The opening range was unchanged to 10 down. Spot interests which were credited with taking over the remainder of the old bull account, gave support causing a rally to four above, with which heavy selling was again resumed, much of the pressure coming from stock exchange houses, the most of which were supposed to be selling their cotton options to protect their marginal commitments in stocks. This movement carried prices down 55 points, but a final rally closed the market from 35 to 40 points lower. It is a curious fact that Southern spot markets have not conformed to the lower prices of futures and this in spite of no apparent demand for the staple by either foreign or domestic apinners. The sales of Americans at Liverpool this morning were only 6,000 bales. The future market however is admittedly in much stronger hands and while the price seems still relatively high it does not look nearly, so unreasonable for the present crop as did the 16 cents quotation established by the bull clique.

Gratifying Statements Brought M. Paulhan Declares it Would Held Yesterday--Net Profits from Flying Machine--Plane Invulnerable in Sky.

> PRESENT PROGRESS ONLY HINTS AT POSSIBILITIES

Los Angeles, Jan. 17.—Among the thousands out today at the aviation field the absorbing topic was how Mons. Louis Paulhan, at a height of 900 feet, passed directly over the stee in the Palos Verde Hills, where the big gons for the harbor defence will be masked. In that it was realized that he could have thrown 300 or 400 pounds of explosives down among them, a hint of future fears has been mingled with the pleasure of the spectators.

"Of course a fleet of aeroplanes could attack harbor defences," said Mons. Paulhan, "and they could destroy the city, too, What I did was nothing more than a hint of what could be done. I made no preparation. You saw me carry two passengers, Suppose I took up the equivalent of two average men's weight in dynamite or some other high explosive and let it fall upon the fortifications. That would be about 375 pounds. What would be left of the guns or armour in the vicinity of where it struck?

the vicinity of where it struck?

Invulnerable in Sky.

"To be sure, I was comparatively close to the ground. My motor is only so horsepower, and with the aeroplane weighted down by three or four hundred pounds extra, possibly I could not fly much higher. But I could put in a 100 horsepower motor and rise to an altitude of 3000 metres (about 9750 feet.) What gunner could hit such a small speck in the sky as my machine would appear then?

Mons. Paulhan is feeling the strain and appeared somewhat haggard today, and when Mr. Cortlandt Fleid Bishop remarked that there were five days more of flying he rolled his eyes wearlly and answered:

"Ah! But don't I know it!" Nevertheless he is preparing for a flight from the aviation field to Echo Mountain, back of Pasadena, when the weather permits. This would necessitate a flight of approximately 30 miles over Los Angeles.

More attacks on the aviation record to 4,146 feet established here a few days ago by Mons. Paulhan, will be made today by Mr. Charles K. Hamilton, in a Curtiss biplane. He is considered that if conditions are ideal he will make the attempt.
