

AN EGG AND POULTRY HIGE COM-MISSIONER.

During the last fiscal year, the taxpayers

Londe of Cauada paid for the support of Sir of Canada paid for the support of Sir Charles Tupper, High Commissioner of Canada in London, nearly \$14,000. They contributed over \$7,500 for salaries for assistants to him in the Lon-don office, including \$2,325 66 for a secretary, and \$1,574 55 and \$1,109 75 for clerks in the same establishment. They paid nearly \$5,000 for salaries to men in the Canadian agent's office at Liverpool; over \$3,000 for the agent's office at Glasgow; \$730 for help in the Bristol office; \$1,730 for the Dublin office; and \$2,477 to an ex-Tory M.P.P. from this Province, who now holds the Cana-dian agency in Belfast.

This seems to be a tolerably lib-

eral expenditure of public money for Canadian agencies in Great Britain. Yet we are gravely given to understand that the entire collection, costing in the aggre-gate many thousands of dollars, cannot dis-cover for the Dominion Government the conditions on which trade in eggs and poultry can be carried on between Canada and Great Britain. duty upon barley, eggs, potatoes, hay and live stock has not affected prices at all unfavorably. From this it draws the inference that no harm has been done to Canadian farmers, and also that the consumer pays the duty. Its statement of the matter is somewhat poculiar, and we are not sure of understanding it. It says the result "intended and obtained" by the raised tariff is that of "securing by protection higher prices for the farmers in the United States, from which it follows that the duty on similar products when imported falls upon the consumer, not upon the Canadian producer." From this it would appear that farmers in the United States are receiving for their barley, potatoes, eggs, hay and live stock the old price for these articles plus the duty imposed under the McKinley tariff, and that farmers in Canada are receiving just as good prices as if the Mc-Kinley tariff had no existence. This might be very comforting if it were true; but there are some things which even the Empire does not understand. Barley maintains its price for two reasons, the first being that the great bulk of it was shipped into the United States before the tariff came into hanksgiving.

A substantial brick building has been obtained, and a steward engaged, under whose supervision ready they will be placed in a tin received made to fit into a galvanized iron box, the hollow sides of which are filled with boiling water, thus keeping the food hot when it is carried in delivery wagons to the various houses. From the tin dishes the soups, steaks and sauces will be transferred to each lady's own china, which will be washed at home as before. The expense of this one large kitchen in the way of food, fuel and gas is not going to be one-tenth as much as that of 50 small ones. The num-ber of stockholders will be limited to 50.




