

Halifax, March 19 .- "The rioting of the Canadian soldiers at Date of Voting On Question of Rhyl camp on March 4 and 5, in which five men were killed and twenty wounded, is directly chargeable to the authorities at Ottawa and at Argyle House, London. It was the direct result of the tragedies inflicted upon the Dominion's fighting men by those responsible for their repatriation and return to Canada.

"My heart bleeds for the Canadian soldier in his present trouble," he told the reporter. "The basic cause of the trouble in England is that Canada was absolutely unprepared for peace. This evening I read Sir Edward Kemp's statement on the situation, and from beginning to end it is a series of excases for things that should not have to be excused. He boasts of what has been done in the matter of repatriating the Canadian soldiers. Why, in the same time that Canada has repatriated and returned 58,000 men. Great Britain has repatriated 2,000,000, the United States has done nearly as well, and Australia has repatriated 92,000, and has transported them 12,000 miles.

"That fact lies at the root of the trouble in England. The last straw that caused the Rhyl rioting was the announcement that the units of the 3rd Division, largely made up of M. S. A. men. would be sent to Canada ahead of those who had fought in France for two three and four years, and who had practically all been wounded. Shortly before the rioting there came to Rhyl camp the announcement that there were no ships, and that nothing definite could be told the inmates of the camp regarding the probable dates of their departure for Canada. On Monday, March 3, the British papers carried the statement that plans had been completed for sending home the units of 3rd Division. The men in Rhyl knew that most of the battalions of the 3rd Division had been decimated during the final months of the war and had been filled up with M. S. A. men, and they knew further that practically the last of the M. S. A. men in England had been sent over to France after the signing of the armis-
