He was born at Kelvedon, Eng., June 19, 1834, was educated at Colchester and Cambridge, and alterward became when in a school at Newnarket. Some of his relatives proposed that he should enter one of the independent colleges, but as he had adepted Baptist views he joined one of their congregations at Cambridge. It was at Feversham, near Cambridge, that he delivered his first sermon in 1850. He was then 16 years old. Soen afterward he accepted an invitasermon in 1850. He was then 16 years eld. Soen afterward he accepted an invitation to become paster at Waterbeach. He soon became a well-known character. The chapel at Waterbeach was filled and he drew crowds that overflowed it. Invitations to preach were sent young Spurgeon from surrounding places. His fame reached London, and he was offered the pastorate of one of the city churches. He first preached in Southwark, London, in 1853, being then 19 years old. He met with so much success that before two years had passed it was considered necessary to greatly enlarge the chapel. The enlargement, however, proved insufficient, and his hearers multiplied so rapidly that it became expedient to engage the that it became expedient to engage the surrey Music Hall. In 1861 the Metro-politan Tabernacle was good and in this Surrey Music Half. In 1861 the Metropolitan Tabernacle was opened and in this
church Mr. Spurgeon preached for 30 years,
during which period his fame constantly
increased. Mr. Spurgeon published his
weekly sermons for 30 years. He also

In 1856 Mr. Spurgeon founded the Psators'
College, which has educated over 700
men, atterward engaged as Baptist pastors,
missionaries and evangelists. The Stockwell Orphanage, founded in 1867 by Mr.

The Metropelitan Tabernacle Colportage Association has 80 or 90 agents, occupying districts in different parts of England. Mr. Spurgeon also established years ago a "book fund" which has distributed free of cost over 80,000 volumes to indigent ministers of various denominations. Mr. Spurgeon as very much loved by his people. TROUBLE IN CHINA.

TWENTY DROWNED!

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 31.—The British ship Ferndale, coal laden, went ashore Friday morning, five miles north of the entrance to Gray's harbor. Twenty of the crew, including the officers, were drowned. Three of the crew reached shore alive.

Where the Ferndale went ashore is 70 miles north of the mouth of the Columbia River. The wreck occurred at daylight. Twenty lives were lost, including that of Capt. Blair. The dead body of the mate encased in a life preserver has been found on the beach, but none of the other bodies are yet recovered. The vessel is reported a total loss. She sailed from Newcastle, N. S. W., Nov. 6 for Portland, Ore. The scene of the wreck was a mile from where the Abercorn was wrecked.



### A TERRIBLE DEATH.

Conductor George Hawthorne, of This City. Smothered in the Tunnel.

Particulars of the Sad Affair- His Train Breaks and He Is Leit Behind-His Companion Recovers-The Body Brought Home.

The body of George H. G. Hawthorne was brought to his sorrow-stricken home in this city yesterday. His death was a terrible one.

Mr. Hawthorne was one of the railway Mr. Hawthorne was one of the St. Clair mehosen to run through the St. Clair nnel, and he has been a train conductor cre since it opened. He left the American there since it opened. He left the American side at 4:20 a.m. yesterday. It is not an infrequent thing for a train to be divided in the tunnel. For the first half of the journey it goes speedily down grade, and in the check received by the commencement of the ascent to the other side couplings sometimes break and cars are parted. Such was the case with Mr. Hawthorne's train, and he was left with Brakeman Joseph Whealen on the rear part. As is customary, the locomotive took the cars that remained attached and shunted them on a sidetrack outside the tunnel. Brakeman Aldridge then returned with the engine to the tunnel, connected the cars that had been left behind and started towards the Canadian side, when the train once more separated. The cars that remained with the engine were again taken outside and a second return made. Aldridge noticed that neither Whealen nor Hawthorne made their appearance, and he commenced to look for them. He was horrified to find the former lying on the track apparently suffocated, and a moment afterwards came across the other in the same condition. The hodies were instantly put on the locomotive and brought to the tunnel station. Medical aid was at once summoned and physicians made every effort to revive them. They succeeded in resuscitating Whealen, who lives in Point Edward, but poor Hawthorne was beyond human aid, and passed away without a gleam of consciousness to brighten his last moments. The remains were placed on No. 40, due here at noon, in charge of Conductor John Wilson, of this city, whose run is also in the tunnel. They were met by a number of his friends, including about 25 members of the Order of Railroad Trainmen, and conveyed to the family residence, 527 King street, after having been coffined at Ferguson's establishment.

The rapid increase of extremely fast trotters is demonstrated by the fact that in the stable of the veteran trainer, Budd Doble, this coming season there will be three trotters, anyone of which will in all probability be able to beat 2:10. Two years ago but one such trotter could have been found in existence.

What Arion will do as a 3-year-old is What Arion will do as a 3-year-old is problematical. As a 2-year-old he was the greatest colt that ever stood on iron, and if he trains on, as he is licensed to do, as we have Senator Stanford's word that he is sound, he will come as near being the two-minute trotter as any yet born. While there is no direct authority for the statement it is more than likely that if the celt is trotted this year it will be under the direction of the master reinsman, Doble.

The discussion of the development question touched mainly on its advantages or disadvantages as applied to animals intended for reproduction, but by studying the results of the annual sales of trotting stock, many of which take place during this season of the year, one is enabled to see where development of parents is a decided advantage. It will be noticed that the get of an undeveloped sire or of a sire whose get have not been developed are not sought after at paying prices. Unless a breeder has a sire whose turf performances have made him popular or his get has been developed and shown a considerable amount of speed, he will do well to keep them at home rather than to sacrifice them at a public sale, where the majority of the buyers base their judgment on the performances of the sire or his get. 


