WANT FERRY SERVICE IMPROVED

More Trips per Hour and Longer Hours of Service Are Asked For.

The Municipal Council of Mann is certainly up-to-date. About thirty years ago that council advocated the building of a bridge to connect Cross Point and Campbellton, and had they received the undivided support of Campbellton citizens we see now a bridge would have been built long ago.

Now they are advocating an improved ferry service as per the following letter received by the Campbellton Town Council:

Oak Bay Mills, Feb. 27, 1920.
To the Mayor and Councilors of the Town of Campbellton:
Gentlemen,—
Our Council is endeavoring to procure a more efficient ferry service between the town of Campbellton and Cross Point and has petitioned the Minister of Public Works for a service similar to that of Chatham, N. B., viz: a round trip every forty minutes (except at noon time, when for that trip one hour and twenty minutes is taken) beginning at 6:30 a.m. and making the last trip at 10 o'clock p.m. I think that the above outline of the Chatham ferry schedule is about correct, then may be a little more time taken for the round trip on Sunday, but it runs until 10 p.m. on Sunday. The Cross Point-Campbellton ferry leaves Campbellton at 7:30 p.m. for the last trip on week days and leaves Cross Point for last trip on Sunday at 5 o'clock p.m. The complaint is general that we cannot get to or from your town after above hours. Will you kindly take the necessary steps to secure if possible a ferry service at least equal to that which the people of Chatham receive? I am gentlemen,

This letter was considered by the Council, but we are sorry to say did not evoke enough interest from our city fathers to bring forth even a resolution supporting it, and was handed over to the Board of Trade to deal with.

No doubt the Board of Trade will take up the matter in due season, but we feel that it means more business for Campbellton.

REGULAR MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Will Cost More to Keep Town Poor—Dismissed With Settlement.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presided. There were present Messrs. McKay, Ingram, Bissett and Matthews.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

An application for position at the Power House was read from Bert Nelson. Received and placed on file.

A letter from the Commission of Public Charities stating that J. P. Powers was asking for an increase of pay for board for town charges. Referred to Public Charities Committee.

His Worship stated that evidently the pump had not yet been shipped as no telegram as provided had been received stating that it had been.

Thos. Young, Sec.-Treas. Municipality of Mann wrote asking that improvements be made in ferry service. The Council of Mann wanted a round trip every forty minutes, except at noon hours, and running from 6:30 to 10 o'clock p.m.

Coun. McKay moved that the communication be referred to the Campbellton Board of Trade.

A communication was read from C. A. Alexander, re payment of land to \$10,000.

Coun. Ingram said that he had been talking to Mr. Alexander and he had agreed to see him again. He had called twice but had not been able to see Mr. Alexander, but would do so at once.

Coun. Bissett moved that the letter be referred to the Finance Committee for report.

Report of Committees were read and accounts ordered paid.

Coun. Bissett asked what had been done in reference to meeting Mr. Yorston but they had not yet come to any definite arrangements about same. He promised to have something definite for next meeting.

Coun. Bissett said that the matter of the right to take water from the Walker Brook should be taken up and rights secured.

His Worship said that this was right, some steps should be taken to attend to this.

Coun. McKay said that there had been considerable adverse criticism entertained in reference to the way the council had dealt with the electric light department matter. He thought that the action of the special meeting of the council was not right. In his opinion the action of the manager was taken to squeeze out two employees the manager considered incompetent. He thought that this discrimination against two men was uncalled for.

He gave notice that he would move for reconsideration of the motion at the next meeting.

Coun. Bissett asked if there was any evidence that the manager wanted to get clear of these two men.

Considerable discussion took place about this matter after which the Council adjourned.

Bissett the motion granting an increased \$10.00 per month to the four employees passed at a previous meeting was rescinded and on motion the recommendation of the manager of the Electric Light Department recommending increasing the salaries of Engineer Robinson and B. Larson, fifteen dollars per month was adopted.

The strike order at the Power House was in consequence called off.

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SEVEN LIVES LOST WHEN STEAMER BOHEMIAN WAS WRECKED

She Went Ashore at Sambro, N. S.
Halifax, March 2.—The citadel signal station reports that the Leyland Liner Bohemian, which was stranded on the Sambro ledge early yesterday morning and which later was abandoned, broke in two this morning and sank.

Halifax, March 2.—Seven lives are believed to have been lost and several persons injured when the crew of the Leyland Liner Bohemian abandoned their ship as she was breaking up on Sambro ledge this morning. The men believed lost included P. Ingleby, second steward, and Walter Tucker, saloon steward. Dr. Baston, ship's physician, was seriously hurt, and a deckhand named Thompson, of Boston, had broken his leg.

A FIRE COLLEGE MAY BE ARRANGED FOR DOMINION

Ottawa, March 2.—A movement has been inaugurated to have a fire college for the Dominion of Canada established in Ottawa, using as a nucleus the Ottawa fire department's training school. The matter is at present receiving the attention of the Dominion Fire Commissioner, C. Grover Smith, and the Dominion Superintendent of Insurance, O. Finlayson. They will present the matter to the convention of the Dominion Fire Chiefs' Association, which is to be held at St. Thomas toward the end of the present month.

U. S. TROOPS ARE EVACUATING SIBERIA

TURKEY'S ARMY TO BE LIMITED

Paris, March 3.—(Havas).—Turkey's army will be limited to the number of troops necessary to maintain order in Asia-Minor, according to the Journal, which says Turkey will be compelled to keep her armed forces on the Asiatic side of the Bosphorus.

THE AMHERST DETENTION CAMP HAS BEEN CLOSED

After four years and eight months service with the detention service at the Amherst camp, Lieut. J. J. Jennings of this city, supply officer and quartermaster of the camp, has returned to the city.

The camp was instituted early in 1915 and during the progress of the war between 1,400 and 1,500 enemy aliens were gathered in and detained there, during which time they were employed on various public work throughout the province.

After the armistice the prisoners were taken in small batches back to Europe via Quebec, the last lot leaving Amherst late last fall. The camp has been recently under the command of Colonel A. Morris, C. M. G., D.S.O., who has been confined to hospital in Halifax with blood poisoning for some months. Although somewhat improved, he is still suffering from the effects of the ailment.

KILLED AT ROGERSVILLE

Timothy LeBlanc of Rogersville was struck by a freight train while crossing the track about noon on Saturday and received injuries which resulted in his death soon after reaching the Miramichi Hospital, where he was taken for treatment. The deceased who was about 60 years of age, leaves a wife and family.

ENGINEERS WANT TO ALTER CLIMATE

British Group Would Dam Labrador Current and Divert Gulf Stream.

Talk of an interesting experiment has been made by a group of British capitalists who are asking the Canadian Government to grant certain concessions for a railway from Quebec to St. John's, Newfoundland.

British engineers have surveyed the route and express their belief that if a dam of masonry were built across the Strait of Belle Isle, over which their railway would pass from the mainland to Newfoundland, a radical change in climate would follow. They hold the theory that the dam would block the Labrador current from the Arctic Ocean, which is responsible for the cold climate of the North Atlantic seaboard, out of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and disperse it in the ocean. This theory further assumes that with the Labrador current removed, the Gulf Stream, flowing northward from the tropics, would come further in shore and temper the climate of New England and all Eastern Canada as far as the Great Lakes.

Into each life some rain must fall, so they say; and it is not strange that another group of British engineers (possibly not interested in the projected railway) should be heard from, uttering warnings about monkeying with ocean currents. What they say, if the Labrador current should refuse to go away and lose itself in the Atlantic, and should circle the southern tip of Newfoundland and keep it colder than ever there? Moreover these capricious objectors recall the time-honored plan of the Irish patriots to destroy England by freezing through the diversion of the Gulf Stream away from that solid island.

What if this game of interference with the Labrador current, bringing the Gulf Stream closer to New England and Canada should actually begette it away from its annual mission, warning the waves which it is Britain's sacred duty to rule? It is all very well to have a Quebec to St. John's railway, they say, but why take such chances of freezing up the beneficent warm water supply provided from the beginning by a Providence which must be considered a friend of England through trick and thin?

Why don't the engineers go ahead with their railroad and build not a dam, but a causeway resting on arches over the Straits of Belle Isle? If the time became ripe for the experiment, these arches could be taken for a test of road behavior by the Labrador current. If it showed a disposition to go away peacefully and so left, and if the Gulf Stream betrays no dangerous eccentricities, the world in general might be better with little risk to anybody.

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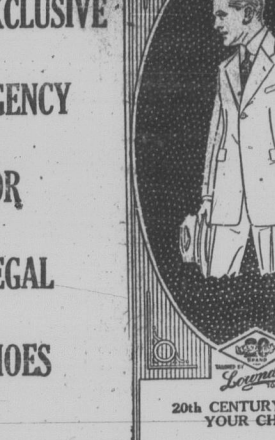

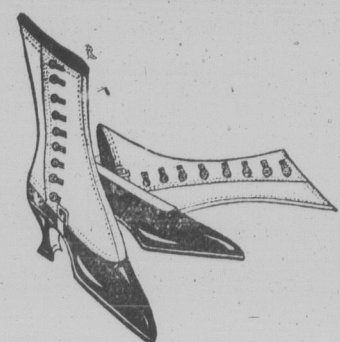

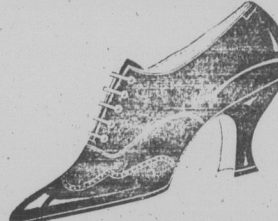

Burial Permits

RURAL DISTRICTS

As there is at times, some difficulty experienced in rural districts in obtaining permits for burial, the following proviso from the Public Health Act, 1918, may be of interest to those concerned:

Section 35. . . . "Provided, however, that in country districts, a burial may take place without such authority being given by the sub district Board of Health, so long as the cause of death and notice of burial shall be given within thirty days, by mail, to the Sub-District Board of Health by any of the parties mentioned in sub sections (a), (b), (c), and (d) of this section."

The Department of Health, however, requests that, whenever at all possible, permits for burial be obtained by the undertaker, and that only in extreme cases this proviso be exercised.

**NEAR EAST IS AFIRE**

NATIONALISTIC SPIRIT IS GAINING IN STRENGTH.

Natives of Various Countries in Asia Minor and Also in Egypt Object to the Overlordship of European Powers and No End to Their Resistance is in Sight.

MADRID, March 3.—Despatches are continuously flooding their way out of the Near East, reporting armed outbreaks in nearly all parts of that troubled region—Egypt, Syria, Arabia, Mesopotamia, Persia, the Caucasus, Asia Minor and the Balkans. There is silence on the western front, but gunfire a-plenty in the Near East.

Each of these local outbreaks may portend little or much; taken all together they are of a significance arresting the attention of thoughtful persons everywhere. Evidently armed conflict is at present on the increase in the Near East. Paris decisions are not being complacently accepted by the masses of the East. Given a modern gun and taught to use it in the war, the Oriental is making it a powerful argument for what he deems his own rights.

This mood of rebellion against Europe is no small thing. To-day Asia appears to be aflame with militant nationalism. The war cracked the crusts that held it down. In defiance of "self-determination" it will fight.

The case is gravely complicated by the fact that none of the European powers claiming protectorates or prerogatives of these aroused and now bellicose Orientals can afford either the money or the men necessary to keep them in a reasonable degree of subjugation and order. French and British soldiers are displaying an alarming lassitude as to when and where and whom they will fight.

There are at present four major centres of armed activity in the Near East, with half a dozen other scenes of recurring outbreaks. Each of the latter would have been deemed serious in pre-war times and fully written up in the press. Now a busy censorship does its best to keep the disturbing tidings from the people's eyes.

These fighting areas do not include revolutionized Russia, nor yet the bellicose Balkans or the cantankerous Caucasus. Persia and Arabia, also, are excluded, although there is gun-fire a-plenty in both places. Morocco and the other North African colonies are also burning considerable gunpowder, but they, too, are outside of the scope of the present article. What must be termed the big fighting is going on in the following four places:

1. Anatolia, which is the Western and Central part of Asia Minor and is sometimes called Turkey proper.

2. Mesopotamia, which has Baghdad for its capital city and includes the Garden of Eden.

3. Syria, better known in America as the Holy Land, stretching from Egypt up to the Taurus Mountains, and from the Mediterranean to the Arabian Desert—although subdivided by Anglo-French treaties.

4. Egypt itself, the most homogeneous of all the regions affected. The nationalist movement in Turkey has grown into a fighting force. Forays and skirmishes are frequent. All of the Allies are in disfavor with the nationalists, who want America to have a mandate for the regions in dispute.

In the meanwhile any sort of an overwhelming outbreak may take place in Anatolia. The Allies appear to have agreed to preserve at least the outward form of Turkey, which is incompatible with the retention of Western Asia Minor by the Greeks. Upon this Mr. Venizelos, who is a power in Paris, insists as a sine qua non.

Partisanship grows more bitter with every passing month, and the case of the Turks is strengthened by all delay, especially as the Turks are not foreigners, or their ability to set forth their people's claims, and it may have no relation to Turkey's past crimes as a nation. Other races in Asia Minor are not so fortunate in the impression they make upon Westerners. The practical effect is that the Turkish cause looks brighter with every passing week of inaction. This is news that will give no pleasure to Canadians.

Down in that part of the Bible lands with which the Book of Genesis largely deals, where the Garden of Eden was, and where Noah dwelt, and Abraham was born, known today as Mesopotamia, there is a fighting of a more momentous character than the public suspects.

Twelfth Night. Twelfth night is the eve of the festival of the Epiphany (January 6), which occurs exactly twelve days after Christmas. It marks the close of the Christmas holiday season, and was formerly celebrated throughout England with merrymakings of various kinds. A king and a queen were chosen to preside over the revels, which lasted until midnight, the Christmas holy and mistletoe were burned and harmless pranks, appropriate to the occasion, were indulged in.

French Textile Trade. In Lille and the adjoining cities of Roubaix and Tournai, France, where the textile manufacturers are centered, it is estimated that 30,000 men, women and children now are busied with combing, spinning and weaving, and approximately 10,000 are employed in the smaller mills of surrounding towns where progress is slower, but is being pushed with equal vigor.

ST. FRANCIS.

A Beloved Saint Who Believed in Brotherhood.

St. Francis, it is said, brought home to his age the same message which the great souls of the past are attempting to bring home to this age, and that is, love to man, the sense of human brotherhood. The change was not only to him, rather, he was the supreme embodiment of the love of his people, who at that time were just rising to the dawn of the modern age. Although boys of low birth were sometimes admitted to the cloister, the monks in sympathy with the upper class.

St. Francis' teachings brought a new attitude toward man and man. Early Franciscanians meant above all the democratizing, the humanizing of Christendom. The "carol spirit" that brought human tenderness into a religion. It made the bringing home of Christianity to masses of townsmen, homely people who needed a religion filled with vivid humanity.

To the early Middle Ages, Christ was the awful Judge, but to St. Francis, it was the little brother of all mankind. He gave a new human joy to religion. The teachings of Jesus in the Gospels, which had been had been hushed into forgetfulness in the hearts of many, but St. Francis with devoutness in his heart, thrust into life again, for to this good man love was the law of life, and he loved from duty but by inner urge. It is small wonder then St. Francis has become one of the most beloved of the saints.

Life on the Applan Way. The Broadway of ancient Rome was in its time not less famous than the main street of the American metropolis. It was called the Applan Way and along it flowed all that was most interesting and picturesque in the life of the imperial city. Thronged by chariots and the vehicles of fashion it was the favorite promenade of the idle rich, and over its smooth pavement successful generals, to whom had been granted the proud privilege of a triumph, led their returning armies with hosts of unhappy prisoners of war.

The Via Appia, however, was much more than a city street. It was the metropolitan terminus of one of the great Roman military roads. It ran in 312 B.C. it ran through one of the great city gates southward to lower Italy—Tuscanum, Tarentum and beyond. One mile beyond the gate was the magnificent Temple of Mars.

Along the thoroughfare today are ruins of once-beautiful buildings that resemble those of northern France and Belgium. And no wonder, for it was wrought by barbarians who were the ancestors of the present-day French. But there are, like others of Roman origin, extending over most of Europe, remains of a wonderful monument to a bygone civilization.

Every conquest of new territory by the ancient Romans was followed by the construction of a military road, laid out straight and without regard for mountains or other obstacles. These roads (designed primarily to facilitate the movement of troops and supplies) were of concrete, over which was usually laid a pavement of polygonal blocks of stone. Each of them was under the management of an officer of high rank, who was held responsible for its condition.

The Hub. The title, "Hub of the Universe," generally shortened to "The Hub," was bestowed on the Massachusetts State House by Oliver Wendell Holmes and has been extended in its application to the city of Boston. The allusion, of course, is to the hub of a wheel. The quotation from "The Autocrat of the Breakfast Table," published in 1858, is: "Boston State House is the hub of the solar system. You couldn't pry that out of a Boston man if you had the tire of all creation straightened out for a crowbar."

COMMONS GET LIVELY START

Liberals Delighted With Hon. Mr. King's Speech at Opening.

Ottawa, March 2.—Members are talking of reaching a vote on the Mackenzie King amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne by Thursday. However there are quite a number of speakers understood to be lined up on both sides of the House, and while nothing is definitely known yet as to the intentions of the "cross benches," led by Hon. Mr. Grew, it is expected that several of them will wish to speak in the debate whether or not there is another amendment from that section of the House.

Mr. D. D. McKeuzie, former Liberal House leader, adjourned the debate last night, and will be the first speaker when the Commons resumes this afternoon. He will likely be followed by H. M. Mowatt, Parkdale, and the next speaker for the Liberals is expected to be L. J. Gauthier, Ste. Hyacinthe.

Members on both sides of the House and also those who have thrown in their lot with the third party, expressed delight with the splendid opening of yesterday. As a rule, made interest attaches to the first few days, but this evening the Commons got away with a "bang."

Liberal members, as evidenced by the statement made after their caucus this morning were delighted with the showing made by Hon. Mackenzie King, who, to a certain extent at least, will be called upon to "win his spurs" this session.

Government members were equally generous in their praise of Sir George Foster's masterful defence of union government, when in their eyes at least had overshadowed all other efforts of yesterday.

Hume Crozier's clever address in opening the debate and that of R. McGregor, Pictou, who followed, were also being given high praise about the corridors this morning.

The cross benches are not saying much at present, but according to several of their members will be heard from to their advantage before the debate has closed.

THE NEED OF WORK.
On his seventy-third birthday Thomas A. Edison declared that he was glad the eight hour day had not been invented when he was young. "It makes me sad," said he, "to see young men shackle their abilities by blindly conforming to rules that force the industrious man to keep step with the shirker. If these rules are carried to their logical conclusion it would seem that they are likely to establish a rigid system of vocational classes that will make it difficult for the working man to improve his condition and station in life by his own efforts."

I wonder if the time will come when unions generally will teach their members how to be better workmen and train the ablest and most ambitious to become bosses and employers."

Mr. Edison's own life of unremitting application to work often 18 or 20 hours a day, is a classic of application but he does not, from his pinnacle of achievement, lecture his lazy fellowmen. How amazed must he be on looking around at present, to see the main ambition of men to see how little they can do.

He knows that in the shine and factors there is an unwritten rule among the workmen that just so much shall be deemed a fair day's work that there is a scaling down of production to suit the pace of the most shiftless. Trades unionism has its virtue but it is a dog on the feet of the better workers; those who have enough ambition to get out of the rut. In times of labor scarcity it is easy enough.

CHEAP HOMES.

Using the Material Already on the Site.
The way to own a home at a minimum of expense is to build it of material already on the site. Earth is the best material for building.

The requisite earth may be had for nothing, and there is nothing to pay for transportation. In England this idea is being taken up with the expectation that the building of mud-cast dwellings houses on an extensive scale will help importantly to solve the housing problem, bricks being scarce and expensive.

We have our own housing problem in this country, and it is daily becoming more serious. Why not use rammed earth for building?

A house of this material costs one-fifth as much as a brick house of the same size. It is quickly erected, and being finished with plaster, is handsome. Furthermore, it is an enduring structure, and is rat-proof and mouse-proof.

There are in European countries many such buildings that date actually from prehistoric times. In parts of France and Spain this simplest of all methods of house construction has long been practiced, and recently it has been adopted with great success in South Africa and other British dominions.

Planks are set up on edge to form a mold, and the space between is filled with earth, which is then rammed as tight as possible. The ramming, of course, can be done much more advantageously and cheaply by machine; likewise the digging.

If the subsoil be clay, the latter, mixed with straw and "puddled," furnishes a first-class material, utilizable in the same way. This what is called in England "cob building."

The birthplace of Sir Walter Raleigh was a cob house, and it is in as good condition as ever today.

Where Moles Beat Monkeys.

Have you ever noticed a gull dropping into the sea—how it spreads its wings high so that the feathers shall not be wetted? If a gull's wing-feathers get wet it cannot rise until they dry.

Throw a mouse into the water. It can swim a little, but as soon as its fur is soaked down it goes and drowns. So too in the case of a rabbit. As soon as its fur is wet it is done for.

A mole can swim like anything, but a monkey is very helpless in the water. Almost all land birds drowse very quickly, if unlucky enough to fall into the water. They strike out with their legs, move round and round in a circle, but cannot get off the water.

Lions and tigers are very good swimmers and do not share the common cat's hatred for the water. But of all the cat tribe the South American jaguar is the finest swimmer in the water. It seems often to plunge in for mere joy of a swim.

A rabbit, as we have said, drowns as soon as its fur is soaked through, yet curiously enough its near relative, the hare, swims quite well, and will often cross a river when hunted.

Bears are good swimmers, even those that usually live far from large sheets of water, and the common rat is no mean performer.

One of the best of animal swimmers is the horse. Horses have been known to swim a river nearly a mile wide simply to get back to their old stables.

Deer, too, can also swim well. There are cases of caribou having swum across lakes ten miles wide when escaping from forest fires.
