### FAMILY MURDERED AND HOME BURNED TO CONCEAL CRIME

Seven Charred Bodies Found in Binghamton N. Y., Home Reveals Tragedy.

Binghamton, N. Y., Aug. 19.—The charred bodies of Philip Roth, his wife and five children, were found in the ruins of their home, twelve miles east of Willseyville, Tioga County, on Saturday. The house, which was located in day. The house, which was located in a remote section of the county, had been burned during the night. An investigation conducted on Sunday by Coroner Holly of Candor, District Attorney Beck and Sheriff Bixby of Owego, led to the discovery of a shotgun on the floor of the room in which the bodies were found, and a bullet hole in the skull of one of the victims gave evidence that all may have been murdered and the house fired to conceal the crime.

Food Controllers State Supply Is Ample If Economy Is Practiced.

Universal war bread of better quality than last year for all the nations fighting Germany, practically without rationing, will be one of the chief results of the food controllers' conferences in London, Herbert C. Hoover, American food administrator, announced to the Associated Press today. He added that there will be ample supplies of fats and meat if the populations are economical and avoid waste.

"The danger of privation is now past," he declared. He said the people of North America are now able to take overseas the great bulk of food supplies required, and it will therefore be possible to curtail the total length of the voyage necessary to bring these supplies to the European Allies, thus supplies to the European Allies, thus hands. supplies to the European Allies, thus effecting a considerable saving in

Mr. Hoover said a program had bee reached regarding the different commodities that are required, not only to maintain the health, but the comform of the armies and civilian populations. He appealed to America for "continued rigid economy in consumption to meet the increased demands of Europe and to enable us to carry over from this year's harvest a stock of foodstuffs that will form positive in surance against any possible climatic eventualities in the next harvest."

FRENCH CONTINUE PROGRESS.

London, Aug. 19, 4:45 p.m.—French troops penetrated into the village of Le Hamel, on the hills west of the Oise and northwest of Ribecourt, today, according to advices from the front, During the fighting today the French were on the aggressive, but made some slight headway against the determined German resistance between

On the new Somme front, local fighting continues, the Entente Allied forces biting off pieces here and there all along the line. Patrol fighting has continued, and there are some indications that the enemy has made up his mind to withdraw from the present front, but would rather go back in contact with the British so as to inflict all the casualties possible by the free use of machine guns and without himself risking many of his own men.

#### ST-MARD-LES-TRIOT NEAR ROYE CAPTURED BY THE FRENCH

London, Aug. 19 .- St. Mard-les-Troit, a little over a mile south west of Roye, was taken by the French yesterday, according to reports from the battlefront. The French also captured the town of Beuvraignes, 23/4 miles south of St. Mard, according to dis-

The new French line runs from Fontenoy to the ridge south of Andignicourt. From there it runs to Nampoel, which the French have surrounded, and extends to the edge of the Montagne Forest. It passes about fifteen hundred metres south of Carlepont, and finally joins the old line north of Tracy-le-Val. The French now hold rather important high gound to the south of Andignicourt.

#### FRENCH ADVANCE TWO MILES.

London, Aug. 19.—The French Tenth Army, which attacked the German positions between the Oise and the Aisne last night, has penetrated to an extreme depth of nearly two miles. The enemy machine gunners are resisting desperately, and the German air service is also very active.

# **COME THROUGH BELOW 6,000**

Total Casualties Far Below Prisoners Taken.

REMARKABLE PERFORMANCE

Two Boche Divisional Head. quarters Captured-Not a Kink Left in Line.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA, Aug. 18—Canadian casualties sustained in the fighting in which
the corps has recently participated to
its further honor and glory are declared the corps has recently participated to the surprisingly light.

It is estimated that they total between five and six thousand, and are less than the prisoners captured.

Viewed from the standpoint of the importance of the gains made and prisoners and booty captured they are in fact lighter by far than any sustained by the Canadian troops in any former engagement of importance.

For comparison the second battle of Ypres may be cited, which cost the first Canadian division alone 5,000 casualties; the taking of Vimy Ridge, where 13,461 casualties were sustained; Lens, where casualties totalled 10,134; Hill 70, 10,000, and Paschendaele Ridge, in the taking of which last autumn the heavy total of 24,530 casualties were sustained.

CANADIANS HAVE IRONED OUT DANGEROUS KINKS.

WITH THE CANADIAN FORCES IN
THE FIELD, Aug. 16.—(Noon)—Via
London, Aug. 18.—A splendidly-organized and executed combined operation
by the troops has resulted in the complete straightening out of our line in
our right, northwest of Roye, by the
capture of the strongly-held villages of
Parvillers and Damery. The latter
place fell into our hands yesterday afternoon. Witnessing our success the French immediately south of us ave a fine example of their traditional elan and dash and made a brilliant attack. They carried the wood of Damery, Villersles-Roye, and Scaurin. When they had brought their line up parallel with our own, as a result of a week's fighting in own, as a result of a week's fighting in which the originally-selected field of assault was extended by our French allies many miles south and east the entire line from Albert to Soissons had been straightened, immensely to our

advantage.

No Weak Spots in Line. We offer no salients to an enemy thrust, even if he were in an adventurous mood. The victorious course of the second battle of Amiens occasioned the second battle of Amiens occasioned a loss to the enemy of some thirty thousand prisoners and well over six hundred guns besides thousands of machine guns, immense stores of material of all kinds and almost the entire fruit of his great drive of last spring.

Fighting over the self-same, but in the contrary direction, the Allies are almost everywhere debouching onto the ancient battlefield of the Somme. Enormous booty has fallen into the hands of the French these days. As the enemy has retired sullenly from the pocket southwest of Roye, blowing up ammunition dumps and destroying so far as he could the heavy guns he could not extricate because of the suddenness and violence of their onslaught, which carried them each day to the very crest of our wave of penetration, the Canadians did brilliantly.





LABOR FOR COAL MINES.

CANADA chose to hire coolie labor the country could mine a large supply of coal which is not available now because of the shortage of miners. Hon. F. B. Carvell has advocated the importation of 10,000 of these workers from the Orient because he believes the country is facing a coal famine, which will cause "untold suffering" to thousands of people. He would not permit the Chinese laborers to remain in Canada for any length of time, making it plain that his idea would be to send them home again as soon as the coal shortage had been relieved. As the minister of public works views the matter, it is a case of overcoming our aversion to the employment of such labor or freezing during the coming winter. Would organized labor prefer to go short on coal this winter rather than compromise with its longrecorded conviction that east is east and west is west, and never the twain shall meet in the labor

markets of Canada? It is a most difficult problem for the whole country. There are few public men and newspapers who care to commit themselves on the question for fear of the offence they might give organized labor. They realize that the Chinese laborer is being used by tens of thousands in France. and that he has relieved many other men for the fighting forces. He is used in France and given what to him amounts to big wages because of the war crisis. The same war crisis, one degree removed, is what causes the labor shortage at the coal mines of the east and the west. While Canada has a tremendous supply of coal, it has not the men to take it from the mines. The west could double its output and be independent of Pennsylvania anthracite, and the east could secure a supply more than adequate for its needs, were it possible to obtain labor. The importance of the coal question has been brought to the attention of the Government time and again, but nothing has been done, and it may be taken for granted the other members of the cabinet will not be as bold as Mr. Carvell in regard to the employment of coolie labor. The only means by which this labor could be secured would be with the co-operation of organized unions. Some leaders of the labor movement would have to be consulted and convinced of the necessity for granting a special dispensation for the use of Chinese during the labor crisis. In the United States Sam Gompers would sit at a table and discuss the matter with frankness. If Woodrow Wilson told him that the welfare and comfort of the nation were at stake. Gompers would be able to lay the matter before his labor men, certain that if he advanced the matter in good faith and presented his assurance that the use of such labor was to be temporary, it is quite possible that organized labor would agree. They would feel as a man might feel who was drowning, and who must be saved by a boatload of Chinese or perish. In the hour of peril, one would not prevent the rescue of himself or anyone else because of the nationality of the rescuer. If the importation of coolie labor is the only method that will save the coal situation for Canada. The Advertiser believes that a round table conference with labor officers would do much to relieve the prejudice. More coal would be secured almost immediately, the Chinese would come in with the understanding that they were to be sent | else back when the shortage was relieved, and the public should have the whole question explained. While there is good news each day, it is not likely that the man power of the country will be asked to do less, and if the military drafts upon the laborers continue, the industrial situation will be much more acute. Now is the time for combined action.

#### A CORRECT ESTIMATE OF "THE DAY." RANK H. SIMONDS quotes a statement made to him by Paul Azan of the French army in April last. It should be emphasized because of its correct estimate of what might happen. It is herewith given:

"The present German situation is by no means free from grave dangers for the enemy. Attracted by the bait of Amiens and of the railroad thence to Paris, they are thrusting forward toward this objective and have thus created a salient dangerous to themselves. The conquest of a zone of land, however large, is of no advantage if the acquisition be too costly, or if it places the troops which occupy it in an unfavorable

"Both these conditions apply to the situation of the Germans today. Not only have they lost very heavily, but they run the risk of being exposed to cross-fire, and if a counter-offensive is launched at the base of their salient they are in strange and new?" danger of having their first line troops taken from behind and cut to pieces. Their troops are obliged to concentrate in the salient if they intend to enlarge it, so that their effort to increase their success will expose them to the gravest disasters.

"When such a salient cannot be enlarged it is best to evacuate it, but a retreat is almost as dangerous as a continuation of the attack. If the Anglo-French army watches its chance the enemy cannot evacuate the salient without being attacked, and it is well known that an attack during a retreat may bring on a disaster.

"Thus Gen. Foch seems to hold the prey in his hands. The situation as it exists today (April 9) was certainly not foreseen. It is not the result of strategic calculations, but it may turn to the advantage of the Allies.

"The reason why the general reserve army of the Allies has not 72t intervened is probably that body plays Wagnerian music any more," "No-

it has not yet been fully constituted. Gen. Fock knows better than anyone else how to utilize this army of reserves. He doubtless will be careful not to throw it into battle until he is certain there will not be another German attack somewhere else; he knows enough to wait until the enemy's reserves are used up in constant effort, and until, little by little, his troops have been decimated by long effort. So the day he does send his reserves into action may mark the beginning of a great victory."

Time has fully justified his comment and Foch has scored a great victory, with further and greater possibilities.

#### THE CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTOR.

ONSIDER the conscientious objector. He goes to penitentiary either because of his convictions or his cowardice. He is brave enough to face imprisonment, injury, or death itself, rather than take up arms, or cowardly enough to risk the brand of base timidity, to be sent to prison for years so long as he does not face the possibility of coming to physical harm. Classified generally, the man who refuses to serve his country in her hour of dire peril, even to the point of suffering ignominy, gets the credit or discredit of being the possessor of "a yellow streak." He has reached forth his hand and accepted the white feather as the mark of his character.

What manner of moral revulsion is to be visited upon him in his two types? The law says he is a coward and sends him to prison for his lack of courage. It may be that the objector had no physical fear, but that his religion possessed him with so strong a sense of obligation he could not enter military service without consciousness of sin. He may have a warped idea of what true meekness is. With the desire to resent a wrong removed from the breast of humanity, the race might become a herd of "dumb driven cattle." But the man whose religious convictions declare to him that he must abstain from warfare may have an obsession that cannot be ascribed to a pusillanimous nature.

The other type must be considered an unfortunate being, born with a physical fear which he cannot overcome. Rather than face the chance of receiving a physical injury he will accept the contempt of the world, certain to find no sympathy except from other craven spirits. Even the prisoners in the penitentiary will regard him with scorn, and his lot in prison must be a long Mr. Gabb. period of shame. Worst of all he will be regarded as a negative quantity in life. He will carry a prison record of a kind that can hardly be lived down. He is an object of pity, ranking low in the scale of humanity, the opposite pole of the man who has gone forward to offer his life for a

Arrival of Mikado's Army at Far Northern Russian Port Has Been Effected in Shortest Possible Time-The Czecho-Slovaks Cheered Over Presence of the Allied Troops.

VLADIVOSTOK, Monday, Aug. 12.—
(By the Associated Press).—Japanese forces have landed and joined the British and French. The Allied contingents received ovations at many points on their way to the front. The British occupied the first line and sent out scouting parties. cupied the first line and sent out scouring parties.

The presence of the Allied force is creating an excellent effect among the Czecho-Slovaks. The Japanese were most efficient looking as they paraded in heavy marching order through the town between silent lines of townspeople. They were reviewed by naval and military officers at Czech headquarters, where their commander was warmly congratulated.

JAP FORCE IN MANCHURIA.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Japan's movement of troops to Siberia through Manchuria is under the agreement with China which followed news recently that former German and Austro-Hungarian prisoners in Siberia had assumed leadership of the Soviet forces along the borders of Manchuria, and were pressing upon the Chinese frontier in the direction of the town of Manchuria, and were pressing upon the Chinese frontier in the direction of the town of Manchuria, compelling many Japanese and Chinese to seek refuge in flight.

It was agreed, as a provisional measure, that a portion of the Japanese troops stationed in South Manchuria should be ordered to proceed immediately toward Manchuli. The size of the expedition cannot be disclosed for military reasons. Stations in Manchuria along the railroad and elsewhere vacated by the Japanese probably will be occupied by Chinese troops, is said to be invested by hostile bands of mixed German and Austrian prisoners and Red Guards, but if the Japanese forces reach the railroad to the westward and in the neighborhood of Lake Baikal it is expected that the railroad between that point and Vladivostok will soon be free from these elements.

WILL RESPECT CHINA'S RIGHTS.

TOKIO, Aug. 18.—Concerning the sending of Japanese troops through Chinese territory, Manchuria, the Japanese Government of troops has been actuated solely by a spirit of harmonlous co-operation. Japan and China face a threatening danger, and, in undertaking to combat it, the Japanese Government will scrupulously respect the sovereignty of China as well as the rights and interests of the local population."

Will Help Seminoff.

It is believed in Japanese circles here that the provisional force is intended to be sent northward and westward by way of Itarbin, and consequently they may be able to relieve the Cossack General Saminoff, who has been sorely beset in the neighborhood of Chila, and has been obliged to play hide and seek across the border line between Mongolia and Siberia to meet the attack of the German-led Bolsheviki forces. It is assumed that as the Japanese troops were ordered to move four days ago they are now close to the Mongolian border.

The section of the Siberian railroad directly westward of Vladivostok, which would ordinarily be used to transport troops, is said to be invested by hostile bands of mixed German and Austrian prisoners and Red Guards, but if the Japanese forces reach the railroad to the westward and in the neighborhood of Lake Balkal it is expected that the railroad between that point and Vladivostok will soon be free from these elements.

WILL RESPECT CHINA'S RIGHTS.

FLIGHT LIEUT. MEEK OF SOUTHWOLD IS KILLED IN ACTION

Young Officer Who Went Overseas a Second Time Meets Death.

**WAR'S BRINK**


