MEN AND THINGS AT OTTAWA.

The Reign of the "Parists"—Elevation of the Standard of Political Morality—The Lake Superior Silver Mining Swindle—The Premier's Game of Grab.

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.

"Oyez, Oyez, Oyez."

"It is our object to elevate once more the standard of public morality."

"This might well bring to a termination twenty years of corrupt Government."

"Oyez! Oyez! Oyez!"

Edward Blake had proclaimed from many a hustings in Ontario, and in his place in Parliament that he did not want office and would not take office in any Government. Almost before the echo of his latest utterances to this effect had died away, Edward Blake occupied a seat in the new Government. Thus, he has no portfolio, and no salary—a position which he formerly declared no man should be allowed to occupy in a Cabinet; but it is his noble spirit of patriotic self-sacrifice, that keeps him from being at the head of a department? No, it is a clause in the terms of partnership with his law partners, which prevents any member of the firm from accepting a department in any Government. This is how he was going to "elevate the standard of political morality"—he considered it was the "STANDARD" and upon the first opportunity, "elevated" himself to a seat in the Cabinet.

Well, what do we find the "elevators" at next? The agents were their way into the office of the Toronto Mail, and by methods which they have found to prove very successful, they allege from his position, Mr. Edward Farrar, an Irishman, and one of the confidential editors of the Mail. Immediately they proclaim that even Sir John's own journalists are so horrified at his wickedness—had Sir John to try and compel to desert him.

Well, Farrar was sent to Lennox to canvass for Cartwright. He did his work well, and it is said that the management of the necessary finances was left largely to the hands of the "elevators." The "elevators" were successful. The rascals must receive their reward; and we have it announced that Mr. Farrar has been appointed Emigration Agent to Ireland.
