



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

Position of the Liberal Party Explained.

Mr. Balfour on Intervention in the Spanish-American War. PROTEST FROM JAPAN.

Washington, June 10 .- Japan has entered a strong protest against the duty on tea provided for in the war revenue bill, on the ground that a uniform duty of 10 cents a pound on all teas, cheap or dear, will have the effect of ruining Japan's tea trade with the United States.

ANGLO-AMERICAN UNITY. London, June 10.-The Westminster Gazette this afternoon, commenting upon the American suggestions that the Liberals are hostile to the proposed Anglo-American understanding, says: "The Liberal party desires nothing more than to draw close the bonds with the United States. If its leaders draw attention to points needing careful handling, it is because, judging from the present conduct of foreign affairs, they have grounds for fearing that the best policy may be wrecked by lack of wisdom and perseverance. If we plead for care and caution in dealing with the United States, it is because we are anxious to save that

cause from the fickleness of the present government." BRITAIN AND THE SPANISH-

AMERICAN WAR. London, June 10.-In the House Commons today, Mr. A. J. Balfour, government leader, replied to a question as to whether "in view of the condition of the populace of Cuba and the sufferings and evils arising from the Spanish-American war, her majesty's government or any of the European powers have any intention of intervening to secure a cessation of hostilities by inducing one or both belligerents to negotiate terms of peace.' He said: "Her majesty's government will gladly take any favorable opportunity for promoting a cessation hostilities and negotiations for peace. But any action upon their part for this purpose can only be undertaken if there is reasonable prospect that it will be well received by both parties and of its being likely to lead to an agreement between them. Unfortunately, there is not sufficient ground for believing this condition exists.

A dispatch from Montreal says that Sir Adolphe Chapleau lies in a dying coffdition at the Windsor Hotel in that city. Since his return from the United States health resort, Sir Adolphe has sunk rapidly, and it seems to be only a question of hours, or days at the Interesting Meetings of the most, when the end will come.

Sir Adolphe Chapleau, who is in his 58th year, has long been a prominent feature in Canadian public life. He entered Quebec Legislature as member for Terrebonne at Confederation, and in 1873 joined the Ouimet Government. ARMY AND NAVY.

Terms Used in the Two Branches of the Service.

Just now, when many are interested in the movements of the United States army and navy, the average reader is not unlikely to become confused with the multiplicity of terms and titles employed in the newspapers. He may make mistake, for instance, of thinking that a captain in the navy is the equal in rank of a captain of the infantry or are two kinds of squadrons, one which runs on land, and anothe" which travels on the water; that a regiment of artillery consists of twelve batteries of six guns each, and that a regiment of cavalry is composed of twelve ops, two or more of which form a squadron. The relative rank of the ofcers of the army and navy, and the divisions in the formation of these two branches of the service are as follows: RELATIVE RANK OF THE OFFI-

CERS OF THE ARMY AND O Army—General or commander-inef; lieutenant-colonel; major-general; brigadier-general; colonel; lieutenant-colonel; major; captain; first lieutenant; second lieutenant. Navy-Admiral; vice-admiral; rearmander; lieutenant-commander; lieutenant; master; ensign.

DIVISIONS OF THE ARMY. Squad-A subdivision of a company, umanded by sergeant or corporal, Platoon-Half of a company, commandeduby a lieutenant. Company-Not more than one hundred men commanded by a captain. Battalion — Four ompanies, commanded by a major. legiment — Three battalions, commanded by a colonel. Brigade-Two er more regiments, commanded by a brigadier-general. Division—Two or more brigades, commanded by a major-general. Corps-Two or more divisions, commanded by a lieutenant-general.





Coupled with this information comes the news by the return of the steamer Willapa that considerable wreckage from the lost steamer, inclusive of four of the boats, has been discovered at different ports along the coast. The gasoline launch belonging to Major Ingram's mountain climbing party also has been found by Indians. It floated upright, although the sea had flooded it. There were a number of books and papers in the boat but no bodies, and the natural supposition is that the six who were seen in the boat when it left the schooner have all been washed overboard.
