FRENCH CLAIMS SETTLED Turkey Pays Up \$7,000,000 Indemnity for Railroad Controversy.

Paris, April 15. - A dispatch to the semi-official Temps from Constantinople says the French ambassador, M. Constans, has received an imperial irade making a complete and definite settlement of the French claims, It gives an indemnity of \$7,000,000 for the controversy over the Damascus-Nazrib Railroad and insures continuous French control of the road, and also accords as damages \$320,000 to the French company operating the quays

The principal feature of the irade is an agreement to use a third of a loan of \$12,000,000 for ordering warships and artillery from French firms. The latter feature gives much satisfaction here, as it was sharply opposed by Turkey, with the concurrence of the German ambassador.

### ESTIMATES UP NEXT TUESDAY

Trustworthy dispatches from the Far East now show that Rojestvensky, first reported, is moving in a northeast. in mind hit-and-get-away operations while he has, by uniting his fleet, provided against defeat in detail, defeat in chances of his ships eluding the

Meanwhile, the whereabouts of Togo remains something of a mystery. It was obvious objections to the colony or reported that he had made a base of Kelung, on the south coast of Formosa. This would be an admirable point at which to await the enemy, as it commands the two northern channels of exit from the South China Sea, the straits between Luzon and Formosa likely to succeed. on the one side and the mainland of China on the other. There is nothing, however, to show that Togo will choose to fight here. He may prefer to rush to Vladivostock ahead of the enemy. If he elects to fight off the coast of Formosa within a day or two, we will have news of the battle through crippled ships entering neutral ports. If Vladivostock be the point at which the fleets are to clash, it will be several follows: weeks before there is a battle.

It has frequently been pointed out that the Russians, in tonnage, greatly outweigh the Japanese. On the other hand, it is generally admitted that the Mikado's ships can outsteam and outmaneuver the Russians. However, there is luck to reckon with, and although, by many experts considered improbable, it is quite possible that Rojestvensky may pull off a victory.

Lord Nelson fought with 27 ships against the allies' larger fleet of 33 ships. Togo is expected to have some 40 vessels against a possible 50 under Rojestvensky.

As at Trafalgar, so now in the Far East, the stake for which the two great fleets will struggle is the command of the sea. It is Russla's last hope of redeeming her lost prestige, while Japan risks not only her sea power, but the fruits of their victories by land. Both as to the actual conflict and the issues at stake, everything points to the greatest naval battle of modern times one that promises to be



# MARKET SMALLER, BUT SALES BRISK

Attendance Falls Off for Two Weeks-The Price of Oats Drops.

There was a good demand for eggs and butter, and the supply in these lines was fairly large, but not up to what had been expected by buyers The price of butter advanced about ! cent, crocks selling at 22 cents and rolls at 23 and 25 cents a pound. The market's egg supply was very nearly cleaned out by 10:30 o'clock. The price was 13 cents a dozen, and it is probable that this will remain pretty firm until after Easter.

The majority of potatoes sold at 7 cents a bag. Apples sold at from 30 to 50 cents a bag. Not much poultry was offered, and the same was the case with maple syrup. There was a great demand for the latter. Most of the farmers have now com leted putting in their oat crops.



Chicago, April 15. - Nicholas Savine, who styles himself alternately "prince" and "Count of Toulouse-Lautrec," who is well known in Chicago, and who is where he was arrested on landing from one of the world's most picturesque adventurers, is now a prisoner in his native country, Russia. A cablegram from Berlin states that upon a request from the Russian consul at Bremen, Savine has been conveyed to the frontier and turned over to the Russian author-

He fooled Stambouloff into favoring him for the successor of Ferdinand, and was forthwith dispatched to Constantinople to secure the assistance of the Sultan. There he was recognized by a Russian secret agent and instantly kidnapped and taken to Russia to answer to several charges of forgery.

Savine was tried at Moscow in 1893 and sentenced to life banishment to Siberia, including ten years at hard labor in the mines. But the genius of the adventurer rose to the demand of this adversity. He contrived to escape from the mines and to make his way to Tomsk, where he established himself as a corn merchant. But he had to swindle somebody, so he began a series of jugglings in grain, which presently got him into fail, where he was identified as the escaped convict, Back to the mines went the "prince" and "count' to be flogged into unconsciousness and thrown into a dungeon.

He seems to have spent about a year longer in the penal settlement, from which he escaped again in the latter part of 1895, making his way into China and eventually to Shanghai, where he took passage to the United States. When in jail in Chicago he related his experiences as a day laborer in San Francisco, Denver, and then as a cab driver, waiter, and billiard marker in







SIR WILFRID LAUDIER

By sheer force of ability and the compelling power of character, Sir Wilfrid Laurier has reached the highest position in Canadian politics, and won a name that "must live in the annals of the British Empire." He has overridden obstacles that would have daunted a man of less virile genius and patriotism. Though French was his ancestry and language, and Catholicism his religion, he has become the leader of the destinies of a great Englishspeaking nation, the larger part of whose people are Protestants.

He was born in St. Lin, Quebec, in 1841, of a family of rebels who fought brayely under Papineau in the revolt of 1837. From the little country school where his teacher, a Scotchman, spurred his ambition and powerfully influenced his life, he passed to L'Assomption College, and in 1864, after completing his course in law, entered the Bar. When he made his debut in politics in 1871 as a member of the Quebec Assembly, his magic eloquence, the fearlessness, strength and finality of his words, and the mastery by which he brought order out of chaos, light out of darkness, thrilled his audience.

Three years later he resigned from the Legislature and was returned to the House of Commons on the overthrow of the Macdonald government. In 1876 he became minister of inland revenue, and two years later changes in politics deprived him of this position. He was the acknowledged leader of the Liberals who were the Opposition party until 1896, when after eighteen years of waiting, the reins of government again came into their hands and in the first flush of triumph they made him Premier.

His statesmanship has been broad, liberal, far-sighted; his patriotism and his love of liberty are manifest in every act and word. He loves and erishes the British Empire, and glories in the part that Canada takes in but as a Power of great possibility, sharing with the United States the lden future of the American continent, he demands of England and the world the recognition of Canada, not as a babe in the swaddling clothes of a olony, but as a full grown nation of virility and assured triumph,


