



The Mining Boom.

Papers Relating to the English Syndicate Brought Down.

The Company Must Pay Out \$120,000 in Three Years and Also Pay the Usual License Fees.

Toronto. March 15.-The Ontario Government last night officially made public the conditions upon which the ining concession in the Rainy Lake district has been made to the Engle due syndicate. The names of the associates of Col. Engledue were also made public. The syndicate is composed of Col. Engledue, of Byfleet, Surrey, England; Mr. James Reid, of London, England, and Mr. J. K. Kerr, Q.C., of Toronto. The return shows that the sizes of the concessions were not correctly stated at first. Instead of amounting to 64,000 acres, the dis trict covers but 46,000 acres, in two blocks, each of 23,000 acres. The announcement first made was that these were one of 44,000 acres and the other of 20,000. One district is on Red Gut

Bay, Rainy Lake, and the other on the Shoal Lake peninsula.

The return comprises an official opinion by A. White, Deputy Minister of Crown Lands, and Archibald Blue, director of the Bureau of Mines These officials say that, while the proposition is a novel one, and not perhaps contemplated by existing regulations, yet, under all the circum stances, it is worthy the favorable consideration of the Government. They regard it desirable that the aurifer-ous wealth of lands in the Rainy River district and of the other parts of the province should be determined accurately and beyond doubt, it have ng been a matter of criticism that neither the work of the geological survey of Canada, nor of the provincia surveys is on a sufficiently close and thorough basis to determine the existence of minerals in the waste lands of the Crown in the province. The objection that this area is withdraw from the market is met by the argument that 46,000 acres is only a small proportion of the 20,000,000 acres over which gold has been found. They deny that this is a blanket applica-

There is no doubt (the official report says) that the work of this company f successful, will stimulate explora ion and development all around the vicinity where its operations are carried on, and will be a great advantage to the district and to the province.
