

COUNTESS OF WARWICK HAS

LADY BOUNTIFUL POOR

and Orator Has Spent Her Great Wealth In Behalf of the Workers and Is Now In Financial Straits-She Has Worked Hard For the Submerged Classes.

A crisis has come in the affairs of

the Earl and Countess of Warwick, naster and mistress of one of the castles. Insolvency has compelled them to call their creditors together with a view to making an arrange-ment to liquidate their debts. This ment to liquidate their debts. This is remarkable when it is remembered that on their marriage they were each possessed of considerable yearth. Both of them have been notable deceased in many directions and both have been and are extremely popular. The major part of their wealth has been spent in supporting the causes of labor and Socialism and in humanitarianism. From a spectacular point of view, however, the methods of the earl have been overshadowed completely by the work of his brilliant and beautiful countess, valued friend of princes, yet sincere support-

friend of princes, yet sincere support-er of democracy.

Before the death of the present earl's father in 1893, there was no one who could lay better claim to the friendship of the Prince of Wales than the talented and marvelously beautiful Lady Brooke, as the counters was then known. She was his lavorite hostess and when he became King Edward VII. her influence did not vanish. She was a lady of great fashion, endowed with knowledge, humor and philosophy, appealing expecially to a prince and king who, notwithstanding his pose of "mixer," was metculously eelectio in seeking the best in everything.

Lady Warwick's interest in Socialism and labor questions and the proved her sincerity by the heavy precuritary satisfaces she has made. The art of oratory is hers and has been used to excellent effect in election campaigns in England. While other aristocratic supporters of Socialism and the cause of the laboring man confined their activities to well appointed stages and platforms, the counters toured the country, like any Presidential candidate, invariably addressing convincingly her large audiences from the tail of a cart. Twitted with her large landed possessions and the apparent neglect of her practice to square with her presching, she pointed to the English "law of entail" which ensures the security of such property to natural descendants, unless the entail is broken by mutual consent of the temporary beneficiary and his heir. Nothing showed the genuineness of the woman more than the sale of every level she possessed to finance Socialist Parliamentary candidates. For this she was much belabored in the Socialist press, but her memory of previous frothy outpourings of a similar kind and her characteristic sense of humor came to the rescue and did not suffer her to abate her interest in "the cause."

When nobility in England desires notoriety or is hampered dhandially, it usually opens a shop in fashionable Bond street, London, and disposes of its wares as nonohalantly as the merest common or garden tradesman. Lady Warwick was one of the first to inscribe a titled name over a store in that famous and delightful thoroughtare. It mattered not that it was a shop for the sale of needlework, designed to afford material aid to struggling seamstresses. Here, again, she was attacked—this time the clamor coming from the labor organisations — because, forsooth, she was "taking the bread out of honest workingwomen's mouths." Humor was again necessary.

Her virility, zeal and strenuousness were known to her critics. It was forgotten or ignored that the Countees of Warwick was a powerful initiator and patroness of many helpful and desire

arwick was a powerful initiator and atroness of many helpful and desir able departures. On her estate in Es sex she has maintained for many years a school where boys and girls are taught farming and horticulture, such admirable accessories as carper tering, building, cooking, needlework and household management. At Reading, in Berkshire, founded and en-

and nousehold management. At Reading, in Berkshire, founded and endowed by the countess, is the Lady Warwick College, where girls are taught all the arts of the dairy, the poultry yard, the kitchen garden, and the flower garden. The interest which this school aroused led to the establishment of the English Wemen's Agricultural League, which has done excellent work in rural education and in the alleviation of the monotony of continual country life. Lady Warwick is the indestigable editor of the League's newspaper, the Women's Agricultural Times.

Apparently this remarkable woman cannot find sufficient for her hands to do. When politics and philanthropy pall she is not bored. She does not suffer from ennui, like many "parlor reformers." Weir of Hermiston, Robert Louis Stevenson's last unfinished book, was written in bed, or rather dictated to the novelist's devoted wife.

Keats wrote one of the finest, and most pathetic sonnets in literature on most pathetic sonnets in literature on his death bed; Charles Wesley wrote a lovely hymn on his, and Mosart, as is well known, composed the famous Requiem, which was first performed at his own burial, while he lay dying.

A Marvellous Treasure Since the recent cause celebre visi ors from all parts have made pil grimages to see the rich storehouse of treasures at Knole, the beautiful fouroccupied by Lord and Lady Sackville. During the great "will" trial it was said that the cash value of the art treasures in Knole was about a million sterling; but their artistic value may be reckoned even higher than this. One room which was decorated by Injer Jones cost no less than by Inigo Jones cost no less than \$100,000 to furnish. It was designed to be the bedrodm of James I. The state bed in this room cost \$40,000 alone. Murilio, Van Dyck, Holbein Joshua Reynolds, and Sir Thomas

CANADA LEADS. But This Time It Is In Incres

A recent despatch from London gave the results of an enquiry which the Dominion Government conducted into the cost of living of the working classes. The investigation showed that the rise in prices has been worldwide, but it also showed that it has been greater in Canada than in other countries, says The Toronto Star Weekly. Ganada easily tops the list, for the rise in prices here, since 1900, has been 61 per cent. In Australia and New Zealand, for instance, the rise has been only 16 per cent.

Why this great increase in Canada? According to local economists, the reasons are many. No two "doctors" agree in their diagnosis. Everyon a?—Tis that it costs a great deal more to live than it did ten years ago, but the blame is placed in different directions.

but the blame is placed in different directions.

Many city people blame the farmer for the high prices of food, and the farmer blames the commission merchant. The manufacturer asserts that the laboring classes are extravagant; that it is the "cost of high living" which has brought about conditions. The working man, on the other hand, maintains that he earns only a bare i "ing at best, and that he is not given a fair share of the manufacturer's profits. profits.

In talking with university professors and other students of political economy the reasons usually given for the increased priess are:

The vast increase in the world's stock of gold, which has been piling up now for more than twolvy years. The amount of money has increased more rapidly than the volume of commodities for sale, which are measured in terms of this money. Therefore, the price of commodities has risen. As a rule an increased supply of any article will result in a lowering of price, but the price of gold is fixed by mint regulations. The increased supply therefore, has been a lowering of the value of sold in commodities.

The expenditure of vast sums of capital in ways which are unproductive, or do not bring immediate returns. The millions of dollars spent on great transcontinental railways will not be productive for some years. The most serious waste in the vast sams recently spent by the different nations in war and preparation for war. Hundreds of millions of money values were recently destroyed in the Balkkins.

One great cause for the increased oct of food is the increased migra-

One great cause for the increased tost of food is the increased migration from the farm to the cities. It is claimed that there are fewer farmers in Ontario to-day than there were ten years ago. If prices keep increasing, wages, too, must rise. In Australia, where the increase in food cost compared to 51 per cent. in Canada, the working classes demanded large-ly increased wages and got them.
