CITY WATER IS AGAIN SAFE TO DRINK

London's drinking water received a clean bill from General Manager E. V. Buchanan of the public utilities commission this morning. He issued a warning Monday, following washing of surface water into reserve ponds at Springbank during Sunday's storm, to the effect that all drinking water should be boiled before using, and now states that further boiling is unnecessary.

Tests of water taken from the city's drinking supply Monday and analyzed by officials at the Institute of Public Health, show a trace of colon bacilli in ten cubic centimetres. However, this is not regarded as a serious condition, similar traces being occasionally discovered prior to the flooding of the ponds.

Tests of today's water supply samples are expected to be negative, showing the supply to be aqua pura in the full sense of the word. The water is still being chlorinated. "I am drinking all the water I want without boiling it,"

declared Manager Buchanan today. "I think it is perfectly clear now." Following flooding of the reserve ponds Sunday, they were emptied into the river as a precautionary measure, 5,000,000 gallons being lost in this manner.

DE VALERA IS CONFIDENT THAT A SATISFACTORY BASIS FOR PEACE IN IRELAND WILL BE FOUND

Irish Republican Leader Declares Conditions Were Never More Favorable in History Than At Presnt Time-Conference Between Sinn Fein Chief and British Premier Is Now in Progress.

London, July 14.—Eamonn de Valera, agreement was reached at the recent the Irish Republican leader, arrived at Dublin conference between Eamonn de No. 10 Downing street at 4:30 o'clock Valera and the Southern Unionists rethis afternoon for his conference with Mr Lloyd George, set for that hour, at which an effort will be made to find a basis for an Irish peace settlement.



WORMS DESTROYING MANY TOBACCO PLANTS

LEAMINGTON, July 13. — The crops of tobacco in this district are being damaged by the tobacco worm. This worm, if allowed to remain on the plants, causes much destruction, as it eats the leaves. The farmers are combatting the worms by allowing chickens and ducks to remain in the fields, and in this way get rid of a large number of the pests. The most common method of destroying them, however, is the use of a mixture of paris green and arsenate of lead mixed with water. Care must be exercised, however, in the use of this solution that the plants are not burned by using too strong a solution.



STATE CONTROL OF CANTEENS NOT FAVORED

Committee Suggests Advance of a Loan As Working Capital.

LONDON, July 14 .- The parliament. ary committee's report on canteen funds states that there has been handed over to the united services fund a sum of £3,049,000 in cash, and also a one million pound sterling funding loan valued at £800,000 at cost; and to the forces of the United States and dominions and colonies the sum of £540,000. After the shares of the United States, the dominions and India have been satisfied, the committee believes that the share of the united services fund will not be less than £7,000,000.


The committee is convinced that the maintenance of some permanent canteens organization is desirable, but considers that navy and army institutions should not be financed with money derived from ex-service men, even in the form of a loan at interest. State control is not recommended, but the committee suggests that the treasury advance the loan as working capital with repayment extended over a ten-year period.

The committee have not solved the question of losses, it being stated that the total profits of the expeditionary force canteens were £10,000,000. This organization, which was formed in 1915, went into liquidation in 1919, handing over its business to the navy and army canteen board.

The latter body, the report states, still carried on during the demobilization period as a separate concern. The report add: "There appears to be no doubt that considerable losses have been incurred."


