low tide.

POLICE COURT

"From a moral stand-point," said Magistrate Ritchie, in dealing with a case of two Chinese laundry owners in the North End, reported for working on Sunday, "I do not think that these men might be held as the men who would give liquor to the poor unfortunate men I see before me almost every morning."

The report was against Sing Lee and Hum Foo. The former pleaded guilty, but said that he had to get the work done for a man who was in a hurry for his collar. Hum Foo denied the charge but another celestial appeared in court and said that he had delivered a few parcels for Hum Foo on Sunday. Sergeant Kilpatrick told of seeing the work done.

The magistrate, in commenting on the conditions in the North End, said that a large crowd in Main street, a man staggered past him using some very vile language. One of the Chinese remarked, "Certainly he should not act that way toward you."

The defendants were each fined \$8 or two months in jail, but the fine was allowed to stand on condition that they do no more Sunday work.

In the case of Herbert Sprague, on application of his counsel, E. S. Ritchie, the preliminary hearing was adjourned until Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

One man, charged with drunkenness, was remanded and three more forfeited deposits of \$8 each.
