

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irdav or. CIRCULAR LETTER,

To the Ministers and Messengers composing the Western New Brunswick Baptist Association, and the Churches which they represent.

BELOVED BRETHREN :---

We propose in our Annual Epistle to address you on the importance of stability and permanency in the Pastoral office. That a divinely called living spiritual ministry has been the principal means, in every age, employed by God for the conversion of sinners, no one can doubt, who believes in the religion of Christ. " For when that in the wisdom of God, the world by wisdom knew not God, it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to

"The preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness, but to us that are saved it is the power of God." The Ministry of the gospel being an ordinance of God, whatever affects its efficiency, and the relation it sustains to the Church of Christ, seriously affects the cause of God. Permit me therefore, dear brethren, to say that I fear we are departing from the example set us by our aged fathers in the Ministry. Did they change their Pastorate yearly, or every few years ? No, these venerable men, whose memory we love and honour, lived and died among their people ; and the few that remain still occupy the same field that they occupied when young men. They were with their people in prosperity and adversity. They never fled from trouble or difficulty in their churches. The Mannings, Hardings, Crandals, Dimocks, Munroes, Burtons, and Ansleys died at their post, or are still living in grey hairs among their flocks, but or statisticas son

The average pastoral relations of these venerable men was something over forty years. If some were called home before they were that length of time in the Pastorate, others have been continued to a much longer period.

Compare the stability and permanency of many of our Pastors at the present with these men, and you will at

once see how far we have departed from the course pursued by them. Now we feel the paralysing effect of the practice so common among us—a continual change among our Ministers.

We admit that some of the Lord's servants should be Evangelists, yea, that such a class of Ministers is necessary to the advancment of the Redeemer's kingdom. And that the Bible honors them, for when the scriptures give a catalogue of the gifts Christ has bestowed on his Church, the office of the Evangelists is placed before that of the Pastors, Eph. iv. 11, " and he gave some Apostles, and some Prophets, and some Evangelists, and some Pastors, and Teachers." We are not speaking about Evangelists who travel, preach and gather Churches—men who in modern times we call Missionaries. We are speaking of the Pastoral relation, its stability and permanency.

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We believe it may be the path of duty for a Pastor sometimes to change his field of labour, but the will of God, as far as we can know it, should be the rule, and not neglect of duty in the Pastor or covetousness in the people. The evils arising from an unsettled state of things among our Churches and Ministers, must be apparent to all.

In the first place, it has a tendency to create disunion and divisions. Every pious consistent Minister will soon have warm friends among his people, who will feel any neglect of the Pastor, and any thing that will remove him from them to be a very great evil, and they must feel grieved with those who do any thing to cause his removal either by absenting themselves from his ministry, or in what is more common, withholding his support, obliging him and his family to suffer or to remove.

You cannot find a united Church, where, in the space of four or five years they have had as many Pastors. Is it not common to find almost as many parties in the church as they have had Ministers labouring among them ? In the second place, it encourages covetousness in our Churches. The unscriptural practice of engaging a Pastor for the year and getting up a subscription for that time; and at the end of the year making another engagement with him, and getting up another subscription list, and calling e purof the among

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on the people once more to subscribe for the support of the gospel, is not only making the term of the Pastor's work and stay depend on the subscription list ; but it tempts the man who thinks what he gives to support his Pastor is like giving to any other charity, to speak in the same way about it, that he would about any other object for which he is asked to subscribe, and offen to find fault with his minister, when the secret is he does not like to be so often called upon to give. You will find that where the practice of which I am speaking exists, there covetousness prevails. Such Churches, unwilling to support the Gospel among them, satisfy their conscience by praying for God to send them a Pastor, and then wait for some travelling Minister to come along. Then a collection will be made, when a man of property will throw in his pittance, and the Minister of the Lord Jesus is treated the same way as any man in distress would be. Does not such a system encourage covetousness in our Churches ?

In the third place, it leaves many Churches without Pastors and many Ministers without Churches. It unsettles every thing around. Ministers with families cannot bring their families from their homes, with the prospect of continuing only for one year. Hence, some of them feel it to be the path of duty, to provide for their families and preach as much to the destitute as they can. But they are unable to give themselves wholly up to the work. They soon become Ministers without Churches, and of course they will leave many Churches without Pastors. Where Ministers break through these difficulties, and engage in preaching all the time, they will be obliged to be away a great deal of the time from their families. And still further : there is another evil which we think to be greatly injurious to some of the smaller Churches-viz, when, perhaps, they could support a Pastor the whole or greater part of the time, they are satisfied with one-third, or one-fourth of his labours. The consequence is, that many of them are in a very languishing condition. The Minister feels as though every time he comes to his people, he has his work to do over anew :

beside, while one Minister has more work than he can justly attend to, perhaps another servant of Christis comparatively idle. But let us return to that stability and permanency in the pastoral relation which marked the ministry of our Fathers in the Gospel, to which we have alluded, and all these difficulties will be overcome.

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In the fourth place, this unsettled state of things affects the efficiency of our Ministers. All know that the Minister who is tossed about without a permanent home. canhot be so studious, and have so much time for reading as he who is labouring almong the same people. Nor has he motives to study that the settled Pastor has. And what affects the efficiency of the Minister will soon affect the information and instruction of the people. If this reasoning be correct, then it follows that the permanency of the pastoral relation leads to an efficient ministry, and a well-informed and well instructed Church; and the observation of that divine precept, " study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of life." The Pastor that has to appear three times every week before the same people; must work hard; must read and think and labor, or else give up his post, and adopt that unsettled kind of labor to which we have been referring.

The longer the residence of the Pastor among his flock, the more will be know of their wants, and the kind of preaching best adapted to their state. Young people growing under the ministry of the gospel that they are matured, hearing from the same servant of God the blessed doctrine of Christ, will have received clearer views of the way of salvation than those who have received their religious views and impressions from different Ministers.

Look around among our Churches and you will find that Church in a broken, scattered state which is continually changing its Minister, without that moral power necessary to exert a healthy influence on the world around. You will find that Church among whom the Pastor has grown in influence and usefulness, and has been blessed with revival after revival, and has been the means of bringing multitudes into the Church of God. he catt t is comlity and rked the we have ne. 🗥 s affects the Minme, canreading e. 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branching out, spreading on the right hand and on the left, until it may be said that the small one has become a thousand. Facts prove that those Churches where the Pastors have lived and laboured twenty or thirty years, have been like a fruitful parent, whose offspring is filling the whole land. Go to those Churches where our esteemed fathers have laboured their forty or fifty years, and you will find that it is out of those Churches we have got most of our Ministers, and from those Churches we have got the persons who compose most of our new Churches. Does not this confirm the truth " that the stability and permanency of the Christian ministry are inseparably connected with the prosperity and advancement of the cause of Christ,"

Some of our Churches, which are always changing their Ministers, are weaker and more scattered than they were some years ago. They engage a Pastor for size months, or for a year, then when that time is up it is not known whether they will hire or engage him another year or not. Is it not dishonouring to Christ to bring down the Ministry of his word to a level with a menial servant, or a man who is laboring for a given time for a certain amount, and when that time expires the engage-

Brethren-let us wipe away this reproach from among us, and come back to the New Testament ground and be governed by the authority of Christ, and not by the maxins of a selfish world, and sustain the ministry of the Gospel in the Church of God, as Christ has "appointed it in his holy word. Let us as Ministers study to be able Ministers of the New Testament, that "our profiting may appear unto all," that "we may be approved unto God," and that we may be wholly given op to it.

Let us as Churches remember that the law of our great master is that" they that preach the gospel shall live of the gospel," that " we are to give as God has prospered " us," that we are to give freely, for "the Lord loveth a cheerful giver." And in thus attending to the law of Christ's house, the stability and permanency of the pastoral office will be secured.

Some alterations and repairs, which had been previously authorized, were made last Summer, and have materially added to the appear-ance of the building and to the comfort of the inmates. The front entrance has been thoroughly repaired, and to prevent the necessity for the lads entering the School Room from that quarter, a door has been opened in the back of the building, leading directly into the school room, and a strong porch erected over it. New fences also have been constructed; the roof has been well covered with fire proof In consequence of the building painted. In consequence of the outlay thus incurred, no reduction of the

amount of the debt has been possible this year. The thanks of the Committee are due to the Ladies of Fredericton,

who furnished a Tea Meeting in the Seminary, the proceeds of which were appropriated to defray the expenses of the repairs mentioned above. Through the seasonable aid thus kindly rendered, and the above. dividend accruing from the general Missionary Union, the Committee have been able to meet the extraordinary charges of the past year without increasing the debt of the Society, the tuition fees now due being more than adequate to cover the balance in favour of the Committee.

The Committee cannot close their report without adverting to the The committee cannot crose that represent of the debt; it is now sum annually absorbed to pay the interest of the debt; it is now about ten years since the present Principal took charge of the Insti-tution, and during that period the interest upon the debt has amounted to three hundred and forty-five pounds, this large sum has been actually paid out for the use of money that might be raised, without any great difficulty, from the friends of Education in this Province

Will the Society allow another decade to see the gradual waste of between three and four hundred pounds?

The Committee make their appeal at the present time because the eneral prosperity of the Province encourages them to hope, that the Educational Institution, which has been the object of so much exertion and so many prayers, will not be the last to share in the abundance which God has conferred upon our Brethren
