In the general election of 1886 Mr. Hanington and two of his ticket were elected, and in 1890 he was again successful on the coalition ticket. 

In 1882 he was se-lected as leader of the government and in the general election of that year his government was sustained, he him-self and his full ticket being elected. SYDNEY, N. pay than other clerks of their class, and that a number of the government scalers had been bribed to say nothing of the stealing after they discovered the system in operation. The books of the government weighers and those of the independent weighers were com-pared and by this means the difference in weight was roughly ascertained. The planters had received payment for the full amount of sugar shipped by them, but the government had been cheated out of duties amounting to an enormous sum. Henry O. Havemeyer, the head of the sugar trust, realizing that it was in the interest of the com-bine to effect a settlement, offered to pay \$2,000,000, and the government of the stealing after they of pay \$2,000,000, and the government finding some difficulty in securing com-plete evidence of the amount stolen, ted this.
