Rev. J. Wesley Clarke, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report :

BROTHER MODERATOR AND DEAR BRETHREN :

Grace be unto you, and Peace, from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ.

Through the tender mercies of our Heavenly Father we are permitted to meet again, and to greet each other in this our sixty-first annual Conference. The occasion suggests to us the rapidity with which time passes, the numerous and marked changes which it produces, and the importance of its improvement.

Twenty-two years, with all its opportunities have passed since this church has had the pleasure of extending the hand of welcome and hospitality, for the entertainment of the members of this Body.

Your Secretary, in behalf of the Church, and himself as the pastor, would herewith convey to you, each and all, our kindly wishes and a cordial welcome to our hearts and to our homes.

Having reached the end of another ecclesiastical year, it is for us to examine the record of our work, that we may better understand what our ministers and churches have been doing; and more fully recognize and appreciate the Divine favor, which has been towards us in plentitude. For the strength given to many of the churches, for the blessing of revival, and for the salvation of sinners, let us devoutly thank God, but for our lack of interest in, and consecration to the work, let us humble ourselves before Him, and resolve, by Divine grace, to more perfectly imitate the pure life of Christ who is our example, and who, when He was on earth, "went about doing good."

Entrusted to us is the care of a hundred and fifty churches, situated in nearly every County within the Province. While some of them are strong, numerically, financially and spiritually, others of them are weak, and in need of the undelayed attention, the faithful and prayerful consideration of this Conference. And may God grant unto us wisdom and help, by means of which we may, at this session, arrange to supply all our weak and discouraged churches with the regular ministry of the Word.

Brethren, our responsibilities are great, but we should face them with the courage and confidence of the Apostle Paul, who said: "We can do all things through Christ that strengtheneth us."

Never, during all our history did we have so many Ministers as now—and seemingly never were more Ministers needed than now, and yet, by order of the "All wise God," two of our number have, during the year, gone from the toils and cares of earth to the joys and rest of heaven. Rev. Edwin Garrity passed peacefully away at his home in Woodstock, in the month of June

last. As he was more than eighty years travelling the journey of life, and as his health was failing him for a long time, his death was not altogether unlooked for.

The Rev. William Downey died at his home in Fredericton, on the 18th of July last. His health became shattered about two years ago. Though feeble, he was with us last year, and none of us have forgotten the testimony, so full of heaven, which he gave in the Conference meeting of that time. It was the privilege of your Secretary to be with him as he was nearing the end, and never can he forget the expression of confidence and joy, and the heaven-given smile that lighted up his face, as he talked of going "home."

Then I may say that great indeed was my surprise, in looking over the list of Ministers of twenty-two years ago, when the Conference last met in this place, to notice that twenty-two (an average of one per year) of the thirty-six ordained Ministers of that time, are with us no more; seventeen of them have crossed the "river".

These see their Saviour face to face,
And sing the triumph of His grace;
Him day and night they ceaseless praise;
To Him their loud hosannas raise.

Worthy the Lamb, for sinners slain,
Through endless years to live and reign;
Thou hast redeemed us by Thy blood,
And made us Kings and Priests to God.

It is my duty at this time to furnish you with a report of the labors and successes under God, of our Ministers and Churches during the year. But I regret to say, that the information received from many of the Churches is greatly circumscribed, especially as to the religious life, thus rendering it impossible for me to make my report as full and complete as I would greatly desire it. I would therefore ask the indulgence of Conference and of all persons interested, while I submit the following:

First District.

Of the Churches composing this district, eleven of them reported at the annual meeting which was held with the recently reorganized Church at Upper Kent, in the month of July. All the meetings were interesting and the many people in attendance were encouraged in the Divine Life.

The care of the Long Island, Arthurette and Rowena Churches of the Tobique, has been with Rev. J. N. Barnes, who, with

his family, moved into this district immediately after our last Conference. Bro. Barnes, true to his record, has worked faithfully and with much success.

Finding the Church at Arthurette considerably discouraged, many of their members having scattered their ways to strangers, our brother began his work with a series of special services, visiting from house to house and praying with all the people. That this was the Will of God concerning him, evidence was soon given, in that many who had forsaken the Lord's house and wandered far from Him, returned seeking mercy through our Lord Jesus Christ. Also, of the number converted, twenty were baptized on the profession of their faith, eighteen of whom united with the Church.

Four were baptized and added to the Long Island Church and one by baptism, and one by letter to the Rowena Church.

Rev. J. J. Barnes, has been pastor of the Bumfrau, Upper Kent, and Lower Perth Churches during the entire year, and of the Bath Church until April last. Bro. Barnes, added two by baptism, and six by letter to the Upper Kent Church, and one by letter to the Lower Perth Church.

Rev. Henry Hartt, is reported as having made a very profitable visit to the Church at California, at which time he baptized eight, and with three others by letter added them to the Church. Later on Rev. J. N. Barnes added three others, two by baptism, and one by letter. The Fort Fairfield Church is reported as having no pastor, but that twenty were added to their number by baptism.

The Canaan and Ortonville Churches have had no pastor.

Licentiate Frank A. Currier, who is a student of Dalhousie College, spent his summer vacation with our people at Long Island. His stay among them was, we believe, profitable to himself and the Church.

Seven of the Churches have had more or less pastoral care during the year. Nine of the Churches have had weekly prayer meetings, and the same number have had monthly Conference meetings. The Lord's Supper has been celebrated only a few times, and with but few of the Churches.

The number added by baptism during the year is 53, and by letter, 13; total, 66; less by decrease, 12; net increase, 44.

The ministers living and laboring in this District, are reported as having worked faithfully and efficiently.

Second District.

The annual session of this District, which was held with the Church at Pembroke, is reported as being one of the best ever held.

The Church at Woodstock continues to profit by the faithful and much appreciated labor of its pastor, Rev. C. T. Phillips. The congregation, which is a large and interesting one, worships in one of the prettiest and best church buildings of the Denomination. The year has been one of seed-sowing rather than reaping. The Pastor baptized two, receiving them with five others by letter into the Church.

Bro. Phillips has also been pastor of the Pembroke Church. This Church, though, until recently, did not report itself for several years, has become one of the most active and spiritual within the District.

Rev. T. S. Vanwart has had a pleasant and prosperous year as pastor of the Waterville, 7th Tier and Charleston Churches. The Waterville Church was considerably strengthened by special meetings, in which the Pastor was assisted by Revs. Joseph Noble and Dr. McLeod. Four were baptized and, with three by letter, received as members of the Church. To the Charleston church two were added by baptism and seven by letter.

The Knowlesville and Coldstream Churches have been ministered to by Rev. E. B. Gray. Though no additions are reported either by baptism or letter, we know that the congregations of these churches have been blessed by the earnest and faithful preaching of the Pastor.

Rev. Gideon Swim has had additions by baptism to all of the churches in his Pastorate. Five were added by baptism to the 3rd Tier Church, one by baptism to the Upper Brighton Church, six by baptism to the Somerville Church, and fourteen by baptism and three by letter to the Victoria Corner Church. In some respects this has been the Pastor's best year on this circuit.

The Churches at Connell, Windsor, Rockland and Lower Brighton have been cared for by Rev. Henry Hartt. It was some time during the winter that a series of meetings was held in the Church at Connell, in which Revs. T. S. Vanwart, Joseph Noble, H. Hartt and Dr. McLeod participated. Connected with their effort was a revival of considerable magnitude and power. Strong men bowed themselves before God and cried unto Him for mercy, and "finding peace in believing and joy in the Holy Ghost," ten of them were baptized and, with eight others by letter, united to the Church. The Pastor added one by letter to the Rockland Church.

Rev. A. C. Thompson has been pastor of the Tracy Mills, Knoxford, East Bridgewater and Brookville Churches. The

Pastor added three by baptism to the Tracy Mills Church, and one by baptism and two by letter to the Church at Brookville. Two were added to the East Bridgewater Church, and two to the Knoxford Church. A C. E. Society was organized.

The Church at Gordonville was much revived and encouraged through the labors of its Pastor, Rev. J. J. Barnes. Bro. Barnes added seven by baptism and one by letter to this Church.

River Bank is reported as having no Pastor.

Of the unreported Churches your Secretary is unable to say anything.

Am glad to make reference to Father Sipprell, who, with the weight of nearly a century of years upon him, is living and well.

Rev. S. W. Shaw is in poor health and quite unable to engage in public work.

Rev. T. Connor, though well advanced in years, has visited several of the Churches in this District.

Of the Churches comprising this District twenty-two of them reported. All but one of which have mid-week prayer-meetings and monthly Conference meetings.

The number added by baptism is 57; by letter, 32; total, 89; less by decrease, 58; net increase 31; total membership, 1,680.

Third District.

Of the twenty-one Churches comprising this District, sixteen of them reported at the annual meeting, which convened with the Marysville Church, on the 15th of last month.

The Churches at Bear Island, Lower Prince William, Douglas and Lower Queensbury, have had the pastoral ministrations of Rev. A. G. Downey. The pastor added one by baptism and one by letter to the Church at Bear Island.

Rev. H. A. Bonnell, has spent all of the year with the Churches at Millville, Kingsley, Upper Hainsville and Stanley. Two were added by baptism to the Church at Stanley and two by baptism and one by letter to the Upper Hainsville Church.

Peniac, Marysville and Gibson Churches have had the pastoral attention of Rev. J. T. Parsons. The pastor added seventeen by baptism and seven by letter to the Marysville Church, and two by baptism and six by letter to the Church at Gibson.

Rev. F. C. Hartley, has spent all of his time as pastor of the

Fredericton Church. Bro. Hartley received twenty by baptism and seven by letter into the membership of this Church.

The Churches at Eel River, Central Southampton, Lower Canterbury and Temperance Vale have been without a pastor during the whole year. Occasional visits were made to the Church at Temperance Vale, but by whom was not reported. It is to be hoped that these pastorless Churches have been visited by some minister, though no report of such has been sent us.

Fourteen of the Churches report Conference meetings but only nine weekly prayer meetings.

The report shows that only seven of the Churches have had the ordinance of the Lord's Supper administered to them.

The total number added to the membership of this District by baptism, is 44 ; by letter, 22 ; total, 66 ; less by decrease, 25 ; net increase, 41. Total membership of the District 1,687.

Fourth District.

This District held its annual session with the Fredericton Junction Church on the second Saturday in September. There was a very general assembling of the people from the several Churches throughout the District, and the brethren are reported as having been greatly strengthened in their work for God. Fifteen Churches comprise this District, only eleven, of which, reported at the annual meeting.

Rev. W. H. Perry has spent another year as Pastor of the Mill Settlement, Patterson Settlement and Blissville Churches. There have been no additions.

The Fredericton Junction, Tracy Station and Little Lake Churches have had the pastoral care of Rev. G. W. Foster for another year. The Pastor added two by baptism to the Fredericton Junction Church, and one by baptism to the Church at Tracy Station.

Rev. John Perry has cared for the Oromocto, Lincoln, Waasis and Rusagornis Churches. There have been no additions to any of these Churches.

Rev. W. R. Reud, the Pastor of the Upper Gagetown Church, has been blessed with a good revival. This Church has been very much helped and is greatly encouraged. Bro. Reud baptized fifteen, all of whom, with one other by letter, were united to the Church.

No reports were received from the Waterville, Geary, Victoria and Greenfield Churches. The Clerk adds "that they have had no Pastor during the entire year," but, that twenty have been added by baptism to the Geary and Victoria Churches, through the labors, we presume, of Revs. J. Perry and Samuel J. Perry.

Eleven of the Churches have had pastoral care during the whole year. Ten report Conference meetings; and seven, mid-week prayer meetings. Only four have had administered to them the Lord's Supper, and only seven have Sabbath Schools.

The number added by baptism, is 38; by letter, 1; total, 39; less by decrease, 14; net increase, 25.

Fifth District.

At the annual meeting of this District fifteen Churches reported.

Rev. C. B. Lewis has regularly and faithfully ministered to the First, Third and Fourth Churches, Hampstead. There have been no addition to any of these Churches. Rev. O. N. Mott, assisted the Pastor in special meetings with the Fourth Church, Hampstead.

Rev. J. G. McKenzie has had additions by baptism to all of the Churches in his pastorate, viz. :—The First and Second Churches in Kars, and the First Wickham Church. The Pastor is reported as laboring earnestly and successfully, and that he is highly esteemed for his work's sake. Bro. McKenzie added nine by baptism to the First Church at Kars, four by baptism and two by letter to the Second Church, Kars, and one by baptism to the First Wickham Church.

The First and Second Johnston Churches and Fifth Wickham Church have enjoyed the Pastoral labors of Rev. S. J. Perry. The Pastor held special meetings in connection with his circuit, which tended to very much encourage and strengthen his brethern.

The Rev. W. R. Reud is highly spoken of as the Pastor of the Second Church, Hampstead. The prayer and conference meetings are interesting and fairly well attended, and the Sabbath Congregations are large.

The Second, Fourth and Sixth, Wickham Churches have been ministered to by Rev. O. N. Mott during the greater part of the

year. The pastor is referred to as a deeply earnest and spiritual-minded man. The Fourth Wickham Church reports visits from Revs. S. J. Perry and J. G. McKenzie; also, a precious season of revival, in which the pastor and Rev. T. W. Carpenter participated. Of the number converted nine were added to the Church by baptism.

The First Greenwich Church has had no pastor. They report an interesting Sunday School. While but little information has been forwarded to us concerning the spiritual condition of this District, your Secretary is sufficiently informed to say that several of the Churches have but a small membership, and yet they are holding on to God, and are engaged in the good work.

Eight of the Churches have sustained mid-week prayer meetings; and monthly conference meetings; eleven have Sabbath Schools, and five have had administered to them the Lord's Supper.

The additions by baptism during the year is 29; by letter 6; total 35; less by decrease 27; net increase 8.

The Lower Millstream, Upper Millstream, Millstream Mountain, Snider Mountain and Apohaqui Churches have been cared for by Rev. Wm. DeWare. His earnest and eloquent sermons

Rev. G. F. Currie has given pastoral attention to the Taylor Village, Dover, Victoria Road and Moncton Churches. The Pastor added three by baptism to the Church at Moncton, and three by letter.

The Lewis Mountain, Coverdale, North River, Wheaton Settlement and Steeves Mountain Churches are prospering under the labors of their Pastor, Rev. Abram Perry. Bro. Perry added one by baptism and one by letter to the Church at Steeves Mountain.

Rev. A. McNitch has devoted himself as Pastor of the Churches at Cornhill, Lower Ridge and Petitcodiac. There have been no additions.

The Clerk of this District, says that while there have not been many revivals the Ministers have done good and efficient work, the result of which will be better known in the world that is to come.

All of the Churches reported, hold monthly conference meetings, and sixteen have mid-week prayer meetings.

Seventh District.

This District held its annual meeting with the Church at Beaver Harbour. More ministers were in attendance than usual. The meetings were interesting and the reports encouraging.

The continuously long term of Rev. G. A. Hartley's pastorate at Carleton, Saint John, is getting longer. He has finished his thirty-fifth year, and entered upon the thirty-sixth year of successful and greatly appreciated service with this Church. Brother Hartley was unable to occupy his pulpit for more than three months of last year, owing to an affection of the throat, during which time Licentiate J. B. Daggett preached with much acceptance. We are very glad to be able to report that our brother's voice is so improved that he is able to regularly preach to his people again. The report from that Church states "that though they have had no special manifestations of God's favor, yet they have enjoyed a fair degree of spiritual life throughout the year,

and that one has been received into the Church by baptism; and also, that a "Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor" has been organized, which has reached a membership of 89, and which gives promise of doing much good. The Sabbath School is prospering, and the Lord's Supper is administered monthly.

The Waterloo Street Church, Saint John, reports itself prospering under the labors of its pastor, Rev. J. W. Clarke. Some special services were held during the winter, with good results. A number that had wandered from the fold returned; the brethren were strengthened, and sinners were converted. Four were added to the Church by baptism and nine by letter. The Church also has organized a "Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor," the members of which are growing interested in doing good.

Rev. T. O. DeWitt has had the pastoral care of the Church at Beaver Harbor. Though no additions have been made during the year, the preaching meetings, the prayer and conference meetings, and the Sabbath School have been well sustained. Prior to Bro. DeWitt's engagement with this Church as Pastor, Rev. T. W. Carpenter spent one month with them. His labors were very encouraging and benefitting. Connected with this Church is a "Young People's Christian Endeavor Society," which is in a flourishing condition.

Rev. Irvine Harvey resides at White Head Island, and although not Pastor of the Church, has given them care as he has had opportunity. This Church, though the farthest out in the sea, is always above water, and its influence for good is over all the people of this little Island.

The Northern Harbour, Fair Haven and Chocolate Cove Churches, have had a pleasant and in many respects profitable year, under the labors of Rev. A. H. McLeod. The report from this circuit states, that Bro. McLeod has labored earnestly, has preached the truth faithfully, and has done much in producing harmony and love among all the people. The seed is being sown and the harvest will surely come. The meetings and ordinances in these Churches are well sustained.

The North Roads and Wilson's Beach Church of Campobello, have been without a Pastor, but have sustained a Sabbath morning prayer meeting. We are informed that Bro. J. B. Daggert, has, with much profit to the people, spent the most of the time since District meeting with the Church at Wilson's Beach. It is to be hoped that these Churches may have with them a settled Pastor at once.

The Seal Cove and Grand Harbor Churches, have had revival and additions through the labors of their much beloved Pastor, Rev. I. D. Harvey; eleven were received by baptism and two by

letter into the Seal Cove Church, and three by baptism and one by letter into the Church at Grand Harbor.

Rev. T. O. De Witt spent six weeks with the Church at Castalia, after Conference a year ago; since that time they have had no preaching. They need a Pastor.

The North Head Church at Grand Manan, reports itself as having no Pastor, but that Sabbath prayer meetings, mid-week prayer meetings and Conference meetings, are regularly sustained. Rev. J. H. Erb spent several weeks with them during the summer; he reports large congregations, a kind hearted and thoughtful people. It is hoped that some man, spiritually and otherwise eligible, may accept the Pastoral charge of this very important field.

The Pastor of the Victoria Street Church, St. John, has been the Rev. W. J. Halse, who has labored faithfully and well and whose work has been blessed. Twelve have been added to the Church by baptism and six by letter. The Conference, the prayer meetings, and indeed all the meetings are interesting and good. The report is one of encouragement.

All of the fourteen Churches of this District reported.

The number added by baptism is 31; by letter, 20; total, 51; less by decrease, 21; net increase, 30.

In examining the reports furnished by the Clerks of the several Districts, I have been thoroughly impressed with the following:

1. That the success in our work for God is contingent upon our

consecration to Him, and adherence to the doctrines and principles peculiar to ourselves as a denomination.

- ¶ 2. That the weak Churches must soon be numbered with the dead, unless instruction and encouragement be given them.
- ¶ 3. That it would please God, and profit ourselves as a people, if two or more of our Ministers, (who are best adapted for evangelistic work) were all the year employed in visiting and laboring with our less enlightened and pastorless Churches.

Infinitely momentous is the work assigned us by God as ministers of Jesus Christ. Connected with our appointments are weighty and eternal responsibilities. May we more and more fully realize them, and, being led by the Divine Spirit, we shall accomplish much for Him for whose glory we have been created.

To the Churches here represented by delegates, I am permitted to offer a concluding word or two of remark. You are the professed followers of the Christ that was crucified; of the Christ that conquered death, and hell, and the grave; of the Christ who ascended triumphantly to the Father, and who now is Mediator. See to it that you follow Him closely—that you represent Him thoroughly. Then when He shall come, and all His holy angels with Him, it shall be said unto us all, "Well done thou good and faithful servants, enter into the joys of thy Lord."

The Conference was a good one, and every session was harmonious. The Conference meeting was one of spiritual power, and there were more than one hundred testimonies. In Missions, (especially Foreign,) our brethren and sisters are enthusiastic, and this year were especially so, owing to the presence and inspiring words of their missionary-elect, Sister Wild. Our brethren have a number of strong young men in their ministry, but like ourselves, have not men enough for their Churches, and some of their important fields are suffering for want of efficient laborers. Your Delegate has the impression that if our Brethren could educate these young men at home, they would be better supplied with ministers, as a number of them, who went away to study, have not returned to their native land after completing their studies.

Your Delegate asked for a continuation of the delegation, and in answer to that request, Bro. Wilson was appointed Delegate to our Conference and is with us to-day, and your Delegate hopes

that he may carry to his home as pleasant recollections of his visit to us as we did on our return.

BROTHER MODERATOR:—Your Delegate appointed to attend the Maine State Association of Free Baptists, would respectfully report that at the proper time he attended to the duty assigned him. The Association convened this year with the church at Saco, a strong, vigorous, spiritual Church. A warm reception awaited your Delegate. He was voted a seat in the Ministers' Conference and invited to participate in the deliberations. The reception of Delegates from other bodies occurred during the first session of the first day of meeting. Several Delegates were present when your Delegate was called for. He received a warm welcome and was attentively listened to. While he conveyed to the body the fraternal greetings of their New Brunswick brethren, and, as best he could, gave a general outline of our standing as a denomination and of our work in its different branches during the past year, your Delegate noticed with pleasure the spiritual vigor manifested in all the religious meetings and the systematic method of the business sessions; the Association from beginning to end following the order of their printed programme. Your Delegate listened with deep interest to the several reports submitted and topics discussed by the Association. A goodly number of additions to the Churches were reported. Fair success has attended their efforts along the different branches of their denominational work. They are especially aggressive in educational matters, having now under control four different schools, Bates College, Cobb Divinity School, Nicholas Latin School and Maine State Institute. Rev. O. N. Mott, and B. S. Palmer, Esq., Treasurer of the Board of Managers, having arrived, took their seats as members of Conference.

S. L. Peters, Esq., Corresponding Secretary of the Executive Committee for Sabbath Schools, submitted the following Report :

BROTHER MODERATOR :—The Executive Committee of Sabbath Schools begs to present the following as their report on Denominational Sabbath School work for this Conference year of 1892-93 :

From the First District we have most cheering information ; 10 Schools have been in active operation during the year, having a membership of 354 pupils, with 35 teachers, a gain of 4 schools, 103 pupils and 7 teachers over the previous year. Those reporting are Bath, Bumfrau, Lower Perth, Fort Fairfield, California, Ortonville, Arthurette, Mineral, Long Island, Rowena. The reports from the various Schools speak most encouragingly of the work, while the returns show 22 conversions among the pupils, leading all the Districts in that important aim of Sabbath School work, "leading the children to Christ."

The Second District reports 10 schools, with a membership of 600 pupils and 47 teachers—a gain of two schools and 147 pupils.

A loss of 12 teachers in the number of those enrolled is sustained, while in the average attendance a gain of 5 teachers has been made. 12 conversions are reported. The schools reporting are, Rockland, Waterville, Coldstream, Lower Brighton, Victoria Corner, Windsor, Knoxford, Charleston, Woodstock, and Knowlesville. Your Committee regret that the schools in connection with the other Churches in this large and thriving District have failed to report.

The Third District reports 8 schools, 495 pupils, and 46 teachers—a decrease from last year of 3 schools, 191 pupils, and 17 teachers. 14 conversions are reported. The schools reporting are, Fredericton, Central Southampton, Lower Prince William Mangerville, Upper Hainsville, Lower Queensbury, Douglas, and Keswick.

The Fourth District reports: 7 schools, 424 pupils, and 33 teachers, being a decrease of 3 schools, 111 pupils and 15 teachers, compared with last year. 7 conversions are reported. Schools making returns are, Fredericton Junction, Upper Gagetown, Blissville, Lincoln, Waasis, Tracy's Station, and Patterson Settlement.

The Fifth District reports: 10 schools, 347 pupils, and 36 teachers, being a decrease of 3 schools, 125 pupils, and 12 teachers for the year. Seven conversions are reported. The schools making returns are, Belleisle Bay, Wickham, Carpenter, Lake View, Hamilton Mountain, Narrows, Jerusalem, Hibernia, Greenwich, and Hampstead.

The Sixth District reports 17 schools, 836 pupils, and 91 teachers as against 19 schools, 980 pupils, and 91 teachers for last year—decrease, 2 schools, 144 pupils. Seventeen conversions are reported. The schools reporting are Apohaqui, Dover, Upper Coverdale, Taylor Village, Waterford, Millstream Mountain, Midland, Penobsquis, Lower Millstream, Snider Mountain, Susséx, Lower Ridge, Norton Station, Corn Hill, Moncton, Long Point, and another, the name of which was not quite clearly stated in the report.

Seventh District reports 11 schools, 1,375 pupils, and 116 teachers—a gain of 38 pupils and 3 teachers over last year. 16 conversions are reported during the year. Schools reporting are Seal Cove, Grand Harbour, North Head, Chocolate Cove, Fairhaven, Carleton, St. John; Waterloo Street, St. John; Victoria Street, St. John; Beaver Harbour, Wilson's Beach, and White Head.

The total results show that we have 5 schools, 388 pupils, and 36 teachers less than last year. The decrease occurring in the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Districts. From enquiries made by your Corresponding Secretary, I am in a position to say that there are quite a large number of schools that, through some cause, have failed to present their returns to the District Meetings, and therefore could not be embodied in this report. The want of teachers in our schools is particularly referred to by Superintendents from many of the Districts. Seventy-six and two-thirds per cent. of our schools are regularly visited by pastors of our Churches. Thirty-two per cent. of our church membership is connected with our schools, and seventy six per cent. of the children residing in their districts attend them.

It is not too much to say that in proportion to our entire church membership, as compared with other denominations, in the province, we are well in the "van" in Sabbath School work; and yet much more remains to be done in order that the field in which our churches are placed may be fully occupied. It is the prayer of your Committee that the entire membership of our Churches may be able to realize and feel the responsibility that is properly theirs, to aid and support our Sabbath Schools, as affording a grand opportunity of Bible reading and Bible study; that realizing its importance ourselves we may be able to impart the feeling to others of the great value of a knowledge of the truths recorded in its sacred pages—truths which only Holy men of God could speak—truths which burn and flame with their own divinity. May the blessing of Almighty God rest upon the efforts of this meeting.

Rev. J. McLeod, D. D., from the Committee on Deceased Brethren, submitted the following Report:

BROTHER MODERATOR:—It is the melancholy duty of your Committee to report that two of the brethren whose names have been on the roll of Ministers of this Conference for many years, have, during the year, ended their earthly activities and entered into eternal rest.

Rev. Edward Garrity died in May last, aged eighty years. He was ordained a minister of the Free Baptist Church in 1872. For several years before that—probably twenty years—he had been in the habit of holding meetings regularly, and was well known in some parts of the Province. During the last six or eight years his connection with this denomination has been scarcely more than nominal. His life was long, and had its share of perplexities and trials, amidst all of which he preserved a calm spirit and faith towards God and our Lord Jesus Christ. And now, his work and trials are over, he rests.

Rev. William Downey died July 18th. More than a year before his death he had been compelled to relinquish his charge, though until a few weeks before his death, he continued to be employed somewhat in such ways as were open to him. Bro. Downey was born at Belleisle, K. Co., May 18th, 1834, and was at the time of his death, in his sixtieth year. When only a lad he entered upon the Christian life, and made profession of faith in Christ, in baptism, at the age of thirteen. He entered the ministry when twenty-two years old, having received his first license to preach Sept. 12, 1856; and was, therefore, for nearly thirty-seven years engaged almost constantly in the work to which God had called him. He was widely known in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. He had travelled and laboured, either as evangelist or pastor, in many parts of both provinces. During his ministry he baptized nearly three thousand converts. He was pastor, for longer or shorter periods, at Woodstock, Saint John, Fredericton, Moncton, Salisbury, Sussex, Brighton, Hartland, Marysville, Keswick, Queensbury, Southampton, Canterbury, and other places. In nearly every pastorate he was given to see a good revival, and he was instrumental in promoting revivals in other places. One of the latest years in his ministry—the last full year—was devoted to mission work and many were converted. He loved his denomination, and gave loyal support to all its interests; for his brethren in the ministry he had profound regard; he loved all who loved our Lord Jesus Christ, and had joy in the extension of His kingdom; he was a good preacher, painstaking and methodical in the preparation of sermons, and preached with earnestness and effect. He loved life, and would have been glad to spend more years with those he loved, and in the work to which he was devoted—for in years and spirit he was yet young. But he had no dread of death; he met the last enemy calmly, confidently, and rejoicing that victory was his through the Lord Jesus Christ. "It is all settled—settled long ago," he often said; "I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed to Him against that day." He will be missed from the work of the denomination,

and from the sessions of Conference and other general meetings. We all mourn that we shall see his face no more on earth.

The Conference hereby puts on record its appreciation of the services of the brethren who have been called up higher, and expresses to their bereaved families profound sympathy, and the assurance of earnest prayers that they may have the ministries of the Divine Comforter in their sorrow.

Rev. J. McLeod, D. D., from the Committee on Temperance, submitted the following Report:

BROTHER MODERATOR:—The Temperance Reform is one of the striking features of present day civilization. Everywhere in Christendom consideration is being given to the effects of the liquor traffic on the physical, intellectual, social, moral, and religious conditions of the people, and its relation to industrial and commercial interests; and everywhere conscience has been so quickened that the evils of the traffic are being realized as never before. There is, we are glad to believe, a growing spirit of revolt against the tyranny of the traffic, and a strengthening purpose to have done with the bondage which, in the form of manifold evils, it has for so long imposed on the individual, the home, the community, the nation. In our own country the conviction that the traffic should be absolutely prohibited grows year by year, and we are hoping that soon the demand for prohibition will be with an emphasis that cannot be mistaken nor denied.

That the record of this Conference as to total abstinence and prohibition has never been equivocal, is gratifying. Before other denominations were dealing definitely with the question this

Conference was doing so, incurring, doubtless, a degree of ill-will, but being faithful in the face of all prejudice and opposition.

The position of the denomination, declared in church covenant, by oft-repeated resolutions of Conference, from the pulpits, and in the organ of the body, is :

(a.) That Every Free Baptist church member is a pledged total abstainer from all intoxicants.

(b.) That every member is required to give the help of his positive influence to temperance reform, and to further prohibitory legislation by every means in his power.

(c.) That it is the duty of every Free Baptist minister to give earnest advocacy from pulpit and platform, and in every way open to him, to temperance and prohibition.

(d.) That it is the duty of all good men, rising above selfish and party considerations, to give their support only to such candidates for representative positions as guarantee, by their character and pledges, that they will advocate and support temperance legislation.

We reaffirm all previous declarations and resolutions of the Conference on this vastly important question, and pledge ourselves anew to the fullest sympathy with and the most earnest endeavors in behalf of every movement to overthrow and destroy the liquor traffic. In political action we know no party as such. We are against any and every form of legalizing the deadly traffic ; we desire its utter and absolute prohibition. We do not advise our people to support one or another party, but to support, irrespective of party, men who are out and out prohibitionists. We do not desire the triumph of one or another party as such, but the triumph of Christian consciences in the delegalization and utter suppression of the hideous, hateful thing, which, established in our midst, makes such ghastly havoc.

Reaffirming, with all possible emphasis, the position taken by the Conference, from year to year, on this subject, we again declare that the attitude of Free Baptists is that of uncompromising opposition to the liquor traffic, and to every form of its legalization ; and that we are pledged, in the most solemn manner, as a denomination, to do everything in our power to procure prohibition.

BROTHER MODERATOR :—Your Committee on the Sabbath submit the following Report :

As far as the observance of the first day of the week, as the Lord's Day, is concerned, we think it settled in all intelligent and stable minds—with the unstable we have nothing to do in this report. As a denomination, we believe the first day of the week should be kept as the day of rest from manual labor and devoted to the worship of God. In order to this it should be remembered to be kept holy. The common business of life should be closed up the day previous, so that the day may be begun with God. All carnal amusements should be abandoned ; such as visiting, pleasure seeking, reading political papers, with the light literature of the day, and as much as it is possible to get to the house of God, and there join in Christian worship. The nearer we can make the day like the gathering of the family at home in the Paradise of God, the more God is honored and we are benefitted and beneficial to others, so they may say, "We have been with Jesus." We regret to know that too much Sabbath desecration prevails, such as driving, boating, and indulging in sleep, lounging about the house, or walking the fields, or sitting in some shade talking of those things that are not profitable to body or mind. And as this Conference hitherto has put on record their belief that the men in authority should exercise that authority in preventing as much as in their power Sabbath desecration.

BROTHER MODERATOR:—Your Committee on Education note
with pleasure the increasing interest in educational matters shown
by our denomination. Many of our homes are represented in
the High Schools, Provincial Normal School, and Union Baptist
Seminary. The question of education is no longer a debatable
one. We highly appreciate the work that the public schools sys-
tem has already accomplished, and yet we feel that in justice to
ourselves we must seek by all legitimate means to foster our de-
nominational school. Therefore we most earnestly commend our
Seminary, both for its educational advantages (none in its class
is superior), and for its sweet Christian atmosphere. It is doing
its work well, and we are gladdened that more and more of our
F. C. Baptist homes send their youthful inmates to swell the
ranks of its pupils.

Dr. deBlois, writing us, says : "The past year has been a pe-
riod of unqualified success. The number of students in attend-
ance was larger than ever before in the history of the institution.
The teaching staff was strong and efficient in every particular,
consisting as it did of men and women who are specialists in their

departments, and devoted to the welfare of their students. The quality of the work done was such as to inspire confidence and hope in the hearts of all friends of the school. The success of the Elocution department, under the direction of Prof. Robinson, made an associate instructor necessary; so Miss Belle Butterfield, a graduate of Abbott Academy, and of the Boston school of Expression, will assist Prof. Robinson during the present year. The departments of music have been placed under the general and most efficient oversight of Fraulein Elsbeth Meyer, a German lady of rare attainments, and a pupil of Scharneuka, the most noted pianist in the world. It is believed that St. Martins can now offer advantages in all departments second to none in the Provinces. The social advantages were also appreciated by the students, as well as the opportunities for broad and general culture. The teachers seemed to enter into the lives and ambitions of their pupils, and sought to help them and be a blessing to them in every possible way. The public recitals, and the lecture course, inaugurated during the past year, contributed to the enlargement of the privileges and opportunities of the young people. The deep religious spirit which pervaded the school during the year bore precious fruit in the conversion of some twenty of the students, whose renewed lives and awakened zeal for the Master will endure through the future years as a blessed memorial of the period of school life spent within the walls of our Christian Seminary at St. Martins. The outlook for the current year is brighter than ever. There are more students boarding in the building than there were last year, and the spirit of work and earnest devotion to study prevails on every hand. Prof. Trefry's place as mathematical master, is being ably and successfully filled by Prof. Shirley J. Case, a recent graduate of Acadia, and a young man of splendid ability. The total number of Free Baptist students enrolled last year was seven; already this year twelve Free Baptist students have enrolled themselves, and one or two others are expected in a few days. During the summer friends of the school have donated upwards of \$500, in special subscriptions, and with this amount the halls and corridors, the chapel, and other parts of the building have been painted and decorated, and eight new rooms in the upper flat have been finished, all of which are now occupied. Some \$10,000 of the old debt has been paid. The balance still hangs over the school, and another resolute effort is needed, in order to free us from this incubus, which has perplexed us for so long."

Your Committee suggests, (1.) That this Conference open a fund for the assistance of our young men studying for the ministry; said fund to be supplied by a special collection taken in all the F. C. B. Churches on the first Sabbath in January of each

year, such collection to be duly announced in the *Religious Intelligencer*. (2.) That the Home Mission Executive receive and disburse this fund.

Rev. J. McLeod, D. D., from the Executive Committee for Foreign Missions, submitted the following Report :

Foreign Mission Report.

BROTHER MODERATOR :—The work of the Free Baptist Foreign Mission in India has gone on steadily during the year. There have been such difficulties and discouragements as are incident to christian work amongst heathen peoples. But there has been, notwithstanding, a good degree of prosperity. The latest reports tell that while "Satan has not left the missionaries to work uninterruptedly, they have not had to fight their battles alone ; Christ, faithful to His promises, has been with them. Rich experiences have been enjoyed, and there are no faint-hearted ones amongst the workers." Large accessions are not reported, but "the hopes and anticipations of the missionaries are large." They say, "We believe in God. . . . Relying upon His faithfulness we work in hope." The number of missionaries being quite inadequate to the work required to be done, they have toiled much beyond their strength, with the inevitable result—some of them have become broken in health. During the last year several have had to turn from the people for whose salvation their hearts yearn, and, to save their lives for possible future work, have come home for a

season. They hope soon to be able to return and take up the work again. There are now seven of the missionaries in America, seeking the renewal of their strength, which it is hoped will come to them by rest in their native climate. Two, who had been at home for a time, have returned to India this year. But the working force of the mission is sadly reduced for the present.

Mrs. Boyer, who more particularly represents this Conference, remains at her post. No one could have shown more clearly the possession of the missionary spirit than she has. Seven years ago she and her husband left us, joyfully hoping to spend together many years in the foreign field. More than two years ago our dear brother Boyer was called up higher. This year Mrs. Boyer had to choose between coming home with her children or sending them alone. She remained, while her two little girls came home. And now, alone, in sight of the grave of her husband who gave up his life in the work, she continues in the place to which God has assigned her, abundant in the labors that must bear rich fruit. Nothing but the strongest conviction that it is the Will of God, profound love for the darkened but precious souls about her, and a deep consecration to the service of the Lord, could move her to such heroic devotion. We may well ask whether we are doing our part of the work as faithfully. Does like spirit of self-sacrifice mark our interest in and support of this branch of our Christian service?

It is gratifying to be able to report that in the India field faithful work has been done—done in the face of great difficulties and done with encouraging promise. But of our way of doing our part of the work, and of the measure of our contributions, this report has to confess, with deep regret, that the record is not at all what it should be. The condition of our Treasury is far from satisfactory. (See Treasurer's report.) The apparent lack of interest in this important work, during the past year, has been somewhat distressing. The Executive, however, having knowledge of existing impressions and fears, have believed that there is no real lessening of interest. And now that there remains no reason for uncertainty, they are expecting a marked increase in contributions.

It is not the purpose of this report to show that Foreign Mission work by this denomination is necessary; the commission of our Lord does that. It is the intention merely to ask that what we have to do be done with all our hearts, for Jesus' sake, and in a business-like way. The spirit of the Golden Rule may, without impropriety, be applied to our relations to our Lord as to our relations to each other. Do we appreciate the condition of the heathen? Do we believe that they need the Word of Life? Do we realize that we are commanded to send them the glad tid-

ings of salvation in Jesus Christ? As saved ourselves, are we anxious that others—including the peoples who are in utter darkness—be saved? If we cannot answer these questions affirmatively, what about our own saving relationship to Christ? The Executive commends the condition and needs of the Foreign Mission work to the Conference as deserving and requiring its earnest consideration during this session. The present deficit is \$350. If \$200 can be raised now, and \$1,000 during the next year, we will meet the next Conference, having done the work of the year, and without a dollar of debt.

We recommend to the Conference the re-establishment of the system, which worked admirably for several years, of designating the amount to be raised in each District, the amount expected from each Church to be named by the representatives of the District to which it belongs; and the Church officers should arrange plans for regularly soliciting contributions. To the pastors we appeal to carefully instruct the people in the duty and privilege of actively participating in the blessed work of sending the Gospel to the ends of the earth. Being in sympathy with our Lord, and being laborers with Him in the evangelization of the world, we shall not only be a blessing to many, but shall receive the richest blessings in our own souls, and on our home work.

Mrs. Boyer Reports,

BOYS' ORPHANAGE.—There are, at present, thirty-nine boys in the Orphanage. The average for the year has been over thirty-six. No deaths have occurred, and there has been no severe illness among them. Their routine of work is the same as reported last year. They sweep their house, bring water, and make their own clothes, in the morning. From eleven till four they attend school. After school they bring wood and water and then play till dark. In the evening they study their lessons. Their house is a few yards distant from mine, but their sewing, studying, etc. is done in my house. I have tried to gain and keep their confidence, the confidence which should exist between mother and son of whatever nationality, and which is such a strong safeguard against the many temptations which surround our boys. I have entered into their likes and dislikes, and the peculiar disposition of each, as much as possible, and into their cares. I feel that the gulf which often seems to exist between native and foreigner has been bridged over.

THE MISSION SCHOOL was made over to me when Mr. Griffin left. I have felt a great interest in it, especially as so many of my boys attend it. I have been able to spend a portion of every day there teaching myself, and I hope the school will benefit by it.

BIBLE WOMEN.—At Balasore three Bible Women, supported by N. B., have been in my charge. A few months ago, they, with Mrs. Griffin's Bible Women, were made over to Miss Coombs. By this they are all under one person's supervision and the work can be better planned.

Our A. C. F.'s have had their meetings regularly throughout the year, and they have been well attended. The meetings are held Sunday evenings in my sitting-room. I have purchased a number of native musical instruments, which add much to the boys' enjoyment. The active members take turns leading the meeting, and usually take great pains to come well prepared. There has been a visible spiritual growth in some, but many fall into the temptations which surround them. On the whole there has been an improvement on last year, but perhaps in no other branch of my work do I see such need for further improvement, nor do I pray so much for any other branch. I often wish that I knew the young folks at home were praying for this little band out here. Though we may know very little about one another, we may get very near in spirit around our Father's throne.

The Hindu Sunday Schools have been kept up all the year. The young men seem to enjoy the work as well as the pupils. I try to visit one each Sunday. The schools are held in a mud school house or on a veranda. Teachers and scholars all sit on the floor. They sing, have a little Bible story, and use a simple Catechism. It is a happy day for them when they come once in three months to my veranda for examination, and for some simple reward in the form of cards, little books and native sweets. Once a month the boys report on these schools and other Christian work which they are pledged to do.

SINGLA is a large village twenty-five miles from Balasore. Work here has been reported for several years. A Colporteur, named Besu, and his wife live here, the only Christian family for miles around. Both go daily among their Hindu neighbours; he, to talk, sell books, and distribute tracts, etc.; she, to sing and talk with the women. Theirs is a pleasant Christian home. On my way to Ujurda I stop with them, sleeping on the mud floor, and often sharing their food. They treat me like one of themselves, and the days spent with them are among the most restful and pleasant I have.

UJURDA.—The seed sown here in weakness about two years ago has become a fruitful tree. Ujurda has now eight Christian

families. Eleven persons have been baptized since last report, six on New Year's day of this year. Though poor in this world's goods, all contribute regularly of their earnings to the Lord's cause. They have promised at the time of harvest to set by a portion of their crops.

The school here at one time contained sixty pupils, but after New Year's, when the chief man of the village was baptized, the parents took fright and kept their children at home. There are now about twenty children and two teachers, one a Hindu and one a Christian.

Daniel Nayak is shepherd of this little flock. He is a kind, patient teacher. In the morning he visits the adjoining villages, accompanied by one of the new converts, a man of natural ability, and influential among his neighbors. In the evening the Christians meet to sing and pray and receive religious instruction. None of them can read well. Daniel's wife helps among the women. At one of their prayer meetings I heard a woman pray thus: "O Lord, I don't know how to pray. I can't pray. Teach me to pray, Lord." That was all, but she looked up smiling, as if her effort had not been unrewarded. A house is being built for Daniel. Work on it furnishes the means of existence for the poorer Christians. Their crops were almost a total failure this year.

On two occasions recently it has been necessary to discipline the new converts. One man got in a quarrel and used bad language, another upheld his son in some improper conduct. When the matter was represented to them, both confessed their faults, asked for forgiveness, and made amends as far as was in their power.

On the whole there has been much to rejoice over in the year's work. It is especially requested that those who are interested in the young people's societies will remember the little band at Balasore.

Rev. F. C. Hartley, A. B., from the Executive Committee for Home Missions, submitted the following Report :

Report of Home Mission Executive,

BROTHER MODERATOR:—Coming as we do at this time to the close of another denominational year, it becomes our duty to look back and review our work. In so doing we will learn the lesson of God's love, care and blessing. Standing as we do to-night, on the very threshold of another year, it becomes us to gird up our loins and prepare, as men of faith and courage, to follow the lead of God's Spirit.

Your Executive of Home Missions has endeavoured to fulfil as best they could the obligations imposed by the trust placed in their hands. The Board has been convened four times during the year; all the members of the Board, with one exception, have given regular attendance. There have been presented to the Board a goodly number of applications from different pastorates and pastors. These have been carefully examined into, and, as our best judgment directed, the means at our disposal have been expended to meet the most urgent needs, and where the prospect promised the best returns.

The Board twice endeavored to place a regular missionary in the field, but both the brethren sought for that position soon accepted regular engagements, and no other opportunity seemed to offer. Following the example of its predecessors your Board of this year has aimed at assisting weak pastorates and giving regular employment to ministers.

The sum of fifteen dollars was granted to Rev. T. O. DeWitt for labor expended in the Seventh District, at North Head, Grand Manan. Northern Harbour Church was assisted to the extent of twenty dollars in obtaining regular pastoral care. Rev. A. H. McLeod writes that he has visited this Church regularly once a week, and thinks good has been done by the faithful preaching of God's Word and regular pastoral oversight.

In the Sixth District the only Church to receive assistance is Newtown. This Church has for years been in a low inactive state. Rev. B. H. Nobles has received four dollars per month for care extended to this Church, and in his report to the Secretary, says: "I have preached to the Church regularly, and believe my weak efforts have not been without success. Several have recently given evidence of spiritual life, and we expect to have baptism soon." He writes that after Conference the Church will appoint new officers. We hope soon again to see a regularly organized and efficient Church at Newtown.

In the Fifth District, the Churches at Lewis' Cove, Henderson, and Akerly, have been assisted by a grant of forty dollars. Bro. S. J. Perry sends a good report from that field. He reports extensive labor; two have been baptized and added to the Church of this pastorate.

The Church at Stanley, in the Third District, received help to the extent of forty dollars. They have been ministered to by Rev. H. A. Bonnell. Two have been added by baptism.

In the Second District, the Church at Hartland was granted the sum of twenty dollars. Rev. Gideon Swim is pastor of the Church. He reports the Church as having had a year of great blessing; five have been added by baptism; a Young People's Society organized, and the outlook is hopeful. Rev. E. B. Grey, the pastor of Foreston, and Knowlesville Churches, has received thirty dollars from the Home Mission Treasury.

In the First District the sum of one hundred dollars has been expended. Twenty-five dollars was granted Rev. J. N. Barnes, who has labored most dilligently and successfully in the upper end of the District. Bro. Barnes in his report states, "My field of labor has been from Long Island to Lime Stone, with some nine preaching places. The Lord has blessed my labors; thirty persons have been brought to God, and twenty-nine added to the Churches." Bro. J. J. Barnes, who has for five years labored in this missionary district has this year received seventy-five dollars from the Board. He reports the organization of a new Church at Upper Kent, where a new church edifice is nearing completion. Sixteen persons have been baptized in this pastorate, all of whom have united with the Churches. Bro. Frank A. Currier was given a special mission of three months on the Upper Tobique. The money expended in this mission—seventy-five dollars—was raised by special subscription. The result of the mission is unknown to your Executive, but it is hoped good will result.

Your Executive has endeavored to keep the expenditure within the receipts; if more money had been at our disposal more work might have been done; as it is, we have done the best we could with the funds at our dispeal. Your Executive has this to say in regard to our Home Mission work:—It is of vital importance. If we are to live, have foliage and bear fruit, the root must be kept alive. The root of our denomination is cared for by Home Mission effort. The field opens up before us so grandly—so many open doors of opportunity for establishing new churches—so many chances to build up and strengthen weak and scattered churches and pastorates. What shall we say as we face these opportunities? Shall we say we are a small body, and cannot undertake this work? Surely not. It is true that we are comparatively small, but, brethren, what is needed is not more of us but a better brand; we need to be more fully consecrated to our own work given us of God to be performed in our own way, which to us is God's way; we need to lay hold upon God, then can we do all things; as a denomination we have a good cre. d.; the theological world seems gradually coming our way; we need

no revision ; we need more loyalty to what we have. Shall we say we are poor and cannot afford to expend our means in this direction ? Perhaps we are poor, but God often selects the poor to do great things for Him. It is not that we have not sufficient means, but it is only too true that too often what we have is not consecrated to God. When Moses stood before God regretting his lack of means, God said, "What is that in thine hand ?" So with Gideon, Joshua, and the poor peasant boy—what was required was not more or greater instruments, but a consecrated use of those already possessed. Suppose you, if we lay down before God what we have He will not use it to His honor. Let us get hold of the strong lever of prayer ; let us pray for the Divine anointing of the Holy Ghost. If we have this we will have no need to mourn any lack of interest in Home Mission work. Let us prepare to accept every challenge to occupy. Let us be ready to strengthen the things that remain. Oh for a Pauline spirit that cries out after the lead of God's Spirit. As said one of God's foremost servants, so say we, the prospect is as bright as are God's promises.

BROTHER MODERATOR:—In submitting another Annual Report, your Board of Managers wishes to say that :

1. They have attended to the denominational business entrusted to them with care.

2. All the interest due up to the time of the close of the last Conference year has been received, and it is expected that all due at the end of the present year will be paid during this session of Conference.

3. The several amounts appropriated to the Foreign Mission Executive, the Home Mission Executive, the Sick and Disabled Ministers' Fund, the Union Baptist Education Society, and the British and Foreign Bible Society, have been paid for the last year, and will be paid for the present year at once. Insurance on the church and parsonage property at Petitcodiac is paid.

4. Your Board would again call the attention of our Churches, and the Boards of Trustees, to the importance of having their churches, parsonages, and other buildings belonging to the denomination properly insured. When the title of the insured property vests in the General Conference, in case of loss, policies should be made payable to the legal agent of the Conference. All renewals of expiring policies should be promptly looked after.

5. A case has come to the knowledge of this Board, where an individual, claiming to have expended money in the erection of a church edifice which was deeded to Conference, effected an insurance on the house in his own name, without the consent or knowledge of the Board of Managers, and then was anxious to sell his policy to the Conference. It should be known that such policies, to say the least of them, possess no commercial value to the holders. Insurance can be effected only by the owner of the property or by legal representatives.

Address by the President.

Mrs. C. W. Weyman, Corresponding Secretary, submitted the following Report :

Report of the Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's Mission Society.

MRS. PRESIDENT AND SISTERS:—To-day as we meet in our eighteenth annual session it becomes my duty to lay before you the yearly report of your work in Balasore, India, which has been this year (as we have no representative of our own in the field) wholly under the direction of our very dear Sister Boyer. But before going farther allow me to join with you in thanksgiving and praise for what God has done for us during the past year.

At our last annual session we had present with us our returned Missionary, our dear Sister Hooper, who for so many years toiled faithfully in India; but since that time she thought it her duty to withdraw from us. While we deeply regretted this step we felt like bidding her God speed and are glad to know she is doing work for the Master in trying to help those who are striving to throw down the gigantic idol of Intemperance which has so long reared its hydra-head even in Christian New Brunswick. God has given us another self-sacrificing, humble, devoted Christian woman who is willing to lay all upon the altar and go forth in His name, our dear Sister Gaunce, who expects in a few weeks to sail for India. And we take this opportunity of asking for our Sister your earnest prayers, sympathy and support.

From the Foreign field we have interesting reports of work done,

yet the crying need is more workers and more means to carry on the work. Sisters, let me ask you earnestly to day, "Are we doing all we ought?" Behold the whitened fields; God says "Thrust in thy sickle and reap." "If ye love me keep my commandments."

Appended I have full and satisfactory reports from Sister Boyer, of whose love and devotion to the work I need not speak, as we have an object lesson of it this afternoon in the presence of her dear little girls whom we are glad to welcome and take to our hearts. And oh! may "Our Father," who has promised to be a father to the fatherless and the widow's God, watch between them and their dear mother while they are absent one from the other.

In a private letter Sister Boyer says: "I send you my report for the last year. Your work has been blessed, I hope this year you can send out a Sister. I have felt the need of a companion in the work from my own country who might be preparing to take your part of it when my time is up. How I wish it were possible for me to meet with you in Conference this year. I seem to see you all and hear your voices. I have had some lonely times this year but it has been a happy one in my work in most respects. I wish you could step in and see my big tall sons and how careful and thoughtful they are of 'mamma.' Also my little fellows the twins affectionate and almost inseparable from me. There are lots and lots between, too, and it does not matter a bit to me that they are all shades of brown instead of white. This work is yours too. I do feel so grateful for the generous support the ladies have given me this year. I wish there could be a little more communication and a little closer feeling between us. I hope the seeming distance is not through any fault of mine. Miss Coombs will report the work of the Balasore Bible women. The fifty dollars sent out to Dr. Nellie Phillips was made over to Miss Coombs. She will tell you how it has been used." I have the full report of Miss Coombs appended with Mrs. Boyer's.

While interested in the work abroad we are not forgetful of the Home Mission work. At our last annual session we donated fifty dollars to the Home Mission Executive; as at present we consider that the most effective way of carrying on our Home Mission work. We also pledged one hundred dollars to the Home Mission Board on conditions that they raise during the year the sum of five hundred dollars for Home Mission work. We deeply regret that the contributions to the Home Mission work have not reached the required amount. The sisters of the 6th District at their annual meeting donated twenty-five dollars to the Tobique Mission. While this is only a small beginning it is a step in the right direction. Sisters, our privileges are exalted, the possibilities before us are great. Let us be up and doing earnestly and unitedly, asking our Father for His blessing and guidance, know-

ing that "It is not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord."

Miss Hooper's Report.

DEAR SISTERS :—Through God's blessing we may rejoice in this year as a happy and prosperous one as regards your work out here. You have this year the native preacher Dannie ; his wife, who instructs the native christian women and an assistant for her, Puntí Barik, who goes about with Dannie, a school teacher for the native christians at Ujunda, and three Bible women at Balasore. This year land has been bought and a fine substantial mud house built for the native preacher at Ujunda. Dannie is the same gentle, kind preacher and careful instructor as reported. Many times since Christmas Dannie has had an assistant Puntí Barak. Before becoming a Christian he was the head of the village and a man of much influence. He goes about with Dannie to the heathen villages preaching Christ as well as he is able. He asks help in all matters concerning the christians at Ujurda. Before becoming a christian he and his wife had not lived on very friendly terms. After he was baptized he came to Dannie and said "Now I am a christian and want to live a peaceable life, so I will leave this quarrelsome woman." Dannie told him that was just the thing he must not do, that he must now bear his trials patiently. For several months he managed to do this but when I was out there last, under great provocation he struck her. On representing the matter carefully to him, he cried like a child. (Do not be astonished that he struck her. It is the common way in this country for Hindoos to manage their wives and christians are often only deterred by fear from doing likewise. In fact a christian once said to me "They have to be taught like children, what other way can we teach them but by the rod?")

The next morning we all went to his house to hold a prayer meeting for the women. After praying and talking with the wife to no effect the christian women said to her, "You know you have a bad tongue, you know you are unforgiving, now do right and make up this quarrel." For a long time she resisted but by and bye Miss Coombs cried and this added to their entreaties and the prayers of all was more than she could stand. She promised better behaviour and I have heard of no quarrels since.

At New Year's the little church out here was organized as a branch of the Balasore church. It now numbers 17. One died during the year. This number does not include Dannie nor his family. The men still meet every night for singing and religious

instruction. Dannie's wife holds meetings with the women twice a week and goes to their homes every morning to teach them to read and sew. Three afternoons in the week she and her helper, Gurubari, visit the neighbouring heathen villages.

This year is the third in which there has been a poor crop. Up to the time of sowing I was able to give the christians work on Dannie's house, and other mission property. Some I was obliged to supply with seed, rice and other help, in order that they might do their cultivating. If they are prospered this year they will repay it. Even in these* straitened circumstances they have monthly contributed a small sum for the Lord's cause.

The prosperous school of sixty pupils and three teachers, was sadly reduced in numbers after Punti became a christian. There are now less than thirty children and two teachers, one of whom will probably have to be dismissed.

Dear old Soni Barik has been ill and helpless since before Christmas. It was his work to keep the school-house clean, ring the bell and do other little services. He did much in preaching Christ by example and precept. His wife and son do his work and a small sum is still allowed him monthly. Old Madhu who takes the children across the river to and from school also has a small allowance which is included in the school account.

The Balasore Bible women Uma, Ajudyha, and Jumma have been superintended by Miss Coombs. My other cares were too numerous to admit of me going out with them. She will report their work to you.

With you, dear sister, I thank the Father for the blessing which has attended your work this year, and personally I thank you for the funds which have enabled me to carry on his work more in accordance to its needs as I saw them, than I have been able to before.

Miss Coombs' Report.

DEAR SISTERS :—When I was released from the care of the Sinclair Orphanage by the return of Mrs. Smith, I took (with other work) the oversight of those Bible women who had been working under Mrs. Griffin, Mrs. Boyer, and Miss Hooper; and the money sent to Miss Nellie Phillips from New Brunswtek was given to me to be used in support of the latter Gali, Suna, and Sorra.

Since that time Gali has gone with her husband to Contai and Sorra, with her husband, to Baliapal, but I have been glad to reinstate Ratui, an old worker of Miss Hooper's, in the work for which she is so well fitted. This leaves me two persons—Ratui

and Suna dependent on that money. The expense of their work is about Rs. 10 per month. A Bible woman is needed at Contai, and I should be glad of permission to use a part of this money in setting Gali to work there. Sorra, at Baliapal, is supported by other funds.

The fifty dollars received brought Rs. 167-4-3 of which I have used Rs. 38-6-6 leaving Rs. 128 -14-3 at present in hand.

The Home Secretary, Mrs. A. McNitch, not being present, short verbal reports were given by local members: Mrs. J. J. Barnes, Mrs. C. H. Ebbett, and Mrs. Long.

The little children of Mrs. Boyer, Missionary, were then called

to the platform, where they arrayed themselves in the native Christian costume, and saluted the audience in the Indian fashion, making their nomascars.

Four young ladies, the Misses Jessie Slipp, Minnie Colwell, Charlotte Peters, and Ada McLeod took the collection, amounting to \$17.88, while the choir sang "Throw out the life line," &c.

Miss Gaunce, Missionary elect, was called upon, and in a brief speech told something of her call to the Mission work, and her experiences, which led her to a decision. She spoke with much feeling, and was heard with interest.

Rev. G. M. Wilson, Nova Scotia Delegate to Gen. Conference, gave a short account of their Mission work, and spoke of their Missionary, Miss Wile, who is to go out in the same steamer in which Miss Gaunce will go, and which sails on the 4th November.

Miss Jessie Slipp read the Report of the Nova Scotia delegate, Mrs. C. T. Phillips.

The President stated that a trunk was being sent to Mrs. Boyer, and that any wishing to send presents to help along her work, could have them sent to Mrs. Patterson's. It was afterwards learned that the trunk would not hold all that was sent.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 17, 1893.

Meeting opened at 10.30 a. m., October 17, with Singing and Prayer. The President in the Chair.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The Home Secretary's Report having come to hand, it was read, and on motion accepted. It is as follows :

DEAR SISTERS:—Time passes so rapidly, that it does not seem possible another year has gone since we last met to review our work. Yet it is true, and again we look over the work of the year just past.

The District Secretaries speak of great need of more earnest, devoted workers. Lack of system seems to retard progress in many places. Then the past year has been one of severe trial. No Missionary in the Foreign field seems to have left, with some, the idea that money is not needed. This then is one reason why we have to report a decrease rather than an increase financially. However, next year we will have our own Missionary. As reports come from different districts, of Miss Gaunce being present at

the yearly meetings, we feel that her earnest words of love for the souls of those who are in darkness, and her simple faith and trust in God, has given a fresh impetus to the people, and that in the year to come they will support her, not only with their substance, but also by their prayers. Thus we hope to have a better year, and also a better report.

FIRST DISTRICT.

The Secretary reports greater need of advocating missions, system, and willingness of people to contribute towards Missions. She reports six Churches, and speaks of Lower Perth in highest terms of praise. This Society has been organized but little more than a year, and is doing good work, sending seventeen dollars for Foreign Missions, or almost half of the whole sum contributed by First District.

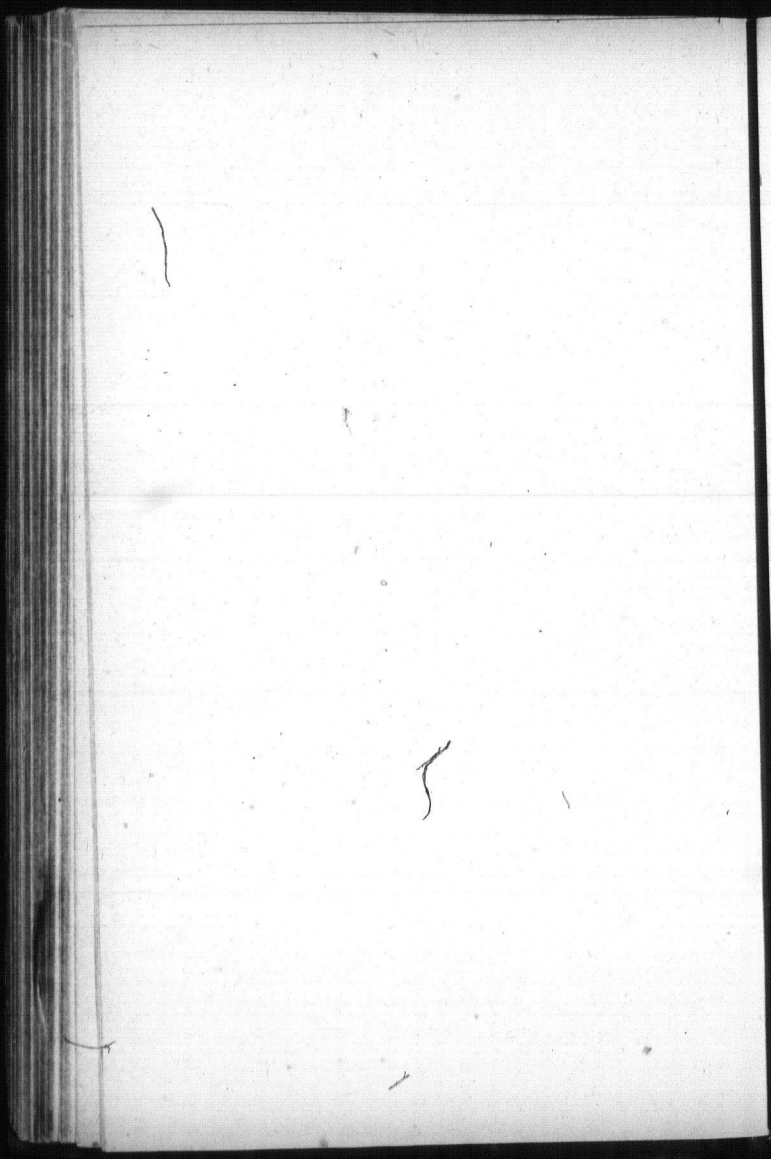
