There sprang up a host of timers who thought that was the way to attain prominence in distance running. Then again a British runner who came over here about ten years ago had a fashion of working his arms like a sprinter, although he ran long distances. Almost immediately after his first public appearance a great crowd of young athletes adopted that method. They were surprised to find that it didn't make them run as fast as the Britisher.
