BONDS DISAPPEAR.
MONTREAL, QUEBEC, Aug. 30.—Fifteen
thousand dollars' worth of bonds of the
town of Outremont disappeared yesterday
afternoon. The mayor and a secretary-
treasurer received the bonds in a parcel
at the head office of Molsons Bank, and
then crossed St. James street to the office
of Hanson Bros. When the bundle was
opened there, the bonds were found to be
missing.

The missing Outremont bonds have been
found. Mr. W. Batten, a book-
keeper, employed in the Shareholder of-
fice, on McGill street, picked them up
from the pavement on St. James street,
just before Mr. Charette noticed his loss.
He was located yesterday afternoon
through the systematic work of the Cana-
dian Secret Service detective, who worked
in conjunction with Detective Van-
gahan, of the city force. Mr. Haynes,
the manager, and Mr. McCaskill took
charge of the case themselves, and soon
after it was given to them they found
people who had seen an old gentleman
pick up something that looked like the
missing bonds. The people who saw them
standing at the time on the
Molsons Bank side of St. James street,
but as a Windsor street car passed be-
tween them and the man, they lost sight
of him and he had disappeared by the
time the car had gone by. After a long
search to all the surrounding buildings,
it was found that the man had entered
Freser, Vigor & Co., and there, although
he did not know his name, a further
clue was given showing that he lived on
St. Hyppolite street. Then a systematic
search of St. Hyppolite street began with
the happy result that they found out
where he lived. They learned from his
wife that he had brought the bonds home
and kept them over night but had taken
them away with him again in the morn-
ing.

When he was seen, he refused, at first
to tell the detective what he had done
with them, but he finally saw that it was
better to give in, and told them he had
taken them for safe keeping in the Union
Bank. It appears that he had instructed
the Union Bank to write to the Molsons
Bank that the bonds were in the former
place.

DREYFUS CASE AGAIN.
**ARRAIGNMENT OF AN ARMY OFFICER THE LAST
DEVELOPMENT.**
PARIS, Aug. 31.—The arrest of Lieut.
Colonel Henry on the discovery that he
is the author of an important letter which
figured in the Dreyfus case, is one of the
most sensational developments in the
whole of this extraordinary affair. Col.
Henry has been throughout the fighting
champion of the army against Col. Pic-
quart, with whom he fought a duel.
This new development evidently, entirely
altered the aspect of both the Dreyfus
and Zola cases, and practically nullified
the evidence of general Pelloux and Boisdere
and the declarations of the Ministers of
War, M. Cavaignac, in the Chamber of
Deputies. In fact, some people believe
that perhaps the real turning point in the
Dreyfus case is reached, and that the
arrest of Col. Henry will lead to a re-
vision of the trial of the prisoners of
Dreyfus.

It appears that so soon as M. Cavaignac
assumed the office of Minister of War, he
charged the office of "bureau" to make a
thorough research of the Dreyfus case,
and it was this enquiry which resulted in
the discovery of the documents lately read
upon the surrender of General Boisdere.
The victory of Canton having failed to
suppress the rebellion and protect the American
missionaries, the United States consul at
Canton has made strong representations
to the acting viceroy, reiterating his de-
mand for the prompt suppression of the
general disturbances. The uprisings ap-
pear to have been fomented by the Triad
and White Lily societies, which have
combined for the purpose.

WAS HENRY'S SUICIDE CONNIVED AT?
PARIS, Sept. 1.—It is now intimated
that the suicide of Lieut. Colonel Henry
was connived at by the French army
authorities. In any case, the suicide
occurred shortly after the prisoner had re-
ceived a visit from an officer of the gen-
eral staff, who, on leaving, ordered the sen-
try on duty before Col. Henry's place of
confinement not to disturb the prisoner,
as he had a lot of work to do. It is rec-
alled that a similar opportunity to commit
suicide was afforded to Dreyfus, who how-
ever declined to profit by it.
It is generally believed that the rest of
the general staff of the French army will
follow the example of General Boisdere,
the chief of staff, and of General Gonne,
the under chief, and tender their resigna-
tions.

day afternoon. The mayor and a secretary-
treasurer received the bonds in a parcel
at the head office of Molsons Bank, and

of Hanson Bros. When the bundle was
opened there, the bonds were found to be
missing.

The missing Outremont bonds have been
found. Mr. W. Batten, a book-
keeper, employed in the Shareholder of-
fice, on McGill street, picked them up
from the pavement on St. James street,
just before Mr. Charette noticed his loss.
He was located yesterday afternoon
through the systematic work of the Cana-
dian Secret Service detective, who worked
in conjunction with Detective Van-
gahan, of the city force. Mr. Haynes,
the manager, and Mr. McCaskill took
charge of the case themselves, and soon
after it was given to them they found
people who had seen an old gentleman
pick up something that looked like the
missing bonds. The people who saw them
standing at the time on the
Molsons Bank side of St. James street,
but as a Windsor street car passed be-

search to all the surrounding buildings,

Freser, Vigor & Co., and there, although
