Detroit, Mich., June 19.—The latest reports show that twelve collisions took place on the upper lakes on Sunday as a result of the fog that day. This is a record. No lives were lost, but the little steamer Ryerson, with twelve passengers on board, had a very close call at Whitehall, Lake Michigan, when she was caught on the bow of the Goderich liner Georgia and almost cut in two. 

High School Inspector of Ontario Quits After Long Service.

Toronto, June 18 .- Mr. John E. Hodgson, M. A., high school inspector since managementare expenses exp 1882, and one of the best known educationalists of the Province has forwarded his resignation to the Government, having found the great amount of traveling necessitated by the position and the long absences from home somewhat burden-It is not improbable that Mr. Hodgson will return to the teaching profession. Mr. Hodgson was born at Whitby and is a graduate of the University of Toronto, being the medalist in classics in 1873. He was classical master at the Cobourg and Hamilton Collegiate Institutes respectively, leaving the latter to go to the high school at St. Marys as principal. Later he went to the Brantford Collegiate Institute, succeeding Dr. James Mills, afterwards president of the Ontario Agricultural Collegiate at Guelph, and now of the Dominion railway commission, as principal. He left that position to become high school inspector in 1882.



War Office as to Potted Stuff in the South African Campaign.

London, June 18. - Chicago again formed the subject of several questions

Mr. Hicks-Beach (Conservative), son of the former chancellor of the exchequer, asked War Secretary Haldane what quantity of Chicago canned meat was supplied to the troops in South Africa during the late war, and what more properly to have been ascribed as due to ptomaine poisoning.

The secretary replied that rather more than half the canned meat had come from the United States. The war office knew nothing of any cases of enteric fever which would b classed at ptomaine poisoning. Mr. Lea (Liberal) wanted to know

if the war office would not issue an order requiring every can of meat supplied to the army to be plainly carried high, as is his habit, "Yes," he stamped with the date of manufac-The secretary said that such had



Ascot, the most fashionable race meeting in the world, commences today. It lasts but four days, and King Edward and most of the members of the royal family probably will be in attendance daily. It is an interesting spectacle when the royal procession, headed by the King, wends its way up the course from nearby Windsor Castle just before the saddling bell rings for the first race. This year it is expected Mrs. Longworth will be a member of the party. The pageant will be seen on the opening day and on Thursday, cup day, but on the other two days of the meeting the distinguished party is allowed to enjoy the races in comparative quiet. The year's Ascot programme is a brilliant one, including 28 events which are expected to attract all the best horses in training, not only in England, but on the continent as well. The famous Gold Cup is of course the feature. Twenty-seven nominations were made last January, but owing to the severity of the contest, two and a half miles over a hilly course, and also the presence of the unbeatable Pretty Polly, the field probably will be comparatively small. An interesting starter will be the Australian-bred Great Scot, which twice has won the most important race in India, the Viceroy's Cup, for his native owner, Mr. Apear. Until recently the unbeaten Austro-Hungarian mare Patience was regarded as the most dangerous antagonist Pretty Polly would have, but Patience broke down during her preparation. Noctourjorm, the New Zealand champion, was brought to England early in the year with a special view to this race, but he must carry a 4-year-old's weight, while, being foaled south of the equator, he lacks several months of attaining that age. Lord Rosebery's Cicero and the Leger winner Challacombe also are eligible.-Chicago Tribune.

If Maud Keswick, 2:03 3-4, stays sound she is certain to capture the world's record for pacing mares. The Canadian mare is now at Cleveland in Nance Nuckols' stable and will remain there until the grand circuit opens, when she will again be taken in charge by the Canadian trainer, Havers James, who raced her last year and who wintered her. She was sent to Nuckols in order that she might have the advantage of the mile track, while James raced the balance of his string on the half-mile tracks for a few weeks. Nuckols recently drove the daughter of Keswick three miles in 2:15, 2:16 and 2:14 1-2, and the Cleveland critics declare she is as good as a 2:05 pacer right now. It is no secret that her owner believes that she will take a record as fast as two minutes, for not long ago he put a price on her, on condition that if she could not show the prospective purchaser a mile in two minutes there would be no sale. If Maud Keswick comes to Buffalo in the form which her trainer expects her to be in at that time, she will put such a race in the 2:04 pace as will lead the Canadians, who are always here in great numbers, to give vent to a louder yell than they did when she won the 2:18 class here last year.
